MOST HORRIBLE.
A WOMAN CURED TO DEATH BY A BULL.—We find the following in the Montreal Transcript. It relates to the death of a Mrs. Young of Ormstown on the Chateauguay River, Canada. The unfortunate sufferer was we understand the widow of a farmer of that name, but continued to reside upon the land, and to derive from it such return as the industry and labour of herself and daughter could procure. She raised a bull calf, on account of his beauty, which, having been familiarized with his mistress ever since his birth, and having always been fed by her hand displayed a natural attachment by no means displeasing to Mrs. Young, whom he followed about the farm like a dog. The animal is now a little more than two years old. Towards the end of last week he had, as usual, accompanied the cows to the homestead, and they were fastened in the cow-house, when Mrs. Young and her daughter proceeded thither to milk them.

On entering the building the girl proceeded to the far end, to milk the cow fastened there, and the loose bull advanced with his usual familiarity to Mrs. Young, who pushed him aside with the pail she carried in her hand. The animal immediately turned upon her, and with the first thrust of his horn penetrated the abdomen, and violently raising his head ripped her body in the most shocking manner. He immediately fled to the yard carrying upon his horns a small fragment of the clothing, and a portion of the entrails of his victim, here he tossed and shook his head in a most frantic manner, and roaring, returned to make a second charge upon the hapless Mrs. Young. By this time, however, the daughter had seized the pailfork, with which she gallantly faced the animal, and after a long struggle, and two or three very successful stabs at the head of her antagonist, she fairly beat him from his purpose. Her first care was now her unfortunate mother, who with such assistance as she could give, was with much difficulty removed to the dwelling house, where, after a night passed in inexpressible torture, she died the following morning.—*Phila. Gaz.*

THRILLING INCIDENT.
The following occurrence took place at the fire in Charleston, on Sunday morning, the ninth instant. "While the fire was at its height," observes the Mercury, "orders were given to blow up a wooden house on Queen street. The powder was placed in the lower story, the slow match ignited, and the Engineer's horn sounded, as a signal for the people to depart from the spot. The signal was promptly obeyed, and the crowd retiring, left a vacant space in front of the devoted building. At this moment, an engine drawn by negroes and directed by the proper officer came furiously down the street, burst through the crowd, and rushed into the deserted spot. So rapidly did they advance, that every effort to arrest their progress proved unavailing. Amidst the noise and confusion of the scene, and the rumbling of the wheels of the engine over the stones, the loudest cries were unheard or disregarded, and the poor fellows attached to the engine full of zeal and energy, moved on as it was feared to destruction, wholly unconscious of the approach of danger.

At length as they advanced towards the fatal spot, the leader seemed to become aware that there was something wrong, and the engine was halted directly in front of the building. It was a moment of breathless interest. The explosion instantly followed. The engine could not at that time have been more than twenty feet from the walls of the house which was blown up. The effect was much less disastrous than could have been anticipated. Every person standing on the engine was thrown off by the shock of the explosion, and two of the negroes were severely wounded, the one having his arm very much lacerated, and the other injured in the head, both by fragments thrown from the building. The rest of the men, though very much stunned, and some of them slightly bruised, got off without any serious injury.

NEW MEXICAN MINISTER.
A clip from the Philadelphia Inquirer says: "We learn by a Mexican paper, just received" from Vera Cruz, that *Senor Don Francisco Pizarro Martinez*, long known as the patriotic and efficient Mexican Consul at New Orleans, has been appointed Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States. The statement is copied from the *Diario del Gobierno*, of a very recent date. From this it appears evident that the Mexican Government is fully disposed to make a further effort to adjust the differences between the two nations, by pacific means.

A very late letter has also been received from *Cel. Almonte*. He fully confirms the recent accounts of preparations for prosecuting the war in Texas, but we cannot expect that much will be done before the close of the dry season, perhaps about the middle of September.

FOREIGN.
LATE AND IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE
—DEATH OF THE KING OF ENGLAND—EFFECT OF OUR SPECIE SUSPENSION, &c.
Three packet ships have arrived at New York—the *St. James* from London, the *Louis Phi-*

lippo from Havre, and the *Westminster* from London. The London papers are to the 20th June inclusive, the Paris to the 16th, and the Liverpool to the 17th of the same month. From the New York journals before us we make the following interesting extracts:
DEATH OF THE KING OF ENGLAND.
The news of this event is thus announced in the Morning Chronicle of the 20th.

"His Majesty expired about twenty minutes past three o'clock this morning. The Archbishop of CANTERBURY was present, as were also several members of the Royal Family. Immediately after the decease the Archbishop of CANTERBURY left Windsor Castle for Town."
The news of the suspension of specie payments in this country reached Liverpool by the *Europe*, on the morning of the 11th, and London on the 12th, in time for the morning papers. The catastrophe had been in a measure anticipated, and notwithstanding the abusive article published in the *Times*, it is apparent that the merchants generally looked upon the suspension as calculated to increase the chances of remittances from this country. The *Times* itself admits that such was the general opinion in the city, and the Morning Post adds—"The suspension of payment in specie in all the principal cities of the Union is viewed by parties with different sentiments, but the more general impression seems to be that it will be extended with ultimately beneficial results."

The same paper also contains the following paragraph:
"We learn that an idea prevails among the leading mercantile men and capitalists in the city, that the financial difficulties which have existed for so many months past, are now nearly at an end, and that a public declaration to that effect is in contemplation. The late events in America have evidently tended much to restore confidence."

As was to be expected, this event has called forth much speculation, considerable anxiety, some commotion, and not a little vituperation against the Americans. We are pleased to see, however, that some of the London journals have had sagacity enough to perceive, and the candour to acknowledge, the willingness of debtors in America, to discharge their obligations, and the probability that their power to do so would be increased by the event in question.—The London *Times* displays none of its wonted obstinacy, and pours forth a sufficient flood of obloquy upon us and our country.

We do not see that new commercial difficulties or embarrassments have taken place to any great extent in England. Various houses were applying to the Bank for aid, and it was thought not improbable that aid would be granted. Among others the long established house of Brown, Brothers & Co. was confident of assistance to any required extent.

The news of the suspension was carried to Liverpool by the *Europe*, and to Havre by the *Sally*; the former arrived on the 11th of June, the latter on the 12th. These vessels also took out the intelligence of the call of Congress. The *Chloris* re-appeared at Naples on the 13th of April. From that date till the 19th of May, 226 persons were attacked by it, and of these, 117 died.

OBITUARY.
On the 19th instant, near Friendship, A. A. county, in the forty-seventh year of her age, *Mrs. C. GUYNE* wife of Capt. Samuel Guyne, after an uncompromising affliction of many months duration, calmly sank into eternal repose.

A BY-LAW

Relating to Dogs in the City of Annapolis. [Passed July 16, 1837.]
SECTION 1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council of the city of Annapolis, and the authority of the same, That from and after the twentieth day of July instant, it shall not be lawful for any dog to go at large within the limits of this city, or its precincts, without a collar, on which shall be written and inscribed the name of the owner, and that any dog or dog going at large, the owner or owners thereof shall pay a fine of one dollar for every male dog, and a fine of three dollars for every female dog, to be recovered as other fines are, the one half to the informer, the other to the use of the Corporation.

Sec. 2. And be it further established and ordained, That if any dog or dogs shall be suffered to go at large a second time, the owner or owners thereof shall be again subjected to the fine in the manner pointed out in the preceding section, and in addition thereto it shall be the duty of the City Constables to kill such dog or dogs, and for each and every dog killed in pursuance of this by-law, the constable killing the same shall be entitled to the sum of fifty cents.

Sec. 3. And be it further established and ordained, That if any person or persons shall, under pretext of executing this ordinance, kill or in anywise injure any dog which may have on a collar, or be at the time on the owners premises, he shall be subject to a fine of twenty dollars, to be recovered in like manner as other fines and forfeitures, and to be paid to the Informer.

A BY-LAW.

A Supplement to the By-Law establishing West-street, passed April 18th, 1837. [Passed July 16, 1837.]

SECTION 1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council of the city of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That the By Law passed on the 18th April 1837, entitled, a By-Law establishing West-street, be now recorded by the Clerk of this Corporation, the same having been omitted to be recorded at the time the same was passed.

Sec. 2. And be it further established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That the City Commissioners be again authorized and required to execute the provisions of the by-law to which this is a supplement, and in so doing they shall in all respects conform to the provision of the said original by-law, especially in that respect in which the width of the said street is not to be diminished.

Sec. 3. And be it further established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That in executing this by-law the City Commissioners need not give notice in the newspapers, but in lieu thereof shall give notice to the owners of lots on said street.
