JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS of the House of Delegates of the State of Maryland.

DECEMBER SESSION, 1837.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 10th, 1836.

The speaker announced the following message as having been received from the senate on yesterday, by their clerk, viz—

A bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act to make valid a certain instrument of writing therein named, and for other purposes.

Also, a bill, further to continue an act to incorporate the Maryland Insurance Company.

And, returned the resolution directing his Excellency the Governor, to cause to be delivered to Captain Thomas Dowden, two hundred stand of muskets, accoutrements, &c., endorsed, "assented to," with the proposed amendments."

Which amendments were severally read, assented to, and the resolution ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Bowie, presented a petition of certain citizens of Anne Arundel county, praying the repeal of the law limiting the time of service of Inspectors of Tobacco, in the city of Baltimore.

Mr. Berret, a petition of sundry citizens of Carroll county praying that the commissioners of the tax for said county, may be elected by the people.

Mr. Iglehart, a petition of sundry citizens of Prince George's and Anne Arundel counties, praying the passage of a law authorizing the rebuilding a bridge over Patuxent river.

Mr. Mann, a petition of Samuel Read and others, citizens of Washington county, praying the passage of an act authorizing the Botanical or Thompsonian system to be practiced by persons not members of the Medical Faculty.

On motion of Mr. Simmons,

Ordered, that the special committee on the State's Tobacco Warehouses and Inspections, be directed to enquire into the expediency of condemning a portion of the wharves adjoining said warehouses in Baltimore, for the exclusive use of the tobacco trade, and said wharves to be placed under the control of the tobacco inspectors.

On motion of Mr. Simmons,

Ordered, that the committee on inspections be directed to report a bill, requiring the Executive to appoint an inspector and clerk to the new State Tobacco Warehouse in Baltimore.

Mr. Sollers submitted the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas a demand has been made by the Executive of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on the Executive of the State of Maryland, to surrender Nathan S. Bemis and others, as fugitives from justice, under the constitution and laws of the U. States; and whereas, His Excellency the Governor of this State, conceiving the demand to be imperative upon him, and that it could not be refused without a violation of the constitution and law of the U. States, did cause a warrant to issue for the arrest of said Nathan S. Bemis and others, and for their surrender to the constituted authorities of Pennsylvania; and whereas, it has been established to the satisfaction of this General Assembly, that the said parties have committed no moral inpropriety in re-occupying property, which a court of competent jurisdiction of this State, has solemnly decided to be rightfully theirs, and it is apprehended that consequences may arise out of this matter, alike injurious to the fixed principles and feelings of the good people of this State, and calculated to disturb the friendly relations, and to mar that harmony which have always subsisted, and which this Legislature sincerely desires should be continued, between the State of Maryland and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and it is hoped and believed, that upon a fair representation of all the facts and circumstances of this case, the proper authorities of our sister State will cause all proceedings in this matter to be forthwith arrested, and will consent to such modification of the law of Pennsylvania, of 1820, in relation to this subject, as will effectually guard the interests of slave-holders of this State.

Be it therefore resolved, That a special agent, not a member of either branch of this Assembly, be deputed to repair to Harrisburg, and endeavour by a candid, earnest and respectful representation of the circumstances of this case, to remove all the difficulties which at present unfortunately exist between the two States, in relation to this matter, and that the said agent be appointed by the Governor and Council.

Which was read the first time;

Mr. Sollers moved that the preamble and resolution be read a second time by special order.

Determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Maulsby, the house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday, being the report submitted by him on Saturday last, from the special committee, in relation to the demand of the Executive of Pennsylvania upon the Governor of Maryland, for the surrender of Nathan S. Bemis, Jacob Fortwood, Edward Pigg and Stephen Lewis, citizens of Maryland, as fugitives from justice.

Mr. Sollers offered as a substitute for said report the preamble and resolution submitted by him this morning, proposing a special agent, not a member of either branch of Assembly, be deputed to repair to Harrisburg and endeavour to remove all the difficulties which at present

unfortunately exist between the two States, in relation to this matter;

Which was read the first and second time.

Mr. Alexander moved to amend said substitute by striking out all after the preamble, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it is inexpedient to suspend, or in any manner to interfere with the action of the Executive of this State upon the requisition made by the Governor of Pennsylvania on the Executive of this State, for the delivery of Nathan S. Bemis, and others, as fugitives from Pennsylvania.

Resolved, That this State should avail itself of the opportunity which is now afforded for settling, by the highest judicial authority, the sufficiency of the guarantee afforded by the Constitution of the United States to the slaveholding States of this Union, for the reclamation of their fugitive slaves.

Resolved, That the Executive of this State be requested to appoint a special agent on behalf of this State, with the assent of the Executive of Pennsylvania, to conduct or assist the said Nathan S. Bemis, and others, in conducting their defence of the prosecutions now pending against them in York County Court of Oyer and Terminer, in the State of Pennsylvania, and that the said special agent request that the Attorney General of Pennsylvania be instructed by the Executive of said State to conduct the trial of said prosecutions in such manner that every matter of constitutional defence may be stated on the record, so that the same may be presented for adjudication of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Resolved, That said agent also request that the said Nathan S. Bemis, and others, be permitted to remain at large on reasonable bail being given for their surrender to the competent authorities of Pennsylvania, in case the said prosecutions shall be finally determined in favour of the said State, and that in the event of such determination the power and authority of this State shall be exercised for the apprehension and delivery of said Bemis and others, to the authorities of the State of Pennsylvania.

Resolved, That the said agent be instructed to suggest the anxiety of this State, that some concurrent legislation shall be had by the States of Pennsylvania and Maryland, for the enforcement of their reciprocal obligations to surrender, each to the other, fugitives from justice and fugitive slaves, and that the said agent be authorized to communicate with the Governor or the Legislature of Pennsylvania, as may from time to time be expedient, and appear to be the best calculated to advance the purposes of his mission.

Resolved, That the expenses attending the execution of the foregoing resolutions, and the employment of such additional counsel as the Executive of this State shall deem expedient to employ in defence of the aforesaid prosecutions, shall be defrayed out of any unappropriated money in the Treasury.

Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, will the house adopt the substitute as offered by Mr. Sollers, Determined in the negative.

The question then returned upon concurring in the report of the committee, and

Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Alexander, the yeas and nays were ordered and appeared as follows—

The report of the committee was concurred in.

The blanks in the message recommended by the report of the committee having been filled by the chair, with the names of Messrs. Maulsby and Alexander.

The said message was then read the second time and assented to.

The house then adjourned.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 11th.

The speaker laid before the house a communication from the Treasurer of the Western Shore, in obedience to an order of the house of delegates of the 2d inst. enclosing an exhibit of the number of banks in this state, where they are located, and the amount of State's stock in each or any of them, and also the amount of capital of each of said banks;

Which was read; and

On motion of Mr. Alexander, referred to the special committee on the currency.

Mr. Jump, of Caroline, presented a petition of Thomas Roe, and Louisa B. Roe, of Caroline county, praying the passage of an act to authorize and empower the said Louisa B. Roe to execute a certain deed.

Mr. Witmer, a petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, praying to amend an act passed in 1798, chapter 106, wherein certain

medical gentlemen therein named, are invested with cert to exclusive privileges of practicing medicine in this state.

Mr. Powder obtained leave to bring in a bill relative to the compensation of judges of the orphans' court of Carroll county.

The clerk of the senate returned the resolution requiring the sheriff of Allegany county to pay over to the treasurer of the poor school fund of said county, the amount forfeited by the securities of Samuel Warnick, endorsed, "assented to," ordered to be engrossed.

And, delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act to divorce William Harris, of Talbot county, from his wife Elizabeth L. Harris;

Also, a petition of Purnell Toadrine, John W. Rider and others, merchants of the town of Salisbury, praying the repeal of an act of assembly, endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the house of delegates;"

And, a petition of Benjamin Dashiell, president of the board of trustees of Wetiquin academy, on behalf of said board, praying a donation to the institution from the state.

On motion of Mr. Risteau,

Ordered, That the committee on the currency are hereby authorized and clothed with full and ample power to examine into the accounts of the directors of the different banks of the state; and also to ascertain whether or not, there is any connection between the brokers and said banks; and furthermore, to inquire into the issues of said banks for the last six months preceding their suspension of specie payments, and for the last six months since that period, and report to this house at as early a period as practicable.

On motion of Mr. Risteau,

Ordered, That it be considered, on ways and means inquiry into the expediency or propriety of imposing a tax by license, on the brokers of the state.

Mr. Neff reported a supplement to an act to provide for electing commissioners for Allegany county, and prescribing their powers and duties; and,

Mr. Huddelson, from the select committee, a further supplement to the act to incorporate the George's Creek Mining Company;

Which were severally read the first, and by a special
