

20 or 30 rods ahead, and requested him to wait until he came up, on which he halted. Passing over an intervening low spot in the road, that brought us out of sight, he stopped and faced about. Being too near him to use the contents of the rifle, I seized it at the well with my right hand, and with my left back of the guard, I proceeded to draw on his head the instant the attempt was made to withdraw his hand from his pants pocket, as it had remained there since rising the hill. In this position, he asked me if I had any specie that I would exchange for paper, with a trembling voice and a guilty countenance. I sternly answered no; on which he said, I will go a grapping, and turned off the road into the swamp. I proceeded on, passed the man whom he had haled in company with one or two others on the side of the road, and arrived at the river St. Francis, which is here about 100 yards wide, determined not to proceed farther than the opposite side of the river without company; but on waiting a few minutes for the ferry-boat, was overtaken by three gentlemen on horseback, to whom I related the circumstances of my being alarmed, and requested the privilege of keeping their company through the swamp, which was about 37 miles farther, to which they agreed, and took my luggage, and we proceeded and arrived safe at Memphis on the next day.

[Mr. W. seems to have been preserved as by a miracle. How many travellers in that southern country are yearly murdered under similar circumstances, of whom no trace is ever found.]
