

than usual; no phosphorescence was visible in the sea itself, being, most probably, overcome by the colour of the water. The vessel sailed about fifteen miles through this white sea, and then left it suddenly as it reached its meeting in an instant the tumultuous sea it had been sailing in before. The change in both, was as rapid as a flash of lightning. The same phenomenon was again observed two or three times for periods of about twenty minutes duration; and the appearance was in both instances, as before described. Colonel Briggs remarked upon the latter, that he had himself witnessed a similar phenomenon on board the Benares, in the year 1810; that some alarm was at first caused by, but that the captain had witnessed this remarkable appearance before. In fact, he understood that it was no means rare, but had been noticed by most vessels sailing in these latitudes."

The editor of the Boston Journal says:—We once witnessed a phenomenon somewhat similar, in the Atlantic Ocean, when the nearest soundings, Bermuda, was supposed to bear N. W. five hundred miles. The light green patch appeared to be about half a mile in length, and contrasted with the dark blue ocean, looked truly alarming. We passed over it, and sounded, but found no bottom within one hundred fathoms of line.

INDIAN RELICS.
A mound in this city has been partially opened this week, and our citizens are picking up beads, arrow points, stone knives, and various other instruments and ornaments. One skeleton has been discovered entire, and portions of others. On counting the grains of the stump of a tree that stands upon the top of the mound, it appears that this tree must have been one hundred and fifty years old. It had been cut down about sixteen years. We suppose that this ancient receptacle of the dead must have been formed about two hundred years ago.

FOREIGN.

From the N. Y. Cour. & Enquirer of yesterday.
NINE DAYS LATER FROM LONDON.
The packet ship Montreal, Capt. GRIFFIN, arrived last night, bringing us London papers of the 9th ultimo. The late hour at which these papers came to hand, and the business of the elections, compel us to be very brief in our notice of their contents.

There is little political news from England. The Speaker of the house of Commons had passed a reprieve and on Mr. O'CONNELL for "false and slanderous imputations" he had made on the honour of the House. Mr. O'CONNELL observed in reply, that the sentence of the House was of little importance to him individually, and that body does not appear to have thought it worth while to take any further action on the subject.

A Bill, brought in by Ministers on the subject of parliamentary elections, had been defeated in the House of Lords by the large majority of 65. In the Commons, an important division had taken place, on a motion to represent to her Majesty that "the open defiance of her majesty's lawful authority in the Province of Upper and Lower Canada, and the necessity of suppressing rebellion by force of arms, and of suspending the Constitutional Government of Lower Canada, are in a great degree attributable to the want of foresight and energy on the part of her Majesty's confidential servants, and to the ambiguous, dilatory and irresolute course which they have pursued in respect to the affairs of Canada since their appointment to office."

The ministerial majority on this question was but 29. Mr. Ewart, of Liverpool, (Radical) had been beaten at the election for a member for Marylebone by Lord Teignmouth, (Conservative), and on the whole, the Conservative party seem gaining strength and confidence.

We copy all the information we find relative to the London Money Market, and other commercial matters. The fall in our rates of foreign Exchange had, as we predicted, excited much attention. The accounts of the Liverpool Cotton Market are unfavourable. No less than six hundred thousand pounds sterling has arrived in the Montreal.

From France and Spain there is nothing of importance.
