In the House of Commons, August 10, Captain Wood moved for leave to bring in a bill to increase the duties on foreign grains, &c. The motion was negatived.

We are now certain of a deficient harvest, and as there is reason to fear a failure of the crops in those countries from which we have been in the habit of supplying our deficiency of food, something like famine may be reserved for us in the course of the ensuing winter.
