LATE FROM THE PACIFIC-CAPTURE OF LIMA BY THE CHILIAN ARMY.
A slip from the office of the Brunawick (Geo Advocate mentions the arrival there, in distress of the schooner Olive, in 31 days from Chagras bound for New York. Mr. F. E. HASSLER American Consul at Panama, was a passenge in the Olive, and communicates the following interesting intelligence:

PANANA, 15th Sept., 1839. By an arrival from Guayaquil, we have re-ceived the following intelligence, which we extract from letters of authenticity from that place

On the night of the 27th July, the Bolivian troops, together with two lattalions of Peru vians, under General Moran, left Lima, and or the following morning, Nieto entered the city accompanied by Orbegozo and about 2000 men and declared the Constitution of 1835, Orbegozu being named Provisional Director. On the 7th August, the Chilian squadron arrived off Callao. consisting of 32 vessels, including transports, and ten men of war; and on the 8th landed at Aucon 5000 nien.

The Chilians demanded twenty millions of dollars, and possession of Callao, until the arrangement should be concluded. These de-mands were considered inadmissible. They then advanced and took Callao and Lima, afte an action, in which it is said 2000 men were killed. General Gamarra has been proclaimed President. The South still adheres to the caus of Santa Cruz, who, it is said, was within three days of Lima, with an army of 1000 men. The dates from Callao are up to the 22d August and from Guayaqual to the 1st Sep. Orbegoz had fled to the mountains.

It appears from the annexed letter, which we copy from the St. Lems Republican, that blood has already been spilt in a conflict between the Mormons and a Missouri mob, and that a still more serious collision isthreatened. The Republican adds, that a messenger, bearing despatches to Gov. Boggs, arrived St. Louis of

Thursday, the 11th inst. Glasgow, Oct. 7th, 1838. Gentlemen.—As one of a Committee of six from the counties of Howard and Chariton, appointed to visit the county of Carroll, where the disturbance exists between the Mormons and the citizens, and to examine into the causes, and to endeavour to effect a reconciliation between the parties, I have thought proper to commu cate to you the facts as they exist. The Mor mons reside at a town, six miles above th mouth of Grand river, called De Witt. For the last week some citizens of Carroll, and other from Saline and Chariton counties, to the num ber of about two hundred persons, have been as sembled within one mile of Do Witt, all well armed, and have one piece of artillery, threaten ing every day to attack the Mormons in De Witt: in fact, on the 4th there was an attack only one man wounded of the mob party, as they are called. We were there on yesterday, and endeavoured to bring about a reconciliation b tween the parties; the citizens proposed that the Mormons would leave the county and not return again, they would pay them tack the mount their property cost, with ten per cent ir terest thereon, and return them the amount their expenses in coming in and going out of the county. The Mormons replied that ever since they have been a people they have been driven from place to place, and they had deterthey had determined, every one of them, to die on the ground. There are about 100 familie of Mornions who are there, and are now encamped with their wagons in town, having just arrived; what number of men they have could not ascertain, but presume they have considerable assistance from their principal town-Far West-ir Caldwell county, about 60 or 70 miles distant; in fact within the last 24 hours their numbers have increased so much that the 12 was below on the 26th. mob have declined an attack until reinforced from other counties. From the Mobile Chronicle. A friend has handed to us the following re-cipe for an incombustible wash for wooden buildings, which also renders brick work impervious to water.

Proportions for five gallons. The basis is lime, which must be first slacked with hot wa-ter in a tub covered, to keep in the steam; it should then be passed in a fluid form through a fine seive to obtain the flour of the same. Six quarts of lime and a quart of clean rock salt for each gallon of water, to be dissolved by boiling, and skinmed clean. To five galions of the mixture, add one pound of alum, a half pound of copperas, three fourths of a pound of potash-the last to be gradually added-four quarts of fine sand or hard wood ashes, say hickory. You may add any colouring matter taste detates. It should be applied with a brush, looks better than paint, and will be as lasting as slate, stops small leaks, prevents moss from growing, and renders the part washed incombustible.
