However much any portion of your committee might regret the inconvenience, trouble an t expense incident to an inquiry, whether the judges of election, from want of judgment, due information or corruption, have received and ounted illegal votes, yet the minority of the committee are of opinion that when an allega-tion is properly made that a member has been returned by illegal votes, or rejected by illegal votes, the constitution and law of the land re-

By the election laws of the State of Mary. egates to the General Assembly, who is not of he age of twenty-one years, and has not r stded twelve months in the State and six months in the county, next preceding said election. -And by the constitution it is declared, that the House of Delegates shall judge of the elections nd qualifications of its members.

Every candidate for a seat in this house who has received a sufficient number of legal votes to elect him, has a right from which he cannot be deprived. It matters not whether ill gal votes have been counted against him, from misapprehension, or fraud, by the judges. The only proper question is, were illegal votes received and counted? If they were, and inquiry is concluded, then an individual having a legal, right to his seat may be rejected.

The unsersigned cannot think, because the

judges of election may be presumed to act turly, that it is safer to trus to their decision tho question of legality in voting, than that this house should undertake to exercise its consuitational duty in investigating whether the judges prived the house of its proper member-an individual of his right-and the propie of their chosen representative. Should this doctrine prevail the worst cons quences may be approxnended. Every day gives additional pract of the corruption of judges of chetion and the necessity of passing penal laws to restrain their trauds and corruptions. It is well known that popular sentiment will not always to strain to the They are too often selected for party purpose and those selected, the weakness of whose and of the corrupt and inariguing. This is far from being always the case; nor will it be infiniated that a great body of the judges of election are not honourable men. It cannot be disputed that the three p having the greatest number of votes at the recent election in Kent county, are entitled to seats on this floor. If Mr. Kuby was one of those, he has a claim of which he cannot be deprived-and if deprived, he can demand an in-quiry from this house, which it cannot, without putting at defiance the constitution, d'ny him. He has the same right to demand a seat before this house that an individual has in the proces ention of a claim, to institute a suit in any of the courts of this State; and this house has no more right to refuse him redress, on the ground of inconvenience and discretion, that could the judges of the courts. If he choose to incur the responsibility of an investigation, and it turn out that his allegations are untenable, then the responsibility is with him—not with this house.

It has accorded to him what is his right and privilege. If though he prove the fact that he vas defeated by illegal votes, his claim is established and his right to a seat incontestable.

He contends that he received five hundred and thirty-five legal votes-that there were only two others who received a many votesthat William S Constable with whom he is re. turned by the judges tied, received only have eight legal votes and six illegal votes, for want hundred and twenty eight legal votes. It thus be true, Mr. Kirby has a legal vested right, which it is competent for him to establish in the way pointed out by the law.
