JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS
Of the House of Delegates of the State of Maryland,
DECEMBER SESSION, 1838.

Monday, February 4th, 1839.
A sufficient number of Delegates to form a quorum not appearing.

Tuesday, Feb. 5th.
Mr. Bier presented a paper containing additional evidence as to the right of John W. Geyer to a seat in the House of Delegates.

Mr. Spence, a memorial of John D. Marshall, of Worcester county, praying the passage of an act authorizing him to bring into this State certain negro slaves therein mentioned.

Mr. Wilmer, a memorial of sundry citizens of Queen Anne's county, praying the passage of a law making an annual appropriation for the promotion of agriculture and family domestic manufactures within this State.

Mr. Handy, a memorial of sundry citizens of Somerset county, praying a modification of the license law, so as to limit or prevent the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Mr. Gillespie, a petition of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying for the passage of a law requiring the commissioners of said county to levy a sum of money for the rebuilding of a bridge over Octorara creek.

Mr. Powder, a petition of sundry citizens of Carroll county, praying the passage of a law to regulate fences in said county.

Mr. Moulshy, a petition of Gabriel McComas, of Harford county, praying to be allowed and paid for the services therein mentioned.

Mr. Moulshy, a petition of Moses St. Clair, of Harford county, praying for a special act of insolvency.

Mr. Moulshy, a petition of Alisona Barton, of Harford county, claiming to be allowed and paid the sum of money therein mentioned.

Mr. Moulshy, a petition of John H. Mitchell and others, of Harford county, in behalf of Dennis Sherrin of said county for a pension.

Mr. Williams of Harford, a memorial of Isaac Rogers and 67 other citizens of Harford county, praying for the passage of an act in relation to the improvements suggested in said memorial.

On motion of Mr. Williams, of Harford, the house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday, being the bill reported by Mr. Hope, entitled, an act to repeal an act therein mentioned, and to give to all the voters of Harford county an equal voice in electing their county commissioners.

Which substitute was accepted by Mr. Hope. The said bill was then read the first, and by a special order the second time, and passed.

The amendments reported by the committee on corporations to said bill, having been read the second time, were assented to.

The said bill was then read the second time as amended, and passed.

The house then resumed the consideration of the report and resolution submitted by Mr. Page, in relation to the Annapolis and Elk Ridge Road Company.

Mr. Watson moved that the house adjourn; Resolved in the affirmative.
