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act to provide for electing commissioners for Allegany county, and prescribing their powers and duties, passed at December session 1829, chapter 25. And Mr. Hellen reported a bill, to authorize the levy court of Calvert county, to receive and dispose of a certain sum of money therein mentioned. Which were severally read the first, and by a special order the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate. Mr. Ghieslin reported a bill, to incorporate the Nottingham Silk Company, of Prince George's county. Mr. Pitts presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore city and county, praying a law for the punishment of certain trespassers. The clerk of the Senate delivered a bill originated in and passed by the Senate. To authorize the levy court of Kent county, to widen a certain road therein mentioned. Mr. Primrose made a favourable report upon said bill. The said bill was then read the first, and by a special order, the second time, passed, and returned to the Senate. On motion of Mr. Wilmer, The house took up for consideration the bill from the Senate, entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate the town of Centerville, in Queen Anne's county, and the amendments reported thereto, from the committee on corporations. The said bill was then read the second time, passed with the proposed amendments, and returned to the Senate. The bill reported by Mr. Thomas, requiring the sheriffs of the several counties of this State, to serve separately each writ of "captias ad respondendum," in their respective hands, against the same defendant, where the said writs are returnable to the same term. Was taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate. The house then proceeded to the consideration of the orders of the day. The first order of the day being the bill reported by Mr. Ford, entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled an act to incorporate the Eastern Shore Rail Road Company, passed at Dec. session, 1835, chapter 333. The said bill having been read through and amended, the question was put, shall the said bill pass. Resolved in the affirmative. On motion of Mr. Spencer, The house adjourned until 4 o'clock, P. M.

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
