7th. That restricting the action of the legis lature on the great questions relative to the public works and public revenue to what may be accomplished between now and Friday next, is equivalent to a total prohibition to act of

these subjects.

8th. It is therefore better to despatch speedi ly the business now before the legislature, and convene here, after a recess, when the great questions relative to the public works, the public credit and the faith of the State may exclusively demand the attention of the members of both houses, without mixing up the consideration of such momentous subjects with the busi-ness now pending at a season so unfitted for mature deliberation as the close of a long ses-
