Waller's case is a most extraordinary position for anyone retained in Waller's interest to take. Mr. Kennedy has not seen the evidence upon which Waller was convicted, nor has a copy of that evidence been read by any one connected with the state department. To plead guilty under such circumstances is a performance which can be defended upon no other grounds than that it is deemed expedient to sacrifice all questions of financial and national interests to permit Waller to go home and die with his children and imperishable reputation rather than to perish in his cell.

Washington, Nov. 22.—It is now certain that the State department will sue for Waller's release as an act of clemency. All idea of demanding it as a right has been abandoned, if, indeed, it was ever entertained. The state department from the beginning has devoted itself almost exclusively to hunting after extenuating circumstances to help out the case of France.

Its sole object seems to have not been to see that an American citizen should not be unjustly punished, but to make sure that we should not by undue resistance make ourselves disagreeable to the French authorities. The determination of the State department has not been brought about by any examination of the records, for the very simple reason that it had no records to examine.

Warner T. McGuinn, of Baltimore, counsel for Waller, today telegraphed his most earnest protest against the proposed action of the state department in admitting Waller's guilt of a political offense by suing for his release in favor of Mr. McGuinn holds that Waller's is unjustly deprived of his liberty, and that the United States cannot afford to put itself in the position of permitting a citizen to be imprisoned in a foreign country and then to release him by paying a ransom.

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**Our New City Governor.**

Mayor Hooper has spent the first week in office on a tour of the City Hall receiving office-seekers. The applicants have been legion and the positions applied for are the highest appointments under the mayor down to garbage cart driving on the street. All the applicants except one were cordially received and assured that their applications would receive due consideration. The exception was a clerical looking man who had offered some one whom he evidently thought had a pull with the mayor \$100. to get his application through. When the briber presented his person to the mayor or put the money to him, "Did you offer me \$100 to get your position?" the question so excited the mayor that he is reported to have plead guilty and left in haste.

The three officials who lost their heads by a stroke of the mayor's official ax are the superintendent of the City Hall and two assistants. It appears that these officials have been kept on the pay roll at an expense to the city of \$3,500 for the last eighteen years or more simply to accommodate agents of the ring, and as the present mayor believes the city is a great business institution he has taken the first opportunity to make good his pledge made during the campaign that he would apply the business rule at the City Hall.

The First and Second branches of the City Council held their second meeting last Monday night and the various committees were appointed. Dr. Cargill of the 11th ward was given a place on several committees, the most important of which is the educational committee. The greatest political sensation of the week was the change at the Sheriff's office. Mr. Stephen R. Mason took charge and retained 5 of the ring deputies and appointed 7 republicans. The day previous to the change, Mr. Mason, in an interview with a Sun reporter, stated he would put no colored man in his office. He also denounced a committee of prominent colored men who called on him and urged the appointment of an intelligent colored applicant, as self-constituted leaders. The interview as published in the Sun and the Sheriff's own words to the delegation to the effect that he would not put a colored man in his office has aroused the colored voters in every part of the city and Mr. Mason is being denounced as a traitor to the principles of the Republican party and as unfaithful to his campaign policy. Some colored men who know Mr. Mason best say he has always posed as an Abraham Lincoln Republican and it was his deceit that secured him the office which he now holds and used to keep down colored men in their efforts to elevate themselves.

In some of the ward clubs, colored men have expressed their indignation and passed resolutions expressing their resentment to Mr. Mason's insult. A meeting of twenty-five or more leading colored men was held in the law office of Dr. J. M. Cargill, D. D. Dixon, Wm. R. Daniels. This meeting was presided over by Mr. Lane and those who responded freely denounced Sheriff Mason's policy toward colored men. Among the most prominent men at this meeting were Dr. Geo. W. Bryant, Ex-Sheriff Wm. E. Taylor, John W. Martin, Lawyer B. F. Lester, J. J. Callis, Rev. A. R. Callis, Rev. G. R. Waller, Lawyers W. T. McGuinn, Malohia Gibson, Rev. W. M. Alexander and many others.

Other prominent Afro-American citizens who have been interviewed by the Afro-American reporter and who have denounced the new sheriff's "negro-baiting" policy are Dr. H. J. Brown, Rev. J. W. Alexander, George Hill, J. B. Murphy.

The demand of Afro-Americans for equal show as a favor of the Republican party and the friends of good government is generally pronounced. The Afro-American say they stand for the declaration of Hon. J. M. Cargill, D. D. Dixon, Wm. R. Daniels, J. J. Callis, Rev. A. R. Callis, Rev. G. R. Waller, Lawyers W. T. McGuinn, Malohia Gibson, Rev. W. M. Alexander and many others.

The rights of the colored men, if the Republicans carry the election, will be properly protected. They are able to pass a proposition that they will have the same opportunity for appointment as the white men, in other words, in all matters they will not be regarded as citizens of the second class, but as citizens of the first class, and standing on the same level as the better and no worse than their brethren.

In the City Council last Monday evening Mr. Hoffman from the 7th ward offered an ordinance for a new school building, colored, corner of Bond street and Ashland avenue. The appropriation asked for \$40,000. Mr. Davis of the 12th ward introduced a similar ordinance for a new colored school in South Baltimore. Appropriation asked for \$28,000.

Dr. J. M. Cargill, the Afro-American representative from the 11th ward was put on the following committees: Markets, (chairman) health, education, water commissioners, accounts, and the Gunpowder Water Supply. The City Council, by resolution, decided to visit the Atlanta Exposition on Maryland Day in a body. It is possible that an Afro-American, the only member of the First Branch city council will be found there. The honors of this occasion is representative in character for the race. Dr. J. Marcus Cargill hopes to be in the number that shall represent this great municipality at the great Southern Exposition.

Quite a number of the colored voters of the 11th ward and the city in general can be heard asking the question why Dr. Cargill, the colored councilman from the 11th ward, did not make a fight for one of the positions in the First Branch City Council, for a colored man; a report is also circulated that the doctor has endorsed Mr. Gillis, a white democrat, for vaccine physician, to the dissatisfaction of many of the white and colored voters of that ward. The doctor says this report is not true and without foundation. When seen by a representative of the Afro-American the doctor said, in reference to why he did not make a fight for a position for a colored man; "It was out of my power to procure a position for a colored man in the 1st Branch City Council for the following reasons: "It was the expressed wish of the mayor that there be no change in the clerical force of the 1st branch on the ground of experience necessary to do the work of the new administration. There were sixteen white votes to one colored; thereby making it impossible for me to over go the will of the majority and to make a fight was considered by me as being unwise under the circumstances. The responsibility of not appointing a colored man to one of the positions of that body rests with the party and not on me. The statements from white and colored republicans notwithstanding, are simply to make the people believe, as a colored man, I could do a thing impossible."

When asked if he had recommended Dr. Gillis for vaccine physician, he said: "I have not endorsed any man as yet for the position. At the proper time will find a man for the position who will be satisfactory to the republican voters of the ward. At least I will try to do so. I think it a bad policy to circulate reports which are untrue and before my actions are known."

The doctor says he can in no way be held responsible for what the white Republicans may do against the proper recognition of the colored republican voters in the city of Baltimore and 11th ward.

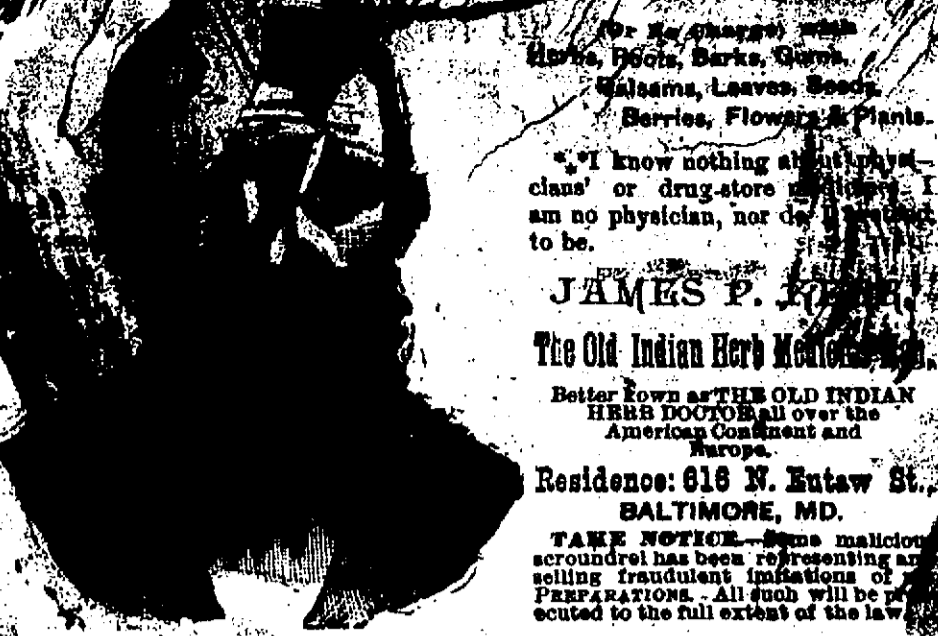
