Missouri has gone over into Wisconsin for a State geologist, the man selected being Professor E. B. Buckley, who was Assistant Superintendent of the Wisconsin Geological and Natural History Society and instructor of commercial geography in the University of Wisconsin.

A test of the merits of British and American locomotives over the heavy grades of the island of Jamaica has resulted in a conclusive triumph for the latter, which drew over the steepest grades in less than schedule time a load the English engine couldn't budge at all.

It is reported also to have crossed the Sierras and entered California. Its slaughter is temporarily prohibited by law in Oregon, and indefinitely prohibited in California under the game law passed by the last Legislature.

Logs of about 80 feet in length are used to form a raft some 400 feet in length and some thirty feet in diameter and the raft is towed in the open sea.
