WHAT'S INSIDE?

Over a quarter of a million students go to college in Maryland.

They study at community colleges, where they can complete their first two years of school before going on to earn a bachelor's degree at a four-year campus — or find excellent career training that leads directly to a good job.

They study at one of the eleven campuses in the University System of Maryland, which includes the University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland's flagship campus, and excellent regional universities serving every part of the state. They study at Morgan State University, Maryland's urban university, and Saint Mary's College of Maryland, designated as an honors college in Maryland.

Or they are enrolled at one of more than a score of fine — and even world-famous — independent institutions, both large and small.

Collectively, Maryland's colleges and universities offer virtually every kind of educational experience, both for the traditional college student who goes directly to college from high school, and for students who have already begun their careers and want to increase their knowledge and skills or learn new skills.

This guide will help you find the courses and the college you want, offer some information on scholarships and other forms of financial aid, direct you to military programs that offer tuition assistance or scholarships, help you find a private career school that will give you the job skills you need.

THE IMPORTANCE OF ACCREDITATION

When selecting a college or university and before committing any money to a postsecondary educational institution, it is important to determine whether the institution is “accredited.” It is even more important when considering a non-traditional form of instruction — such as distance learning. With an accredited institution, a student has some assurance of receiving a quality education and is assured that other colleges and employers will recognize the course credits and degrees earned. Accreditation is an affirmation that a college provides education at a level of quality that the general public has the right to expect and that the educational community recognizes.

If a college or university is not accredited, its students will probably not be able to participate in either Federal or State of Maryland financial assistance programs.

If you are uncertain about the accreditation status of a college or university, you should ask the institution for the address and phone number of their accrediting body. You can also address questions to mkiphart@mhec.state.md.us or dsumler@mhec.state.md.us.

ACADEMIC COMMON MARKET

PROGRAMS CURRENTLY APPROVED FOR MARYLAND RESIDENTS

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Maryland is a member of the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), a consortium of 16 southern states that administers the Academic Common Market (ACM), a tuition reduction program. ACM allows Maryland residents to enroll in specific bachelor's and graduate degree academic programs at in-state tuition rates at any participating SREB college or university, provided a similar academic program is not offered at a Maryland public higher education institution.

To be eligible, applicants must be United States citizens or legally admitted permanent immigrant aliens and must have resided (or their parents have resided, if the student is under 24 years old) in Maryland for 12 months. Applicants must have been accepted into an approved program of study not offered at a Maryland public college or university. The application form is available from the Maryland Higher Education Commission and high school guidance offices.

Students have access to specific bachelor's or graduate programs offered through ACM in Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia. Students also have access to specific graduate programs **only** offered through ACM in Florida, North Carolina and Texas.

Scholarship winners are obligated to military service. This can be fulfilled by 1) serving 2 to 4 years followed by service in the Army National Guard or Army Reserve or 2) by serving 8 years in the Army National Guard or Army Reserve. Four-year scholarship recipients must attend Army ROTC host institutions; two and three-year recipients may attend any college offering Army ROTC. Applicants must be high school graduates, 17-21, and U.S. citizens. Awards based on SAT or ACT and high school academic review, interview, and physical aptitude exam. Apply during junior year in high school. For information, write to the Department of the Army, ROTC Scholarships, Ft. Monroe, VA 23651.

NAVAL ROTC NAVY-MARINE CORPS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Tuition, laboratory fees, books, and fees provided, plus \$150 monthly compensation. Four-year active duty service obligation, plus four-year reserve duty. Attend participating college of choice. High school graduates must be U.S. citizens, at least 17 when enrolled, and not over 27 when graduated and commissioned. Awards based on SAT or ACT, high school academic review interview, physical aptitude exam, plus other processing requirements. MILITARY ACADEMIES

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All military academies require that applicants be American citizens, at least 17, and of good moral character. Each academy has specific entry requirements regarding marital status, maximum age at time of appointment, good vision, minimum height, and high school academic background. Details and application forms are available by writing the academy of your choice.

Appointments to the Air Force Academy, Naval Academy, and U.S. Military Academy are by Congressional nomination and are competitive. Coast Guard Academy appointments are strictly competitive.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY

All expenses paid by the government. Cadets receive \$400-\$500 per month compensation depending on class. Five years active duty service obligation. For information, write to U.S. Air Force Academy, CO 80840.

NAVAL ACADEMY

Tuition, room, board, medical and dental care provided. Midshipmen receive monthly compensation of \$540 per month for uniforms, books, and personal needs. Five years active duty service obligation, plus two years in the Reserves. For information, write to Director of Candidate Guidance, Naval Academy, Annapolis, MD 21402.

U.S. MILITARY ACADEMY

Tuition, room, board, medical and dental care provided, plus annual compensation of about \$6,500 from which cadets must pay for uniforms, books, and personal needs; a deposit of \$2,400 is required to defray initial expenses. Five years active duty service obligation. For information, write to Director of Admissions, U.S. Military Academy, West Point, NY 10996.

COAST GUARD ACADEMY

Cadets compensated at a rate of \$543 per month, plus daily food allowance. Compensation covers all expenses incidental to cadet training. Five years active duty service obligation. For information, write to Director of Admissions, U.S.C.G.A., 31 Mohegan Avenue, New London, CT 06320.

MERCHANT MARINE ACADEMY

Tuition, room, board, uniforms, books, medical and dental care are provided by U.S. government. Midshipmen compensated by steamship companies who employ them at a rate of \$548 per month. Eight years Naval Reserve service obligation. Other service obligations available. For information, write to Director of Admissions, U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point, NY 11024.

PRIVATE CAREER SCHOOLS



There are over 150 private career schools in Maryland. Private career schools offer training in dozens of fields, from computer certification and real estate to cosmetology and allied health. Thousands of Marylanders today hold rewarding jobs because of training they received at private career schools.

Before you enroll in any career school, explore your options and obtain information about several schools. Ask questions about each school's training, method of payment, and the completion and placement record of its students. Request from each school a list of employers who have hired recent graduates of the school.



Here is a short checklist to help you select the training that is right for you:

- Make sure the school is approved to operate.
- Ask about the admissions requirements.
- Inquire about the full cost of the program, including tuition, fees, books, and materials.
- Find out if the school qualifies for federal financial aid.
- Visit the school.
- Observe classes and ask current students to comment on their experiences with the school.
- Check out the instructors' qualifications.
- Ask about job placement.
- Obtain a copy of the school's catalog and read it carefully.
- Read and understand what you sign.

After you enroll, be certain to maintain your school documents, including your enrollment agreement, school catalog, as well as all receipts and financial records. **For additional information regarding private career schools (PCS), contact the Maryland Higher Education Commission or see the PCS web page at www.mhec.state.md.us for the most up-to-date list of approved private career schools.**

PAYING FOR COLLEGE



WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?

Financial aid is money that helps you pay for college. It is added to the amount that you and your family can personally afford to pay for you to attend college. Merit-based financial aid is given to students who have special talents, skills, or who have earned good grades. Need-based financial aid is given to students who show they have financial need.

WHAT KINDS OF FINANCIAL AID ARE AVAILABLE?

- Grants and scholarships are gift aid that you do not have to pay back. Grants are usually given because the student has financial need, while scholarships are usually given to recognize the student's academic achievement, athletic ability, or other talent. The State of Maryland also provides scholarships that require students to complete a specific employment obligation after graduation.
- Loans must be repaid, usually with interest, after you graduate or stop going to school.
- Work Study, or student employment, allows you to work and earn money to help pay for school. These jobs are usually on-campus.

Most students receive a combination of these types of aid in a financial aid package put together by their college financial aid office.

WHO GIVES FINANCIAL AID?

The federal government provides most student financial aid. The Federal Pell Grant, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), Federal Perkins and Federal Stafford loans, and Federal Work Study are examples of their programs. The State of Maryland offers scholarships and grants based on a student's financial need, talents, or career choice. Colleges and universities also give scholarships to students. Some of the scholarships are based on need and some on talents and grades. A number of civic organizations, associations, clubs, foundations, churches, and businesses also provide financial aid.

This year, the State of Maryland will award nearly \$80 million in financial aid to more than 40,000 Maryland residents. Students use this aid at Maryland community colleges, private colleges and universities, private career schools, and the State's 13 public four-year institutions. The Office of Student Financial Assistance, a division of the Maryland Higher Education Commission, awards State financial aid funds.



APPLYING FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID



WHO SHOULD APPLY FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID?

All students should apply for need-based financial aid. Many families mistakenly think they may not qualify for this type of aid based on their income and assets. However, if you choose not to apply for need-based financial aid, you may be closing the door on opportunities that could help you pay for college. There are other sources of financial assistance available regardless of your need, but most require you **first** to file the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)**.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID?

The FAFSA is the form used to apply for need-based financial aid. You must complete the FAFSA to apply for Maryland's need-based grants, as well as for federal financial aid and other aid from colleges. Your FAFSA must be received by the federal processor no later than **March 1** to be considered for need-based aid from the State of Maryland, and you must apply every year. The US Department of Education supplies and processes the FAFSA. The processed information is then sent to the Office of Student Financial Assistance and to all the colleges you list on the form.

Many colleges may require that you complete one or more supplemental application forms to apply for institutional financial aid. Ask the colleges you plan to attend for information about any additional applications you may need to complete as well as their deadline for FAFSA submission which may be earlier than that of the State. That way, you will make sure you are considered for all types of college financial aid.

There are two types of FAFSA's. If you are applying for financial aid for the first time (or did not apply for the past year), you must complete the regular FAFSA. The form has many questions that you and your family must answer. You can apply for academic year 2005-2006 by filling out a paper copy of the FAFSA and mailing it in the envelope that comes with the form. You may also apply electronically from your home computer or from a computer at your high school or college and submit your application online at **www.fafsa.ed.gov**. You must mail appropriate signature pages or apply for a Personal Identification Number (PIN) in order to sign your electronic application.

The second type of FAFSA is the Renewal Form. If you filed a FAFSA last year, you will probably file the 2005-2006 Renewal FAFSA this year. Your Renewal FAFSA may be available for you to submit electronically via the web, or it may be mailed to you at your home address. Check with your school's financial aid office to see how you will receive your Renewal FAFSA.

If you do not receive your Renewal FAFSA by January 1, you should complete and file a regular FAFSA form.

WHERE CAN I GET A FAFSA?

The 2005-2006 FAFSA should be available in November. You can get this form from your high school guidance office, a college financial aid office, a public library, or online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

WHAT KIND OF INFORMATION DO I PUT ON MY FAFSA?

The FAFSA asks for your family's financial information. To complete the 2005-2006 FAFSA, you must use information from your and your parents' 2004 federal income tax return.

If you or your parents will not have your tax returns completed before the March 1 deadline, you can carefully estimate your answers on the FAFSA and correct them later.

Along with the tax return information, you will need bank statements, W-2 forms, and any benefit statements you receive from the Social Security Administration, Social Services, or other agencies. If you and your parents (if you are dependent) will not file a tax return, you will still need bank statements, W-2 forms (if you or your parents worked), and any benefit statements you received from the Social Security Administration, Social Services, or other agencies.

You should list all the schools you are thinking of attending on the FAFSA. Make sure that you put the college you will most likely attend at the top of your list. **If you do not list a Maryland college, you will not be considered for Maryland financial aid.** In addition to the name of the college, you must list the college's Federal Title IV Institution Code. Institution codes for Maryland colleges and universities are listed in the *Student Guide to Higher Education and Financial Aid in Maryland* beside each institution's description. You can get other Title IV codes from your high school guidance office, college financial aid office, public library, or at the US Department of Education website www.fafsa.ed.gov/fotw0405/fslookup.htm or by calling the USDE at (800) 433-3243.

If you use an APO or a Post Office Box in your address, the Office of Student Financial Assistance will ask you to provide your actual Maryland street address.



WHEN DO I APPLY FOR NEED-BASED AID?

You must **file** the FAFSA or Renewal FAFSA between **January 1 and March 1** each year to be eligible for State aid. Do not sign, date, or mail your FAFSA before January 1, 2005. Your eligibility is determined one award year at a time. The results from your 2005-2006 application are good only for the 2005-2006 academic year. Because your financial circumstances can change from one year to the next, you must complete a FAFSA each year.

If you are filing a paper FAFSA, make sure you fill out, stamp, and mail the postcard that comes with your FAFSA so you will know when it has reached the federal processor. To prove that you mailed the FAFSA, you should get a Certificate of Mailing from the post office when you mail your form.

Do not use a special mailing service - it will delay the processing of your FAFSA.

Some colleges may have a deadline other than March 1, so it is very important that you contact all the colleges you are interested in attending to confirm their deadlines.

SHOULD I USE THE SERVICES OF A CONSULTANT TO HELP FIND SCHOLARSHIPS OR TO HELP ME COMPLETE THE FAFSA?

The Office of Student Financial Assistance urges you to look carefully at these services. Make sure you are not paying for something that is available free from your high school guidance office, the public library, a college financial aid office, the web, or from the Office of Student Financial Assistance. If the consultant guarantees that you will receive some sort of financial aid, learn as much as you can about the consultant, the company, and the students who have used the service before you spend the \$50 to \$1,000 that some consultants may charge.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER I APPLY?

The federal processing center will check your FAFSA for proper signatures, correct Social Security numbers, and other information. If you leave items blank on your FAFSA, it may be returned to you for completion. This delay could keep your application from being considered for financial aid. After your FAFSA has been processed, you will receive a report of your answers to the FAFSA questions. This report is your Student Aid Report (SAR). Your 2005-2006 SAR will be printed on green paper. If you filed your FAFSA electronically, you will receive your SAR via e-mail.

It will take approximately four weeks to process your paper FAFSA, and approximately two weeks for an electronic application. If there are no questions or problems with your FAFSA, your SAR will tell you your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). Your EFC is used to determine your eligibility for need-based aid.

WHAT IF I HAVE TO MAKE A CHANGE TO MY FAFSA?

Please take a careful look at each answer on your SAR. If you find a mistake, or if you need to change something, you should make corrections right on your SAR or electronically if you filed on the web. You should also correct any information that you may have estimated when you first completed the FAFSA. Make copies of your complete SAR; send one copy, by April 1, to the Office of Student Financial Assistance and send the original back to the federal processor. Print a copy of your electronic corrections prior to submitting these changes over the web. Be sure to keep the second copy with all of your other financial aid materials.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR NEED-BASED AID



HOW DOES THE STATE DETERMINE HOW MUCH AID I'M ELIGIBLE FOR?

When you apply for financial aid, the information on your FAFSA is used to calculate your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The Office of Student Financial Assistance also uses your EFC to determine your eligibility for need-based Maryland financial aid.

Generally, your EFC will determine if you will be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant. The amount of your Pell Grant depends on your EFC, the cost of attendance at the college you plan to attend, and your enrollment status (full-time, three-quarter time, etc.). The cost of attendance at your college is the total amount of money you will need to go to a college for one year.

Your financial need is the difference between what it costs to attend college, and your EFC plus the amount of your Pell Grant (if any).

WHAT OTHER REQUIREMENTS DO I HAVE TO MEET TO BE ELIGIBLE?

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents to receive financial aid from the State. Students and their parents (if you are a dependent student) must reside in Maryland for 12 months prior to attending a four-year college or for three months prior to attending a community college or private career school.

To be considered Maryland residents, you and your parents (if you are dependent) must:

- own or rent and occupy living quarters in Maryland;
- keep most of your personal property in Maryland;
- pay Maryland income tax on any of your earned income;
- register all vehicles in Maryland;
- have a valid Maryland driver's license (if you drive);
- be registered to vote in Maryland (if you are registered); and
- receive no public assistance from another state (or entity).

If you or your parents (if you are a dependent student) are active duty military personnel stationed and residing in Maryland, you are considered Maryland residents for financial aid purposes. If you or your parents (if you are a dependent student) are Maryland residents and in the military, you will be considered for Maryland financial aid whether stationed in Maryland or not.

If you are entering college directly from high school, you are probably a dependent student. If you are dependent, you must report both your and your parents' financial information on the FAFSA.

To be considered an independent student, you must meet one of the following conditions:

- you were born before January 1, 1982;
- you are married as of the date of the FAFSA;
- you are working on a master's or doctoral program (MA, MBA, MD, JD, PhD, EdD, or graduate certificate);
- you are a veteran of the US Armed Forces;
- you have children who receive more than half of their support from you;
- you have a dependent other than children or a spouse who lives with you and receives more than half of his or her support from you; or
- you are an orphan or ward of the court (or were a ward of the court until age 18).

Each scholarship or grant program has specific enrollment requirements. You must enroll for a minimum of 12 credit hours each semester to be considered a full-time undergraduate student. To be considered a full-time graduate student, you must take at least 9 credit hours each semester.

To be considered a part-time undergraduate or graduate student, you must enroll for at least 6 credits each semester.

If you go to a Maryland private career school, you must enroll for at least 18 clock hours per week.

Each Maryland financial aid program has other specific eligibility requirements. Please refer to the program description section.

WHAT IS VERIFICATION?

Verification is the process used to confirm that the information you reported on the FAFSA is accurate.

If the Office of Student Financial Assistance or your college or university selects you for verification, you may be required to complete a Verification Worksheet. You must also provide copies of your and your parents' (if you are a dependent student) signed federal income tax forms and other documents that may be requested, along with statements from any agencies from which you and your parents received benefits.

If there is a significant difference between the information reported on your FAFSA and the information you provided for verification, the Office of Student Financial Assistance or your college will re-calculate your need. Awards you had been offered may remain the same, decrease, increase, or be cancelled.

APPLYING FOR MERIT, CAREER AND OTHER TYPES OF STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

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The State of Maryland offers a number of other State scholarship programs that are based on merit or other criteria. Some programs consider a student's need as well as other factors. Some programs require a student to work in Maryland in a specific employment field after graduation.

The various grants and scholarships offered by the State of Maryland have different application forms and deadlines. Please read the individual descriptions of Maryland's financial aid programs for more specific application information. Please pay close attention to the deadlines and other required information to be submitted with the applications.

Scholarships may also be available from your Maryland State senator or delegates. A list of all the Maryland legislators is available from the Office of Student Financial Assistance. Some legislators allow the Office of Student Financial Assistance to select the students who will receive a Senatorial or Delegate Scholarship and some Senators and Delegates make their own awards. If your legislators make their own awards, you must contact them to find out the application procedures they require.

FINANCIAL AID AWARD NOTICE

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HOW WILL I KNOW IF I AM AWARDED FINANCIAL AID?

You will receive an award letter from the Office of Student Financial Assistance along with information about the award you are being offered. First review the letter to make sure everything is correct. Your address may have changed or you may have decided to go to a college other than the one listed on the award letter. Be sure that your correct Social Security number is listed. You can make any changes right on the letter. You must sign the letter and check the box showing that you accept the award. Make a copy of the letter for your records and return the original to the Office of Student Financial Assistance by the deadline listed in the letter.

You may also check your award status and/or print an award letter by visiting our website at www.mhec.state.md.us under the option "Student Inquiry."

WHAT IF I HAVE TO MAKE CHANGES AFTER I RETURN MY AWARD LETTER?

Call or write the Office of Student Financial Assistance to make corrections to your address or to tell us you will be attending a different college.

HOW IS MY COLLEGE NOTIFIED OF MY AWARD?

The Office of Student Financial Assistance will send a list of students who have been offered a State grant or scholarship to each college. The financial aid office at your college is responsible for determining how much federal and institutional financial aid you will be awarded and for coordinating all of your aid.

WHEN IS MY AWARD PAID TO MY COLLEGE?

At the beginning of each semester, your college will be asked to certify that you meet the requirements for the award. When the certification is complete and sent back to the Office of Student Financial Assistance, your award will be processed for payment. Payment to the college will be made four to six weeks after the college completes the certification.

CAN I APPEAL THE DECISIONS OF THE OFFICE OF STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?

The Office of Student Financial Assistance will consider appeals for several situations (e.g., special financial circumstances or failure to maintain a required GPA). You must call or write your Office of Student Financial Assistance staff person for further information.

- Complete and mail your FAFSA to the federal processor. **Do not mail the FAFSA before January 1.** We recommend that you mail your FAFSA no later than February 15. You can also file the FAFSA electronically at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Remember your college may require you to file prior to March 1.
- Call or write the Office of Student Financial Assistance for specific Maryland State scholarship applications. Many State applications are available at www.mhec.state.md.us.

MARCH 1

- **March 1 is the deadline for receipt of the FAFSA by the federal processor so you can be considered for Maryland State scholarships.** If the FAFSA is received after March 1, your application is late and you may not be considered for State scholarships.

APRIL 1

- Make a copy of any changes you made to your Student Aid Report (SAR) and send it to the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) no later than April 1.

MID-APRIL

- Renewal and new Guaranteed Access Grant, Educational Assistance Grant, and other scholarship award letters are sent to students beginning in mid-April.

JUNE

- Senators and Delegates begin to make scholarship awards.

WHERE DO I GO TO GET MORE INFORMATION?

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The first stop in your search for student financial assistance should be with your high school counselor or your college's financial aid office. FEDERAL TUITION TAX CREDITS*

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THE HOPE AND LIFETIME LEARNING TAX CREDITS

If you're paying for your own or your dependent student's college education, there are two federal tax credits available for you – the HOPE and Lifetime Learning credits.

WHAT'S A TAX CREDIT?

A credit is subtracted directly from your federal income tax on a dollar-for-dollar basis. This credit saves you more money than a deduction, which you subtract from your income before you calculate your tax and which yields much less than dollar-for-dollar savings.

WHO GETS TO CLAIM THE CREDIT?

If someone claims the student as a dependent for tax purposes, that person, not the student, may receive the tax credit, even if the student files a tax return. Otherwise, only the student may receive the credit.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE CREDITS?

The HOPE credit can be claimed for each of the first two years of college or vocational school for classes that lead to a degree or recognized certificate. The student must be enrolled at least half time to qualify for the HOPE credit. The Lifetime Learning credit is available for any postsecondary education, including graduate and professional school, and unlike the HOPE credit, there is no minimum enrollment. If you qualify for both credits, it will usually be to your advantage to claim the HOPE credit.

WHAT COLLEGE COSTS QUALIFY?

Qualified expenses include tuition and required fees, minus any grants and scholarships that are received tax-free. Expenses for books and supplies are not included unless they are paid to the institution as a condition of enrollment. The costs of room and board, insurance, transportation, and medical fees (including health fees) are not qualified expenses, even if required for enrollment.

WHAT THE HOPE TAX CREDIT IS WORTH:

The amount of the credit equals 100% of the first \$1,000 of qualified expenses plus 50% of the second \$1,000, for a maximum of \$1,500. After the year 2003, the credit will be adjusted according to inflation.

WHAT THE LIFETIME LEARNING TAX CREDIT IS WORTH:

Currently, the credit will be 20% of the first \$10,000 postsecondary tuition and fees paid each year, for a maximum of \$2,000. Unlike the HOPE credit, this credit will not be adjusted for inflation.

IS THERE AN INCOME LIMIT?

Single tax filers with up to \$40,999 of modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) and joint tax filers with up to \$82,999 of MAGI qualify for the full credit. It is gradually phased out for single filers in the \$41,000-\$51,000 range and for joint filers in the \$83,000-\$103,000 range, and it is not available for those whose income exceeds the upper limit of those ranges.

IT'S EASY TO CLAIM THE CREDIT!

- The college will send the student IRS Form 1098-T Tuition Payments Statement, which will report the tuition and related expenses paid for the student.
- The person claiming the credit needs to fill out IRS Form 8863 (PDF) and attach the form to his or her federal tax return. You can call (800) 829-3676 to order the form. It is a worksheet that will help to calculate the amount of the HOPE or Lifetime Learning credit that will be claimed on the return.
- Please refer to IRS Publication 970 - Tax Benefits for Education for additional information.

GUARANTEED ACCESS (GA) GRANT



Who may apply: Current high school seniors who will complete a college preparatory program that prepares students for college level work, including programs that prepare students to achieve a two-year technical degree from a community college.

How to apply: Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and complete and file the Guaranteed Access (GA) Grant application. Applications are available at www.mhec.state.md.us/ssa/ga.htm or with your guidance counselor.

When to apply: Students are encouraged to apply by March 1. Applications submitted after March 1 will be considered as long as funds remain available.

Eligible majors: All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student, and you must demonstrate financial need. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required for full-time status. All applicants must have a minimum unweighted cumulative 2.5 high school grade point average (GPA) and meet the following income requirements:

FINANCIAL NEED

A GA Grant is determined by student need. Your need for a GA Grant is determined using the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{College Cost of Attendance} \\ & - \text{EFC + or- Regional Cost of Living Adjustment} \\ & - \text{Certain State scholarship awards (if awarded)} \\ & - \text{Federal Pell Grant (if eligible)} \\ & = \text{Financial Need} \end{aligned}$$

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of a GA Grant equals 100 percent of the financial need. The minimum annual award amount is \$400 and the maximum award is \$12,800. You may hold the GA Grant with all State awards, except the Educational Assistance Grant. The total dollar amount of all State awards may not exceed your cost of attendance, as determined by your school's financial aid office or \$16,800, whichever is less. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend. Students are encouraged to submit the FAFSA no later than March 1 each year. Eligible students who submit the FAFSA after March 1 will be considered as long as funds remain available. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may receive a GA Grant for a total of four years of full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate study.

EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE (EA) GRANT

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Who may apply: Current high school seniors **and** full-time, degree-seeking undergraduates.

How to apply: Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This application can be completed electronically at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

When to apply: January 1 through March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.

Eligible majors: All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required for full-time status. You must demonstrate financial need.

All applicants are ranked by Expected Family Contribution (EFC). Your EFC is based on information reported on the FAFSA. Students with the lowest EFC are awarded first.

FINANCIAL NEED

An EA Grant is determined by student need. Your need for an EA Grant is determined using the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{College Cost of Attendance} \\ & - \text{EFC +or- Regional Cost Of Living Adjustment} \\ & - \text{Certain State scholarship awards (if awarded)} \\ & - \text{Federal Pell Grant (if eligible)} \\ & = \text{Financial Need} \end{aligned}$$

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of an EA Grant equals 35 percent of the financial need. The minimum annual award amount is \$400 and the maximum award is \$2,700. Should you be offered and accept certain State scholarship awards, your EA Grant will be re-calculated. You may hold the EA Grant with all State awards except the Guaranteed Access Grant. The total dollar amount of all State awards may not exceed your cost of attendance as determined by your school's financial aid office or \$16,800, whichever is less. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend and submit the FAFSA no later than March 1 each year. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may be a recipient of an EA Grant for a total of four years of full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate study.

PART-TIME GRANT

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Who may apply: Part-time, degree-seeking undergraduates and students who are simultaneously enrolled in a secondary school or an eligible home school program and an institution of higher education (dually enrolled students).

How to apply: Part-time undergraduates must complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Contact the financial aid office of the institution you will attend and ask to be considered for the Part-Time Grant. Dually enrolled students must contact their college financial aid office to determine the application process.

When to apply: File your FAFSA January 1 through March 1. Contact the financial aid office of the institution you will attend for additional deadlines.

Eligible majors: All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR PART-TIME UNDERGRADUATES

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university as a part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student. You must demonstrate financial need.

Recipients are selected by the institution.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR DUALY ENROLLED STUDENTS

Students who are enrolled simultaneously in a secondary school or an eligible home school program and an institution of higher education in Maryland should contact the office of financial aid at the institution they plan to attend to determine eligibility requirements and application method.

FINANCIAL NEED

Eligibility for a Part-Time Grant is based on student need, as determined by the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum Part-Time Grant award is \$200, and the maximum award is \$1,000. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew your award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend and submit the FAFSA no later than March 1 each year, or earlier if required by your school. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may be a recipient of a Part-Time Grant for a total of eight years. Your school determines renewal policies.

GRADUATE AND PROFESSIONAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Degree-seeking graduate and professional students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Also contact the financial aid office of the institution you will attend and ask to be considered for a Graduate and Professional Scholarship.
- When to apply:** Contact the financial aid office of the school you will attend for their deadlines.
- Eligible majors:** Graduate and professional programs in dentistry, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy, social work, and veterinary medicine.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be a Maryland resident and demonstrate financial need. You must be enrolled as a degree-seeking student, either part-time or full-time, and attend one of the following schools: University of Maryland, Baltimore (UMB) Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Law, Pharmacy, or Social Work; University of Baltimore School of Law; The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine; The Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine; or certain Maryland institutions offering a master's degree in nursing or social work.

FINANCIAL NEED

Applicants are ranked on the basis of student need as demonstrated on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum award is \$1,000 per year and the maximum award is \$5,000 per year. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may receive an award for a maximum of eight semesters if you remain enrolled in an eligible program, maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of your institution, file a FAFSA each year, and demonstrate need. The institution determines eligibility for renewals.

SENATORIAL SCHOLARSHIP



- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors and full-time and part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students. Students attending a private career school may also apply.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). If your Senator makes his/her own awards, you must call or write to your legislator for further instructions. The Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) can provide a list of all State legislators.
- When to apply:** Complete and file the FAFSA by March 1. Contact your senator in February for further instructions.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

You may use this scholarship at an out-of-state school if your major is not available at a Maryland school, and if your senator agrees. OSFA must verify that your major is unique. To be considered for unique major approval, students must submit the curriculum outlined for their intended major and a cover letter that includes: name, date of birth, Social Security number, address, phone number, name of major, name of institution, degree to be earned, and academic year of entrance. Information on academic programs offered within Maryland can be found at www.mhec.state.md.us/higherEd/HEPrograms.asp.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university, as a full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate or graduate student, or attend certain private career schools. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required for full-time or part-time status. You must demonstrate financial need. You must take the SAT 1 or the ACT unless you graduated from high school five or more years ago; have earned 24 college credit hours; or are attending a community college or a private career school.

FINANCIAL NEED

Some senators ask OSFA to make awards for them. These awards are made on the basis of need as demonstrated on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum annual award amount is \$400 and the maximum award is \$2,000. You may hold the Senatorial Scholarship with all State awards. The total dollar amount of all State awards may not exceed your cost of attendance as determined by your school's financial aid office or \$16,800, whichever is less. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Some awards will be renewed automatically if you maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend. Other awards may be offered for one year only. It is the student's responsibility to contact their senator for renewal procedures. Full-time students may receive a Senatorial Scholarship for total of four years. Part-time students may receive a Senatorial Scholarship for a total of eight years.

DELEGATE SCHOLARSHIP

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Who may apply: Current high school seniors and full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students. Students attending a private career school may also apply.

How to apply: If your delegates make their own awards, you should call or write them for further instructions. The Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) can provide a list of all State legislators. Some delegates ask OSFA to make awards for them. If OSFA makes the awards, they are made on the basis of need as demonstrated on the FAFSA. Students must complete and file the FAFSA to be considered by OSFA.

When to apply: Complete and file the FAFSA by March 1 if OSFA makes awards for the Delegate. Contact your delegates in February for further instructions.

Eligible majors: All majors are eligible.

You may use this scholarship at an out-of-state school if your major is not available at a Maryland school and if your delegate agrees. The OSFA must verify that your major is unique. To be considered for unique major approval, students must submit the curriculum outlined for their intended major and a cover letter that includes: name, date of birth, social security number, address, phone number, name of major, name of institution, degree to be earned, and academic year of entrance. Information on academic programs offered within Maryland can be found at www.mhec.state.md.us/higherEd/HEPrograms.asp.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university as a full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate or graduate student, or attend certain private career schools. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required for full-time or part-time status.

FINANCIAL NEED

If OSFA makes the awards for your delegates, you must demonstrate financial need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum annual award is \$200. You may hold the Delegate Scholarship with all State awards. The total dollar amount of all State awards may not exceed your cost of attendance as determined by your school's financial aid office or \$16,800, whichever is less. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew your award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the institution you attend. You must re-apply each year to your delegate(s). If required, you must complete and file the FAFSA by March 1.

CHILD CARE PROVIDER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

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Who may apply: High school seniors, high school graduates or GED recipients, and degree-seeking undergraduate students.

How to apply: Complete and file a Child Care Provider Scholarship application. Applications are available at www.mhec.state.md.us/ssa/child.htm.

When to apply: Application deadline is June 15.

Eligible majors: Child development program or early childhood education program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must enroll in a child development program or an early childhood education program. You may attend part-time only if you are working at least 15 hours a week at a child care or family day care center. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required for full-time or part-time status.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

An award for full-time attendance at a community college is \$1,000 per year; a part-time award is \$500 per year. An award for full-time attendance at a four-year institution is \$2,000 per year; a part-time award is \$1,000 per year. The total dollar amount of all State awards may not exceed your cost of attendance as determined by your school's financial aid office or \$16,800, whichever is less. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend, maintain a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA, and remain enrolled in an approved program. Your parents must also remain Maryland residents. The award may be renewed for an additional three years.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to provide child care services in Maryland, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within six (6) months of graduation. If you hold this scholarship with any other award requiring a service obligation, you must perform your service in consecutive years.



HOPE COMMUNITY COLLEGE TRANSFER SCHOLARSHIP

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Who may apply: Current Maryland community college students who will have completed at least 60 credits or who will have earned an associate's degree by the end of the semester in which they will transfer to a Maryland four-year institution.

- social workers (either a bachelor's or master's degree)
- speech pathologists
- physician assistants
- teachers with the following areas of certification:
technology education (secondary); chemistry; computer science (secondary); English for speakers of other languages-ESOL (elementary and secondary); mathematics (secondary); physics (secondary); and special education; generic (infant to grade 3; grade 1 through 8; grade 6 to adult).
- Teachers in schools designated as Federal Title I or schools identified for improvement by the Maryland State Department of Education. Official list available on MHEC's website www.mhec.state.md.us.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have graduated from a college in Maryland or from a law school. You must be employed full-time in state or local government or in a nonprofit organization in Maryland. Your employer must provide service to low income, underserved residents or underserved areas in the state. You must have loans from a university, government, or commercial source that you used to pay college expenses. You may not be in default on a loan. Your gross salary cannot exceed \$50,000 and, if married, your combined salaries cannot exceed \$110,000.

PRE-GRADUATION LAW STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

You must be a law student attending University of Maryland, Baltimore or University of Baltimore and in your third and final year of school. You must submit a Pre-Graduation Law Application before graduation in May, together with verification of an employment offer. You must submit a LARP General application by September 30 and meet all eligibility requirements listed above.

AWARD AMOUNT

A formula is used to determine the amount of each award. This formula uses your total annual student loan debt and your expected contribution to determine your award amount up to \$7,500 a year. Funds may not be available to award all eligible applicants. Awarding priority will be given to nursing and teaching applicants.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may reapply for this award each year, provided you continue to meet all eligibility requirements.

LOAN ASSISTANCE REPAYMENT PROGRAM – PRIMARY CARE SERVICES (LARP-PCS)

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- Who may apply:** Primary care physicians and medical residents in a residency program specializing in primary care.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a LARP-PCS application available from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH). Contact DHMH by calling (410) 767-5692.
- When to apply:** Rolling deadline.
- Eligible specialties:** General internal medicine; family practice medicine; general pediatrics; obstetrics/gynecology; and gynecology.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have graduated from a college in Maryland or from a medical school. If you are a physician, you must have a valid unrestricted license to practice primary care medicine in Maryland and work in an approved underserved area in Maryland. If you are a medical resident, you must have at least one year remaining in a residency program specializing in primary care. You must have outstanding eligible higher education loans. You cannot be in default on a loan or have incomplete service obligations.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

Physicians will receive between \$25,000 and \$30,000 per year, depending on the length of their service commitment. The total award to medical residents may not exceed \$25,000. All recipients will receive a supplemental amount equal to 39 percent of the annual repayment amount to help defray the associated tax liability. Funds may not be available to award all eligible applicants.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may re-apply for this award after completion of the service obligation. Recipient's total award amount cannot exceed \$120,000 plus 39 percent.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to serve full-time as a primary care physician in an underserved area in Maryland for a period of two to four years. You must be a resident of Maryland at the time the service obligation begins. Physicians must begin their service obligation within three months of the close of the fiscal year in which the contract is executed. Medical residents must begin their service obligation within three (3) months of completion of training. If you hold this scholarship with any other award requiring a service obligation, you must perform your service in consecutive years.

MARYLAND DENT-CARE LOAN ASSISTANCE REPAYMENT PROGRAM (MDC-LARP)

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Who may apply: Practicing dentists.

How to apply: Complete and file an MDC-LARP application available from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH). Contact DHMH by calling (410) 767-7899.

When to apply: Rolling deadline.

Eligible field of employment: Dentistry.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be a Maryland resident. You must have graduated from an accredited US dental school. You must have a valid unrestricted license to practice dentistry in Maryland and be employed full-time as a dentist in Maryland providing care to Maryland Medical Assistance Program (MMAP) recipients in Maryland. You must have at least 30 percent of your patient population as MMAP recipients. You must have outstanding eligible higher education loans. You cannot be in default on a loan or have incomplete service obligations.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

Dentists will receive up to \$23,000 per year of obligated service. All recipients will receive a supplemental amount equal to 39% of the annual repayment amount to help defray the associated tax liability. You may reapply for this award after completion of the service obligation. Recipients total award amount cannot exceed \$99,000. Funds may not be available to award all eligible applicants.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Award may be renewed up to three years if you continue to meet all requirements.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note stating that you will remain employed full-time as a dentist. You must agree to maintain at least 30 percent of your patient population as MMAP recipients. If you hold this scholarship with any other award requiring a service obligation, you must perform your service in consecutive years.



JACK F. TOLBERT MEMORIAL STUDENT GRANT PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Students attending or who plan to attend a private career school.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by March 1. Apply to the financial aid office of the private career school you will attend.
- When to apply:** Rolling deadline.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at an approved Maryland private career school. You must enroll for at least 18 clock hours per week.

FINANCIAL NEED

These awards are made on the basis of need, as demonstrated by the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The award amount of a Tolbert Grant may be up to \$300. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

The award may be renewed one time.

EDWARD T. CONROY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time and part-time, degree-seeking undergraduates and graduate students or those enrolled in certain private career school programs.
- How to apply:** Complete and file an Edward T. Conroy Memorial Scholarship application. Applications are also available at www.mhec.state.md.us/ssa/conroy.htm.
- When to apply:** Applications are available in April. Deadline is July 15.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland college or university, as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester) degree-seeking undergraduate, or degree-seeking full-time (9+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-8 credits per semester) graduate student or attend a private career school. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required. You must be:

- the son or daughter of a member of the United States Armed Forces who died or was 100 percent disabled as a direct result of military service;
- a veteran who suffers, as a direct result of military service, a disability of 25 percent or greater and has exhausted or is no longer eligible for federal veterans' educational benefits;
- the son, daughter, or surviving spouse (who has not remarried) of a victim of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks who died as a result of the attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City, the attack on the Pentagon in Virginia, or the crash of United Airlines Flight 93 in Pennsylvania;
- a POW/MIA of the Vietnam Conflict or his/her son or daughter;
- the son, daughter, or surviving spouse (who has not remarried) of a state or local public safety employee or volunteer who died in the line of duty; or
- a state or local public safety employee or volunteer who became 100 percent disabled in the line of duty.

NOTE: The parent, veteran, POW, or public safety employee or volunteer must have been a resident of Maryland at the time of death or when declared disabled and have exhausted or no longer be eligible for federal veteran's educational benefits.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of your award may be equal to your tuition and fees, but the total dollar amount may not exceed \$7,950, whichever is less.

An applicant who is the child or spouse of a victim of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks may not receive awards that exceed \$16,800 when combined with any other scholarship received.

Recipients of the Conroy Scholarship who also receive grants or scholarships from other sources as a result of September 11 events may have the Conroy adjusted to remain below the \$16,800 fund limit. Funds may not be available to award all eligible students.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed each year if you continue to meet eligibility requirements. Awards may be held for five years of full-time study (12+ credits per semester) or eight years of part-time study (6-11 credits per semester) or a combination of both. Audited courses cannot be used to reach the minimum credit hours required.

NONRESIDENT TUITION REDUCTION AND STATE AID PROGRAM FOR NURSING STUDENTS

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- Who may apply:** Nonresidents of Maryland who attend a two-year or four-year public institution in Maryland.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a Nonresident Tuition Reduction and State Aid Program For Nursing Students application and submit it to the financial aid office at the school you attend. Applications are available at www.mhec.state.md.us/ssa/nonresnurs.htm.
- When to apply:** Applications become available in May and are accepted throughout the year.
- Eligible majors:** Undergraduate nursing program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be a resident of a state other than Maryland. You must enroll at a two-year or four-year Maryland public college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student. You must be accepted into a nursing program.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

Your college may reduce your tuition so that you pay the tuition charged to a Maryland resident.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be renewed automatically for an additional year if you attend a two-year public institution, or for an additional three years if you attend a four-year public institution. You must maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you attend and remain enrolled in an eligible program.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to serve as a full-time (35 hours or more per week) nurse in Maryland in an organized institution or at a home that provides domiciliary, personal, or nursing care for two or more unrelated individuals. The service obligation is two (2) years if you attended a community college, and four (4) years if you attended a 4-year public institution. If the student service obligation is not met, the award must be repaid to the state with interest. You must begin your service obligation within six (6) months of graduation. If you hold this scholarship with any other award requiring a service obligation, you must perform your service in consecutive years.

TUITION WAIVER FOR FOSTER CARE RECIPIENTS

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- Who may apply:** Certain students under the age of 21 who have resided in a foster care home in Maryland.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Contact the financial aid office of the institution you will attend to have the waiver activated.
- When to apply:** Apply between January 1 and March 1, each year.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have resided in a foster care home in Maryland at the time you graduated from high school or successfully completed a general equivalency development examination (GED); or you must have resided in a Maryland foster care home on your 14th birthday and were then adopted after your 14th birthday.

The Department of Human Resources must also confirm that you are eligible for the waiver.

You must enroll as a degree-seeking student at a public two-year or four-year higher education institution in Maryland on or before age 21.

AWARD AMOUNT

You are exempt from paying tuition and mandatory fees at a public college in Maryland. The tuition waiver applies to any balance on tuition and fees minus any grants and scholarships you receive.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award for an additional four years or until your bachelor's degree is awarded, whichever occurs first. You must file a renewal FAFSA by March 1, maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you will attend and remain enrolled in an eligible program.

IMPORTANT TERMS



AWARD LETTER

When the State of Maryland offers you a scholarship or grant, the Office of Student Financial Assistance will send you an official award letter. This letter will list the name and amount of the scholarship or grant and which school should receive the award on your behalf. You must sign, date, and initial the letter confirming that you accept or reject the scholarship and return the letter to the Office of Student Financial Assistance. You can also print out a copy of your award letter from our website at www.mhec.state.md.us under “Student Inquiry.”

COST OF ATTENDANCE

The total amount of money it will cost for you to go to college for a year is called the cost of attendance. This amount includes tuition and fees, room and board or housing/living costs, and allowances for books, supplies, and other necessities. Where you choose to live (on-campus, off-campus, or with your parents) is also a factor used in deciding the total cost of your college of attendance.

EXPECTED FAMILY CONTRIBUTION (EFC)

This figure is determined by the information you report on the FAFSA and is calculated by the federal methodology. Your EFC combined with your college costs will determine your eligibility for a Federal Pell Grant and other need-based aid.

FAMILY INCOME

Family income includes all income (taxed and untaxed) for you and your parent(s) (if you are a dependent student) that is reported on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

FEDERAL METHODOLOGY

Federal methodology is a formula used to calculate your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). This formula, established by Congress, is used nationwide for all students. The most important factors in the formula are the income, assets, and net worth of your parents; your income and assets; and the size of your family.

FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

The FAFSA is the basic application you must complete and file to apply for federal student aid, State of Maryland financial aid, and much of the financial aid your college may give to you. If you are a dependent of your parents, you must complete the student section of the FAFSA, and you must have your parents complete the parent section of the FAFSA. You may file the paper FAFSA and the Renewal FAFSA through the mail, or file an electronic FAFSA/Renewal FAFSA using FAFSA Express software or FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

FINANCIAL AID PACKAGE

Your financial aid package consists of the total amount of financial aid you receive. Your package may contain federal grants, loans, and work study; State scholarships or grants; and scholarships, grants or loans from your college.

FINANCIAL NEED

The difference between the cost of attending your college and the amount of your EFC is your financial need. Your financial aid package is based on the amount of your financial need.

FULL-TIME STUDENT

If you enroll as an undergraduate for 12+ credits per semester, you are considered a full-time student. If you enroll as a graduate student for 9+ credits per semester, you are considered a full-time student.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

Your GPA is the average of your grades, where the grades have been converted to a 4.0 scale. On this scale a 4.0 is an A, 3.0 is a B, and 2.0 is a C. A cumulative GPA is the average of all your grades when you attended a high school or college (i.e., cumulative GPA of grades 9-12 of high school).

GRADUATE STUDENT

A student who is enrolled in a master's or doctoral program is called a graduate student.

GRANT

Grants are financial aid you do not have to pay back and are usually for students who have a financial need. The largest Maryland state grant program is the Educational Assistance Grant. The largest federal grant program is the Federal Pell Grant.

LOAN

A loan is money that you borrow and must pay back later with interest. Federal funds provide most of the money used in making educational loans. The Stafford Loan and the Perkins Loan are federal loan programs.

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPT

An official transcript is a list of all classes taken and all grades received by the student and is sent by the school in a sealed envelope, usually with an original signature of a school official and an official seal.

PART-TIME STUDENT

If you enroll as an undergraduate for 6-11 credits, you are considered a part-time student. If you enroll as a graduate student for 6-8 credits, you are considered a part-time student.

PROMISSORY NOTE

If you accept a scholarship that has a service obligation, you must sign a promissory note. The note is a binding legal document that states the terms and conditions of repayment of the scholarship should you not complete the service obligation.

SCHOLARSHIP

A scholarship is financial aid you don't have to pay back and is usually given to students who are recognized for academic achievement, athletic ability, or other talents.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

Some scholarships and grants require that you work in state or local government or nonprofit agencies in your chosen field after you complete your education. If you fail to complete your service obligation, you must then repay the money you received, with interest.

STUDENT AID REPORT (SAR)

The SAR summarizes the information you included on the FAFSA you filed. The SAR will tell you your EFC and whether you are eligible for a Pell Grant. You should receive your SAR 4-6 weeks after you mail your FAFSA to the processor. This year (2005-2006 academic year) your SAR will be green.

TITLE IV SCHOOL CODE

When you fill out the FAFSA, you need to put in the six-digit Title IV code for each school to which you are applying. You can find a list of the Title IV school codes at your high school guidance office, college financial aid office, public library, the Federal Student Aid Information Center, and at www.fafsa.ed.gov/fotw0405/fslookup.htm. Title IV codes for Maryland schools appear in the *Student Guide to Higher Education and Financial Aid in Maryland* beside each institution's description.

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT

A college or private career school student who is enrolled in a certificate, nursing diploma, associate's degree, or bachelor's degree program is called an undergraduate student.

WORK STUDY

Work study is part-time employment during the school year, usually at an on-campus job.



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
