Information About the Maryland Register and COMAR

MARYLAND REGISTER

The Maryland Register is an official State publication published every other week throughout the year. A cumulative index is published quarterly.

The Maryland Register is the temporary supplement to the Code of Maryland Regulations. Any change to the text of regulations published in COMAR, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal, or emergency action, must first be published in the Register.

CITATION TO THE MARYLAND REGISTER

The Maryland Register is cited by volume, issue, page number, and date. Example:

• 19:8 Md. R. 815—817 (April 17, 1992) refers to Volume 19, Issue 8, pages 815—817 of the Maryland Register issued on April 17, 1992.

CODE OF MARYLAND REGULATIONS (COMAR)

COMAR is the official compilation of all regulations issued by agencies of the State of Maryland. The Maryland Register is COMAR's temporary supplement, printing all changes to regulations as soon as they occur. At least once annually, the changes to regulations printed in the Maryland Register are incorporated into COMAR by means of permanent supplements.

CITATION TO COMAR REGULATIONS

COMAR regulations are cited by title number, subtitle number, chapter number, and regulation number. Example: COMAR 10.08.01.03 refers to Title 10, Subtitle 08, Chapter 01, Regulation 03.

DOCUMENTS INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE

Incorporation by reference is a legal device by which a document is made part of COMAR simply by referring to it. While the text of an incorporated document does not appear in COMAR, the provisions of the incorporated document are as fully enforceable as any other COMAR regulation. Each regulation that proposes to incorporate a document is identified in the Maryland Register by an Editor's Note. The Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended or Repealed, found online, also identifies each regulation incorporating a document. Documents incorporated by reference are available for inspection in various depository libraries located throughout the State and at the Division of State Documents. These depositories are listed in the first issue of the Maryland Register published each year. For further information, call 410-974-2486.

HOW TO RESEARCH REGULATIONS

An Administrative History at the end of every COMAR chapter gives information about past changes to regulations. To determine if there have been any subsequent changes, check the "Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended, or Repealed" which is found online at www.dsd.state.md.us/CumulativeIndex.pdf. This table lists the regulations in numerical order, by their COMAR number, followed by the citation to the Maryland Register in which the change occurred. The Maryland Register serves as a temporary supplement to COMAR, and the two publications must always be used together. A Research Guide for Maryland Regulations is available. CITIZEN PARTICIPATION IN THE REGULATION-MAKING PROCESS

Maryland citizens and other interested persons may participate in the process by which administrative regulations are adopted, amended, or repealed, and may also initiate the process by which the validity and applicability of regulations is determined. Listed below are some of the ways in which citizens may participate (references are to State Government Article (SG),

Annotated Code of Maryland):

• By submitting data or views on proposed regulations either orally or in writing, to the proposing agency (see "Opportunity for Public Comment" at the beginning of all regulations appearing in the Proposed Action on Regulations section of the Maryland Register). (See SG, §10-112)

• By petitioning an agency to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations. The agency must respond to the petition. (See SG §10-123)

• By petitioning an agency to issue a declaratory ruling with respect to how any regulation, order, or statute enforced by the agency applies. (SG, Title 10, Subtitle 3)

• By petitioning the circuit court for a declaratory judgment

on the validity of a regulation when it appears that the regulation interferes with or impairs the legal rights or privileges of the petitioner. (SG, \$10-125)

• By inspecting a certified copy of any document filed with the Division of State Documents for publication in the Maryland Register. (See SG, §7-213)

EXECUTIVE ORDER 01.01.2015.17

Declaration of Emergency — Special Appointment of Maryland State Police

WHEREAS, The State of Maryland is subject to a public emergency as defined in Section 14-301 of the Public Safety Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland;

WHEREAS, Baltimore City experienced historic civic unrest resulting in more than 200 arrests, multiple structural fires, and at least 20 injured law enforcement officers;

WHEREAS, Executive Order 01.01.2015.16 was issued on April 27, 2015, declaring a state of emergency and implementing the emergency powers of the Governor;

WHEREAS, Law enforcement officers from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Washington, D.C., have been requested to assist and continue to assist in protecting the citizens of Baltimore City and restoring peace to the area pursuant to the Emergency Management Assistance Compact enacted as Section 14-702 of the Public Safety Article;

WHEREAS, Those law enforcement officers of the New Jersey State Police, Pennsylvania State Police, and the Metropolitan Police Department of Washington, D.C., require powers of arrest within the State of Maryland for the duration of the emergency;

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Section 2-402 of the Public Safety Article, the Secretary of Maryland State Police has the authority to appoint the employees that the Secretary considers necessary for efficient administration of the Department;

WHEREAS, Employees appointed by the Secretary have police powers and authority set forth in Section 2-412 of the Public Safety Article;

WHEREAS, Failure to waive certain requirements regarding qualifications and employment of police employees in Subtitle 4 of Title 2 of the Public Safety Article may prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action to address this emergency;

WHEREAS, It has been determined that law enforcement officers of the New Jersey State Police, Pennsylvania State Police, and the Metropolitan Police Department of Washington, D.C., are qualified by virtue of their training and experience as law enforcement officers within their home states;

WHEREAS, Use of law enforcement officers of the New Jersey State Police, Pennsylvania State Police, and the Metropolitan Police Department of Washington, D.C., may be required;

WHEREAS, Upon receipt of a special appointment as a Maryland State Police officer, these individuals shall enjoy the same immunities as Maryland State Police officers, but they shall not be entitled to any compensation or personal benefit except that which is authorized by the Emergency Management Assistance Compact; and

WHEREAS, This special and limited appointment shall immediately expire when Executive Order 01.01.2015.16 is terminated.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAWRENCE J. HOGAN, JR, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION AND THE LAWS OF MARYLAND, INCLUDING SECTION 14-107(d) OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE, HEREBY SUSPEND THE EFFECT OF ANY PROVISION OF MARYLAND LAW OR REGULATION. INCLUDING THE PROVISIONS OF SUBTITLE 4 OF TITLE 2 OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE, WHICH BAR OR IMPEDE THE IMMEDIATE APPOINTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FROM NEW JERSEY. PENNSYLVANIA, WASHINGTON, D.C., OR ANY OTHER STATE AS SPECIALLY APPOINTED MARYLAND STATE POLICE OFFICERS.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 01.01.2015.18

Rescission of Executive Orders 01.01.2015.16 and 01.01.2015.17

WHEREAS, I, Lawrence J. Hogan, Jr., Governor of the State of Maryland, issued Executive Orders 01.01.2015.16 and 01.01.2015.17 declaring a state of emergency in Baltimore City and implementing the emergency powers of the Governor to protect the lives and property of citizens impacted by the emergency; and

WHEREAS, The emergency conditions caused by recent events in Baltimore City no longer exist.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LAWRENCE J. Emergency status means that the regulations become effective immediately, or at a later time specified by the Committee. After the Committee has granted emergency status, the regulations are published in the next available issue of the Maryland Register. The approval of emergency status may be subject to one or more conditions, including a time limit. During the time the emergency status is in effect, the agency may adopt the regulations through the usual promulgation process. If the agency chooses not to adopt the regulations, the emergency status expires when the time limit on the emergency regulations ends. Of the 43 possible late declarations, 40 hold TFLs and 3 hold either a FIN or a HLI. Therefore, if all 43 individuals renew their permit, the Department will increase revenue by \$6,600.

D(1). This number is based on the 30,500 pounds of striped bass the 43 possible additional permittees hold in their allocations, worth \$2.50 per pound.

D(2). The Department is "over allocating" to provide quota to the 43 individuals who may take advantage of the additional criteria to declare late for the striped bass fishery. What this means is that the Department runs the risk of exceeding the State's annual quota. If this happens, the Department will have to deduct the overage off of a future year's quota. The actual impact cannot be determined because it is not known if this will happen.

Economic Impact on Small Businesses

The emergency action has a meaningful economic impact on small business. An analysis of this economic impact follows.

The proposed action may have a total benefit of \$76,250 for the 43 potential new entrants to the striped bass fishery. The proposed action may have an indeterminable negative impact to the striped bass fishery as a whole. Please see the Estimate of Economic Impact for further analysis.

Promulgation of Regulations

An agency wishing to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations must first publish in the Maryland Register a notice of proposed action, a statement of purpose, a comparison to federal standards, an estimate of economic impact, an economic impact on small businesses, a notice giving the public an opportunity to comment on the proposal, and the text of the proposed regulations. The opportunity for public comment must be held open for at least 30 days after the proposal is published in the Maryland Register.

Following publication of the proposal in the Maryland Register, 45 days must pass before the agency may take final action on the proposal. When final action is taken, the agency must publish a notice in the Maryland Register. Final action takes effect 10 days after the notice is published, unless the agency specifies a later date. An agency may make changes in the text of a proposal. If the changes are not substantive, these changes are included in the notice of final action and published in the Maryland Register. If the changes are substantive, the agency must repropose the regulations, showing the changes that were made to the originally proposed text.

Proposed action on regulations may be withdrawn by the proposing agency any time before final action is taken. When an agency proposes action on regulations, but does not take final action within 1 year, the proposal is automatically withdrawn by operation of law, and a notice of withdrawal is published in the Maryland Register.

The Local Health Departments need to be strategically able to serve the community. This would help the health departments in preparing their budgets knowing what they would be reimbursed for services rendered. These changes in the rate setting process should realign the health department rates with other health care facilities. It should have a positive impact economically for the health departments.

(11) "Medical Assistance" means the Maryland Medical Assistance Program, which is administered by the State and pays the medical bills of certain needy and low-income individuals pursuant to Health-General Article, Title 15, Subtitle 1, Annotated Code of Maryland, and 42 U.S.C. C. Revisions and modifications to a Schedule of Charges shall be made and approved by the Secretary pursuant to instructions issued by the Division, provided that the Schedule of Charges for each local health department is updated and approved by the Secretary at least annually.

.10 Wellness Program.

A. Definitions.

(1) In this regulation, the following terms have the meanings indicated.

(2) Terms Defined.

(a) "Conscientious, religious, or cultural objection" means a statement that the individual holds sincere beliefs or practices of a religious, moral, or cultural nature that prohibit the individual from participating in one or more of the healthy activities requirements or in the Wellness Program as a whole.

(b) "Department" means the Department of Budget and Management.

(c) "Director" means the individual appointed to manage the Employee Benefits Division or unit of the Department with primary responsibility of managing the Program.

(d) "Healthy activities requirements" means those activities that must be completed in order for an individual to obtain the full rewards available under the Wellness Program, unless a reasonable alternative is identified by the individual's personal physician and submitted to the Director, or a waiver is granted by the Director.

(e) "Reasonable alternative" means an activity that may be substituted for a healthy activity requirement and that may provide an individual with another method of qualifying for the opportunity to earn the full rewards available under the Wellness Program.

(f) "Reward" means:

(i) Obtaining an incentive, such as a waiver of all or part of a cost-sharing mechanism, which may include deductibles, copayments, or coinsurance; and

(ii) Avoidance of a penalty, such as the absence of a premium surcharge or other financial or nonfinancial disincentive.

(g) "Waiver" means a determination by the Director to exempt an individual from one or more of the healthy activities requirements or other applicable standards for obtaining a reward.

(h) "Wellness Program" means the program within the State Employee and Retiree Health and Welfare Benefits Program and described in the Guide to Your Health Benefits provided by the Department for each plan year.

B. Scope of the Wellness Program.

(1) The Wellness Program applies to employees, non-Medicare-eligible retirees and non-Medicare-eligible enrolled spouses, subject to the following:

(a) If the retiree is Medicare-eligible, but the spouse is not, the spouse is exempt from the wellness requirements; and

(b) The Wellness Program does not apply to retirees and retirees' spouses for whom Medicare is primary.

(2) The Wellness Program does not apply to enrolled children regardless of age.

(3) Each individual to whom the Wellness Program applies shall have the opportunity to qualify for the rewards at least once per year.

C. Waivers.

(1) The Wellness Program includes the opportunity to request a waiver from participating in the Wellness Program as a whole or from participating in one of more of the healthy activities requirements. A waiver is available as follows:

(a) On the basis of conscientious, religious, or cultural objection; or

(b) On the ground that the individual can provide reasonable support demonstrating that the healthy activities requirements are detrimental to or cannot improve the individual's health.

(2) An individual who obtains a waiver from participating in the Wellness Program may not qualify for incentive-based rewards or be subject to a premium surcharge or other financial or nonfinancial disincentive.

D. Reasonable Alternatives.

(1) The Wellness Program shall allow a reasonable alternative to or exemption from the healthy activities requirement or otherwise applicable standard for obtaining the reward for:

(a) Any individual for whom, for that period, it is unreasonably difficult due to a medical condition to satisfy the healthy activities requirement or otherwise applicable standard; and

(b) Any individual for whom, for that period, it is medically inadvisable to attempt to satisfy the healthy activities requirement or otherwise applicable standard. For these persons, a reasonable alternative determined by the individual's personal physician shall be permitted upon the individual's request, or the required healthy activity or other condition for obtaining the reward shall be waived.

(2) The Director may request verification, in the form of a signed and dated statement from the individual's personal physician, that a health factor makes it unreasonably difficult for the individual to satisfy, or medically inadvisable for the individual to attempt to

satisfy the healthy activities requirement or otherwise applicable standard in an activity-only wellness program.

(3) If the individual's personal physician states that a healthy activity requirement is not medically appropriate for that individual, the Director shall permit a reasonable alternative that accommodates the recommendations of the individual's personal physician with regard to medical appropriateness.

E. Process for Evaluating Requests for Waivers and Reasonable Alternatives.

(1) Applications.

(a) A request for a waiver or reasonable alternative shall be submitted in writing to the Employee Benefits Division and shall be signed by the individual who is seeking the waiver or reasonable alternative.

(b) A request for a waiver based on conscientious, religious, or cultural objection shall include a statement that articulates the sincerely held beliefs or practices of a religious, moral, or cultural nature that prohibit the requestor from participating in the healthy activities requirements, and an explanation of how the beliefs or practices prohibit such participation.

(c) A request for a waiver asserting that the healthy activities are detrimental to or cannot help the individual's health shall include documentation that supports the stated basis for the request.

(d) A request for reasonable alternative to the healthy activities requirements may include documentation that supports the stated basis for the request. Where an individual provides credible support that it is unreasonably difficult due to a medical condition to satisfy the healthy activities requirements or otherwise applicable standard or that it is medically inadvisable to attempt to satisfy the healthy activities requirements or otherwise applicable standard, a reasonable alternative shall be permitted, or the required healthy activity or other condition for obtaining the reward shall be waived.

(e) A physician recommendation for a reasonable alternative or physician statement in support of a request for waiver or reasonable alternative shall be on official letterhead, signed and dated, in order to be considered.

(f) All documentation submitted with a request for waiver shall be treated as confidential and shall be disclosed only as permitted by applicable law and only to those individuals who need to know its contents as part of the review, evaluation, and approval process.

(2) Committee to Review Requests for Waivers and Reasonable Alternatives.

(a) The Director may designate two or more employees as members of a Waiver Committee consistent with the specifications of this regulation, to review and evaluate requests. At least one employee member shall be from the Employee Benefits Division of the Department Office of Personnel Services and Benefits.

(b) For each request, the Waiver Committee shall make a recommendation to the Director or designee to grant or deny the request, or to request additional information from the requestor.

(c) The Director or designee has discretion to accept or reject the recommendation and may request additional information from the Waiver Committee or from the requestor.

F. Determinations by the Director.

(1) Written Determination.

(a) The Director or designee shall issue a written determination approving or denying the request as soon as practicable. Approval of a request for waiver or reasonable alternative is discretionary, subject only to abuse of that discretion, and denial may be based on any legally permissible reason.

(b) A determination approving a request for a waiver shall state the healthy activities to which it applies.

(c) A determination authorizing a reasonable alternative shall describe the reasonable alternative.

(d) A determination denying a request shall include instructions for requesting reconsideration.

(2) Reconsideration.

(a) An individual may request reconsideration of the determination.

(b) A request for reconsideration must be submitted to the Director within 10 days of receipt of the determination.

(c) A request for reconsideration shall state the reasons the individual believes the determination should be reconsidered and may be accompanied by supporting documentation.

An IMD is defined as a facility with more than 16 beds that is primarily engaged in providing diagnosis, treatment, or care of persons with mental diseases and chemical dependency disorders. This is known as the Medicaid IMD exclusion. Due to this exclusion, many Medicaid enrollees with acute psychiatric and addiction treatment needs are referred to hospital emergency departments. These emergency departments often lack the resources or expertise to provide the type of care needed to these individuals. Additionally, hospital emergency departments are not cost effective.
