 the year of our Lord Eighteen hundred and thirty three between Anna Maria
 Tilghman of Talbot County, in the State of Maryland, of the one part, and
 William Caulk of the County and State aforesaid of the other part, Witnesseth,
 that the said Anna Maria Tilghman for and in consideration of the sum of
 Three thousand, one hundred and twenty eight dollars current money of Maryland,
 to her in hand paid by the said William Caulk at and before the execution
 of this Indenture, the receipt whereof the said Anna Maria Tilghman doth
 hereby acknowledge, and from the same and every part and parcel thereof, doth
 hereby forever exonerate acquit and discharge the said William Caulk, his heirs,
 executors, administrators and assigns, hath granted, bargained, sold, aliened,
 released, enfeoffed, conveyed and confirmed, and by these presents, doth give, grant,
 bargain, sell, alien, release, enfeoff, convey and confirm unto the said William
 Caulk, his heirs and assigns forever, all that part of a tract of Land called
 Anetill, the Union, and Wells outlet or survey, but more commonly known
 by the name of Locust Neck, situate, lying and being in Talbot County aforesaid,
 between the waters of Broad Creek and the waters of Harris Creek: Beginning at a Stone
 near the head of a small cove of Broad Creek, set in the ground as a divisional
 Boundary between said Land and the Land of Joseph Campor, and running from
 thence, according to the several meanings of the shore of said Cove and Creek the fol-
 lowing courses viz: South thirty eight degrees West twelve perches, then South
 eight and a half degrees East six and a half perches, then South forty three degrees
 East two perches, then South eight perches, then South six degrees West seven
 and a half perches, then South fifty four degrees West seventeen and a half
 perches, then South twenty nine degrees West six perches, then South eight and
 a half degrees East eight perches, then South seven degrees West thirteen and a
 half perches, then South ten degrees East seven and a half perches, then South
 forty one degrees East six and a quarter perches, then North fourteen and a half
 degrees East three and one eighth perches, then North seventy eight and a half
 degrees East fifteen perches, then South thirty five and a half degrees East four
 ten and three quarters perches, then East four and a half perches, then North sixty ten
 degrees East eight perches, then South thirty one and a half degrees East nine
 perches, then South sixty degrees East six perches, then East nine perches,
 then North forty nine and a half degrees East seven and a half perches,
 then North four degrees West fourteen perches, then North ten degrees East
 five and a half perches, then North thirty five degrees East eleven and three quarters
 perches North sixty degrees West seven perches, then North thirty degrees
 West six perches, then North forty nine degrees West eight perches, then
 North thirty nine degrees West eleven perches, then North nine degrees West
 six perches, then North thirty two degrees West four perches, then North fifty
 five degrees West six perches, then North seven East seventeen perches,
 then North thirty nine degrees East nine perches, then North four degrees East
 eight perches, then North thirty two and a half degrees East eight perches, then
 South sixty one degrees East six perches, then North fifteen degrees East
 eight perches, then East two perches, then South four and a half degrees East
