

# CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND

### ARTICLE I.—Name

This organization shall be known as the UNITED BAPTIST MISSION-ARY CONVENTION OF BALTIMORE CITY, MARYLAND.

#### ARTICLE II.—Objects

The objects of the Convention shall be the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ; the promotion of His kingdom by united efforts on the part of the churches composing it; to unify the churches, doctrine and Christian polity; to promote home and foreign missions by establishing and supporting religious work in communities wherever it is needed, and giving unstinted support to education in Maryland, as well as supporting it elsewhere; to collect, classify and publish statistics of the churches; to promote prosperity among the churches; to encourage brotherly love and to co-operate heartily with other regular bodies doing similar work in our state; our country and the whole world.

### ARTICLE III.-Membership

The membership shall be composed of regular Baptist churches and life members, within the bounds of the State of Maryland. Any regularly organized and recognized Baptist church may become a member upon the payment of five dollars (\$5) and shall be entitled to two (2) messengers, and one additional messenger for each additional five dollars (\$5); such membership shall continue upon the payment of five dollars annually. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in Maryland may become a life member upon the payment of fifteen dollars (\$15). All applicants must be elected by a majority vote of the convention.

ing Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed by him as an assistant.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with this body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the State; collect funds from the churches for the work of the convention; receive reports from the missionary or missionaries, as well as moneys collected or raised by them; paying the same over to the treasurer and taking a receipt for the same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the executive board. All letters, packages, e.g., received by him officially shall be the property of the convention. He shall be secretary of the executive board and shall draw all drafts on the treasurer and shall present a written report to the board at each of its quarterly meetings. He shall report the doings of the executive board in writing at each annual meeting of the convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all of the funds of the convention, provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution, selected by the convention or executive board and pay all orders of the convention, properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Board. He shall render a quarterly statement to the Board and an annual report to the convention. His books shall be kept ready for inspection by any of the proper officers of the convention. The treasurer, shall give such security or bond for his proper conduct in office and the safe-guarding of the funds of this convention as the body or executive board may require.

The Statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history in city and the condition of the Baptists in this State, as to the commistic, economic, property and resources, numerical, spiritual and financial strength and present the same at each annual meeting.

The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the same preceding the election of officers.

The officers of this convention shall be elected by ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the president and the report of the executive board, through the corresponding secretary, treasurer and the auditor.

# ARTICLE VI.—Convention in Session.

The work of the convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by messengers and pastors, said messengers holding membership in the churches they are sent to represent. Each pastor having charge of a church in this State, which is connected with this convention, shall be a member of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the churches composing the convention.

# ARTICLE VII.-How Churches Can Become Members.

Churches desiring to become members of this convention shall make application by letters bearing the names of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenets and sentiment of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation; and if satisfactory to the convention, shall be elected as members, after which the president or his appointee shall ratify their connection by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of this convention this duty shall be performed by the chairman of the executive board, to such as were not fellowshiped during the sessions of the convention.

### ARTICLE VIII.—The Executive Board.

There shall be an executive board elected annually, which shall consist of

the pastor and one layman from each church composing this body. They shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and secure the interests of the convention. Fifteen shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the convention shall be members of the Board by virtue of their officers. The Board shall have power to hold quarterly meetings and monthly meetings.

### ARTICLE IX.-Work of the Board.

The Executive Board shall be the legal representatives of the convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend mission fields, appoint missionaries for the convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, fix their salaries and make provision for the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the convention. It shall issue orders on the treasurer of the convention, made out by the corresponding secretary, and duly signed by the president chairman of the Executive Board. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the convention.

ARTICLE X .- Time of Convention Meeting.

The Convention shall meet annually Monday after the 3rd Sunday in May Lord's Day in May at 10 A. M. and adjourn on Friday evening, at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition, financial standing and work, the names of messengers sent and enclosing money for the several departments of the convention and the contingent fund shall be read.

# ARTICLE XI.—The Convention in Extra Session

The president, on written request of two-thirds of the members of the executive board, may call the convention in extra session whenever an emergency arises and the work of the extra session shall have the same legal force as the work of the convention in annual session; the business to be transacted in the extra session shall be designated in the call by the president.

ARTICLE XII.—Non-Interference.

This convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the churches within its bounds, regular organized and recognized by this body, and in no case nor under any circumstances will this convention attempt to interfere with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserves the right to deal with any church in so far as its membership affects this body.

ARTICLE XIII.-Reading List of Members.

The entire list of membership shall be read before the adjournment of each annual session, including life members, and if objection be made to the continuance of any one of the bodies or life members, by a two-thirds vote the name of said body or life member shall be stricken from the list of membership and the money returned. Notice shall be given at the session preceding the calling of the list, that it shall be called at the next session.

ARTICLE XIV.-Co-operation with Other Bodies.

This convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance and extension of the kingdom of Christ and in education; Home and Foreign Missions outside of the state of Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which holds the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

ARTICLE XV.-Auxiliaries.

The auxiliaries to this convention shall be governed by this constitution, and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principals of the general convention, he or she will forfeit his or her office, and the executive board will appoint his or her successor, and that no resolution nor docu-

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ment passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the convention or executive board.

### ARTICLE XVI.-Other Auxiliaries.

Regular Baptist Associations operating in the rural districts of Maryland may become members of this convention by the payment of ten dollars (\$10), after having made public application; which ten dollars shall give the joining body two representatives in the convention and their membership shall continue upon the payment of ten dollars annually.

#### ARTICLE XVII.—Boards.

The following boards shall be elected annually by the convention: Education, Home Mission and Foreign Mission.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.—Amendments and Revisions.

This constitution may be amended or revised at any annual session of the convention, providing twelve (12) months notice has been given in writing and the proposed amendment or the nature of it be filed with the corresponding secretary. Amending the constitution and other important matters which deal with the life of the convention shall be decided by two-thirds vote of the churches in the convention.

# RULES OF ORDER FOR THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND.

1. Every meeting of the convention or board shall be opened with prayer and other devotionals.

2. The Ministers Star Book by Hiscox shall be recognized as the standard guide in all of the deliberations for the general government of all parliamentary matters of this convention and the board.

3. The president shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise provided for: a. On Enrollment. b. Finance: c. On Nomination: d. New Bodies: e. Education: F. State of the Country: g. Temperance and Prohibition: h. Foreign Mission: i. Home Mission: j. Feeble Churches: k. Resolutions: (and oll other committees as may be necessary from time to time). A standing committee on budget for the convention's annual budget.

4. The introductory sermon shall be preached the first day of the assembling of the convention. Other sermons shall be preached, as doctrinal, educational, missionary and such others as in the judgment of the program committee may be necessary.

5. Immediatly after the opening of the convention, the rules of order shall be read by the Corresponding Secretary.

No subject shall be opened for discussion until a motion has been made, seconded and stated by the president.

7. No person shall speak more than twice, nor longer than five minutes

on any motion without permission from the president or body.

- 8. When a motion has been made and seconded, any member opposing its being discussed, the president shall immediately put the question: "Shall the question be discussed?" which if negatived, the subject must be dismissed.
- If any motion under debate contains two or more propositions, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
- , 10. Every person who wishes to speak on a motion shall rise from his seat and address the president and await his recognition before proceeding, and shall avoid using personalities in debate.
- 11. The election of officers shall take place in the afternoon of the first day's meeting of the convention, the chairman of the executive board may be elected by the convention or board.

12. No member of this convention shall absent himself without leave or permission of the president.

# MINUTES

#### MONDAY—MORNING SESSION

The first annual session of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland met at the Shiloh Baptist Church on the above-named date. Rev. W. W. Allen, D. D., Pastor.

Introductory Sermon delivered before the first Annual Session of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland, by Rev. J. R. Butler, Monday, May 16th, 1927.
Text, Ps. 119:59—I thought on my ways and turned my feet

unto thy testimonies.

Subject: Thought, a Potent Factor in Man's Development.

Introductory: In consideration of the theme, I wish to call attention to three points:

1st. Man, the only independent conscious thinker in the universe.

2nd. Erroneous thought in action, and, 3rd. The value of right thinking. The speaker said: Thought in man is what the mainspring is to the well-regulated timep ecc. Without the mainspring the clock would be useless for telling time. Minus the fire of reason found by the power of constructive thought, man would fail to carry out his mission in the world.

He would never rise to take his rightful place. He would never

get above the lowest beast in the animal kingdom.

1st. Man the only independent conscious thinker in the universe. a. Because of this relation he sustains to his Maker, (1) made in his image, (2) created after his likeness, (3) he (man) alone can think himself from the known into the mysteries of the unknown.

b. Man alone can change his entire being by creating and recreating new environment in which to live. This new life and changed environment are the direct result of man's system of thinking.

No man is bigger than his thoughts.

d. He who thinks in small terms circumscribes and limits his development.

The value of right thinking: 3rd.

Right thinking motivates proper conduct.

Men who think rightly are easily governed in deliberative b. bodies.

### PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Monday, May 16, 1927-Shiloh Baptist Church

Fellow Ministers, Officers, Members and Friends of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland:

With pardonable pride I address you in this, our first annual meeting.

More than thirty years ago the cords of union, which bound us together as one body, were broken and we drifted apart. The reason, in part, for

this separation was as follows:

In the beginning the white and colored brethren were in one convention, known as the Maryland Baptist Association. As years rolled on many of the older white ministers died. Their respective charges were filled by younger preachers from the Southlands. Eventually the young Southern preacher was in the majority. Their feeling of hostility was so great toward the colored people they attempted to discriminate. They succeeded in doing this against the protest of the older white preacher. Because they were in the lead. As a matter of fact we can't make much headway in cutting off the tail of a snake, for he uses his head to do his deadly work. With this spirit exhibited the colored preachers decided to withdraw. This organization was called the Lott Carey convention, which was an auxiliary to the Maryland Baptist Union Association. After a few years the Co-operative Baptist State Convention was born, and lived until November 5, 1926.

Today finds us once more united in one great Christian family, for the purpose of putting over a great program for our Lord and Master. Our hearts are filled with gratitude to God for granting us this privilege to take

part in this all important work, in His name and for His glory.

If we were to retrospect for a moment we would be startled to behold

the many changes which have taken place in these years.

Many of our once strong and influential churches became weak and unsettled because of the disunion. Many of the strong and useful Christian workers became confused and disheartened and wandered away from the church of their choice and united with other denominations where they are trying to make themselves believe that which they know is not the teaching of God's word. We may pity them, but the cause of their blunder can be traced to the disunion of the Baptist family which took place more than a quarter of a century ago.

In many of our churches there is much evil that cannot be dealt with justly because there are men among us instead of co-opertaing for the right, will say to the wrongdoer, "If your pastor and church call you in question you don't have to stand for it. Come over to my church. I will not only take you as a member, but make you an officer." The preacher who will do these things is marrying a condition before long will be seeking a divorce. That is to say, "If we build our monuments of our brothers dead bones they are bound to rot. No man feels good about a brother digging the sand from

under his feet."

We as Christians should love each other so dearly when we see our brother going wrong we can go to him, warn him of the danger, tell him the right way. If he has to get on a side track for a while then get on the main track to go on to success. But if the wrongdoer does not want to get right those of us that stand for right should get out of the way that he can have a clear fall.

I would not have you tarry longer to brood over these sad facts but shall pass them by with silent sorrow, praying they will be left to slumber without hope of a resurrection. We are to go forward and make this great organization serve God and humanity. May we ask God to teach us to

number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.

I fancy today when this convention opened its session the faithful leaders such as Doctors Wm. Alexander, A. Brown, P. C. Neal, Harvey Johnson, J. R. L. Daggs, as well as the sainted followers who have been called from their labor to their rich reward looked over the battlements of glory and shouted in words that breathe and thoughts that burn, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow, praise Him all creatures heer below, praise Him above ye Heavenly Host, praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost. For the Baptist forces of Maryland had come together."

For this union to live on, we need men (and we have them among us) who are willing to be bound together with the cords of love and friendship. For after all it takes love and faith in God to work for God. And working for God is treating our brother and sister right, rescuing the perishing and caring for the unfortunate one. We need men who are willing to lay aside all scheming, cliquing and selfish ambition for office, men who are willing to make a sacrifice for the upbuilding of the Baptist denomination and the glory of God, who is our leader.

We as an organization should plan our work, then work our plan. I feel we need more missionaries in the State, but owing to our formation we are not able to support more than one now, but we all can be missionaries

to help somebody.

Therefore I will recommend a "Forward Movement Committee," whose work will be to organize the four sections of the state into district associations. The missionary during the year will get in touch with the various state pastors and assist them in working up a meeting among the churches. Then the city churches will send their pastors and Christian workers to reinforce the churches composing the association, by holding religious services with special financial effort. The money collected in this meeting will be divided among the churches composing this association according to their financial need.

I also recommend that we give our hearty support to our educational institution. And organize plans by which to raise finance for its maintenance.

Third, that we put in operation the budget system that has been recom-

mended by our Budget Committee.

Fourth, that we seek financial aid from other bodies, who are in position to make a contribution to the expenses of our state work.

# DAWNING OF A NEW DAY THROUGH THE EYES OF THE BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLES' UNION

Mr. President, Officers and Members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland.

Greetings:

To this high and noble Christian body, meeting in your first grand session as one solid, cemented and united religious force, for the advancement of God's Kingdom on earth. May the years and life of this great Baptist Convention be showered with the refreshing sunshine of pure love, peace and contentment. And register forever on the pages of history for facts, actions and faithful execution of all matters that pertain o he welfare and uplift of humanity. And may our association with you, as the Baptist Young Peoples' Convention, bear much fruit, and the spirit, as the proper ihild to its parents. And that we may never do anything that will bring reproach upon any of the Constitutional laws of this progressive Baptist family.

Every today will be a yesterday, but dawn must precede the new day, as we term, tomorrow. This new day is excellent, for we can see the light appearing over the Eastern horizon; for the darkness is now passed. The dawning will present us a new day. The presentation will consist of new life, new thoughts, new songs, new facts. The power of new thoughts and facts will register very keenly, new actions of a higher calling. The new day will usher in new and drastic demands upon us. People will ask new and seemingly strange questions. We must be able to answer intelligently, produce and prove real, honest facts. New and dizzy heights will appear before our visions in greeting this new day.

Time and tide await for no man. The dawning and the new day will come whether we are prepared or not. It accepts no excuses. The day is always on time. The question arises: Are we prepared or preparing for the new Day? The Baptist Young Peoples' Union is now awake to accept the demands of the new day. Their vision is clear to gaze on the duties that confront the Christian forces. Their eyes pierce through the dusty distance to the Righteous Goal of finer qualities in preparing for service, for the creating values of fellowship and loyalty to the world's Greatest Leader and Teacher, Jesus Christ. Many kind thanks to the pastors of every local Baptist Young Peoples' Union, for their unstinted efforts in making their Unions go over the top in every project that the young people have launched in our Convention. My visits have been most pleasant. The highest type of Christian character is deeply rooted in every local Union with which I have had the honor to work. The Baptist Young People will run the race with patience. Ever looking to the hills from which cometh our help.

The word Baptist strikes them very seriously. The name Baptist gives us inspiration, courage and reverence. We can readily see the need of Denominational Pride, which seems to nave been slipping in our city in the past few years. The spirit of denominational pride works the same as the spirit of charity. It begins at home.

Friends, if we ever expect to set the highest mark in Denominational Pride, it must begin in every local Baptist Church. The unexcusable mud that has been thrown upon the churches in our vicinity arises from the fact that we have not known our church. We have not been deeply impressed about our church—the laws, rules, history, the sacredness of the Baptist Church which Jesus purchased with his own blood. If we knew our church better, we would love it more. Love brings obedient service.

The Baptist Young Poples' Union is a unit in the Baptist Church, training the Young People for present and future service. The keynote in every Union is, prepare that you may serve God, your family, your church, your fellowman. The services are simple and impressive. This department of the Church should be given all the help possible, because the time given to instruction in our Churches is so short. When figured up for the entire year, we have given but a few hours; with our doors closed practically six days and every other influence for bad ever present to mislead.

Members of the Baptist Church, let us call our Baptist Young Peoples' Union, "UNION," not League, not B. Y. P. U. Rather say, the Baptist Young People at work in Kingdom building by winning your pal for Christ. The dawning of the new day sees the need of advertisement for the Union. Such titles as, "Your best Friend is in the Baptist Young Peoples' Union. Jesus is your Best Friend. Every pastor should be in his Union before

closing period.

The Unions could do more effective work if all the local Unions could secure the proper material, necessary for Union work. I will just mention a few pointers in reference to the Baptist Young People object: The unification of Baptist Young People to increase spirituality; to stimulate their desires for Christian service; education in Scripture knowledge; Baptist History and Doctrine; to enlist in Home Missions and let it spread to the foreign fields. Enlistment, Enlightenment, Enlargement. Every member a Christian; every Christian a worker; every worker, trained.

The weekly topic cards play a very important part in the services of the Union. The constant searching of the Scriptures that we may be fully prepared to open and discuss our topics, has helped the members to recite the Books of the Bible. We believe if we are to know God we must learn of Him through his Holy Word, the Bible, the masterpiece of literature, the Book of Books; that we may be able to measure out rightly to God and man.

The Baptist Young Peoples' Union is essential to every Baptist Church, regardless of condition. No church is quite complete until it has in it everything that helps to train and develop our people. The Unions have a congenial spirit; they boost their church and pastor. They are forever building their powers upward. To further the aim of the Baptist Young Peoples' Union, certain material is essential and very helpful, namely: Bibles, topic cards, Junior and Senior quarterlies, Junior and Senior pledge cards, membership cards, wall charts, banners, blackboards, temperance and missionary tracts,

daily Bible reading cards, that the Christian life program may be more effective.

The Baptists of Maryland feel the issues that the character of the church is even now passing through, profound and far-reaching changes, in its struggle to find its adjustments to the condition amid which we live. The Church, if it is to fulfil its high calling will embody the ideals of the souls of a great people to uphold the spirit values of life. It links the centuries and races of men together by its witness to the undying manhood of the soul's aspiration and hope.

The Baptist voice is moral thunder of Mt. Sinai and its prophetic eye sees in the future the spiritual destiny of mankind. Already the signs of a coming age of faith are unmistakable, and the Baptist cry of a kingdom

# PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS TO SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

ANNIE GROOMS, ELMER IMES, Chairman, ETHEL DAVIS, Secretary.

Mr.. Vice- President, Members of the Convention, Ladies and Gentlemen:

When the Great "Titantic" was sinking every soul was touched as the band struck up and played "Nearer My God to Thee." They might have played 'The Star Spangled Banner" or some classical selection or a Jazz as they were quite in the habit of doing under ordinary circumstances, but on that fateful night such music was entirely out of place, for those who played and those who listened were facing death. Their thought turned eagerly to God and only such music as would lift their souls to Him was appropriate and helpful. In such a moment only He who holds the sea in the hollow of his hand can hold attention.

So it is on this occasion, I might possibly weave into my talk

So it is on this occasion, I might possibly weave into my talk some cross and crown words; or something that might amuse you for a moment, but in view of the fact that quite a large percentage of the inhabitants of this country are sailing on the sea of ungodliness and their ships are sinking very fast, it would be entirely out of place for me to try to amuse you.

We have eminent examples and compelling reasons for making this day a great, interesting and beautiful occasion. We are engaged in a tremendous and significant business. What we are doing today is for "age on ages telling." It is joining hands with the old and young of this state in lifting them to a higher degree of citizenship by the teaching of God's word through the Sunday Schools. Hence my subject, "What Is Your Life?" What, indeed, there are many answers ancient and modern, and here is one: "Life is an arrow; therefore you must know what mark to aim at, how to draw the bow, then draw it to its head and let go." Henry Van Dyke, whose lines I have just quoted, is the maker of straight verses—verses that arrow-like go singing to the mark.

Let us accept his answer. "Life is an arrow," and like the arrow must have an aim, must have a traversable way; must have power to send it straight and on. Life must have a mark. A ship without a port; a traveler without a destination; a builder without a plan; a runner without a goal; a marksman without a mark—that is tragedy!

What then is the aim of life? We are knocking here at a big gate and yet need not knock with timid hands. Life is no blind alley. It leads on by God-sent paths to a great goal, and that goal, casting aside all negative definitions, is the fullest possible realization of the high-

est self.

The end of life is expression and repression, self-realization and not self-denial. Repression, self-limiting, self-denials are of value only as they make for higher realization. The athlete denies himself of many bodily pleasures, but the merit is not in the denial, the merit is in the higher realizations. The scholar, the minister, the Sunday-school worker, the artist, the musician and all other professional men, deny themselves of ease and pleasure, yet their reward is not in the sacrifice, but in the greater garnered wisdom. God wants a full life, not an empty one—a life whose lowest and whost topmost notes are alike resonant and full. To make the most of the life stuff given us is Ife's true aim. To unfold our native powers is our highest privilege.

1st. This, then, is the mark at which to aim life's arrow; the amplest, the largest development of the highest self—the sounding of the mountain notes with the trumpet force and volumes, the living of a full life whose fullness comes through Him who said "I have come that ye might have life, and that ye might have it more abundantly."

2nd. Life, though, it has a mark, must have a way. A way hindered and barricaded it may be, and yet traversable. Here the aim of the arrow does not hold altogether good. As the arrow speeds through the soft air from the bow it meets with no resistance, save the air; but life's arrows too often fall, split and are battered at the foot of any

unyielding wall.

God has set before us an aim and a way in order ahat we may reach our highest self; and has thrust us into a universe where the way can be realized by us all. The God who created the instinct of the birds to fly and the fish to swim and then provided the yielding atmosphere and supporting sea, this same God has also put into the heart of man an instinct and also provided a way for its highest development. Thus we see that it's false that life's failures come from without, but they are from within. The failure of Solomon was not in the past; the past was noble, heroic, filled with shepherds' songs and psalmists' prayers, trumpets tongued in ethical appeal. The failure was within. Life's way is not blocked.

One, writing of Napoleon's disastrous Russian campaign, says that "the whole campaign was against his will, that he wanted to invade England. that only a higher will pushed him on toward's Moscow's flames." Was that higher will Fate? No, the power behind Napoleon was Napoleon. It was through the force of his own genius, his own determination, that he climbed from the obscurity of Corsica

to the eminence of Versailles.

It was Napoleon, not fate, that battered down Toulon, climbed

the snowy Alps, fought the battle of the Pyramids and sent high in the heavens his star of glory above the fields of Austerlitz. It was Napoleon, not fate, who, drunk with ambition, pitted his armies against God's almighty snow, blundered in reckonings and in orders on the field of Waterloo. and who at last in storm-girt Helena, his glory gone, out of his own baffled ambition and keen remorse, wove the winding sheet for his own body and sank self-slaughtered into a self-dug grave.

3rd. Life, having an aim, a way, must also have power to send it on.

The great bow of Ulysses means nothing without Ulysses to bend it and send the arrow to the mark. The clear course amounts to nothing, the goal but tantalizing, without a force to send the feet straight out and on. The world's supreme need is power. When John Ruskin, the great art critic and yet a greater philosopher, looking with almost adoration upon a great cathedral, was asked by a friend why we do not build such great cathedrals now? He answered, "The men who built these cathedrals were men of great conviction. Here in a sentence is the philosophy of great living.

All true greatness is rooted in great convictions. Lacking such greatness, we build meanly, whether it be cathedral or character. As great convictions wax, men kindle into nobleness of thought and word and deed, and as great convictions wane, men shrivel into littleness in all their words and ways. The tombs of Egypt's kings and queens are noble because they were constructed to last through the eternities, and by those who dreamed that they should never diet. Only immortals will build immortal temples. Having conviction, possessing true greatness, with heaven's most bejeweled crown, which is the crown of character, we are then in a position to ask whence comes this power?

Let us see: One might be standing on the street corner, all around is nothing but darkness, not a star, not a ray of light can be seen, all is dark, dark, dark, in a moment; ves, in the twinkling of an eye, and all is bright. You say they have touched the electric button at the power-house and turned on the lights. Just so we can call on God, and from His great power-house we get the power to do whatever he wills us to do. We get the power from God.

My friends, I have briefly tried to show that to accomplish much in life we must have a mark, we must have a way, we must have the power. Having these, what shall we as Sunday school workers at-

tempt to accomplish?

We all realize the importance of training children for the great work of life here and hereafter. The child that God has given has a living soul. His spirit is a part of the great spirit of the universe. His soul, as well as his body and intellect, is to be nurtured and developed. We as officers and teachers should realize the great obligation resting upon us in training the millions of immortal souls that have been given into our keeping. The souls of these are of more value than all else in the world, and to train them is our highest privilege. Man has been endowed with ability to achieve great things. He has built the Pyramids and the Parthenon; he tunneled the Alps and made way for trains under the East River. He has dug the Suez and the Panama Canals; he has erected great cities; he has illuminated the earth with electricity; he has caught the sound of far-away voices with the radio; he has connected the continents with the telephone, and has occomplished wonderful works; but the greatest of all his endowments is the ability to work with God in training a human soul in the way of eternal life. It is a task big enough to call forth the best efforts of the greatest men and women of this or of any time. Great men of all ages have realized this obligation.

All Sunday school workers should see in their children's eyes the soul of God born anew into the world, and if they can see God looking upon them through the eyes of those of their class, the ones of their class should find God waiting for them in the hearts of their teachers. No true man or woman wants to rear their child in a community where there is no church or Sunday school, or where that child would receive no religious instruction.

The church and Sunday school is the spiritual power-house where a man or child becomes charged with an electric current of Christ's likeness to His children. It is impossible to convey spiritual life to your pupils if you have none yourself. No lodge, club or fraternal organization, I care not how good it may be, can take the place of the church. The church and aux liaries is the only institution that can develop the soul. The day school develops the intellect, the club, the social life; the lodge, the fraternal life; but the church is the only ordained institution to develop the spiritual life of the individual.

What part of our life-work and energy are we giving to eternal things? How much time are you teachers giving to strengthen the eternal spirit of the members of your classes? The Great Creator has implanted in the bosom of every member of your class a longing for God and immortality. You may harden your conscience, you may neglect your duty toward them, you may destroy your own soul and to some extent the souls of those you teach; you may live in the cellar of your being, you may give your life to the gross materialism of your day, you may freeze your soul in selfishness until it becomes as hard as the gold and silver you are seeking, but these things will never give you satisfaction. Every Sunday school worker should strive hard to see to it that his or her school is made better by your having worked in it. Life is so short at the best, each one of us should leave something good behind us.

What is the greatest inheritance we can leave to our classes? Is it wealth? This they can misuse and destroy. Is it fame? This they can mar and abuse. Is it opportunity? This they can ignore or despise. Is it a good name? This they can tarnish or disgrace. Ah! my friends, the greatest inheritance you can leave is training in right-eousness.

It is sad to see men and women today trifling with life's serious problems and giving their best thoughts and attention to the fleeting things of this world. They dismiss their conscience with a laugh, they kill their spiritual life through pleasure and gratification of self. They see noth ng in religious training.

But my time has expired. I must conclude by saying this is the time to take a serious look at life—fine time to consider what is my life? How am I using it? There are two classes of people. One class lives to make a living; the other, to make a life. Our happiness and success will depend largely upon the goal we place before us. The roads we travel contain both warning of danger and evidences of safety ahead. Signs along the way proclaim the failures of some men and women who have preceded us and hold forth cheering notices of success of others. If we have eyes with which to see and ears with which to hear, we can find abundant help in carrying forward our purpose to make our lives count. We as Sunday school workers have a great opportunity. Millions of children, not counting the men and women, are as yet out of the Sunday school. The harvest truly is great. Who will be the laborers? If you would be a Sunday school worker, go to work at it. If it is your full purpose to do what you can for the building up of the work and live a Christian life and reach heaven. God has so arranged it that you cannot fail. Your Heavenly Father would line every angel in heaven around you if nec-

essary to protect you while in discharge of your duty. All the devilson earth cannot defeat you if you commit your service to the work of the Saviour. Finally, let us improve all those God-like capabilities which have been conferred upon us by nature until they become as "clear as the moon, as bright as the sun and as terrible as an army with banners."

# MINUTES OF THE FIRST ANNUAL SESSION OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND Dear friends and members of the United Missionary Baptist Convention,

Dear friends and members of the United Missionary Baptist Convention, it is with no small degree of pleasure that I greet you on this, our first annual Convention, as we gather today from our various homes and churches to gather inspiration to better do the work of our Lord and Savior, and as I look in each face I seem to hear each heart say, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow, Praise Him all creatures here below!"

Today we come together saying that we are Baptist and if we are united in spirit and with the same purpose what a mighty work we can do, if we are all of one accord we will be able to convince men and women as did Peter on the day of Pentecost, for our job is to help the Kingdom come on earth and the only way that can be done is to bring it into the heart of mankind.

Today the world is craving for the truth. If we would satisfy that craving we must offer them Jesus Christ who is the truth and the life. We must sow the seed and God will take care of the harvest, for Jesus has said, "Greater work than this shall you do for I go to my Father." Are we doing that greater work? Are we going in the highways and hedges caring for the widows and orphans, lifting up the unfortunate man or woman, boy or girl. and visiting the hospitals and slums? Are we doing what our hands find to do—have you answered the great call to service in the vineyard of

the Master? ## STATF MISSIONARY'S REPORT

Baltimore, Md., May 16, 1927.
To the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland, in Session at the Shiloh Baptist Church, Baltimore, Md., Rev. W. W. Allen, Pastor:

It is with pleasure that I have the honor and privilege of presenting to this most august body the work of this your humble servant beginning from February the 21st to date, which is as follows:

February 21st to March 21st, weeks of labor, 4; sermons, 7;

prayer meetings, 5; average Sunday congregation, 35; confessions, 5; by letter and restoration, 3; average Sunday school attendance, 25. Points of standard attained, excellent; average B. Y. P. U. attendance, 18; points of standard attained, 5; religious visits, 12; Bible, 1; Testaments, 1. Have visited the following: First Baptist, Annapolis. This church does not seem to be making much progress. Was asked to meet the officers in joint session Monday, February 28th, at 8 P. M., at which time the general condition of the church was discussed. After much deliberation it was unanimously agreed upon to recommend to the church to ask the convention if it could assist them in financing their mortgage of about nine hundred (\$900.00) dollars, the convention to take over the property until they are able to repay the convention. The Second Baptist Church has secured the services of Rev. Logan, who came to them as an evangelist. They are moving along fairly well and spiritually alive, with a membership of about twentyfive. First Earleigh Heights is doing remarkably well under existing conditions. Visited the Sunday school and found fifteen pupils present, with much interest manifested in the lesson.

Mount Hope, Berlin, Md, under Rev. G. H. Brown, is moving along nicely. They have recently organized a B. Y. P. U., and the members are manifesting much interest in the services. Mount Zion, Snow Hill, is holding its own. This church has an excellent Sunday school and a very progressive superintendent, who is also a deacon of the church. This church was organized about forty years ago by the late Dr. W. M. Alexander. Rev. E. J. Henry is pastor. Macedonia, Pocomoke City, is without a pastor. This church is in excellent condition. I met some of the officers, and they are considering the call of a pastor. They have a splendid little church, with a very active membership. bership. Mount Ellm, Salisbury, is making very rapid progress; closed their winter revival with 23 converts. The officers informed me that the church never was in better condition than now. This speaks well for the pastor, Rev. Archie Frankling, who is very optomistic as to the future progress of the church. The Sunday school is very active and the prayer meetings are well attended and spiritually alive. Union, Easton, is doing remarkably well under the leadership of their new pastor, Rev. E. T. Tucker, who succeeded the Rev. G. Dudley. The Eastern Shore Association, organized by Dr. D. Bryant while field missionary, is quite active and doing a very commendable work in moulding Baptist sentiment. Rev. G. H. Brown is rendering excellent service under the auspices of this association. This association is planning to become an auxiliary to this convention. They are to hold their quarterly meeting the fifth Sunday in May with the Mount Hope Baptist Church, Berlin. The churches composing this convention deserve our prayerful consideration. The Tabernacle Baptist Church, under the leadership of Rev. W. A. Copeland, is making very rapid progress. The members are very much encouraged as to the future days lower the church. development of the church. They have an excellent Sunday school and a lively B. Y. P. U. The members are manifesting unusual interest in the services. Was asked to meet the members of the First Baptist Church, Post Deposit, to consider the call of a pastor. This church succeeded in getting five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to pay on their mortgage of eight hundred and fifty dollars, leaving a balance of three hundred and fifty dollars.

## HAVE VISITED THE FOLLOWING

Bethany Baptist Church, Mt. Winans, is doing a very commendable work. Sunday school and prayer meeting well attended and spiritually alive. Rev. Reuben Johnson, Pastor. March 22 an ordination council, consisting of messengers from six churches, met at the First Baptist Church, Earleigh-Hights, to consider the propriety of setting apart the work of the Gospel ministry, Brother N. H. Morgan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Annapolis. After an examination of the candidate, the council recommended that he be ordained. Moderator, Dr. G. G. Mack; secretary, Rev. Luke G. Réynolds; catechiser, Rev. George A. Crawley; ordination sermon, Dr. Simon Williamson; ordination prayer, Rev. Albert J. Grune. Rev. L. J. Jeffries, pastor. Mt. Zion, Havre de Grace, is doing remarkably well under the leadership of Rev. W. A. Hall, who has been serving them a little more than six months. This little groun was very much discouraged, owing to the fact that Reverend Johnson had persuaded the majority of the members to join an organization known as the Holy Rollers. Since Reverend Hall has been with them conditions have changed and the membership is increasing. The Sunday school has been revived, and the

future outlook is very bright; they are planning to pay off a debt of \$60.00; the work would be very much stimulated if some of the brethren would pay them an occasional visit. There is an organization in Harford county, known as the Ministers' and Laymen's Association, that will meet the fifth Sunday in May with the First Baptist Church in Belair. This organization is doing much to create Baptist sentiment. We are endeavoring to create similar organizations in the various counties, in order to stimulate the work among the Baptists, and; through this medium give the Baptists more prestige in the counties. Shiloh, Sycamore Avenue, under the leadrship of Rev. G. P. Cunningham, is making rapid progress Sunday school and prayer meetings well attended and spiritually alive. A visit by some of the city pastors would very much encourage them. Unity Baptist Church, Elkridge, is moving along nicely, and the members are working very harmoniously. They deserve much credit for their spirit of loyalty to the cause. Although few in number, they have erected a building in keeping with the spirit of the times. Rev. John Richards deserves much credit for the work accomplished in this community. The members have been encouraged to buy lots near the church, and some have built beautiful the couraged to buy lots near the church, and some nave punt beautiful homes, and the county officials have given them a school building near the church, which was due to the influence of the church. These people deserve your prayerful and financial consideration. Allen Memorial Church, situated in Hodges Grove, organized by Rev. Dodson with four members from the Shiloh Baptist; cornerstone laid by Dr. Simon Williamson the fourth Sunday in October, 1926. They have about 17 members; was informed they have 6 candidates for baptism and 17 applicants for membership; cost of property, about \$1,000; owes \$600. This church was organized through the influence of Brother James Ingram, a man 80 years of age. Rev. N. L. Ford, pastor. Visited Union Bridge with the hope of organizing a church between Union Bridge and Linwood; found a few Baptists scattered within a radius of two miles who are desirous of having a church, but do not feel that they are able to support a pastor. I am to make them another visit for the purpose of organizing a Sunday school. Visited St. Lewis' Baptist Church, and to my surprise found a very active body of people doing excellent work, with wide-awake prayer meetings well attended. The auxiliaries are doing excellent work. The building has a seating capacity of 175. The pastor, Rev. J. H. Matthews, who has been with them about a year, deserves much credit for the work accomplished. Shining Star, Bengies, was organized in 1922 and built at a cost of about \$1,550; owes \$548. The pastor, Reverend Smith, agreed to join the convention. First Bantist Church, Mt. Washington, is moving along as well as can be expected under existing conditions. There has been much dissatisfaction among some of the members since the death of the pastor, Rev. O. Watkins. Rev. R. D. Crawley is acting pastor. Rev. S. J. Winder has been called to the Social Baptist Church, South Baltimore. Reverend Winder is also pastor of Mount Pilgrim, Harmon, Md. The Berean Baptist Church, under Reverend Cephas, is moving along nicely, and the members seem very much encouraged. Ebenezer, Magnolia, is making very little progress; they are without a permanent pastor. Reverend Simpson, who lives near Bengies, is serving them. Israel No. 2, under the leadership of Rev. T. L. Jones, is making rapid progress, membership increasing, and every department is quite active. Prayer meetings well attended and much good is being accomplished in this community.

Mount Harmon Baptist Church is in excellent condition; they are meeting their financial obligations, membership is rapidly increasing and the members are very much encouraged; prayer meetings are well attended and they are spiritually alive; and the members seem to

have a mind to work. Rev. Lloyd Price, their progressive pastor, deserves much credit for the work that has been accomplished. Was asked to visit Perry's Point. This congregation is composed principally of Pedo-Baptists. They hold services in a hall owned by the government. Was informed that the church must be governed on non-sectarian principles.

We, the Educational Board of the United Baptist Missionary Convention, beg leave to make the following report:

First, after careful survey of the conditions of the State, we have found a most urgent need for an educational institution in this city to take care of the needs of our people in religious training for service.

Therefore, we recommend the support of the same through the Convention.

We further report to the Convention in view of this need, a number of Brethren, Citizens of this city, on April 6, 1927, were appointed incorporators of an institution known as the Clayton-Williams College and Training School. Plans are being made to open this school this Fall September 26, 1927 in shape to do class work.

Therefore, we recommend that this Convention adopt this school as its education agent and object of educational support.

We further recommend that a drive be put on to terminate in 60 days from date, for the purpose of raising funds to secure a building for the same, and each person be asked to give one dollar or more.

This is a demand that claims our attention and support, that we may have a place to train our Sunday School workers, our Missionary Workers, and to provide a place for our young men who are not able to go out of the city to secure a training for the ministry.

We also need an institution where we can keep alive, by teaching, the principles of our church and instill the Word of God.

Shall we have it? Shall we put it over for God and our people?

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ARTICLE V.—Duties of Officers

The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of this body, maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the constitution; preserve order sign orders on the treasurer and to have general oversight of the work of the convention.

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the president in his absence, resignation, illness or death.

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair, impartial and correct record of the transctions of the convention in a book provided for that purpose, and the entire enrollment of the membership, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes, for which he shall receive such salary as shall be designated by the convention or executive board. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary and in his absence shall perform all the duties of the Recording Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed by him as an assistant.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with this body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the State; collect funds from the churches for the work of the convention; receive reports from the missionary or missionaries, as well as moneys collected or raised by them; paying the same over to the treasurer and taking a receipt for the same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the executive board. All letters, packages, etc., received by him officially shall be the property of the convention. He shall be secretary of the executive board and shall draw all drafts on the treasurer and shall present a written report to the board at each of its quarterly meetings. [He shall report the doings of the executive board in writing at each annual meeting of the convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all of the funds of the convention, provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution, selected by the convention or executive board and pay all orders of the convention, properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Board. He shall render a quarterly statement to the Board and an annual report to the convention. His books shall be kept ready for inspection by any of the proper officers of the convention. The treasurer shall give such security or bond for his proper conduct in office and the safeguarding of the fnuds of this convention as the body or executive board may require.

The Statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history in city and the condition of the Baptist in this State, as to their domestic, economic, property and resources, numerical, spiritual and financial strength and present the same at each annual meeting.

The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the same preceding the election of officers.

The officers of this convention shall be elected by ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the president and the report of the executive board, through the corresponding secretary, treasurer and the auditor.

# ARTICLE VI.—Convention in Session

The work of the convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by messengers and pastors, said messengers holding membership in the churches they are sent to represent. Each pastor having charge of a church in this State, which is connected with the convention, shall be a member of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the churches composing the convention.

# ARTICLE VII.—How Churches Can Become Members

Churches desiring to become members of this convention shall make application by letters bearing the names of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenets and sentiment of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation; and if satisfactory to the convention, shall be elected as members, after which the president or his appointee shall ratify their connection by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of this convention this duty shall be performed by the chairman of the executive board, to such as were not fellowshiped during the sessions of the convention.

# ARTICLE VIII.—The Executive Board

There shall be an executive board elected annually, which shall consit of the pastor and one layman from each church composing this body. They shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and secure the interests of the convention. Fifteen shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the convention shall be members of the Board by virtue of their offices. The Board shall have power to hold quarterly meetings and monthly meetings.

# ARTICLE IX.—Work of the Board

The Executive Board shall be the legal representative of the convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend mission fields, appoint missionaries for the convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, fix their salaries and make provision for

the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the convention. It shall assue orders on the treasurer of the convention, made out by the corresponding secretary, and duly signed by the President chairman of the Executive Board. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the convention.

# ARTICLE X.—Time of Convention Meeting

The Convention shall meet annually Monday after the 3rd Lord's Day in May at 10 A. M. and adjourn on Friday evening, at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition. financial standing and work, the names of messengers sent and enclosing money for the several departments of the convention and the contingent fund shall be read.

# ARTICLE XI.—The Convention in Extra Session

The president, on written request of two-thirds of the members of the executive board, may call the convention in extra session whenever an emergency arises and the work of the extra session shall have the same legal force as the work of the convention in annual session; the business to be transacted in the extra session shall be designated in the call by the president.

# ARTICLE XII.—Non-Interference

This convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the churches within its bounds, regular organized and recognized by this body, and in no case nor under any circumstances will this convention attempt to interfere with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserves the right to deal with any church in so far as its membership affects this body.

# ARTICLE XIII.—Reading List of Members

The entire list of membership shall be read before the adjournment of each annual session, including life membership, and if objection be made to the continuance of any one of the bodies or life members, by a two-thirds vote the name of said body or life member shall be stricken from the list of membership and the money returned. Notice shall be given at the session preceding the calling of the list, that it shall be called at the next session.

# ARTICLE XIV.—Co-operation with Other Bodies

This convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance and extension of the kingdom of Christ and in education, Home and Foreign Missions outside of the state of Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which had the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

# ARTICLE XV. - Auxiliaries

The auxiliaries to this convention shall be governed by this constitution, and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principals of the general convention, he or she will forfeit his or her office, and the executive board will appoint his or her successor, and that no resolution nor document passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the convention or executive board.

### ARTICLE XVI.—Other Auxiliaries

Regular Baptist Associations operating in the rural districts of Maryland may become members of this convention by the payment of ten dollars (\$10), after having made public application; which ten dollars shall give the joining body two representatives in the convention and their membership shall continue upon the payment of ten dollars annually.

### ARTICLE XVII.—Boards

The following boards shall be elected annually by the convention: Education, Home Mission and Foreign Mission.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.—Amendments and Revisions

This constitution may be amended or revised at any annual session of the convention, providing twelve (12) months notice has been given in writing and the proposed amendment or the nature of it be filed with the corresponding secretary. Amending the constitution and other important matters which deal with the life of the convention shall be decided by two-thirds vote of he churches in the convention.

# RULES OF ORDER FOR THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND

- 1. Every meeting of the convention or board shall be opened with prayer and other devotionals.
- 2. The Ministers Star Book by Hiscox shall be recognized as the standard guide in all of the deliberations for the general government of all parliamentary matters of this convention and the board.
- 3. The president shall appoint all committee, unless otherwise provided for: a. On Enrollment. b. Finance: c. On Nomination: b. New Bodies: e. Education: f. State of the Country: g. Temperance and Prohibition: h. Foreign Mission: i. Home Mission: j. Feeble Churches: k. Resolutions: (and all other committees as may be necessary from time to time). A standing committee on budget for the convention's annual budget.
- 4. The introductory sermon shall be preached the first day of the assembling of the convention. Other sermons shall be preached,

as doctrinal, educational, missionary and such others as in the judgment of the program committee may be necessary.

- 5. Immediately after the opening of the convention, the rules of order shall be read by the Corresponding Secretary.
- 6. No subject shall be opened for discussion until a motion has been made, seconded and stated by the president.
- . 7. No person shall speak more than twice, nor longer than five minutes on any motion without permission from the president or body.
- 8. When a motion has been made and seconded, any member opposing its being discussed, the president shall immediately put the question: "Shall the question be discussed?" which if negatived, the subject must be dismissed.
- 9. If any motion under debate contains two or more propositions, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
- 10. Every person who wishes to speak on a motion shall rise from his seat and address the president and await his recognition before proceeding, and shall avoid using personalities in debate.
- 11. The election of officers shall take place in the afternoon of the first day's meeting of the convention, the chairman of the executive board may be elected, by the convention or board.
- 12. No member of this convention shall absent himself without leave of permission of the president.

# PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

If it was possible for you and for me to go back to the days of the destruction of Jerusalem, and could place ourselves in the position of good old Nehemiah when he begun to think of his native land. He saw Jerusalem in cmplete ruin. The towers down. The gates down. The temple being dishonored and defaced in fact all the beauties of Jerusalem was in complet ruin. You will remember that Nehemiah was an exile and a cup bearer in the King's Palace, or in the Palace of Artaxerxes. Yet in this plight he never forgot his native home, yes his native land.

One day you will remember that as he was handing the king a cup of wine, the king asked him why art thou sad? Are you home sick? Tell the king all of your troubles. Then to told the king of how Jerusalem had been broken down. He then and there arranged with the king to go back and view the city. Got pass ports and in hot haste this adventurer goes back to Jerusalem. We see him on horse back riding in the moon light. We hear the click of the horses hoofs, on which he was riding. We see him as he guides him this way and that, winding through that gate and this one amid the

ruins of the once great Jerusalem. Now the horse comes to a dead halt at tumbling masonry where he cannot pass. Now he shies off at the charred timbers. Now he come along where the waters under the moonlight flashes from the mouth of the brazen dragon after which the gates were named. Heavy hearted Nehemian, riding in and out, now by his old home which is desolated. Now by the defaced temple. Now amid the scars of that great city that had gone down under the battering rams and conflagation. Still that midnight exploration goes on. Nehemiah on horse back, riding through the fish gates, by the tower furnace by the king's pool, by the dragon well. In and out until midnight the ride was completed and Nehemiah dismounted from his horse and to the surprise and amazed and confounded body guards he declared the dead secret of his heart when he said, come let us rebuild the wall of the city. I cannot trace this story further. You are no doubt better posted on the story than I, and know more about it than I am able to tell. Some people laughed and said that the city could not be rebuilt. Some were angry and offered physical violence, saying that the thing should not be done. But my friends the workmen went right on. standing on the wall, trowel in one hand and sword in the other until the work was gloriously completed. At this very time in Greece, Renophin was writing a history and Plato was making philosophy, and Demososthenes was rattling his retorical thunder. But all of them together did not half so much for the world as that midnight, moonlight ride of praying, courageous, home-sick, close mouth, Nehemiah.

My friends it is through this spectacle of this scene that we discover the ardent attachment of Nehemiah for sacred Jerusalem which in all ages has been a type of the church which we should love just as much as Nehemiah loved his home, Jerusalem. This deed of Nehemiah to my mind stands out in bold letters on the pages of history possibly without an equal as a deed of true devotion to a just cause. From this narrative I have chosen my subject:

### Church Patriotism, Or A Mind To Work

Patriotism as you and I understand and possibly feel it, is love of country, loyal to its life and weal—love, tender and strong, tender as the love of son for mother, or daughter for father. Strong as the pillows o death: loyalty,generous and disinterested, shrinking from no sacrifice, seeking no reward, save country's honor and country's triumph.

Patriotism there is magic in the word. It is bliss to repeat it. Through ages the human race burnt the incense of admiration and reverence at the shrine of patriotism. The most beautiful pages of history are those which count its deeds. Fireside tales the out pouring of the memories of the people, borrowed from its warmest glow.

Poets are sweetest when they re-echo its whisperings. Orators are potent when they thrill its chords to music.

The human race pays homage to patriotism because of its supreme love and value. The value of it to a people is above gold and precious stones, above commerce and industry, above citidel and warships. The shield of the nations safety.

Take patriotism away and the nation's soul has fled, bloom and beauty has vanished from the nation's countenance. Patriotism goes out to what is among earths possessions the most precious, the first and best and dearest,—country, and its effersion is the fragrant flowing of the purest and noblest sentiment of the heart. It is innate in all men, the absence of it betokens a perversion of human nature, but is grows its full growth only when thoughts are elevated and heart beating are generous. Next to God is country and next to religion is patriotism.

No praise goes beyond its deserts. It is sublime in its heroic oblation upon the field of battle. O glorious is he exclaimed Homer, the Trojan Warrior, who for his country falls. It is sublime in the oft-repeated toil of dutiful citizensship.

Of all human doings wrote Cicero, none is more honorable and more estimable than to merit well the commonwealth. Here the question might be asked, that if patriotism is so binding, why is it that we have so many nations and countries? I would answer that countries are of divine appointments. The most High divided the nations. The physical and moral necessities of God's creatures are revelations of His will and laws.

Man is born a social being. A condition of his existence and growth of mature age is the family. Nor does the family suffice to its self. A large social organism is needed, into which families gather so as to obtain from one another security of life and property and aid in the development of the faculties and power with which nature has endowed the children of men. The whole human race is too extensive and too diversified in interest to serve those ends. Hence its sub-divisions into countries, nations or people. Countries have their providential limits, the waters of a sea, a mountain range, the lines of similarity of requirements or methods of living. The limits widen in space according to the measures of destinies which the Great Ruler alots to people, and the importance of their part in the mighty work of the cycles of years. The ever advancing tide of humanity's evolution. The Lord is the God of nations, because He is God of men. No nation is born into life or banished back into nothingness, without His bidding. I believe in the providence of God over countries as I believe in His wisdom and His love, and our patriotism to our country rises within our souls invested with the halo of our religion to our God. America, born into the family of nations in these later years is the highest billows in humanity's evolution, the crowning efforts of the aggrandizement of man. Unless we take her in this attitude, we do not comprehend her. We belittle her towering statues and conceal the singular design of providence in creation. America is the country of human dignity and human liberty.

When the fathers of this country or republic declared that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuits of happiness, a cardinal principle was enunciated which in its truth was as old as the race, but in practice relization, almost unknown. Slowly amid suffering and revolutions, humanity had been reaching out toward the reign of the rights of man. Anti-Christians, Paganism had utterly denied these rights. It allowed nothing to man as man, he was what wealth, place or power made him. Even the wise Aristotel taught that some men were intended by nature to be slaves and chattles.

The sweet religion of Christ proclaimed aloud the doctrine of the common fatherhood of God and the universal brotherhood of men.

Eighteen hundred years however went by and the civilized world had not yet put its civil and political institutions in accord with its spiritual faith. The Christian Church was all, thus leaving humanity socially and patiently awaiting the promised fermentation.

This came at last and it came in America. It came is a first manifestation through the Declaration of Independence; it came in a second and final manifestation through President Lincoln's Proclamation of Emancipation.

My friends, it is fortunate for a people that from time to time, a supreme emergency arises, testing their patriotism to the highest pitch. If it remains dormant for a long period it may lessen in strength, while the reffections and self-consciousness which resolute action awakens results, in the fuller estimate of the value of the country and institution which it is the duty of pariotism to defend A supreme emergency did arise for the people of this nation. On the morning of the 12th day of April in that memorable year of 1861 a cannonball swept over the waters of Charleston Harbor, aimed with deadly intent at the Star Spangled Banners floating above the walls of Sumter. War was declared against the country. At stake was the Union of the States, the strength and life of a nation. At stake was the plenary recognition of human rights in our own country.

Contrary to the Declaration of Independence men were held as slaves—forsooth because of color. In practice America had failed as yet to be the ideal country of manhood and human dignity.

Had rebellion triumphed slavery should have been confirmed. At stake was liberty for the world, the stability of a government of the people, for the people and by the people. The Union disrupted, shattered fragments prostrated over the land as its broken and desolute columns of once famous temples in Grecian and Roman regions, liberty trembling over the ruins should have hastened back to caverns of gloom, her friends abandoning hope, her enemies rejoicing and confident.

The death of the Union implied a century of retrogression for humanity. Deep and soul rendering was the ceasless anxiety of freedom's sons during the dreary years of American Civil War. At every rise of the morning sun the heavens were questioned. O say can you see by the dawns early light what so proudly we hail at the twilight's last gleaming? O say does the Star Spangle Banner yet wave, over the land of the free and the home of the brave? Great was the sacrifice which the war in defense of this nation demanded: but great was the results. To give life for ones country is only a part of what men have been willing to give for country.

Human life has often seemed to be a very triffling possession to be exposed cheaply in all sorts of useless risks. Wealth that Croesus might have envied poured out at the feet of our mothers and sacrifices taken up which St. Francis never knew. Ease and luxury, refined company and cultivated employment have been rejected for the hardships and suffering of the camp, and even at the age when men would not offer neither life nor living as any value to the country the children and grandchildren which were to have been the old man's and the old woman's solace were freely sent forth in the cause of the nation which sent back nothing but a sword and a cap to be hung on the wall and never to be worn by living man again, the wearer having been slain on the bloody field of battle. My friends, such are the sacrifices men have made for the existence, the honor, and prosperity of this nation.

You note that American patriotism was on guard, and the day came when at Appomattox, on flag unfurled its beautious flo ds over both contending armies. And at the rising of the morning sun the heavens peeled forth the glorious answer. 'Tis the Star Spangled Banner, O long may it wave, O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave. If men through patriotism will offer their live, their money, and sacrifice their home and the many dear ones there in order to keep the flag of their country ever floating to the breeze, what shall we expect of those of us who have taken a solemn vow to hold up the banner of the Great Church of the living God?

A glance through the pages of history and you will be convinced that nations rise, flourish and decay. But the great Church has

continued to float her banners still higher to the breeze. I cannot illustrate this better than the poet who declared.

Oh, where are kings and Emperors now Of old that went and came? But, Lord that church is praying yet, A thousand years the same.

We mark her goodly battlements

And her foundation strong,
We hear within a solemn voice
Of her unending song.

For not like kingdom of the world,
Thy wholly church, O God,
Though earth quake shocks are threatening her
And tempest are abroad

Unshaken as eternal hills,
Immovable she stands,
A mountain that shall fill the earth,
A house not made by hand.

The church then is the greatest institution.

The battles that are being fought in the church are not, or should not be for territorial gains, or for men's selfish honors. It is a battle for the saving of the souls of men. Shall we be patriotic? Shall we allow the banner of the church and schools to trail in the dust? Shall we shrink from any duty when the enemy of the church and schools declare war against her? As the country has been divided into different nations so has the church been divided into different denominations.

Shall we then, of what ever faith we may be, neglect our church and schools? Or shall be buckle on the armor and fight like valiant soldiers, to uphold its honor? My answer to all these are that like a true citizen, a true churchmar will be patritic to his church and school. In time of battle he will ever be ready to fight for her. In time of trouble he will ever come to her relief. When the enemies assail her good name he will ever be ready to defend. When the cry comes, to come over in Macedonia and help, he will ever be ready to go. In short as men are true to the nation, so to a greater extent should men and women be true to the church and schools. God wants true men and women everywhere. He wants men and women who will ever dare to do right. He wants men and women in the church and school who will not prove traitors and who will not desert His cause. He wants men and women who will ever let it be

known throughout the length and breadth of church and schools, that church and school membership involves of necessity, a sense of responsibility for the welfare of the whole people.

He wants men and women who will let it be known that the condemnation of Christ fell not with the greatest severity upon the public sinner or the outcast, but upon the respectible members of society and of the church and schools, who laid burdens and would not lift a finged to lighten them, upon the useless, the selfish, the indifferent.

His condemnation was: in as much as you did it not!

Let it be known through the church and schools, that there are thousands of men and women who, because of the churches and schools lethargy in centuries past, as well as today, shun or hate the church and schools, but who adore the Christ, and yet they are giving up their very life for their fellow man and putting the church and schools membership to shame. Let the members of the church and schools appreciate more keenly that the masses of men, women and children who are hidden in the intricate mechanism of this industrial age, in the mines, mills and work shops, out upon the prairies and in the lonely valleys, are really men, women and children for whom Christ gave his life.

I believe that the strongest appeal that the church and schools can make to the people, the most effective call to the ablest young men to her ministry, is by such devotion to the welfare of the people as will show them that the church and schools are alive to the spirit of her Master, Christ.

In the turmoil of industrialism, in the mingling of sin and righteousness, of lust and purity, of selfishness and self sacrifice, of commercialism, and sweet thoughtfulness, let the churches and schools voice be strong and full of hope.

In the strong march of men throughout the world toward a finer civilization, a common justice, a better chance for everybody and a purer brotherhood, in the advancement toward God's kingdom. Let not vested interest or a selfish timidity check our steps, but where ever the path o ftruth and justice points the way, let the Church and schools and every member thereof, march in the van. Thus from the midst of a people, educated, matured in Christian thought and character, these three visions rise and stand. A brotherhood of man, a united Church and redeemed society. In the vast material resources of today and the intensity of life the battle is being quickly fought out as to whether material or the spiritual will dominate. Shall we run the course of other nations and fall under the impact of wealth, or shall we use our wealth in the uplifting of the people?

We have noted brieftly what patriotism and labor has done for

our nation. I believe that with such devotion in our Sunday Schools we can be the means of the saving of thousands of souls. But in order to accomplish this we must not only have a mind to work but we must work.

Christian labor is more than a question of Christian giving. It includes all life. We as Sunday School workers want to find a place in the school, and if we fail to make the most of our talents in Christian service we are guilty of a breach of divine trust and of sin against ourselves and the Kingdom of God. The test of our sincerity and courage is our willingness to serve the Lord in the use of the talents with which He has endowed us, in whatever place we can serce Him.

That may be down in the slumly district of our city or state. It may be among the fine residents. It may be in the alleys or small streets, it may be on the flowery boulevards, it may be among the poor and needy, it may be among the highest class of society, it may be on the mountain top or down in the valley, regardless as to where it may be, we as Sunday School workers must be willing to go where the Lord wants us to go and to do what He wants us to do.

My friends, when we look around us we see so much that ought to be done. So much darkness, so much hatred, so much ungodliness, so much superstition and so many grooping in misery and sin and woe. Here is the golden opportunity fr us all. Here is the open door for the Sunday School workers.

In our Sunday Schools God's moulding process is going on. From the Sunday Schools He will bring forth men and women who will do His biding. You know that in all times of great public exigency God raised up men and women to do His work.

Sometimes the age most needs earnest and alarming voices that shall cry day and night in the city and in the wilderness: "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." Sometimes there are wanted men and women of action, whose silent and ceaseless energy is the voice with which they arouse and shake the nations. Sometimes there is need of men and women with courage of heroes and faith of martyrs to hew down the thrones of iniquity with the stroke of the battle ax, and to meet the armed forces of wrong on the bloody field of battle. Sometimes the world's greatest need is the embodiment of active, benevolence, the incarnation of pity and humanity to carry the light of righteousness into the lark places of sorrow, to speak peace and pardon into the dens and dungeons of vice and crime. Today we want the incarnation of all these centralized into living action throughout the Sunday Schools in opposition to wickedness as it sets enthroned throughout the state and city.

The opportunity is yours and mine to enter into the field and assist today. Reforms never go tackward. We cannot stand still. The command at the Red Sea was general orders for all times. Speak

ainto the Children of Israel that they move forward. God set the pildow of fire in front and it is still there today. Let us then realize that if we would use the opportunities as they are given us that marching must be done. We must be constantly on the move.

Friends, we need in our Schools a definite program. A specific object and then each and every Sunday School worker put his or her shoulder to the wheel and with a mind to work we shall be able to accomplish much in the work of the Master.

We must be united in our every efforts. We noticed at the out set that those who were interested in the building of the walls of Jerusalem as well as those who were struggling to save the union were united, every man worked as one man, every man fought as one man, every man was interested in one common cause and the results were that the cause for which they labored was accomplished. So it should be in our Sunday School work.

But my time has expired. I must conclude by saying that you no doubt remember when the Children of Isreal were marching out of Egypt that they came to the Red Sea, on their right were high mountains, on their left were high mountain cliffs, before them was the Red Sea and coming behind them was the mighty army of Pharoah, hence to escape was impossible. Something must be done, at such a time God spoke from the pillow of fire to Moses and commanded him to seak unto the Children of Israel that they move forward. The command was obeyed and the waters of the Sea divided and God's people passed through.

The great army of Sunday School workers and pupils are surrounded by the enemies of God, to the right of us are oppositions, to the left of us are oppositions, behind us are oppositions and in front of us are oppositions, but if we will only listen we will hear a voice coming from over the battlement of heaven, the voice of our Blessed Master saying speak unto the Sunday School workers that they move forward, and if we like the Children of Israel, will only obey that voice, we will be able to march on to victory and success. Jesus Christ is the Captain of the Sunday School army and if we will simply follow His command we cannot fail.

Let us all labor earnestly, let us all labor prayerfully and faithfully and let us ever remember that the walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt because the people had a mind to work.

Let us all be up and doing
With a heart for any fate,
Still achieving, still persueing,
Learn to labor and to wait.

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

To The Woman's Auxiliary of The United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland:

Dear Members and Friends, as we assemble today in the Trinity Baptist Church to greet each other on this our second convention, we feel as we gather today that it is with God's approval of the work that we have attained.

As we look over the year's work we feel like saying with the Psalmist David; "The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear, the Lord is my strength of life of whom shall I be afraid."

We feel as if we have accomplished much; but we are not satisfied, because a servant of God cannot be satisfied, when he sees so much to do. Today the world is crying for service and we can do so much if we will listen to the cry; that is ringing out." Who will go?"

What have we done this year? Let us pause and see; First: Wa have papered the Old Folk's Home, bringing joy to the Mother and Father, who are in the sunset of life. Second: we have had the pleasure of having the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention to visit us.

Third: we had a part in helping, to, send a nurse to foreign fields. Yet we feel that we have just begun to work.

First we must unite all of our efforts together in order to do more and better service for the Kingdom of the Lord and Saviour Jessue Christ. Because he is telling us to go in his vineyard and work and whatever is right he will pay us. The world is the vineyard of the Master and it is time for us to be up and doing. And we must not let him come and say to us, "Why stand ye there idle?"

Sisters the cry is so great for service that we have no time to stand idle to see what someone else is doing. Did you ever think that by sending a missionary across the sea with a message of the bleused word of life to feed the hungry, thirsty soul with the bread of life and give them the living water is a great work. The work of redeeming the world is in the hands or we, the missionaries, because that is why we were made disciples, so that we could go in all the world and help others.

When the call comes to us for help we should not think how little we can send, but of how much we can send. We have children who need to be educated, hospitals are needed, orphans who need to be taken care of, girls that have made mistakes in life and boys who have gone astray. All of these things are missionary work. There is so much to do that we should ever be alert to answer the call and say, "here am I, send me." You can never tell who the message will come to. For the woman of Samaria was not a great woman, but she carried a great message, for she carried the glad tidings and caused many souls to be saved.

Sisters, as missionaries let us do all that we can in our community. Let us visit Bay View, let us go in the alleys and the lanes and carry sunshine with us. Let us get a larger and greater vision of what the Master requires of us and above all let us have more love for one another. Because if the world is saved, it will be by Love.

I would recommend that we organize our Junior Department at once in the next board meeting, so that they can become acquainted with the work and be ready when the call comes to serve.

Let us go away with new inspiration and new determination to do more and better work for the Master.

President D. G. Mack introduced Mr. Walter Corbin a contractor who spoke about his work and asked cooperation. Also introduced Dr. C. M. Lawrence and Rev. J. W. Warren, who made brief interesting speeches.

Motion by Dr. Winston that we endorse the work of the National Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Congress prevailed. Rev. Junius Gray called attention to the World's Baptist Alliance which meets in Toronto, Canada in June.

Mr. Frances Davis, President, Maryland Union Association, was introduced and made a speech about the work of the Union. Rev. Geo. A. Crawley, presented some special standing resolutions as follows: (a) With reference to trouble in various churches of the convention. (b) That the constitution be amended. (c) Old Folks Home.—(See Resolutions) signed by committee, Revs. W. W. Allen, George A. Crawley and Beal Elliott.

## REPORT OF STATE MISSIONARY, G. B. LOCKHART

Baltimore, Md., May 24. 1928.

Brother President, Officers and Members of the United Missionary Convention of Maryland:

Having been appointed by the Executive Board of this Convention, I immediately entered into the service with a cheerful and willing spirit, feeling that much good would be accomplished in the name of the Master, and the cause of the Baptist Denomination. We have striven as best we could under existing circumstances to carry out the spirit of this convention, if we have not done so, it is not because we have not tried.

Permit me to say that I am very grateful to the Executive Board for their support, therefore I am submitting to this august body the following:

By special invitation to preach at the Mt. Horam Baptist Church, this church is spiritually alive, the members seem to be exerting every effort to liquidate the indebtedness of the church, and have been able to meet their obligations when due. The Sunday School, Baptist Young People's Union and prayer meetings are

spiritually alive. The pastor, Dr. L. L. Price, deserves much credit for the work already accomplished under his administration.

Made a number of visits to Hagerstown for the purpose of organizing a Baptist Church; on my last visit there they decided they were able to support a pastor. Most of them have joined the Free Will Baptist Church. We feel that if some one could live there, a church might be established there.

Visited Edgemont, Emmettsburg, to Thurmont, First Baptist Church, Frederick. This church under the leadership of Dr. J. W. Townes is in an excellent condition, they have remodeled the basement, made a reception room, a kitchen and have put in a new gas range, have a baptismal pool, and the members seem much encouraged; have received two by Baptism, three by Christian expeience; present membership 63. Dr. Townes has wrought well in the face of such, tremendous opposition.

Visited Brunswick where Dr. Townes has another church, the Mt. Olivet. This church is a member of the Ministers' and Deacons' Association, that includes a part of Virginia and West Virginia.

Have visited Eadesville and Chestertown. The Pentecostal Baptist Church in Chestertown has made very rapid progress under the leadership of Rev. C. H. Hamilton, with Sister Hamilton started this work by themselves and to-day they can boast of having the most prosperous church in that section of the country. They are still looking forward to the time when the board can, under a committee, rendered a program in order to give the Baptists more prestige in that section of Maryland.

On July 21st, a committee met at the First Baptist Church. Annapolis and installed Rev. N. H. Morgan as pastor, Dr. W. W. Allen preached the installation sermon, Dr. D. G. Mack was master of ceremonies. The following brethren participated: Revs. J. R. Butler, J. H. Matthews, G. A. Crawley, Deacon C. B. Cook and Rev. Collins.

The fifth Sunday in July the Ministers' and Deacons' Association of Harford County met with the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Havre de Grace. Rev. W. A. Hall, preached in the afternoon and Rev. Wilkerson preached at night. The services were well attended, and the people came from far and near. This association is making quite an impression over the entire country. Shiloh, Sycamore Ave is progressing along all lines, they have purchased a piano, have a cested choir and have added a vestibule to the church. Berlin is doing nicely under the administration of Rev. G. B. Brown. Received by Christian experience 1, by letters 2. Have one for Baptism. Mt. Zion, Snow Hill, under the leadership of Rev. E. J. Henry is doing remarkably well. 1 by Baptism, have raised since last May for church \$500.00, for Sunday School, \$40.00. This speaks well for the pastor and members.

First, Guilford is in a splendid condition. The pastor, Rev. Chas. Jackton and members are very much encouraged as to the future outlook of the church. Have received 2 by letter, 1 by Baptism. Present membership 36. They have installed new electric lights, and put a new fence around the church. Unity Baptist Church is still holding her own. Most of the members around the church own their own homes, have a splendid day school near the church, all due to the influence of the church. Received by Baptism 7, Christian experience 1. Rev. John Richards, their beloved pastor deserves much praise for the work accomplished.

Visited Pocomoke City, Salisbury, Denton, Hurlock, Cambridge, Centerville, First Fairfield is in an excellent condition. The Sunday School, B. Y. P. U. and prayer meetings are spiritually alive and exerting a wonderful influence for good in the community. Rev. John Widgeon, one of the oldest pastors in the state deverves much praise for the very splendid work accomplished by him and his loyal members. The Tabernacle Church is without a pastor. Rev. W. A. Copeland having resigned a few week ago. First Church, Rose ville, of which the late Rev. Henderson was pastor is moving along very well, under the leadership of Rev. Adams, who is a member of the church.

Little Zion under the leadership of Rev. D. W. Dawson, is doing a splendid work. The members are manifesting unusual interest in their church life. They are looking forward to a more suitable building in which to worship. The Sunday School, B. Y. P. U. and prayer meetings are quite alive and seem to be very much encouraged.

Allen's Memorial, Hodges Grove has an excellent building, and doing remarkably well, they have had a number of accessions by Baptism, and Christian experience. This church deserves our consideration, and a visit by the brethren would greatly encourage.

Pleasant Hill, Perryman is in charge of a very progressive young man in the person of Rev. S. D. Washington. The church has been greatly revived, and the people seem to have a mind to work.

Mt. Zion, Havre de Grace has called Rev. J. F. Redd, who is a student of the Northern University, at Rahway, N. J., under the leadership of this young man, the church is destined to accomplish much in the Master's cause.

Fountain Baptist Church entered newly acquired church building on December 4th. The membership has increased and the church is spiritually alive, the pactor, Rev. J. R. L. Coel was successful in securing this property before it got into the hands of speculators at the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars, in fee, including the furniture and parsonage. Green with the officers deserves much commendation for the manner in which the church had been governed. They were successful in securing as their pastor, the Rev. ## PROCEEDINGS

Baltimore, Md. May 18, 1943

THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION MET WITH THE Enon Baptist Church of Baltimore, Md., on the above date.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises conducted by the Rev. I. Gilliam. After indulging in a song and praise service, for a half hour or more, the meeting was turned over to Dr. George A. Crawley, president of the convention, who formally declared the convention open for business. Music for the morning session was furnished by the St. Mark's Baptist Church, which is pastored by the Rev. Gilliam.

Rev. Paul Pollard was programmed to discuss the theme, "Jesus the Panacea for the World's Ills in the Home." Rev. Paul Pollard had informed the president of the convention of his inability to be present on time and asked that someone be substituted for him on the program. Rev. Dr. Williamson, pastor of the Faith Baptist Church, was called upon to lead the discussion. Even though he had no previous knowledge that he was to appear on the program to lead the discussion of the topic, Dr. Williamson's brief but eloquent handling of the subject was all that could have been expected, had he been given time to make preparation.

The welcome address on the part of the Enon Baptist Church was made by Rev. Grafton Grandison, who acted in the stead of the pastor who had to be absent at the time. Response was made by the Rev. S. A. Harrington, pastor of the New Union Baptist Church.

President Crawley appointed the following committees: Enrollment,

Finance and New Bodies.

Motion was made to adopt the program of the convention. The same

was duly seconded and passed.

The president stated that the Rev. Dr. Mack was scheduled to preach the introductory sermon to the convention. He had, however, received a message from Mrs. Mack, stating that he had met with an accident, and for that reason had gotten in touch with Rev. R. T. Reed, alternate, so that he might deliver the sermon. Unfortunately, the president stated, Rev. Reed informed him that he had not preached for some time and that he was unable to carry out the assignment.

In the light of the aforementioned circumstances, Rev. Wilkerson made motion that Rev. J. H. Matthews preach the sermon. Without a dissenting

vote the motion was passed.

Following selections by the choir and congregation, prayer was offered by Rev. S. J. Greene. President Crawley presented Rev. J. H. Matthews, paster of Mt. Hebron Baptist Church, to preach the introductory sermon.

Following a short prayer, Rev. Matthews announced his text as follows: 11 ch. of St. Matthew, 29th vs.; "Take my yoke upon you and learn of me for I am meek and lowly in heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls." Subject, "Yoke Up." Rev. Matthews, like Rev. Williamson, had no previous knowledge of having to preach the sermon scheduled for the opening session, found himself ready and willing to serve because he believes in preparedness for any eventuality. #### PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

### to the UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND May 18, 1943

We come to render an account for the conduct of the past twelve months. God is to be thanked, honored and praised for His indescribable blessings this past year. He is to be thanked for you, who have joined hands and many of your hearts, in the effort to carry forward the work of Kingdom building.

He is to be thanked for the many, many accomplishments. Not at any time in the history of the Colored Baptists in Maryland has so much been accomplished, and more harmony existed than this year. The work tells

for itself.

Every department of the convention has excelled itself this year. This is the greatest proof of the genuine Church of Christ. In the midst of the greatest rage of sin, we march to unknown heights and success. Paul said, "where sin abounds, grace much more abounds."

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BAPTIST TRAINING CONVENTION has done its best work this year under the leadership of one of the finest, one of the most consecrated, energetic and qualified co-operative christian men of the people of God. He is the Associate Dean of the National Sunday School and Baptist Training Congress—Dr. Miles W. Connor. This work is realized in the local churches. Better Church Schools and B.T.U.'s are being developed through the work of this body. Talent is being discovered and denominational pride is being aroused.

THE WOMEN'S CONVENTION, under the presidency of Mrs. Ellen G. Wilkerson and her staff, has outdone itself this year. These women have projected an excellent program this year—program of training—of consistent activity in missionary work. They have established a worthwhile financial system, which has resulted into tangible results. The unselfish support is requested and earnestly sought for our president and her workers. With this needed support given she is destined to make a great leader and do an unparalleled work. Too much cannot be said about our Junior

Missionaries. Mrs. Bertha C. Winston, the director, is responsible for the conduct of this group. To say she has done her work well is putting it mildly. Some of our brightest stars will some day come forth shinging from our Junior department of the convention.

THE CHURCH-WIDE INSTITUTE: The results are telling and the benefits lasting. The Institute is a definite permanent fixity in the denominational life of our state work. Many churches are being helped by the training offered in this movement.

THE HOME MISSIONS: This is one of the most important departments in our State work. This has been a banner year in that work. Another real accomplishment has been realized in this field. The Eastern Shore has been reached and is now in active contact and relation as never before to the convention. Rev. J. W. Luck was called to the Union Baptist Church, Easton, Maryland, through the efforts of the President of the Convention and upon the recommendation of the same, thirty dollars per month have been paid on Rev. Luck's salary for six months. He is paid up to date. This money was paid through the convention by the following churches who subscribed five dollars per month to the convention for this purpose: Perkins Square, Zion, Faith, St. Paul, Second Baptist of Annapolis, one dollar per month, The Relief Association of Baptist Church, New York City; Morning Star has contributed to this fund and the Women's department of our convention, Mt. Lebanon has promised five dollars per month. A group of five, Drs. Winston, Yerby, Matthews, Clark and Crawley visited the church on May 5, 1943 and presented the last check. They were filled with enthusiasm and thanks. This work under Rev. Luck has really progressed. On this trip to the shore we discovered a new church at Cambridge, Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, Rev. John Clash, Pastor. We expect them at this session.

Other places need our help—Westminster, Laurel, Crisfield, Berlin and

many other churches in the outside districts throughout the state. Strong churches could be developed in these places, but the pastors who serve these churches can only develop them by living on the field. We must help them to stay by helping the churches to pay them a living salary until the work can fully take care of them, as we did in the case of Rev. Luck.

I am asking twenty-five churches and pastors to give five dollars or more monthly for this work and all churches to give some amount monthly. The Chairman, Rev. Edward T. Jordan, has made a number of visits to some of these churches and at the proper time will have something to say about the work.

EDUCATIONAL WORK: In this, our dream of seventeen years, has become a realization. Our convention purchased a building, June, 1942, at the corner of McCulloh and Mosher Streets, with twenty-three rooms and for the price of thirty-four hundred and seventy-five dollars. To date more than twenty-six hundred dollars have been paid; and the balance of less than one thousand, including interest will be paid by July first coming. THE BAPTIST INFORMER: Credit to the Sunday School and Training Union Convention. It is the earnest devotion and endeavor of Mr. A. B. Koger. This fills a long need of a very important nature in Baptist life of this state. Every Baptist Church and member of this convention is called upon for the support in every way possible of this project.

FOREIGN MISSIONS: This is our ever remaining outstanding duty and unfinished task. It is with thanks, we can say, that all of us are becoming more foreign missionary minded. Rev. George J. Garrett is chairman of this Board. He has done fine work in the Christmas contribution this year. More must be done for foreign missions as the Lord blesses us.

THE HOME FOR AGED: This is the most important year in the life of the home. It is the mortgage burning year. Every church has been asked to share in this history making epoch by bringing up to this session a large substantial amount for the purpose of liquidating this mortgage. The home is a credit to the denomination. Under the leadership of Rev. Ward D. Yerby and his staff, most excellent work has been done. The home

is one of the best of all homes of its kind in the state

THE CONDITIONS OF THE CHURCHES IN THE STATE: I am interested in all the Baptist Churches in the State, naturally I may mention those who are not members of this body directly. The spiritual condition of the churches is fine. Harmony abounds within the membership of each church, and they are at peace. I have visited may of them since our last annual session. Financially, they are in a healthy condition; meeting their demands and burning their mortgages. Many of them are raising more money than they know with what to do. Rev. McDaniels resigned from Laurel and was replaced by Rev. Adams. Rev. Robinson resigned from Annapolis. Some attempts have been made at his replacement by a Washington with a strength of the attempt is not definite. I understand ington minister. However, the attempt is not definite, I understand.

VISITS AND TRAVELS: I have visited many of the churches this year, and have done much traveling in and out of the State. I have gone over the state, repeating my visits in some parts of it. Many churches in the

city have been visited.

I have gone to the Board meeting of the National Baptist Convention at Atlanta, the New England Convention in Brooklyn, N. Y., the National Baptist Convention, Memphis, Tenn., and may other places where the denominational interest was at stake. The session Brooklyn was good—nothing new. It seems that some of the objects of inspiration are waning. They are having a one day session in New York this year. In the meeting at Atlanta was set the great machine in every for the Memphis meeting at Atlanta, we set the great machine in order for the Memphis meeting. At Memphis, we had the greatest meeting in the history of the Baptists.

We burned the mortgage on the publishing house this year. This is the biggest accomplishment in the life of our group. We can say today, there

is not a penny against the publishing house.

CALL TO BAPTIST IN THE STATE FOR COMPLETE UNITY:

Seventeen years ago, men who believed the gospel they preached and who recognized that when Jesus prayed that his followers be one he meant them, got together. Every organization of any kind which had a head and represented any group of regular Baptist Churches, was abolished by its own vote, for the purpose of erecting one united body of Baptists in the state with definite aims set forth in their declarations of intentions. I quote, "The first aim was, 'that there be, now and always, one state convention in Maryland. Second, that we devote ourselves to the task of supporting home and foreign missions. That we own and operate an institution of learning in the State of Maryland. That we cooperate, associate and affiliate with similar Baptist bodies and especially the National Baptist Convention, Inc., and the Maryland Baptist Union Association.'"

This convention was organized in the Macedonia Baptist Church, December 16, 1926, upon the above principles and agreements. Members of every factional group which had existed before this time made up this body. It was a grand meeting and everybody was happy. God was pleased and the members of all the churches were glad, and praised the pastors for having christian religion and good sense. Every church, but one, which was in existence in and about Baltimore has been a member of this convention and almost every church in the State has been a member since that time. There has not been a split, not a division of any kind since that day. Whatever has been the differences, we have remained together as a united body. Some one church has gone out without any trouble or misunderstanding, just went out by choice. Others have dropped out by not representing the next year. Ninety-five per cent of all the churches who ever joined this convention are still members. We represent the labors, struggles and prayers of all the Baptists. Our aim is extended to all—"Every Baptist Church and Member Up" is our motto.

THE CONDITION OF THE WORLD AND THE CRISIS OF OUR CIVILIZATION: No period in the history of the world has man lived in so much sufferings and troubles. This present civilization has failed. The price paid was not sufficient to make it lasting and durable. Our present civilization was founded upon false promises, upon hatred, prejudice, race superiority, class distinction, discrimination, false religions, white Christianity and a God of the privleged classes. The Church has been established within the same civilization with the same view with regards to the rights and privileges of those who make up the nation. This civilization has changed the church and fashioned it after a wicked order, instead of the church changing civilization and shaping her after the order of God. In this, the church has not served civilization, which she was designed to do, but has failed in the lap of the church. "O Zion come forth and put on thy strength."

The Church and Christianity need to assert themselves in this old wicked world which is struggling under a confused condition and a false pre-

tense. "A Christian Nation."

SOME OF OUR NEEDS FOR THE COMING YEAR AND WHICH REQUEST IS MADE: We need six thousand dollars for our Baptist Educational Center; eighteen hundred dollars for Home Mission Field; three thousand dollars for our Baptist Home for Aged Colored People; eight hundred dollars for Foreign Missions; seven hundred dollars for Conventional expenses, four hundred dollars for miscellaneous. These churches who are out of debt should devote themselves to this task. Any church with three hundred members on financial roll should give not less than three hundred yearly to the work. We are not doing anything with God's bounty, brethren. A Church with five hundred members to a thousand bringing fifty dollars to the convention and giving little money or none during the year, this is

a shame and God is not pleased. Three Methodist Churches bring more money to the conference than all of us put together will raise at this convention. More money is paid for conference running expenses one year, than we pay for twelve years. With all other interests supported. The Churches send the money up and the pastors bring it. What are you going to do about it, brethren? I have resolved for God, brethren. Watch me.

"And Now, Brethren, we commend you to God and to the word of His grace, who is able to build you up, and reserve you and make you to do his

will and good pleasure.'

## THE MARYLAND BAPTIST HOME FOR AGED COLORED PEOPLE, INC.

Having returned to Baltimore after an absence of five months, during which time I was in the U. S. Army, I note many changes. Colored people being employed in defense industries, and other businesses which did not formerly hire colored. Our churches are prospering. Many have been redecorated. Enon Baptist has moved; but most remarkable of all, they have paid for their new church. Some churches have paid off their mortgages, while others have reduced them considerably.

While this progress has been made, many move along in the same old way as is evidenced by the talk I heard my third day home. We use to have Clayton Williams University, a Day Nursery, and a further enumeration of institutions that use to exist. I asked myself, while listening to him, "What did he do to save these institutions, to keep them going." This is the ques-

tion each one of us should ask ourselves. After asking myself this question,

I decided to resume my work at the Home.

Let us do all we can to keep our institutions going. Contribute to them regularly; and thereby make our Church Covenant—"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to aid each other in sickness and distress"—a living reality, not just something we mumble over once a month. Contribute now! Then make provision for our institutions after you have gone. Months ago I took out two small policies of life insurance; my Church is the beneficiary under one, the Home is the beneficiary under the other. This costs me but fifty cents a week. Thus these institutions shall have my support while I live and when I die they will get something.

Other people have done this. A number of people have included the Home in their Wills. Perhaps you can persuade some one to include the Home in their Will. Don't forget the name: THE MARYLAND BAPTIST

HOME FOR AGED COLORED PEOPLE, INC., 1618-20-22 W. Lexington

This Home was established in 1920 under the leadership of Rev. D. G. Mack, Macedonia Baptist Church; Rev. Beal Elliott, Sharon Baptist Church; the late Revs. P. C. Neal, of First Baptist; and R. W. Jefferson, of Leadenhall Baptist Churches. Each one of these churches and \$1,000. The present site was purchased with this money at a cost of \$16,500. \$2,000 is the amount now due on the mortgage.

Twelve trustees are appointed by the Convention, the other twelve by the churches who established the Home. The Constitution further provides for an Advisory Board, thus churches and organizations not members of the Convention may have a voice in the management of the Home by being

represented on the Advisory Board.

The Trustees wish to thank each one who made a contribution, whether it be of money, food or entertainment, and ask your support during the coming year.

Mr. President, Delegates and Friends assembled:

As Secretary of the Board of Trustees of our Old Folks' Home, I have tried each year to bring to you a statement that should give you some facts pertaining to the Home and its operation during the past year. I have always felt that you had a right to expect such a statement or report of those to whom you have entrusted this partricular responsibility.

those to whom you have entrusted this partricular responsibility.

The oversight of an institution of the size of our Old Folks' Home is no small responsibility. I have said before, it does seem to me that this Denominational enterprise should challenge our best thought and action to prove just how well we can operate an institution. A big success in this field should inspire confidence that we can support and manage other.

Denominational institutions. In fact, I think it much easier to run a Home for the aged than a school, a Center or other enterprises, however important they may be. People are always sympathetic and willing to give to old people. As a demonstration of this fact, I have never seen money raised so fast as was done in my own church recently when an appeal was made for the Home. In a very few minutes, more than \$100.00 was raised. I doubt very much if this could have been done for any other cause. We might have long ago capitalized on this strong appeal and made the Home an ideal

pattern of institutional support for our Denomination.

At the last sitting of the Convention, after discussing in our report the breakdown in Christianity, which has led to the bloodiest and most ruthless war in all the history of man-while we were conscious of the fact that day by day the monster was slowly but surely creeping upon us, and would eventually greatly affect our liberties and way of life—we concluded, at that time, that in so far as the Home was concerned there had been no change in our procedure, we were moving along about as usually. However, I prophesied, I felt sure, we would not be able to make such a report a year hence. A year has passed, and we who are closely identified with the Home know that this prophesy is true. The war has affected the Old Folks' Home as it has affected every home represented here, in fact every home in America. We have been forced to change in many ways our usual procedure and way of life. We have come to a day when we have money in our pockets and cannot spend it for the things we want.

Treasurer's Report

Contrary to our expectation, our Treasurer, Brother Gregory Hawkins, is with us during this Convention. We expected to report that Mr. Hawkins was in some distant army camp, or probably in Australia or Africa or elsewhere; but, fortunately, he was released after serving about five months. We welcome Brother Hawkins back and are glad that he was willing to take up his old duties. Mr. Hawkins has developed certain techniques in the handling of our finances which have proven valuable in running the Home. During this war period, we shall need all the skill of Mr. Hawkins and more,

we think, to make ends meet.

#### Brother David Norrell

When Brother Hawkins was called to the army in October, 1942, our Assistant Treasurer, Brother David Norrell, took over the "bag", and the other duties our Treasurer is called upon to perform. Our Treasurer not only carries the "bag", but also does most of the buying for the Home and exercises the necessary strategy and diplomacy that goes with meeting obligations from an inadequate source. We are greatly indebted to Brother Norrell for the way he handled everything. Brother Norrell through his Norell for the way he handled everything. Brother Norrell, through his long years of service to his church and denomination, has acquired a reputation of sincerity, ability and honesty, and we were very fortunate to have him available for service to our Home. He will continue to be active, especially in soliciting for the Home and reaching those churches that have not become regular supporters of our institution. Matron

One of the most important persons in our set-up operating the Home is the Matron. The smooth and successful running of the institution depends upon her more than any one else. Trustees come and go occasionally and perform certain necessary duties, but the Matron lives in the Home and must daily face its many problems and endeavor to solve them. In October,

Irs. Mary Barrett, who had served as matron several months, re-School, B. Y. P. U. and B. T. U. field. We are indeed fortunate in vas not until the later part of December that we were able to secure ices of our present Matron, Mrs. Anna Mitchell Tynes. Mrs. Tynes needs no introduction to this convention, for she is well known here. She has long been active in church and denominational work, especially in the Sunday School, B. Y. P. U. and B. T. U. field. We are indee dfortunate in having Mrs. Tynes to serve us. She has, because of her training and ability, brought to the Home a superior type of service that is reflected in the general improvement of the Home. We hope it will be possible for us to keep Mrs. Tynes a long while.

Food

We have the responsibility of feeding 18 people 3 meals a day. That means 18,710 meals in a year. Under present conditions this is a real problem of major importance. How are we to get enough food to satisfy these people?

If we have or can get enough points under the point rationing system set up by the Government, how can we buy the necessary food products with

our present resources?

#### **Donations**

This leads me to consider what has been one of the main arms of support of the Home during the years of its existence—namely: donations of food. People have marveled at the low cost of operating our Home. The reason, in a large measure, has been the numerous donations of sugar, canned goods and other food products that were brought to the Home all through the year. If our pantry was running low we could put on a food shower and stock up to capacity.

It should not be difficult to understand that this important arm of support would disappear under the point-rationing-system. The number of points allowed each person is hardly enough for that person, so there is none

to spare for donations.

However, despite the conditions above mentioned, we have received quite a numbr of donations during the year, before the point-system went into effect and since, and we want to thank those who gave publicly, as we have already done privately, for their gifts to the Home. These must of necessity fall off. Our cupboard at present is indeed bare. What shall we do? There seems but one way open to feed the inmates and that is to buy food for them with the points allowed them just as we do for ourselves. To buy what we used to have given to us will take more money. Our food bill has already increased by leaps and bounds because of the high cost of everything, and the fact that we have to buy many things that used to be given us. In some way we will have to get over to the supporting churches, clubs and individuals that to help now—we need more money. With cash we can use our own points and buy the things we need.

Programs, Dinners, Etc.

We have been able to report each year a type of donation that is especially appreciated. We refer to programs, religious services, dinners, outings, etc. These old people need diversion as well as younger people, and these donations fill that need. No doubt there will be a falling off in dinners, but we do hope the clubs will continue their programs and other diversions. We thank all who have served the Home in this fine way.

#### Ways and Means Committee

The feminine touch given the Board of Trustees a few years back has been a blessing to the Home. These ladies form the Ways and Means Committee, and they are active throughout the year raising funds to supplement our income, and performing other services that only a woman can do. Mrs. Dilettia Pinn, Mrs. Bessie Clark and Mrs. Ossie Keck need no introduction to any Baptist gathering in Baltimore.

#### New Inmates and Deaths

We are happy to report that there were no deaths among the inmates during the past year. We added four new inmates to our family: Mrs. Annie Thompson, Mr. John W. Berry, Mrs. Laura V. Ware, and Miss Elizabeth E.

Woolridge. We now have 17 inmates. Three men and fourteen women.

#### Our President

Rev. Ward D. Yerby has served as President of the Board of Trustees for 6 years. During that time much improvement has been made at the Home. The business-like way he has guided the meetings of the Board has had much to do with the measure of success attained. May I ask for him your sympathetic and whole-hearted support, so that his burden, and that of the other Trustees may be lightened.

Our final word is to lay additional emphasis on the fact that the Home will need increased financial support from the interested churches during the new Conventional year. The purchasing value of the dollar for the Aged Home will buy no more than the dollar for our homes. Since we need more dollars to run our homes, we we will also need a great many more dollars to run the Aged Home.

The task will be easy if all pull together and share the load.

### THE BAPTIST CENTER

To the President, Officers, Fellow-Laborers and

Friends of Education:

We, who are about to engage in the plan of organizing a Religious Centre and to do definite educational work; and we, who serve as leaders and guides, and the assurance, that when this plan shall have been effected, and that the power that has been delegated us in the perfecting of this arrangement has been so gladly carried out and the property has been deeded to the convention and its constituencies, with the idea, that a great Center is to be projected and a great educational institution is to be developed; we, who are leading, must be scrutinizing and alert in safe-guarding the property. We, who may constitute the Trustee Board, must be strong in intellect, clear in vision, broad in our perviews, unselfish in spirit, pure in heart and fair in our thinking; if that which we have in mind is to come to pass. We must be vigilant, alert, wise, and broad-guage, but more than that, we must also be responsible and honest.

All educational institutions that expect to survive and do creditable work must rest upon four separate columns: To wit: 1. Self-help. 2. Race and denominational independence and integrity. 3. Freedom to make innovations without regard to traditions. 4. God-fearing leaders, big-hearted, and the power of public opinion. And if at this time a strong, positive and unanimous public opinion was manifested, at once positive in its faith and

firm in its conviction and its support, and if a full realization of the spirit of the occasion were awaken and openly proclaimed, disciples would readily fall in line. If we can get the truth of this Christian Center, and educational institution embodied in our mind, enshrined in our hearts, and enthroned in our conscience, then we are ready for business. We are saying all this, because you know as well as we do, that there is a fixed and deliberate antagonism to the operation of a school, owned and controlled by "The United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland," but with a retrospect, and introspect and a prospect we start, go on and succeed.

Let us look at this proposed Christian Center and Educational work through eyes of honesty and fair exchange. The honest man is the only way any man can respect himself. Everything about him is sound, and every act will bear inspection and examination. This sense of one's own genuineness and worth is honesty's chief reward.

- 1. Information of our character and integrity for A Christian Center and an educational institution: We must see to it that the Trustee Board will be self perpetuation, but subject to confirmation of the United Baptist Missionary Convention. That is to say, that the Trustee Board will nominate its own members, and be confirmed by the convention. That the trustee board shall be divided into three classes: Classes A, B, and C, so that one class can be elected each year, so that you will always have two-third experienced members on the Board. That is shall be the duty of the Board to make their own nomination, and the convention does the confirming; that in event that the convention rejects any of the nominee or nominees presented by the Board, that it shall be the duty of the Board to offer other name or names until a confirmation is made, since the Trustee Board is a better judge of who shall be a member of its Board than the convention.
- 2. That the handling of the property be not a one-sided transaction: Since an educational institution may live longer than a convention, and since the development of a school requires more time than the development of a convention, and since disagreements and misunderstandings are more prevalent in conventions than in school boards, and since disputes at times break up conventions and cause much unpleasantness and long litigation, it should be the consensus of the promoters, that the title of the property should be held by the Trustee Board, with an enabling clause or provision, that the Trustee Board cannot mortgage or sell the property without the consent of the convention, and that any Baptist Preacher or layman is eligible for election as a member of the Trustee Board of the Institution.
- 3. That since the promoters of "The Christian Center and the Educational Institution" have in mind the development of an institution for the training and education of our people; and that if at any time, for any just cause, and for any reason, that the Trustee Board, with the consent of The United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland, ever decides to discontinue the operation of The Christian Center and the education institution, and decides to sell the property, that money accrued from such sale shall be used exclusively for educational purposes, so that the spirit of the originators and promoters be carried out.

This we would consider to be a fair and honest transaction and distribution of the funds. In fair exchange both parties are benefitted. In unfair exchange one party profits by the others loss. Any transaction in which either party fails to receive an equivalent for what he gives is a fraud; and the man, who knowingly and willfully makes such a trade, is a thief in disguise. For taking something which belongs to another, without giving him a return, and without his full, free, and intelligent consent is stealing and this accounts for this convention and Board in securing a

piece of property of their own instead of linking up with some one else, and

this also accounts for the enabling clause in this memorial.

Since we must transmit to the present and coming generations material worth, as well as spiritual and moral values, all must be safe-guarded. Life as you know, consists in the maintenance of relations; it requires continual adjustments; it implies external objects as well as internal forces. Conduct must have materials to work with; stuff to build character out of; resistence to overcome; objects to confront; and a well regulated Christian Center and a well governed educational institution will help us to accomplish these objects.

So, we come together to worship, to inspire, to be inspired, to pool our

interest, to make reports, and to fellowship.

We are indeed happy to meet here with you in your spacious building with this fine pastor and people. We trust that our stay here will mean inspiration for you, and we are happy with you over your fine accomplishments.

#### Visits

Since the last Convention, I attended the Fiftieth Annual Session of the Woman's Auxiliary of the New England Baptist Missionary Convention and the Thirty-Second Anniversary of the President, Mrs. E. ### RECOMMENDATIONS

From annual address of President Miles W. Connon, made at Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Convention, July 8-9, 1943, Baltimore, Md.

- 1. In view of the great service which the National Baptist Sunday School Congress is capable of performing in stimulating trained leadership in our Sunday Schools and Baptist Training Unions, and in view of the contact with great personalities which it affords our young people who attend, I recommend that we go on recorl as unqualifiedly approving this work and that we herewith begin a campaign to send a larger number of representatives from our churches to the Congress next year and in subsequent yars.
- 2. The International Council of Religious Education senses the need for a nation-wide movement to emphasize the necessity for more effective religious education. It is therefore setting aside the week of September 26 to be known as Religious Education Week. I recommnd that this Convention concur with the general plan of the Council and foster a Religious Education Week at a time in the Fall which may best suit the Convention and that a program be worked out which will be designed to meet the specific needs of the constituents of the Convention.
- 3. The five-year plan adopted in 1940 callel for a full or part-time worker who could visit the various units of the Convention and thus coordinate and stimulate the entire work. The Convention has not yet reached the point where it could employ such a person. I am recommending, therefore, that the territory which the Convention covers be divided into three sections and that each of the three vice presidents be given the responsibility for the work of a section. They shall make a report periodically and will be free to call to their aid such persons as they may need to successfully perform the duties of the office.
- 4. For several years we have claimed that the issuing of a publication as an official organ of the Convention would popularize our work by keeping the various units in contact throughout the year and by keeping the public informed concerning our aims and accomplishments. The Informer, under the able editorship of Mr. A. B. Koger and his staff has clearly demonstrated the wisdom of the claim and the possibilities which lie ahead in this activity.
- I recommend that we continue this publication and that we seek to extend its influence by integrating it with the parent body and the other auxiliaries thus making it not only the organ of this Convention but of the combined Baptist family of Maryland.
- 5. It is evident to all that the dearth of trained Christian ministers and religious workers is threatening the progress of our churches and the spiritual life of our people. We, who are engaged in fostering spiritual ideals must give our moral and financial support to the institutions of our group preparing ministers and Christian leaders.

In the light of this observation, I recommend that we continue to contribute to these schools and that we make an effort to increase our contributions.

6. We note with great pride the achievement of the parent body in carrying to a successful conclusion the campaign to clear the mortgages on the Old Folks Home and the Baptist Center. We are proud of the small part which the Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Convention played in that achievement and I recommend that in the present compaign for renovation of the Center, this Convention will pledge a substantial sum (to be named by the Board) to be paid within the next Convention year.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND

ARTICLE I-Name

This organization shall be known as the UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION of the STATE OF MARYLAND.

ARTICLE II-Objects

The ebjects of the Convention shall be to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ; the promotion of His Kingdom by united efforts on the part of the churches composing it; to unify the church's doctrine and Christian polity; to promote home and foreign missions by establishing and supporting religious work in communities where needed, anl giving unstinted support toward education in Maryland, as well as supporting it elsewhere; to collect, classify and publish statistics of the churches; to promote prosperity among the churches; to encourage brotherly love anl cooperate heartily with other regular bodies doing similar work in our state, our country and the world.

ARTICLE III .- Membership

The membership shall be composed of regular Baptist Churches and life members and associations within the bounds of the State of Maryland. Any regular organized Baptist Church may be come a member upon the payment of five (\$5.00) and shall be entitled to the pastor and two (2) messengers, and one additional messenger for each five dollars (\$5.00; provided that a church shall shall be allowed more than fifteen (15) messengers—any such membership shall continue upon the payment of five (\$5.00) dollars annually. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in Maryland may become a life member upon the payment of Fifteen dollars (\$15.00).

All applications must be elected by a majority vote of the Convention. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in the state may become an associate member upon the payment of one dollar (\$1.00) and shall he entitled to the discussion, but not to vote—an associate member may become an annual member and enjoy all the privileges of the convention by the payment of five dollars (\$5.00) annually; any association in good and regular standing may become a member upon the payment of ten dollars (\$10.00) and continue upon payment of ten dollars (\$10.00) annually.

SECTION 2.—Discipline of Membership

Any church or member belonging to this convention may be dropped from membership of the Convention, who may hold to and practice doctrines which are contrary, unbaptistic, and departing from the tenents, rules and laws governing the body or by the non-payment of the membership fees herein described, but in all cases, the church or the life member shall be given a fair and impartial trial; and if found guilty shall be suspended or expelled, thereby forfeiting all rights and privileges of the Convention.

ARTICLE IV .- Officers

The officers of this Convention shall be a president, three vice-presidents, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, statistician and auditor, and Executive Board, who shall be elected annually and shall continue in office until their successors have been duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE V .- Duties of Officers

The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of this body, maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the Constitution. preserve order, sign orders on the Treasurer and to have general oversight 

of the work of the Convention.

The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in nis absence, resignation, illness or death.

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair, impartial and correct record of the transactions of the Convention in a book provided for that purpose and the entire enrollment of the membership; superintent the printing and distribution of the minutes, for which he shall receive such salary as shall be designated by the Convention or Executive Board. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary and in his absence perform all duties of the Recording Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed as an assistant.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with this body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the S tate; collect fuds from the churches for the Convention; receive reports from the missionary and missionaries, as well as moneys collected or raised by them; paying the same over to the Treasurer asd taking receipt for same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the Convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the Executive Board. All letters, packages, etc., received by him officially shall be the property of the Convention. He shall be the Secretary of the Executive Board and shall draw drafts on the Treasurer and shall present a written report to the Board at each of its quarterly meetings. He shall report the doings of the Executive Board in writing at each annual session of the Convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all the funds of the Convention and provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution selected by the Convention or Executive Board and pay all orders of the Convention properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Boord. He shall render a quarterly statement of the Board and an annual report to the Convention. His books shall be kept for inspection by any of the proper officers of the Convention. The Treasurer shall give such security or bond for his proper conduct in office and the safeguarding of the funds of the Convention as the body or Executive Board may require.

The statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history and the condition of the Baptists in this State, as to their domestic. economic, prosperity and resources, numerical, spiritual and financial strength, and present the same at each annual meeting.

### ARTICLE VI.—Convention in Session

The work of the Convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by the messengers and pastors, said messengers holding membership in the churches in this State which are connected with the Convention shall be members of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the churches composing the Convention.

# ARTICLE VII.-How Churches can Become Members

Churches design to become members of this Convention shall make application by letters bearing the name of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenents, and sentiments of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of this Convention this duty shall be performed by the Chairman of the Executive Board, to such as were not fellowshipped during the sessions of the Convention.

# ARTICLE VIII.—The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of the pastor and one messenger from each church which has paid its annual representation fees in the Convention

last assembled. Provided that the officers of this Convention shall be recognized in law or jurisprudence as the Board. The Board shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and interest of this Convention. Seven shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the Convention shall be members of the Board by virture of their offices. The officers may act as executors for the Board and Convention in case of emergency. The Board shall hold quarterly meetings and call meetings when necessary.

### ARTICLE IX.-Work of the Board

The Executive Board shall be the legal representative of the Convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend mission fields, appoint missionaries for the Convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, tix their salaries and make provision for the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the Convention, It shall issue orders on the Treasurer of the Convention, made out by the Corresponding Secretary and duly signed by the President. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the Convention.

### ARTICLE X-Time of Convention

The Convention shall meet Monday after the third Lord's Day in May and adjourn on Friday evening at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition, financial standing and work, the names of the messengers and the contingent fund shall be read.

### ARTICLE XI.—The Convention in Session

The President . on written request of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board, may call the Convention in extra session whenever emergency arises and the work of the extra session shall have the same legal force as the work of the Convention is annual session the business to be transacted in the extra session shall be designated in the call by the President .

### ARTICLE XII,-Non-Interference

This Convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the Churches within bounds, regularly organized and recognized by this body, and in no case nor under any circumstances will this Convention attempt to intefere with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserves the right to deal with the church in so far as its membership affects this body.

## ARTICLE XIII.—Co-operation With Other Bodies

This Convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance and extension of the Kingdom of Christ and in education; Home and Foreign Missions outside of the State f Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which holds the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE XIV.—Auxiliaries

The auxiliaries to this Convention shall be subject to this Convention and shall always remain subservient and loyal to the same and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principles of the General Convention, he or she will forfeit his or her office, and the Executive Board will appoint his or her successor and that no resolution nor document passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the Cosvention or Executive Board. The Recording Secretary of all auxiliaries shall turn

over the minutes, records and all letters and other material received at the meeting of the auxiliary of which he or she is Recording Secretary to the Parent Body in 15 days after the close of the auxiliary meeting.

#### ARTICLE XV.—Amendments

- 1. This Convention shall plan its program for Kingdom Extension work as follows: Sunday School, B. T. U. Missionary Conventions and Associations, throughout the State of Maryland. These shall be composed of local organizations and societies in each church. All of these organizations and their constituents shall operate under the direction and supervision of this, the Parent Body.
- 2. An effort shall be made to, as far as possible, help weak churches, organize new missions and Sunday schools in communities and places throughout the support and co-operation oof the churches, missions and new Sunday schools organized and through the support of the larger churches of the Maryland where needed, and render whatever assistance may be possible through State of Maryland shall be one big family in the work of Kingdom Extension.
- 3. The Associations, weak churches, and the places where missions and Sunday schools are to be organized and located shall be left to the discretion of the Board of the Convention.
- 4. In order that these objects may be reached among Baptists in the State of Maryland, a special fund of not less than ten per cent of all money raised by the Convention and its auxiliaries shall be set aside to foster this program.

#### ARTICLE XVI.—Amendments and Revisions

All amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing at an annual meeting, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting, being subject to modification in form, but not in character, and shall be adopted only by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting. Amendments to this constitution may be submitted in writing at any monthly or quarterly meeting of the Board, and shall lie over for consideration for three months, being subject to modification in form but not in character, and shall be adopted only by the two-thirds vote of the members present and voting.

The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the Convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the same preceeding the election of officers.

The officers of this Convention shall be elected annually by ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the President and the report of the Executive Board, through the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor.


- 1. Every meeting of the Convention or Board shall be opened with prayer and other devotionals.



#### **EVENING SESSION**

May 23, 1944

The evening session of the first day was opened with devotionals conducted by the Rev. Swinton and Deacon Payne of Perkins Square Church.

(President Crawley presiding)

At the conclusion of the devotionals the president called for the reading of the minutes of proceedings for the morning and afternoon sessions. The minutes were read by the secretary and motion was passed adopting the same.

Rev. Reynolds led in the singing of "Jesus I Love You."
President Crawley presented Rev. Paul Pollard, who preached the scheduled doctrinal sermon. Rev. Pollard used as a subject. "Going on Among other interesting observations, Rev. Pollard Unto Perfection." stated that we should strive to reach the state of holiness and perfection while here on earth; but that condition reached we are carried on to our heavenly home. The doctrines of the denomination were sat forth throughout the discourse.

Attorney A. B. Koger made a report of the activities of those responsible for the issuance of the "INFORMER," urging that the members of the convention and the churches give it a most hearty support.

A committee was appointed on the recommendations in the President's address. Those appointed were Revs. W. J. Winston, J. T. Bodie, A. J. Payne, H. E. Smith and L. G. Reynolds.

The committee on New Bodies reported. Motion prevailed adopting the same. (SEE REPORT). Rev. G. J. Garnett fellowshipped the churches represented in the report.

#### PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

#### UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND Eighteenth Annual Session May 23, 1944

Another year and we are here again in another Annual Session of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland. Since we met last, many have answered the roll call. Some from among us, who were very near and dear to us, are in that number. Some of our leading pastors and earnest workers for the Master are gone. They are attending the Celestial Convention in Mt. Zion today. God bless their memory. We pauze here—to thank God for bringing us safely thus far. It is an untellable joy today to meet you here and greet you in the name of the Cross Head of the Church and the Captain of our calvation. Great Head of the Church and the Captain of our salvation.

Nine years ago, it was, upon this spot we met in our Annual Session of this Convention. It was upon this spot, this your humble servant was chosen to lead this host. It is befitting that we meet here at this time to celebrate our victories, and report for our stewardship.

Many have been our victories since we departed nine years ago. Victory over contentions, disagreements, the lost confidence, ill feeling, dissatisfaction, non-cooperation by a large majority, debts and past due mortgages, poorly supported and disgraceful institutions, an effort to establish a Baptist Center and School of Religion, wasted and unreached, unknown fields in and outside of Baltimore City, and many other Victories, we celebrate here today on our return to this grand old spot. We thank God for what He has done for us as we journeyed, to return to the New Metropolitan Baptist Church, Pastored by the Dr. Willis J. Winston, the most able scholar and man of the munites, a great lover of the Cause, a real friend and much beloved by all. Everything has been done by

him and the church to make our stay pleasant and comfortable.

This has been the best year in the history of our existence, in all departments of the convention. The work is now taking a very definite shape. Our objects are missions, education—home and foreign. Education in general and especially in Maryland. We have five channels through

and by which these objects are fostered.

1. The Sunday School and Training Union Convention

2. The Women's Missionary Convention

The Junior Missionary Department of the Women's Auxiliary to the Convention

4. The Baptist Center and School of Religion

. The Maryland Baptist Home for Aged Colored People.

These are the mighty aims of our convention and they are the speedy, strong wings upon which we have flown to unparalleled success this year. The work this year has been hard and plentious, but freighted with pleasure and fun. The brethren have been so loving, cooperative, so responsive and encouraging that it has been a pleasure to work hard. They have answered every call—practically all said yes, a few—very few said no—while a small number, very small number answered, but said nothing.

1. The Sunday School and Training Union Convention is carrying

The Sunday School and Training Union Convention is carrying on in its usual way, constantly making progress under the unselfish and most efficient leadership of President Miles W. Connor, who is Associate Dean of the National Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Congress. It should be said of him, he has a program, he produces his own program according to his own local needs and conditions. By so doing many neighboring groups have been inspired to propagate such as we have here in our state. He never does anything without consulting the parent body, and as he puts it, "gets the green light."

2. Our Women's Convention led on by our very anxious and optimistic president, Mrs. Ellen G. Wilkerson, has done a very fine job this year. Emphasis is being placed upon training and a uniformed program in this state. This president has been made an aggressive leader and the work is making progress, taking definite shape as they forge toward their goal. She deserves the unselfish support of every worker. Time can only reveal the height of the

women's attainment under her leadership.

3. The Junior Department marches forward claiming new territories each year. The director is Mrs. Bertha C. Winston. Mrs. Winston is a person of ability, vision, determination, and denominational interest. Her activities have attracted national notice. She is at home in this work. She has our O. K. for any task in this field that seeks her.

These mentioned leaders deserve the confidence, love and support

of every church and department of all the churches in the state.

4. The Home—This is one of our principal and most definite objects of support. It is out of debt—the mortgage is burned. It is in the best shape ever. The convention in the last annual session raised more than two thousand dollars to clear the home of debts. The Board of the Home is due no little credit for its fine and successful management. Two of the most active members have passed this year, yet, we are still marching on. Rev. Ward D. Yerby is the much-esteemed and beloved president of the home; as helpers he has had some faithful women and brethren; Rev. Matthew Wilkerson is manager. He has done much to push the work over in an admirable way, and to curtail expenses at the home. At one time more than two hundred dollars were saved by him.

5. The Center and School of Religion—This is the most potent factor of all our undertakings. It is the center of our training and making for proficiency our denominational and church life. It is the haven of permanent and perpetual success and security. Every effort is bent now on the renovating and setting the building in order to begin operation as early as possible. More than three thousand dollars have been raised and now in bank to properly equip the building for the work. Mr. A. B. Koger directed the drive for the Center. Too much cannot be said in commendation for him. Mr. Koger is a most valuable Christian lawyer—he gives

his time, money and himself for the work. With him are other faithful devout layworkers who have given themselves for this work. Dr. Miles W. Connor, treasurer of the Center Fund, is deserving of special notice in this effort. Many of the churches contributed to the drive, some in a large way. Others are here today with their contribution for the same. Brethren, this is no longer a dream, IT IS A TANGIBLE REALITY. A board of Trustees has been elected and functioning. All things will be ready for operation within ninety days. The Center is to be the Center and Headquarters of the Colored Baptists of Maryland, excluding none. It is our Baptist Churches' common home for use and information. It is to serve all while Baptists last in Maryland. It will be directed by a full-time dean and a Secretary of Baptist Activities.

Our Church-wide Institute has done a telling work in helping to make more efficient leaders in our churches. Dr. J. M. Ellison has done much in conducting the Ministers Department. Each year he has given unselfish service to this department. Miss Nannie H. Burroughs has done the same and many of our white Baptist friends. Thanks to everybody. This work will still go on as before. Mrs. Bertha C. Winston is to be commended for the unusual thing done in the young people's department this year. She conducted her own courses and did the teaching herself. It is said to have been the most gainful that they have received at any

time.

HOME MISSIONS IN THE STATE: This is the most challenging of all our endeavors. Much has been done by our missionaries this year and the money spent in that direction has been well spent. Revs. J. W. Luck, Moses I. Tynes and James C. Wyatt have labored in that field this year. Great discoveries have been made by them. Rev. Wyatt was the last to enter, but he is a live wire and has done a most excellent job. You will hear the reports during the Home Mission hour. I am asking that many churches will join the monthly contributors for this work. Rev. Dr. Wyatt needs our financial help now in establishing a new church to accommodate a community of at least five hundred families. Each church should join

in the support of this effort.

THE INFORMER: This is the Voice of Maryland Baptists. It is speaking when all mouths are shut. It is speaking for us when we are silent. It fills a very great and long need in our denominational life. It is one of our conventional projects, and we should so treat it. Definite plans and a fund for this paper should be worked out and provided to assure the publishing of the same the time designated for its appearance. Mr. A. B. Koger is the editor and manager of the Informer. He has done a splendid work with the support of the Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Convention. The parent body took this paper over last year as its official organ dedicated to all the departments of our work. So, now we must have the support of the Convention and all the churches. We cannot get the best results without this Informer; it will go when and where we cannot go and tell what we are doing. At least five thousand copies should go out every quarter.

A great need is a Baptist Register. Every member recorded under his church name. So that the church will be able to help our people when there is such great demand for record of each person in the nation. In many cases the only record that can be found of many of our people is that which the pastor and church can give. There will be a greater demand for such records as the readjustment and reconstruction take place. The church should be able to furnish this important help. We shall undertake this task this year through each church and pastor. A copy shall be placed in our archaisle of the Center, one sent to the State House at Annapolis and one to the United States Department of Interior. Each church will be provided a copy for a small sum. A committee will be

appointed in this convention to work out this proposal upon your approval of the idea.

Thanks to the Baptist Ministers' Wives Alliance for their very liberal gift to the Baptist Center. Mrs. Bertha C. Winston is president and Mrs. Clara Banks is secretary.

OUR CHURCHES: All of them are in a most healthy condition spiritually and financially. All but a very few are clear of debt. Others will soon clear up, maybe this year. Since we last met, Trinity, Memorial, New St. Mark, New Shiloh, Perkins Square, Shiloh-Edgemere, Mt. Ararat, Mt. Sinai, Mt. Hebron, pastored by Rev. L. A. Williams, Wayland, Providence and others of whom I have no knowledge, at this writing, have paid out of debt. Leadenhall has been made over, one of the finest piecs of work done anywhere is to be seen at this church. They pay as they go, and they have gone, so they have paid. Rev. M. C. Allen is responsible for all that is done there. He is a hard worker, a great leader and pastor. Many of our churches have on mortgage burning programs now, which will terminate this year.

Since we last met, many changes have taken place. Rev. Moses I. Types has been called to at least four churches. He is now at the First Baptist Church, Mt. Winans; Rev. C. H. Owen called to Mt. Sinai, Cambridge, a son of Mt. Olive, Cambridge is called to her pastorage, and Rev. V. T. Williams of North Carolina called to the First Baptist Church, this city.

Many of our pastors and fellow yoke-men have fallen this year. Pastors who have passed are: Rev. W. D. White, D. G. Mack, L. L. Price, A. J. Greene, Isaac Thomas, J. E. Watson, S. A. Arderbridge, Horace Minor and Moses P. Clark. Minister not pastoring: Rev. W. T. Cole-

We feel the absence of these our brethren. Many of them were sources of inspiration and fine companions. They wrought well among Their labor is their monument and heaven their reward.

The Churches must have a world-wide prospective. A prospective was the basis, hope and sole ground upon which Christ founded the Church. Today that need is more evident than ever before in the history of human experiences. Our churches must have world-wide interest and relations today as never before. God cannot reign and destroy the evil forces of this earth as long as this kingdom opposing program continues. God would have the church to take her place in times of war and peace. God is waiting now for the Church to get right, that He may through her come to a doomed world. If she finally rejects Him, He will come without her. The Church has suffered, as the results of this great war. Some of the best talent and most promising spiritual timber has been taken out of our churches, some never to return. For those who will return, the church faces the task to provide for them, for their vast experiences, their acquired knowledge, and for their ill-fitted and wrenched

lives which will be the outcome of their varying experiences and con-

Now, my brethren, let us think upon others; let us put ourselves last; let us hide ourselves in the cause. God knows we are here, and if we are His, He will take care of us. We are only here a short while, and then

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES of the MARYLAND BAPTIST HOME FOR AGED COLORED PEOPLE, INC. to the UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND
Baltimore, Maryland

May 26, 1944

Mr. President, Delegates and Friends Assembled:

Mr. President, Delegates and Friends Assembled:

Because of the interest of some of our ministers, laymen and friends, the Maryland Baptist Home for Aged Colored People is a credit to the Baptist Denomination. Theodore Roosevelt said, "... it is by sheer force that we move on to better things." Nothing worthwhile and lasting is accomplished the easy way. It is the force of patience, hard work and sacrifice on the part of somebody that causes worthwhile movements and institutions to live and accomplish the dreams of their founders.

The Maryland Baptist Home is no exception to this rule. The Home lives because of the force of interest, hard work and sacrifice of D. G. Mack, P. C. Neal, Robt. W. Jefferson, Beal Elliott, R. T. Reed, Quintina Creditt, Lucy Wolfe, Cammie Payne and others. It carries on now because some have caught the spirit of the pioneers and are willing to

cause some have caught the spirit of the pioneers and are willing to make the same sort of contribution in sacrificial service and money. We have not yet arrived at the place where we would have nothing to strive for or sacrifice for and thereby lose the values obtained by such efforts. The fiscal year of the Home started with a "bang". The successful

Mortgage Drive, led by Rev. Hiram Smith, and the rousing finish inspired by Rev. C. H. Coleman raised for the Home at the Convention \$2,363.00. With this money the mortgage was paid off, and most of the outstanding With this money the mortgage was paid off, and most of the outstanding current debt. This remarkable achievement brought joy to the Convention, and especially to the Board of Trustees of the Home, who have upon their shoulders and hearts the great responsibility of successfully operating our Aged Home. A mortgage debt, as annoying as it is, is, far easier to carry than a current debt. The great danger of a mortgage debt is fereclosure, and not being able to re-finance, thereby causing a forced sale at a loss. This rarely ever happens with church property. Most pecile who invest in mortgages realize they can make no more with their money re-invested than they are making now. So if you keep up the interest they will go along with you. This is not true with a up the interest they will go along with you. This is not true with a current debt. If you do not pay the grocer, he will stop serving you. If you do not pay the phone bill, the gas and electric bill, the fuel oil bill, the water rent, etc., these people will cut off the very essentials of living.

We are wondering if some of our churches have taken the erroneous view that our financial problem was solved in the paying off of the mortgage, and they did not need to send their monthly contributions as heretofore?

We do not mean to chide, but we who are closest to this problem and entrusted with this responsibility, feel it our duty to remind the Convention and the churches composing this Convention of the facts. We have time and time again, and shall continue to try to impress upon the pastors and churches that the Aged Home is an object of their interest and support, nay more, it is a child of their care and as much deserves their motherly and fatherly consideration. Can any mother or father feel that they have done their full Christian duty if they have forgotten or neglected their child?

#### NEED FOR AN AGED HOME

With the coming of Old Age Assistance, or Old Age Pension, as it is called, some have said there is no need for an Old Folks' Home. This is far from true. Old Age Assistance does not provide a home for aged people. It merely helps, them to exist in the homes of others, often

where they are not wanted and receive very little comfort and considera-

At the Maryland Baptist Home, and other similar institutions, they get the comforts of a home, they are well fed (although some may say this is not so), they get companionship, they get entertainment from groups and the radio, if sick they get medical care and attention and other comforts and diversions Old Age Assistance does not provide. We have many inquiries from old people or those interested in old people. We do not take all these people into the Home because some cannot and others will not meet the requirements of entrance.

Here are samples of the inquiries we receive:

Some white people in Harford County have an old servant who has been in the family for years. She is now old nad unable to work. They hear about our Home and make arrangements to bring her here. We

accepted her and she is now in the Home and being cared for.

A soldier called me up and said he had an aged father sick in Provident Hospital and he wanted to put him into the Home. Knowing conditions at our Home, where we have plenty of sickness and no nurse, and finding out that he was a member of Ebenezer A. M. E. Church, we referred him to Bor. Forgus the nactor or Bishon Davis. We realize referred him to Rev. Ferguson, the pastor, or Bishop Davis. We realize that our first duty is to the aged in our own Baptist churches.

NURSE AND OTHER HELP NEEDED

Speaking of not having a nurse to attend the sick in the Home, raises an important question. We employ only one person—a Matron. To administer the needs of 20 inmates, some sick, others feeble, and the many duties a Matron is called upon to perform, is a big job. Personally I think it is too much to expect of one person. sonally, I think it is too much to expect of one person. It is true that these Homes all require the inmates to help with the work about the Home. Some being old and failing in health and strength can do very little, others can do nothing and have to be waited upon. May I suggest as a vital need of the Home a woman be secured who has some knowledge of practical nursing and diet to assist the Matron with the sick and other duties about the Home. I suggest this to the Churches of this Convention, for if this need is met you will have to increase your support to the extent of paying the wages of this much-needed help.

OUR MATRON

In the preceding paragraph, I have mentioned the position of Matron a number of times. Now I want to think of the person occupying this

position-Mrs. Anna M. Tynes.

A person to fill this position successfully must have certain qualifications, such as: executive ability, knowledge of economics and management, patience, personality, not afraid of work, and plenty of good religion. We feel that Mrs. Tynes has a large measure of all of these qualifications

and we are very proud of her.

This has been a very taxing year for the Matron, for we have had an unusual amount of sickness and deaths, and problems of discipline. Under the circumstances, we think she has done very well. I have always felt that some of the women of our Churches might help our Matron at times, if they went over to the Home and talked with her and offered their services. Try this out and see if it works.

I am hoping that the Matron is here and can tell you her own story

about the Home.

#### MR. HAWKINS

Many of us were surprised at the last Convention to have with us Mr. Hawkins in his familiar role as Treasurer of the Home. We thought Uncle Sam would have him for a long time, but somehow he was fortunate enough to be released.

We all know just how energetic he was in getting all the money possible for the Home. Many of us will be equally surprised not to see

Mr. Hawkins busy this year looking out for the interests of the Home. We regret to report that during the year Mr. Hawkins gave up the work of Treasurer, leaving the "bag" to Brother David Norrell, who acted

while he was in the Army.

Brother David Norrell is now Treasurer of the Home and any money or donations of any kind that used to be given to Mr. Hawkins you may give to Brother Norrell without any hesitancy. Brother Hawkins is a man of fine training and ability. He attacks any job in which he is interested with energy and enthusiasm. We hope he can find a place in some other phase of our Denominational work and thereby give us the benefit of his valuable services.

#### TRUSTEES

The Home was hard hit during the past year in the passing of two of its greatest benefactors:—Dr. Daniel G. Mack and Deacon William Dr. Mack was one of the founders of the Home and its first President. He never failed to have a deep interest in the Home and

his church was a regular contributor to its support.

Deacon Ware had a passion for the Home which was only second to that for his church. Although passed eighty years of age, he rarely ever missed a Board meeting. He met his death while on his way to the meeting of the Trustee Board. The products of his farm he always shared with the inmates of the Home. In his will he remembered the Home with some income-producing ground rents.

We should mention too the passing of Rev. Moses Clark, a former Trustee and husband of Mrs. Bessie R. Clark one of the present Trustees.

Our sympathy goes out to the relatives of these friends of the Home and may God supply the vacancies created by their passing.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

We regret we do not have a detailed financial report for distributions at this Convention. Here is where we miss Mr. Hawkins, who has prepared these reports for the last several years.

We shall, however, give you the total receipts and expenditures for the year beginning May 1st, 1943, to April 30th, 1944. We shall also

give you the outstanding obligations.

Total outstanding obligations, April 30th....\$319.51 We are sure the donations brought to the Convention by the Churches will more than wipe out the deficit and give us a good balance for the first month of the new convention year.

As soon as we can complete a detailed financial report, we shall have it printed and sent to the Pastors and Churches.

One of the biggest problems in any home is that of food. It is a problem in a home of 3 or 4 persons. It is more of a problem where there are 19 persons to feed 3 times a day. We have had as many as

22 persons to provide for during part of the year. Figure it out for yourselves. Three meals a day for 19 persons 366 days and you have 20,862 meals served in the Home during the past year. This is hardly believable, but it is a fact and should give you some idea of the food problem. Food is high. I feel sure that our food bill will approach nearly \$1,500.00 for the year. Since writing this I figured out we had actually spent \$1,607.87 for food.

#### DONATIONS

Our food bill has gone up because of two factors: the high cost and the

falling off of food donations.

Many groups have always preferred to donate sugar, canned goods, groceries, fruits, etc. The food limitations due to the war have dry groceries, fruits, etc. The greatly affected these donations.

Despite the handicaps in making food donations at this time, we have throughout the year received quite a number from Church groups, schools, clubs of various kinds, and individuals, for which we are very grateful and wish to thank the givers. (I have prepared a list of all who have made donations of this kind during the year and will read it if time and

patience will permit).

RELIGIOUS SERVICES, PROGRAMS, DINNERS, ETC.

We have never failed to mention and emphasize, in these reports, the value we place on donations of religious services, literary programs, dinners, outings, etc., for our inmates. For many, if not most of these old people, their whole social life is bound up in the activities of the Home. These occasional diversions go a long way toward breaking the monotony of lives that are for the most part shut in because of old age, or physical or mental disability. We want to encourage this type of service, and let those who have given it, and others who may, know just how much we value it and how thankful we are to all who helped in this way. Just get in touch with the Matron and arrange a date for your group.

#### NEW INMATES AND DEATHS

Our Home is well established in the community; therefore, we receive many inquiries and requests for applications. All of those who inquire or get applications do not enter the Home because they cannot or will not meet the requirements of entrance. While this is a Christian institution, it is also a business institution, and, unless we conduct it as a busi-

We have during the yeear added four new inmates to our family, namely: Mrs. Mary Annie Hall, Mrs. Marie Carter, Mrs. Belle Stewart Harris and Mr. William Chandler.

We regret to report the death of two of our inmates: Mrs. Nancy Carey and Mr. Robert Brown.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE AND HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Since our Home is licensed by the State, we never know when some of the agents of the Department of Public Welfare or Health Department are going to drop in to see how we are measuring up to the standards set by these departments. These regulations are for the safety and health of the inmates. At the last inspection, there were 24 different items listed against our Home. Some of these have been remedied, others have not because they require money which we do not have. Fire escapes, removal of certain rat harbors, screening windows and doors, repairs to our garage are some of the needed improvements.

ANNUAL DRIVE

In order to do some of the things listed by the Department of Public Welfare and balance our current budget, we decided to put on the usual Annual Drive before the Convention. Rev. M. W. Wilkerson was selected

to head the Drive, assisted by Deacon Daniel Ringgold. Letters have been sent out to the Churches. Up to the last meeting of the Board only a few responses had been received. We are hopeful that fruits of the appeal will be, or have been made, at this Convention.

OUR FINAL WORD

President Ward D. Yerby, and his armor bearers, the Trustees and Matron, are grateful to the Pastors, Churches, groups and individuals who have remembered and supported the Home during the past year. There is no end to our gratitude and thankfulness to these loyal friends; however, since there is still need for larger support, we must bring this fact before this Convention and the Pastors and Churches that compose it. The Maryland Baptist Home is an object of this Convention. If all of the Churches will send to the Home regularly a monthly contribution, we feel that each year we will be abe to report a balanced budget and a fine type of service rendered the community.

With Hope in God, and Faith in you, we press on into another year's

work.

Mr. President, Delegates and Visitors to the 18th Annual Session of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland:
With profound gratitude to you for your fine and liberal support given me during the fiscal year ending May 26, 1944, I make this report. I thank God for the preservation of the Baptist heritage during these times. I thenk God for beinging me through a year that was filled with times. I thank God for bringing me through a year that was filled with handicaps and sorrows for me, which cannot be described in human speech. I shall mention only a few of them. First, a very sick wife who had to be carried to the hospital twice a week, part of the time, and then have a doctor to call to see her. Then I had a nervous reaction from the strain. For more than two months my income from all sources was stopped and I had to draw my last dollar out of the bank. I have done the best I could under such unfavorable circumstances, to which I now call your attention.

First, Revivals during the year. I conducted meetings in New York City, Easton and Cambridge, Maryland and Orange County, Virginia.

NEW PASTORS AND VACANT CHURCHES

Rev. M. T. Tynes was called to the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Snow
Hill and from there to Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, Cambridge. His stay
at each church was very short. Rev. Geo. H. Brown, pastor of Mt. Carmel
Baptist Church, Princess Anne, has been called to the Mt. Hope Baptist Church, Welborne, Md., also. He has these two churches and is supplying Macedonia Baptist Church, Pocomoke City, until the first of September. During the summer season he also pastors the Antioch Baptist Church, Ocean City, Md.

Rev. F. D. Cobbs of Portsmouth, Va. is called to the Enon Baptist Church, Crisfield, Md. Rev. John English, a member of that church, is called to the Mt. Olive Baptist Church Cambridge to succeed the late.

CHURCH AFFILIATIONS

Macedonia, Pocomoke City, belongs to the Northampton Baptist Asso-

ciation of Eastern Shore, Virginia. It meets in August. Enon, Crisfield, belongs to the same Association. Mt. Carmel, Princess Anne and Antioch, Ocean City, belong to the Shenandoah Valley Baptist Association. Zion, Cambridge, belongs to the Delaware Association. Maryland is the only unorganized part of Eastern Shore. There is much need for trained leadership on the Eastern Shore. If the pastors who are able would let their churches contribute more liberally to the support of trained leaders, all our churches on the Shore could be saved. We have only 13 churches now left. Every year we lose one or two because of the lack of pastors to serve them. The help I received from the Convention during the past year was as follows: June \$25.00, July \$25.00, August \$30.00, September \$30.00, October \$25.00, November \$25.00, December \$25.00; January \$30.00, February \$8.00, March \$30.00; total \$253.00. Other sources: Baptist Ministers Conference \$20.11, Night \$6.25, Baptist Ministers Union \$12.25, Morning Star \$25.00, Perkins Square \$3.00, Shiloh \$10.00, Memorial \$10.19, Union Temple \$10.26, Dr. W. J. Winston \$5.00, Dr. Edward C. Brown \$5.00, Dr. H. E. Smith \$10.00, Provident B. T. U. \$6.19; total \$123.34; with many dollar gifts from the brethren.

#### THE REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND

Baltimore, Maryland, May 23rd, 1944
To the President, Officers, Members and Fellow-Co-Laborers:

One year ago I was requested to accept the position as Educational Secretary, and this I did with some degree of trepidation. But in selecting me, you had this in mind, I suppose, that you were selecting one whose heart was strong, his spirit buoyant and his determination unabated for education, a great Baptist Center and School Religion. I accepted this position because I believed that you stood first of all for genuine Christian religion, for a constructive system of education in the light of our philosophy, psychology and economic condition and that you stood

for traditions that were helpful and hopeful and worthy of emulation; which would encourage innovations conducive to the demands of the age. Well, I have had some gratification in that direction inasmuch as our Baptist Center and School of Religion will tell the true story of practical training as well as theoretical instruction, because practical training, practical education, is necessarily essential for successful leadership, sine education is a mean to an end, and whatever education one may have, if it is inadequate to accomplish the end in view, it is non-productive in so far as one's achievements are concerned.

This has been a most eventful year in the life of Baptists in Maryland. There has been a greater educational awakening, and the finest spirit of fellowship known to the Baptists in Maryland. There is a fellowship between the colored and white Baptists unheard of in Maryland, so much so that it has stimulated Baptists white and colored throughout the country. What we have connected with this educational movement is a class of doers as well as a class of thinkers. This has been attested by pastors and laymen giving their personal checks for one hundred dollars each, something unprecedented in the life of the Baptists of this state. When Dr. George A. Crawley, the President, called the brethren together in their first meeting, there were loyal men who pledged more than thirteen hundred dollars in less than half an hour and paid their personal pledges within 35 days.

#### THE INSTITUTIONS THAT HAVE BEEN HELPED BY US

The convention has given generously as possible to The Virginia Theological Seminary and College, Virginia Union University, The National Profession and Trade School, The Northern University and The Jones-Williams School. The Baptist Religion is a teaching religion and will always require religious teachers. It is a religion of faith and freedom, and holds these priceless principles as their chart and compass, the lever of independence, the cornerstone of truth and the foundation of the Baptist Church Polity which was born of liberty, caught in the arms of justice, rocked in the cradle of freedom and nursed at the breast of fair-play to all.

#### REAL UNION AMONG BAPTISTS IN THE STATE

In our educational work all race barriers have been broken down, and we as Baptists of this State are united in interest, sentiment, purposes and plans, and our love and union are intensified as never before. Old prejudices, petty jealousies and race antipathies that were held by men years ago, are but withered grass and fading flowers in our memory.

# THE BAPTIST CENTER AND SCHOOL OF RELIGION IS NOW A FACT IN REALITY

The papers of incorporation have been drawn under the careful and legal guidance of our attorney, Mr. A. Briscoe Koger, a man with fine legal dissertation and a master in jurisprudence and one of the denomination's best friends. The courses of instruction have been tactly outlined. There will be courses and instruction in the Baptist Center and School of Religion that will be beneficial to all. For religious and church workers, Sunday School leaders, B. T. U. workers and expositors, social and community workers and leaders, and in fact for all seeking to improve themselves in Christian leadership.

There will be a Ministerial department for those who have not had

advantage of early school life.

There will be a course known as A Special Course for those who cannot arrange for a full theological course. They will have the privilege of electives to meet their needs.

There will also be a Theological Department: The work of this department is to give young men who are called to the work of the Gospel

Ministry and who have a literary training a thorough and practical course in Theology, that they will be qualified to meet the requirements of Christian Ministers and defend the doctrines that they preach and to become efficient interpreters of the word of God and to meet the demands of the

The Committee has in mind an Academic Department. This department will offer a course closely allied to a Junior College. Its aim is to prepare students for their vocation in life. Also an Evening School.

#### THE DUTY OF THE CHURCH IN THIS RELIGIOUS PROGRAM

The Church must re-state and re-emphasize its stand on a prepared The Hiscock's articles of Faith are not a fair test of any man's qualifications for being ordained to the work of the Gospel Minis-While the churches must insist that young men prepare themselves for the ministry and Christian leadership, provision must be made by these churches in assisting these young men in school, by help paying their tuition and seeing that they secure such books as the prescribed courses demand. The deepest thing that concerns us today is spiritual and not material. We must put stress upon spiritual values and not material gains. A man who enters the ministry must have a high purpose, and his life must be the interpretation of what he preaches. If life is known to be without a purpose or intelligence or fairness or justice, that man is unalterably doomed to defeat.

We have in our churches, as you know, some modern pessimists. But this pessimism is based not on the belief that knowledge will not increase but on the belief that increased knowledge will bring them decreased

happiness, nobility and self-esteem.

We need to step up and look up: Homes are disintegrating. The purity of family life is fastly disappearing. Men and women are demanding the right, as they call it, of self-expression, though most of them having nothing to express but the most commonplace hankering after the primitive satisfaction.

#### THE CHURCHES ARE SPEAKING THROUGH THE CONVENTION

From the incipient of this convention which received its birth in Macedonia Baptist Church 18 years ago, the promoters wrote in the constitution their desires for education and an institution of education. We have waited and the child has been born. It was born out of due season, it has come with a message of freedom and a united council by those who have suffered and sacrificed during the years, and are now ready to receive a message of equality and fairmindedness in fostering the cause of Reputity Conton and School of Policion and when our man and season. a Baptist Center and School of Religion, and where our men and women can meet and hold their organization meeting at will. It was conceived in righteousness and delivered in justice, and we can safely report that this child of promise will present to the state and country sons and daughters who will hold high in their hands the holy torchlight of reason, liberty and love while on their shining foreheads falls the golden dawning of a brighter day.

In announcing the proclamation of the Baptist Center and School of Religion, we would have you to know that the future of this institution is in the hands of true and tried men and women who are the servants of the convention and the exponents of racial ideals and denominational advancement. That it will be retained and maintained under the benign sovereignty of a people whose faith is in the Lord. I do not permit myself to doubt. That they will prove themselves rich and valuable heritages, I feel assured, and that they will undergo no change even under a

tropical sun.

We are fulfilling an obligation imposed by the triumph of our convention under the leadership of George A. Crawley and his corps of officers and in the declaration of our constitution and the adoption of

honest laws by the convention's sense of honor, and more than all by the rights, interests and conditions of the Baptist people themselves. In this age of frequent interchange and mutual dependence, we cannot shirk our denominational responsibilities if we would; they must be met with cour-

age and wisdom, and we must follow duty even if desire opposes.

Within the last twenty-one months we have astonished the most pessimistic as well as some of the optimistic minds; because with ready hands, steady minds, cool heads, tired and trembling flesh you have expressed your loyalty to the child of your choice, and now your names are being sung upon the lips of men of fame and national reputation.

The outlook for our educational work has never been brighter than now. The newly founded and newly named institution will take her place among the institutions doing similar work. It should be our pride and joy in contributing to this worthy cause, when you remember that this institution will lessen the bulk of ignorance by shedding moral and intellectual light into the otherwise dark places of our state and preparing the lives of our young men and women for usefulness and service. Who will be able to compute their value and tell of their worth? We are not majoring in that kind of education that is more concerned about athletics expediency, degree seeking and foot-note collecting. but with character, scholarship and experience. We want to produce a set of Parthenon instead of Pyramid builders.

THE WORK OF THE CHURCH LEADERS We must emphasize that the need of God is as real a need in human life as the need of food. It may not be as immediate, but for the realization of life's highest possibilities and for the encompassing of lie's noblest

program it is indispensable.

The church is the symbol and vehicle of religious idealism, not presidents and politics; and religion is the dynamics of social justice. Every human life must be regarded as reflex of divinity. The first great service which the church, the effective arm of religion, can render the cause of social justice, is to galvanize by education and inspiration the will of men so that they will seek justice and pursue it. Don't be charity seekers. Because as a relief it is only palliative and remedial. The task of establishing a Baptist Center and School of Religion and the machinery for the perpetuation of it and an especial challenge to organized religion and Christianity.

When Christianity speaks of truth, justice, peace and love it voices its own essential genius and men may be moved to harken unto it. But when it loses its own prophetic voice and becomes the echo of the State, it turns into deception and most beguilement. The Church must be the

guide, the critic and the center of the state, never its tool.

It is only by such intrepidity of spirit that we can vindicate our prophetic mission in the world. If our historic role is that of a prophet and seer, then we must accept the tribulations which fall to the lot of the prophets. At the cost of being misunderstood and maligned we must speak freely and unafraid, and be a John the Baptist crying in the wilderness and at the same time preparing the way for the people spiritually, morally and intellectually.

#### REPORT OF REV. J. C. WYATT-MISSIONARY SOUTHERN MARYLAND DISTRICT

To the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland in Its 18th Annual Session.

Brethren:

I beg to make the following annual report:

I began my work the first Sunday in September 1943, making my first visit to the First Baptist Church, Tacoma Park Md. Rev. Virgil Taylor,

Pastor. I speak of this visit because I still remember the very fine way

in which I was received. The first four months of my appointment were confined to visiting The first four months of my appointment were confined to visiting churches as far as I was able. My work at times was seriously hindered by the gas shortage. However, I made the following calls: two visits to the First Baptist Church in Tacoma Park, three visits to the First Baptist Church at Glen Arden, one visit to the Mt. Ararat Baptist Church in Du Pont Heights, one visit to the First Baptist Church, Brentwood, one to the First Baptist Church at Capital View, one to the First Baptist Church in Fairmount Heights and one to the Sylvan Vesta Baptist Church, Fairmount Heights. Two visits were made to the Southern Maryland Baptist Association and one to the Missionaries of the Association. Baptist Association and one to the Missionaries of the Association.

The last two and a half months have been confined to the First Baptist Church in Highland Park, where I have been serving as Acting Pastor, at the suggestion of the brethren in the Southern Maryland Association. When I went there only a few children had been attending, no prayer services were being held and the Lord's Supper had not been served in more than a year. We now have two services on Sunday, a promising Sunday School and have purchased among other things a Communion Set

at a cost of \$39.75, and still have nearly \$50 in the Treasury.

Among our other activities was a Group Meeting held at Tacoma Park which was an inspiring and helpful event. Rev. Crawley, our President, Rev. Tynes and Mrs. Wilkerson, together with others, represented the Convention.

I am happy to report that most of the churches I have visited are

in very good shape, both spiritually and financially.

The work which I was doing at the Community Baptist Church in trying to train Sunday School Teachers and workers, previous to last July, when I was appointed Field Missionary, is now being done in the name of the Community Baptist Church School. We now have the largest, one of the best organized and the largest corps of regular teachers in the Southern District.

I wish to report further that we are using the press and the radio whenever it is convenient to bring our work to the minds of the public. We desire your prayers for a greater program in the Southern District.

Mrs. Vice President, President George A. Crawley, National Officers,

night cometh when no man can work.

We are happy to be meeting here today, in an ideal section of the city and in the New Metropolitan Baptist Church. This location is ideal because it brings us face to face with our long hoped for dreams, "The Baptist Center and School of Religion"—the pride of the Baptists of Maryland just across the street. The New Metropolitan Baptist Church is ideal because of its spaciousness, its beauty, its location, and its hospitality and the fine pastor, the Rev. #### Visits

The task that lies ahead is an enormous one, and we have only viewed the land by faith, and we believe that with God and our stalwart leaders we are fully able to possess the land. Our friends at Salisbury, Easton, Lakeland, and many other places in Maryland are looking this way and many, I hope, are here.

Mrs. Anna M. Jordan, chairman of this committee, has had a broken

leg and could not do what she wanted to do.

Mrs. Bessie R. Clark, our first vice president, is chairman of the educational work, and with her committee has worked hard. We are anxious and interested in seeing our Baptist Center become an active reality.

This has been one of our banner years. The enthusiasm and interest

have been high among the official groups and the various churches.

Many thanks to the Trinity Baptist Church for housing us this year for our monthly board meetings, and for the "Miss Baptist Rally." To the First Baptist Church where we had our "Fellowship Dinner," and to the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church where we had our "Educational Rally," we also express our appreciation.

The Sharon Baptist Church led us in the "Miss Baptist Rally" this year and 'they were crowned "Miss Baptist of Maryland." This was a

very successful effort.

#### Juniors

Our Junior Organization is growing by leaps and bounds. Some churches have three distinct junior groups functioning regularly. It's also interesting to remember that nineteen years ago in this church, this idea was adopted by our National Organization and Mrs. Winston, who directs the juniors for the State of Maryland, was a part of that meeting.

With Miss Rosetta Davis and her cabinet leading and Mrs. Winston's

guidance, we can expect great things from our juniors.

Our Music Department speaks for itself. This group is making a fine presentation under the leadership of Mrs. Goldie Greene. They look charming and sing sweetly.

Mrs. Mary Evans and her co-workers have kept us in money for

fruit and flowers. They may seem slow but they are sure.

Death visited the second vice president's home and the first vice president's home this year and took from our midst the Rev. D. G. Mack and the Rev. M. P. Clark. Their husbands, this has hindered Mrs. Mack from serving, and the Foreign Mission Committee did not function. However, we know the needs of Foreign Missions, and we are making a special offering today for missions.

The chairman of the Program Committee, Mrs. M. E. Amy, has with her group, sought to produce such programs that would be helpful and inspirational to the missionaries throughout the State. At our various Quarterly Conventions, Open Forums, and interesting discussions on the

work, much has been accomplished.

In 1941, we scarcely were using any literature in Maryland, but now the secretary of literature reports that more than 300 copies of "The Worker" have been handled per quarter. Yet there are missionary groups who carry on in their weekly or monthly meetings without any kind of literature. That's like putting the dinner on the table without dishes, and eating without silver. Sisters, we just cannot do our best work without the proper kind of help. Let us see the secretary of literature, Mrs. Amy, and peruse the literature table, get song books, get guides, get magazines or whatever is helpful for you.

The Social Committee has received and welcomed visitors in our Quarterly Conventions. They did not function like they had hoped to, but

they will next year. Mrs. Clara Banks is chairman.

Our Finance Committee this year has been led on by our finance

director, Mrs. Madison Williams. They have worked faithfully keeping our monies straight, and raised more than their portion of the budget.

Through the Child Welfare Committee, and the Home Mission Committee of the National Baptist Convention, we have kept up with our national requests this year. I hope we are going to send some money to the school at Nashville, Tenn. President D. V. Jemison asked in our board meeting in Cincinnati that the Women's Auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention take over the operation of the school at Nashville, which they did.

Our budget this year for twenty-six hundred dollars has not fully materialized and cannot ever be until we get more of our churches functioning in the same direction at the same time on the same things.

Streamlined Mission Circles

To make streamline means to make strong, attractive—to make in-

teresting.

Too often we hear presidents of Missionary Societies say that their minister is not interested in their missionary work and that they don't know what to do to interest him. One day a missionary worker said to me: "Our pastor is not interested in the missionary work, and he does not attend our meetings, nor does he give any encouragement or co-operation whatsoever." Her name is "Liegeon!" For the leader to say that the pastor is not interested in what she is doing is to admit defeat and to acknowledge weakness.

In the first place, the church should see that the leader or president of the Missionary Department is a good consecrated Christian, with a reasonable educational background; that she will be able to take in and pass out. She certainly must be above selfishness, jealousy, and prejudice. These three things alone will defeat one as a leader and thereby handicap whatever one is leading. Therefore, the first step in streamlining is

to set the organization straight.

Second, streamline your organization by making it attractive. Carry on a well planned, outlined program, change your procedure, keep your room attractive. Try to use your talent where it can best serve, and keep your entire program related. Meet once a week or not less than twice per month.

Third, streamline your organization through a program of enlistment. If you can, enlist the entire church in missions. Survey your community and bring in new members; vivsit shut-ins and sick, and encourage and bring in delinquent members. Be instrumental in saving souls, and advertise your work. One day when you look around, your minister will be there, because he will want to make an announcement.

Fourth, make your organization streamlined through a program of stewardship. I like the Stewardship Creed as written in "Stewardship Applied in Missions," by J. B. Lawrence. The creed follows:

"What do we need? Not more collections, not fewer collections. We need a generation of Christian men who will understand the plain truth about the Stewardship of Money." That truth might be stated in a Stewardship Creed as follows:

1. My money is mine only in trust. It belongs to God, just as I do. 2. This money is not filthy lucre. It is not the devil's coin. It is stored up human power. It is so much of my self which I can set to work

on the mission fields of Africa and in the homeland.

3. God is counting upon this money for His work. It is to build churches, preach the Gospel, train Christian workers and send them out, teach, heal, and save the sin-sick and suffering and help in every way to bring in the Kingdom of Righteousness, Brotherhood and Peace.

Do these things, missionary leaders, and your pastor will be on hand to address you, to encourage you, and to give advice.

The following poem should prove inspirational to all missionary leaders:

Two little men stood looking at a hill, One was named Can't and the other was named Will. Can't said, "I never in the world can climb this hill."
So there he is now at the bottom still. Will said, "I'll climb to the top because I will," So there he is now at the top of the hill. Two little men are living by the hill—At the botton is Can't, at the top is Will.

Our Churchwide Institute this year was one of our best. The securing of the Rev. E. W. White as one of our instructors was quite an asset. The evidence may seem slow, but in the process of maturity good things grow slow and require a lot of patience. The inspiration was high and the

information was plentiful and wholesome.

We had our first Interracial Conference this convention year in July, the Trinity Baptist Church. This type of program does more for us than one would think on the surface. We had such fine speakers as Miss Kathleen Mallory, executive secretary of the Women's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Convention; Miss Mobola Auyrondis, Nigeria Africa, a representative of the Women's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Con-

vention, and many of our local leaders.

We enjoyed a fine conference, discussing together ways and methods of carrying out the Master's great commission. This was made possible with all expense paid through the kindness of the Women's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Convention. Many thanks to W.M.U., Miss Mallory, and our Mrs. Barnes. We are looking forward to a better conference

Sign Posts

A sign is that by which a thing is made known or represented. It is that which furnishes evidence; it's an indication; it's proof; a remarkable event considered by the ancients as indicating the will of some diety, an event considered by the Jews as indicating the Divine Will.

A sign may be evident with us of that which is in our favor, and it may indicate things that are against us; it works both ways. Nebuchadnezzar had a dream which indicated the fall of his kingdom. The captivity of Zedekiah was a sign unto the house of Israel. In the healing of the nobleman's son, Jesus used signs and wonders that His hearers might believe.

Mark 16: 17 verse: "And these sings shall follow them that believe. In My name shall they cast out devils. they shall speak with new

Mark 16:20 verse: "And they went forth and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the Word with signs following."

The commercial world has used signs to advertise their goods and to represent their commodities. As we pass along the highways and by-ways, we read and we are sold by such signs as "Burma Shave," "When better cars are built Buick will buill them," "Oh Henry!" Everyone knows what these slogans represent.

This convention represents our united interest of the State of Maryland, the biggest church organization of color in the State. It includes every missionary Baptist. We are its constituency; we are its sign posts.

What does the slogan on our sign post say? Do they express our total interest and united sentiment? Is the reading on our sign post the impression we want to make on others, including unenlisted Baptists as well as other denominations?

#### THE ANNUAL REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WOMEN'S CONVENTION AUXILIARY TO U.B.M.C. OF MARYLAND Baltimore 17, Md. May, 1944

Madam President and Dear Co-Workers, Greetings:

We are delighted to report another year of progress in God's service. This does not mean that we have accomplished all that we set out to do at the close of our convention last year. It only means that "through many toils and snares we have come thus far and if we keep our hands in God's hand, He will continue to lead us on. Christian service is a very difficult task at its best, but if we put our trust in God, He will lead us, His children, "on in ways of nobler life, where foolish fears are cast aside, and bitter hate is unknown."

Many of our women of this convention have experienced some things this year of which they have never dreamed. #### REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION

Another year has rolled around. Here we are today. Though rugged the path where our duty may lead. The promise to be that they that be wise shall shine.

Because it is the duty of every child to help give the gospel to the

world systematically and regularly. The Missionary need is greater than ever.

(3) It shows that we can take our religious duty seriously, yet business like.

(4) Because it is a moral force of creating christian character. What the Africans do they stick to it. Then worship is the crescent Mohammed drivev. We believe in the cross and Jesus Christ. They must be tonight by precept and example. They watch strangers very closely. One must not deviate from what you teach them. If so they are very fearful.

They see the stars and moon that fade away get larger. They believe there is a big daddy somewhere that brings changes. Souls yearn to know who he is. We sing the heathen in their blindess born down toword and stone in their crude way trying to find the true God.

What the chief decides to take for their God he accepts. Sometimes a whole town worships a banana bush, build a low fence around it, then have it guarded, no one to ever touch that sacred bush. They also worship a creek, dam up the catfish so tame they swim to the edge and eat of your hand.

When the Africans accept Jesus Christ they never blackside the church becomes the biggest thing in their lives. No post war reconstruction can possibly be satisfactory that does not include Africa and its millions of unemancipated souls. We must give Christ to Africa for no other reason than that by doing so we strengthen our souls.

Resume of 1943:

That the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention is the only exclusive and distinct foreign mission convention among Negroes in the United States. That the convention is prohibited by constitution from using more than 25 per cent of its total income for operating expenses. That hundreds of souls have been led to Christ.

## MINUTES OF THE S.S. AND B.T.U. CONVENTION OF MARYLAND ST. PAUL CHURCH

Thursday, July 13, 1944

Morning Session—Mr. Wardell Richardson, presiding. The Eighteenth Annual Session of the Sunday School and B.T.U. Convention of Maryland. The worship period was conducted by Miss Crawley and others of the St. Paul Baptist Church. Miss Nevie Streeter of St. Paul delivered the welcome address. Greetings from the parent body were by the Rev. G. A. Crawley, president; response on behalf of B.T.U. was given by Miss Dorothy Logan of Ebenezer Baptist Church. Dr. Connor called the following persons to the platform: Miss Delmai May, Virginia Union and First Baptist, Baltimore; Miss Mabel Stokes, Coppin graduate and Fulton Baptist member; Miss Edna DeCoursey, Sharon teacher in the city school system, and Miss Scott, First Baptist and a graduate of Dunbar High School. A word was heard from each of them.

The convention sang "Count on Me." Scripture lesson, Philippians second chapter, was read by the Rev. Mr. Groves of Grace Memorial Church.

Dr. Connor presented the Rev. M. W. Wilkerson, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, who gave the introductory sermon. He preached on "The Name of Jesus," and advised all to look up to a name which is above all others. He pointed out that no one has been able to attain this name, and that

Jesus' name will lead you in mercy, love and all things.
Following the sermon, prayer was offered by the Rev. Ward Yerby, pastor of Perkins Square Baptist Church. "The Name of Jesus" was sung

by the convention.

Mr. A. B. Koger, editor of the Informer, spoke in behalf of the paper. He urged each and everyone to buy a paper, and suggested that each church take at least fifty copies to sell.

#### Afternoon Session'

Mr. James Downs, second vice president, presided over the evening session. The Rev. Hiram W. Smith, pastor of Mt. Lebanon, conducted the worship period. A selection was rendered by the convention. The scripture was taken from Galatians 6:1-10. Prayer was offered. The selection, "Love Divine" was sung.

Panel discussions on "The Problems of the Training Union" were given by Miss Eunice Bowers of the Southern Baptist Convention and a member of the Fulton Avenue Baptist Church, and Mrs. Anna M. Tynes,

ates to participate. Persons were given time to ask questions.

The delegates to the National Sunday School and B.T.U. Convention were asked to make their reports. Mrs. Iola J. Branch and Miss Mabel Stokes responded.

It was recommended that each church send at least one delegate to Congress next year. The motion prevailed that this convention give the delegates a rising vote of thanks for the reports brought back from the congress at Birmingham, Ala.

Echoes from Congress were heard from Mrs. Ellen Wilkerson, president of the Women's Convention; also from Mr. A. B. Koger, Mrs. Bertha

Winston and others.

The Rev. W. D. Yerby spoke in behalf of the Baptist Aged Home. He

thanked all for the contributions made in the past year, but urged that we do a bit more this year.

The offering was lifted by the Rev. Mr. Tynes. It amounted to \$5.48, with \$75.50 for annual fees. The Rev. B. T. Williams offered the benediction. Recess and dinner followed.

#### **Evening Session**

Miss Mabel Stokes, first vice president, presided over the evening session. The convention rendered selections entitled "Bring Them In," and "Lift Him Up." The worship period was conducted by the Rev. James S. Williams, and associates of Grace Memorial Baptist Church. It was the worship and application of the convention and walking the walking the walking the convention and walking the w very inspiring and uplifting. The convention sang "To the Work."

Miss Stokes presented our president, Dr. M. W. Connor who de-livered his annual address. He extended his appreciation to the officers and members of the convention for their fine co-operation. The subject of his address was "Challenge for the Church School," and it was well received and the challenge accepted, together with the recommendations.

A motion prevailed that the challenge and recommendations of the president be placed in the hands of a committee and be worked on and a report made during this session. The motion was carried. The president's recommendation committee was composed of Mrs. Marguerite Selden, chairman; the Rev. W. D. Yerby, Mr. A. B. Koger, the Rev. G. A. Crawley, Miss Edna DeCoursey, and Mrs. Marguerite Saunders.

At this time, the former presidents of the Sunday School and B.T.U. Conventions were presented. They included Mr. Elmer Imes, Macedonia; Mr. A. B. Koger, Union, Baltimore; Mr. William Keck, Fulton. Mr. Imes gave a few remarks.

A selection was rendered by the Zion Baptist Junior Choir, second prize winner in the musical contest.

The Rev. Messrs. Payne and Fowler lifted the offering, which amount-

ed to \$20; annual fees, \$33; total, \$53.

Miss Smith of Fulton won first oratorical prize; Miss Shirley Holland of Morning Star, second oratorical prize.

Mrs. Brown and Mrs. White were named as members of the Time and Place Committee. "Nocturne" was rendered by Miss Mildred Williams at the organ. The Rev. A. J. Payne read the Forty-sixth Psalms. A solo was offered by Miss Zelma Rozzell. Total finances for Thursday amounted to \$354.12.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND

ARTICLE I.—Name

This organization shall be known as the UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION of the STATE OF MARYLAND.

ARTICLE II.—Objects

The objects of the Convention shall be to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ; the promotion of His Kingdom by united efforts on the part of the churches composing it; to unify the church's doctrine and Christian polity; to promote home and foreign missions by establishing and supporting religious work in communities where needed, and give unstinted support toward education in Maryland, as well as supporting it elsewhere; to collect, classify and publish statistics of the churches; to promote prosperity among the churches; to encourage brotherly love and co-operate heartily with other regular bodies doing similar work in our State, our country and the world.

ARTICLE III.—Membership

The membership shall be composed of regular Baptist Churches and life members and associations within the bounds of the State of Maryland. Any regular organized Baptist Church may become a member upon the payment of five (\$5.00) dollars and shall be entitled to the pastor and two (2) messengers, and one additional messenger for each five dollars (\$5.00): provided that the church shall be allowed more than fifteen (15) messengers—any such membership shall continue upon the payment of five dollars (\$5.00) annually. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in Maryland may become a life member upon the payment of fifteen dollars (\$15.00).

All application must be elected by a majority vote of the Convention. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in the State may become an associate member upon the payment of one dollar (\$1.00) and shall be entitled to the discussion, but not to vote—an associate member may become an annual member and enjoy all the privileges of the convention by the payment of five dollars (\$5.00) annually; any association in good and regular standing may become a member upon the payment of ten dollars (\$10.00) and continue upon payment of ten dollars (\$10.00) annually.

SECTION 2.—Discipline of Membership

Any church or member belonging to this convention may be dropped from membership of the Convention, who may hold to and practice doctrines which are contrary, unbaptistic, and departing from the tenents, rules and laws governing the body or by the non-payment of the membership fees herein described, but in all cases, the church or the life member shall be given a fair and impartial trial; and if found guilty shall be suspended or expelled, thereby forfeiting all rights and privileges of the Convention.

ARTICLE IV .-- Officers

The officers of this Convention shall be a president, three vice presidents, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, statistician and auditor, and Executive Board, who shall be elected annually and shall continue in office until their successors have been duly elected and installed.

#### ARTIVLE V.—Duties of Officers

The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of this body, maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the Constitution, preserve order, sign orders on the Treasurer and to have general oversight of the work of the Convention.

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence, resignation, illness or death.

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair, impartial and correct record of the transactions of the Convention in a book provided for that purpose and the entire enrollment of the membership; superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes, for which he shall receive such salary as shall be designated by the Convention or Executive Board. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary and in his absence perform all duties of the Recording Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed as an assistant.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with this body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the State; collect funds from the churches for the Convention; receive reports from the missionary and missionaries, as well as moneys collected or raised by them; paying the same over to the Treasurer, and taking receipt for same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the Convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the Executive Board. All letters, packages, etc., received by him officially shall be the property of the Convention. He shall be the Secretary of the Executive Board and shall draw drafts on the Treasurer and shall present a written report to the Board at each of its quarterly meetings. He shall report the doings of the Executive Board in writing at each annual session of the Convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all the funds of the Convention and provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution selected by the Convention or Executive Board and pay all orders of the Convention properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Board. He shall render a quarterly statement of the Board and an annual report to the Convention. His books shall be kept for inspection by any of the proper officers of the Convention. The Treasurer shall give such security or bond for his proper conduct in office and the safeguarding of the funds of the Convention as the body or Executive Board may require.

The Statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history and the condition of the Baptists in this State, as to their domestic, economic, prosperity and resources, numerical, spiritual and financial strength, and present the same at each annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI.—Convention in Session

The work of the Convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by the messengers and pastors, said messengers holding membership in the churches in this State which are connected with the Convention shall be members of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the church composing the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII.-How Churches Can Become Members

Churches desiring to become members of this Convention shall make application by letters bearing the name of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenents, and sentiments of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of this Convention this duty shall be performed by the Chairman of the Ex-

ecutive Board, to such as were not fellowshipped during the sessions of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII.—The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of the pastor and one messenger from each church which has paid its annual representation fees in the Convention last assembled. Provided that the officers of this Convention shall be recognized in law or jurisprudence as the Board. The Board shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and interests of this Convention. Seven shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the Convention shall be members of the Board by virtue of their offices. The officers may act as executors for the Board and Convention in case of emergency. The Board shall hold quarterly meetings and call meetings when necessary.

#### ARTICLE IX.-Work of the Board

The Executive Board shall be the legal representative of the Convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend mission fields, appoint missionaries for the Convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, fix their salaries and make provision for the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the Convention. It shall issue orders on the Treasurer of the Convention, made up by the Corresponding Secretary and duly signed by the President. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE X.—Time of Convention

The Convention shall meet Monday after the third Lord's Day in May and adjourn on Friday evening at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition, financial standing and work, the names of the messengers and the contingent fund shall be read.

#### ARTICLE XI.—The Convention in Session

The President, on written request of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board may call the Convention in extra session whenever emrgency arises and the work of the extra session shall have the same legal force as the work of the Convention in annual session, the business to be transacted in the extra session shall be designated in the call by the President.

#### ARTICLE XII.—Non-Interference

This Convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the Churches within bounds, regularly organized and recognized by this body, and in no case nor under any circumstances will this Convention attempt to interefer with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserves the right to deal with the church in so far as its membership affects this body.

#### ARTICLE XIII.—Co-operation With Other Bodies

This Convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the futherance and extension of the Kingdom of Christ and in education; Home and Foreign Missions outside of the State of Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which holds the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE XIV.—Auxiliaries

The auxiliaries to this Convention shall be subject to this Convention

and shall always remain subservient and loyal to the same and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principles of the General Convention, he or she will forfeit his or her office, and the Executive Board will appoint his or her successor and that no resolution nor document passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the Convention or Executive Board. The Recording Secretary of all auxiliaries shall turn over the minutes, records and all letters and other material received at the meeting of the auxiliary of which he or she is Recording Secretary to the Parent Body in fifteen (15) days after the close of the auxiliary meeting.

#### ARTICLE XV.—Amendments

1. This Convention shall plan its program for Kingdom Extension work as follows: Sunday School, B.T.U. Missionary Conventions and Associations throughout the State of Maryland. These shall be composed of local organizations and societies in each church. All of these organizations and their constituents shall operate under the direction and supervision of this, the Parent Body.

2. An effort shall be made to, as far as possible, help weak churches, organize new missions and Sunday schools in communities and places through the support and co-operation of the churches, missions and new Sunday schools organized, and through the support of the larger churches of the State of Maryland where needed, and render whatever assistance that may be possible through the State of Maryland, and shall be one big family in the work of Kingdom Extension.

3. The Associations, weak churches, and the places where missions and Sunday schools are to be organized and located shall be left to the

discretion of the Board of the Convention.

4. In order that these objects may be reached among Baptists in the State of Maryland, a special fund of not less than ten per cent of all money raised by the Convention and its auxiliaries shall be set aside to foster this program.

#### ARTICLE XV.—Amendments and Revisions

All amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing at an annual meeting, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting, being subject to modification in form, but not in character, and shall be adopted only by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting. Amendments to this Constitution may be submitted in writing at any monthly or quarterly meeting of the Board, and shall lie over for consideration for three months, being subject to modification in form but not in character, and shall be adopted by the two-third vote of the members present and voting.

The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the Convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the

same preceeding the election of officers.

The officers of this Convention shall be elected annually by ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the President and the report of the Executive Board, through the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor.

## RULES OF ORDER FOR THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND

1. Every meeting of the Convention or Board shall be opened with prayer and other devotionals.

2. The Minister's Guide Book, by Hiscox, shall be recognized as the standard guide in all parliamentary matters of this Convention and the Board.

3. The President shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise provided for: (a) On enrollment; (b) Finance; (c) On Nomination; (d) New Bodies; (e) Education; (f) State of Country (g) Temperance and Prohibition; (h) Foreign Mission; (i) Home Mission; (j) Weak Churches; (k) Resolutions and all other committees as may be necessary from time to time; a standing committee on budget for the Convention's annual budget.

4. The order of business shall be prepared by a committee appointed for that purpose, subject to ratification or change by the Convention, and shall include the following: The appointment of the following committees: (1) Enrollment of the names of delegates; (2) Report of enrollment and digest of letters from churches and auxiliaries; (3) Reception of delegates from relative bodies and associations; (4) Special committees; (5) Introduction of visitors and fraternal messengers. REPORTS—Enrollment committee; (2) CLASS—Corresponding Secretary, Executive Board; (3) Treasurer; Auditor; (5) Standing Committee; (6) President's Annual Address.

5. The introductory sermon shall be preached the first day of the assembling of the Convention. Other sermons shall be preached, as doctrinal, educational, missionary and such others as in the judgment of the Program Committee may be necessary.



6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, the rules of Order shall be read by the Corresponding Secretary.

 No subject shall be opened for discussion until a motion has been made, seconded and stated by the President.

8. No person shall speak more than twice, nor longer than five minutes on any motion without permission from the President of Body.

- 9. When a motion has been made and seconded, any member opposing its being discussed, the President shall immediately put the question: Shall the question be discussed?—which, if negative, the subject is dismissed.
- 10. If any motion under debate contains two or more propositions, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separtely.
- 11. Every member who wishes to speak on a motion shall rise from his seat and address the President and await his recognition before proceeding, and shall avoid using personalities in debate.
- 12. The election of officers shall take place in the afternoon at the first day's meeting of the Convention, the Chairman of the Executive Board may be elected by the Convention or the Board.
- 13. No member of this Convention shall absent himself without leave or permission of the President.
- 14. Standing Committees: (1) Finance; (2) New Bodies; (3) State of Country; (4) Weak Churches; (5) Foreign Missions; (6) Home Missions; (7) Budget for the Convention year.



#### THE ORGANIZATION


This Convention was organized December 10, 1926, at the Macedonia Baptist Church, Baltimore, Maryland.



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

## PROCEEDINGS

Baltimore Maryland, May 20th, 1947.

## Tuesday Morning 10:00 A. M.

The devotionals were led by Reverend W. W. Payne, Tuke G. Reynolds. The Convention Chorus furnished the music. Mrs. Goldie Green at the Piano. Hymn, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" was sung by the Chorus, Messengers, and Friends. Scripture was read by Rev. W. W. Payne. Prayer was offered by Rev. Luke G. Reynolds. Hymn, "Go preach My gospel saith the Lord" was sung with much enthusiasm. Rev. Reynolds directed the singing.

The Theme for the Devotional Period "The Church's Opportunity In A World Crisis In Evangelism" was ably presented by Rev. W. W. Payne. Rev. Payne expressed appreciation for the privilege of participating on the program. After the opening selection by the Choir, the President presented Rev. J. H. Matthews, Minister of the Church mentioned above to deliver the Sermon. ## HOME MISSION PERIOD

## Rev. V. T. Taylor, Presiding

Rev. V. T. Taylor presented Rev. J. C. Wyatt, of the Southern District. The report made by Rev. Wyatt was accepted with thanks. The following Rurual Pastors were presented and made remarks; Reverends, Lee Stewart, Houston, and J. T. Brooks. Rev. V. T. Taylor, the Chairman of the Home Mission Board made his report. After some comments it was motioned by Dr. W. J. Winston, that the report be adopted. (Carried).

Rev. W. J. Winston presented the following Resolution: "Whereas, there has been so much misunderstanding and continual discussion as to the feasible and propriety as to the tenure of office of President therefore, for the purpose of clarifying and reaching some definite decision or conclusion on the tenure of office of the President of this Convention, I wish to submit this Amendment to Article Four (4), of the Constitution to read thus; The Officers of this Convention shall be a President-three Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Asst. Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Statitician, Auditor and Executive Board, who shall be elected annually; and that the President shall not continue in office more than Four (4) years; he shall not succeed himself more than three (3) consecutive years. Rev. V. T. Williams motioned that, the Amendment to the Constitution offered be adopted. After some discussion a standing vote was taken; 87 votes for; 5 votes against. (Carried.) The Amendment immediately went into effect.

## FOREIGN MISSION PERIOD Rev. D. B. Banks, Presiding

The Chairman, Rev. D. B. Banks, delivered an able address on the importance of supporting the work of Foreign Missions. The speaker also submitted his report on Foreign Missions. (See Report) Rev. H. M. Moore, assistant to Dr. Adams of the Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention, Inc., was presented and spoke. An offering of \$18.30 was lifted for Foreign Missions. Announcements — Benediction.

## FRIDAY MORNING 10 O'Clock

The devotionals was conducted by Reverends B. Thompson, T. B. Scott, and Lee Stewart. After singing Hymn "Thou my everlasting portion" President Williamson thanked the Brethren for conducting the devotionals. Rev. S.mon Williamson presented Rev. J. A. Franklin, who spoke on the Theme "The Church's Opportunity In a World Crisis, In Economic Betterment". The President thanked the speaker for the very fine way he treated the subject.

President Williamson, then, presented Rev. James L. Moore, the Minister of Sharon Baptist Church, who in turn preached the Educational Sermon. Text, Hosea, 6;1; "Come and let us return unto the Loid; for he hath torn, and he will heal us, he hath smitten, and he will bind up." SUBJECT: THE ROAD BACK TO GOD. Watts, of the Maryland Baptist Union to be present, he sent Dr. Berdhezer of the Maryland Baptist Union to represent him. Dr. Berdhezer was presented by Rev. A. J. Payne, Minister of Enon Baptist Church, who addressed the Convention. The address was well received.

Rev. B. F. Jackson, Minister of Fulton Baptist Church, and the President of the Trustee Board of the Baptist Center, made an interesting report. Rev. Geo. A. Crawley motioned the report be adopted. (SEE REPORT). (CARRIED).

Dr. W. J. Winston, the Educational Secretary also made his report. A motion was made to adopt the same. (CARRIED).

Rev. Carey, the Educational Secretary of the Educational Board of the National Baptist Convention, Inc., was presented and spoke in behalf of the National Baptist Theological School at Nashville, Tenn.

The Woman's Department of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland made its report. A motion prevailed that the report be adopted (SEE REPORT).

Report of the Committee on Annual Members, and New Bodies. It was motioned that the report be adopted. (CARRIED). (SEE REPORT).

Rev. M. C. Allen, Minister of Leadenhall Baptist Church, presented Rev. J. M. Raynor, Minister of Concord Baptist Church to preach the MISSIONARY SERMON. Music was furnished by the Choir of the above named Church. SUBJECT: "THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH IN AN INDUSTRIAL AGE." Rev. Raynor thrilled the Convention, and stirred the hearts of his hearers. Mr. President, Delegates and Friends assembled:

Another year has passed swiftly by and we find ourselves again gathered in the Annual Meeting of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland. This is a glorious blessing granted us and we ought to thank God for our spared lives and the joy of meeting again face to face.

As Secretary of the Board of Trustees of our Aged Home for the last ten years, I have endeavored to bring you a report each year containing information that might be interesting about that institution. The money to operate the Home come largely, from the pockets of members of the churches connectel with this convention and I feel you are entitled to a report of our stewardship. You are not only entitled to a report, but have a right to criticize and question the use of this money if you think it has been unwisely used. The Trustees, and especially the officers, have a great responsibility, and those who have been active, take this responsibility seriously. The only compensation these Trustees receive is the consciouness of having rendered a Christian service to old people. This, truly is a work of love, for often those who receive its benefits do not appreciate them. Works of love do not depend upon a show of appreciation. The Master came to serve sinners, but they spat in his face and put on his head a crown of thorns, but he forgave them and completed the work of salvation.

In my report last year I made this statement: "Much is said today about child study and juvenile delinquency. This is fine and too much cannot be done to guide the child, for he has a life to live, but should we not also devote time and study in the interest of old people who have lived. their lives, have made their contributions to the world, and often pass the evening of life in misery because little or no provision has been made for them. Well planned and well supported Old Folks Homes could do much to alleviate this condition." When I made this statement, it came out of my experience in dealing with the old folks in our Home. I did not know that others, far bettter qualified, had given this subject serious consideration, and had developed a science that deals with the study of the problems of old age. The science is called Gerontology, - a big word, I could not even find it in the Standard Dictionary - and there is a society to propagate it. A journal of this society came to the Home during the year and we had a chance to know that at least a movement has been started to study the problem of old age and the best way to treat them. The slogan of this society is - "To add life to years, not just years to life."

Unconscious of any scientific approach to the problem of old age, our Old Folks Home has for over 25 years been trying to add life to the years of those who came within our fold. The spirit that motivated us has been humanitarian and Christian, but we, and similar institutions will welcome the help that science can give to better provide and care for old people.

Personally, I am at the age of retirement, but am staying on the job because I am not sure I shall know what to do with myself if I retire. To sit around and do nothing means slow but sure mental and physical death. Our health depends largley upon keeping ourselves mentally and physically active.

BRO. THOMAS H. HENDERSON: We have a fine example of what I have been trying to say in Bro. Thomas H. Henderson, one of our inmates. Bro. Henderson, I understand is 90 years old. He has been in the Home many years. A finer character you have never met. He has served without pay during his years in the Home as our handy man and gardner. Those who have seen our grounds in summer will testify to their care and beauty. Although he is now broken physically, his mind is clear and ambition strong and he tries to do as he has done through the years. If all of us had the fine spirit of Bro. Henderson, we would add beauty to our lives of those around us, as Bro. Henderson adds beauty to the lawn and grounds of our Old Folks Home.

OUR PRESIDENT, REV. M. W. WILKERSON: I think it was Emerson who said, "The greatest study of mankind is man." This thought leads me to think of our President, Rev. M. W. Wilkerson. If you had been present at the Annual meeting of the Trustee Board, when the officers are elected for the ensuing year, you would have seen a group that were perplexed and befuddled because our president had suggested that he would like to retire and pass the honor over to some one else. Fortunately, this suggestion did not prevail and Rev. Wilkerson is still our president for another year.

Last year has been a hard one in the management of the Home. The inmates are getting older and some are breaking down rapidly in body and mind. There has been much sickness. We lost our efficient matron, Mrs. Louise Palmer due to personal sickness. The problem of help is always present because we cannot pay high wages. The solution of the above mentioned problems and many others fall heavily on the president. Rev. Wilkerson has proven himself unusual in handling these problems. All of us should thank Rev. Wilkerson for the sacrificial service he has given to the Aged Home during the last year.

OUR HELP: We have only two regularly employed persons, a matron and a cook. We have had to employ a day worker for 2 days and sometimes 3 days a week to help with the laundry and cleaning. We were sorry to lose Mrs. Louise Palmer, who proved herself to be a very efficient matron. Illness made her give up the work. Mrs. Alice Banks, our present matron, took over when Mrs. Palmer took sick and has carried on very well. She is a young woman - in fact a young bride, for she married since coming to the Home, - full of energy and willingness to serve the Home. Mrs. Rosa Green, our cook is a good cook and fine Christian lady and we value her services very much, but she has just passed the 70th birthday and we know not how long she will be able to cook for so large a family as we have at the Home.

FOOD: Speaking of cook leads us to think of food, the largest item of expense we have. We thought we had reached a high figure in our report last year, the food item was \$1,762.74. This report shows it to be \$2,897.96 which is \$1,135.22 more than we spent for food the previous year. This seems unbelievable but it is true for we have paid the bills of the butcher, the baker, the fruit, poultry and provision dealers. If we add the cost of all the food donations brought to the Home we would have a much larger food bill. Our Matron and cook try in every way to econimize and hold down the cost of food, but it mounts despite their efforts. The inmates are well fed and should be grateful to the denomination for providing such a place as our Old Folks Home.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE: This Committee, composed of the lady members of the Board and Advisory Board, sponsored several efforts during the year to benefit the Home. The Food Shower in November was the most successful and brought to the Home a well stocked pantry. Our published report gives the churches, organizations and individuals that participated. The effort to upholster the living room furniture was also a success. The sale of "Planks" to rebuild our porch was only partially successful. We need considerably more money than was raised to rebuild our porch which is in bad shape.

The State Department of Health is still on our "neck" demanding that we not only rebuild our porch, which is a hazzard, but that we keep the Home free from rats, mice and vermin of all kinds; that we follow the standards of cleaning and handling food set up by the Health Dept. We are doing the best we can under the cirsumstances, but we know we do not measure up in some particulars. We are still classified as a hospital, but we cannot afford to have a nurse.

BRO. WILLIAM H. LANGLEY: There is one man on our Board that deserves honorable mention because of his unusual loyalty and devotion to the welfare of the Old Folks Home. I refer to Bro. William H. Langley. Bro. Langley rarely ever misses a meeting of the Board. Whenever we are in a hole financially and need quick money Bro. Langley has willingly loaned us what we need. Our financial report shows we paid him back \$925.80 we had borrowed last year. What is more, we would have you know of his generous spirit, that he has loaned us this money without even exacting interest. Long live Bro. Langley and may his tribe increase.

OUR INMATES: In an institution that only takes in persons that are 60 years of age and over it is expected that one by one they will leave us and go to their reward. I have noted, however, that we must have a pretty nice Home for none seem anxious to go. I really believe we contribute to Gerontology and add life to years and also years to life. I believe we give to those in our Home what old people should have - security, freedom from great responsibility, and a degree of ease and comfort.

We now have 15 inmates, 9 women and 6 men. During the year 3 of our family passed away: Sister Mary Purthy and Annie Thompson and Bro. Thomas H. Douglas. We received one new inmate - Bro. Wm. H. Thornton of Union Baptist Church.

OUR TREASURER AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT: When we asked Dr. D. G. Mack, one of the founders of the Home and first President, to give us two Trustees to represent Macedonia Baptist Church, he sent to us Deacon Daniel Ringgold who latter became Treasurer. Bro. Ringgold has proven himself to be a trustworthy and enthusiastic worker for the Home. The financial statement shows that over \$9,000.00 was handled by Bro. Ringgold last year. We have been so fortunate in the men we have selected as Treasurer during the last 10 years, that we have not even required them to be bonded. Some may say this is bad business, but the character of these men have been all the bond we thought necessary.

## DR. SIMON WILLIAMSON, PRESIDENT OF THE CONVENTION

OUR FINAL WORD. With all the progress we have made, my friends, we have not yet arrived, and we must strive harder than ever before to improve upon past performance. There is much needed at the Aged Home and we invite each of you, and especially our leaders to investigate and see what you can do.

The Trustee Board again wishes to thank all who have made any contribution whatsoever to the Home and pray God's richest blessings upon you.

### COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

We, the committee on Education submit the following report: Whereas, education and christian education especially, is essential for training in leadership for the destiny of tomorrow, and, Whereas, to educate one in mind and not in moral is a menace to society and civilization, and,

Whereas, modern education majoring in preparing the brain has left the heart untouched, and thereby, has spent character to make money, and as a result thousands of people, both professed christians and none professed christians, have led their fellowmen to the scaffold of injustice and death and their hands are stained with the blood of the innocent, dripping from murderous fingers, motivated by the wicked hearts of those who have not been touched by the teaching, which is christian education;

We therefore recommend that this convention will urge the pastors and preachers to continue to study to show themselves approved of God, workmen, which need not to be ashamed. That preachers who have not been systematically trained in religious education will take the advantage of every prevailing opportunity to prepare themselves in the field of education —

That the churches and pastors will be asked to establish courses in religious education in the churches, and urge each member thereof to take advantage of the same -

That churches shall be discouraged in ordaining preaches who refuse to make preparation for the ministry and who do not have a charge or have not been called to any definite work.

That we shall recommend all to the Baptist Center and School of Religion and all of the institutions that are held under the state program which seek improvement in Religious Education. That the churches be urged to support the Baptist Center and School of Religion in a larger way, and other educational institutions engaged in christian education.

## ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT OF MARYLAND

MAY 20, 1947

REV. JAS. C. WYATT, Field Missionary

Mr. President, Officers and Members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Md. Ladies and Gentlemen. I am grateful to God for the privilege of bringing to you another Annual report from the Southern District of Md. I count my self happy to give an account of my stewardship of the disrtict of which I serve.

The year has been a busy one on the part of your missionary: I have found much work to do, some of it has been done, some of it is yet to be done. and with God's help more of it will be done.

Only the true Missionary is acquianted with Mental, Moral, and Econo-

a true Missionary possesses the love, the courage, the faith, and the patience to be instrumntal in bringing about a change in lives so burdened under to be instrumental in bringing about a change in lives so burdened under the press.

I thank God that I have some of this love; some of faith, some of the courage, some of the patience to be of service on the Jerico Road of life. Yes may I say humbly yet truthfully during this year my efforts supported by God's power have helped and inspired some weak churches, restored harmony and love in some almost broken homes, and brough men ,women and children to Christ, who have found a place in the Cnurch Program and playing their part well. May I also say humbly but truthfully that my spiritual advice and council has been sought and appreciated by Men, Women and Youths of many faiths denominations: on each and every occassion I have given the best that is with in me. And I have watched for and seen good resulst there from.

I do not lay claim to a complete job in the Southern Disrtict of Md. There are fields that have not been reached there are lives that have not been touched and there are almost countless souls that have not been saved, But I am grateful to report that the doors of many of our churches stands ajar ready and happy to receive your Missionary as their Missionary: to give him a chance and to do their best in their humble way to cooperate with this program. Brethern lift your eyes and see! there are visionable indications that your vision that began under the far sighted and courageous leadership Dr. Geo. A. Crawley and continued under the dynamic and renowned leader: Dr. Simon Williamson, your efforts has been as bread cast upon the water, seeds sown in good soil bringing forth fruit some sixty some thirty, some a hundred folds.

Take a brief retrospect with me: let us look back to our Annual Session in 1942 and call the roll of our Churches in the Southern District who were giving no more and most cases lest thas \$10 annually to the work of our convention: If records are true and memory serves me right you would only find the names of Brooks of Bladenburg, Morgan of Annapolis, Franklin, Lakeland, and Luckett Sylvestia. In the month of July 1943 Rev. J. T. Brooks of the Southern District gave my name to Dr. Geo. A. Crawley to work for this convention in the Southern District of Md. I was given the job. Brothern Brooks and Crawley was working in the interest of me: For I was burden I was pressed, I was discouraged, I was at my breaking point; and in my distress I had poured out my soul to God. Lord I want to work send me some where! As lighting flashes out of a clear sky, the answer came; saying your name has been given to me to work for this convention come to Baltimore July 29, 1943.

Let us look now at the present: our annual session at this Beautiful Faith Baptist Church, May 1947 and call the roll again of the Churches in the Southern District of Md. Those who will gladly answer, saying "here am I send me". are Brooks of Bladenburg, Morgan of Annapolis, Franklin, Lakeland, Taylor, Tokoma Park, Jones-Fairmount Hgts. Stewart, Cedar Hgts. Turner-Capitol View, Bowman of Annapolis, Houston of Glenarden, Luckett of Sylvestia, Wheeler of Antioch, and Wyatt of Highland Park. The Southerns with its auxiliaries, The Missionary Auxiliary and the Young People Department. Each and all making their contribution to the Great work and unique program of our convention. Brethern your efforts have not lost, your labors have not been in vain.

This Convention has made it possible for me to pastor my little Church. It was in 1945 that I went there as the Missionary to save that which all most lost at that time there were eight members and one active, a com-

munity a hot bed of desention and strife children on the road to destruction yes my friends Highland Park was a Nazarene city, May 1946 I was called as their Pastor - There is very little straw in Highland but some way some how we are making brick. 75 members are on our Church roll. 68 children are enrolled in our church school, and 90 percent of our youths support our church program. If the convention had done nothing more than saved these irresponsible children from destruction and ruin its laborers in the Southern District would of not been invain.

During this quarter I have done little preaching out side of my own Church. I was forced at the request of my Doctor to slow down. However I have kept in touch with their programs I visited the most of them during their afternoon and night and week activities. The churches visited during this quarter are, Community Cedar Hghts, First Fairmount Hghts, Sylvestia, First - Glenarden, St. Paul Bladenburg, The Southern District Association, The Missionary Auxiliary The Young Peoples Department Meeting. All meetings of the Home Mission Board of which I am secretary. There are only four known Ministers or Pastors in my District that I have not talked with about this work and our convention work during this quarter. The most of our work is in very fine shape in our District.

The First Baptist of Fairmount Hgts. is making a desperate struggle trying to close in their new building. The needs there is great the Pastor Rev. J. R. Jones health is failing fast and he just is not able to carry on, however the Officers and assistant Rev. McDowell is doing their best to keep up the interest and to carry on the work. This cause is certainly worthy of all the help that can be given at this time, and have located one New Church in our District and one Baptist Mission. The Abeseania Baptist in Deanwood Hgts. Md. Pastored by Rev. Aaron McCombs is at the present time in a house, but already have their plans to build, and the Baptist Mission is in Charles Co. on the border line Prince Geo. Co. Pastored Rev. Bowen of the Baptist Seminary.

During the year I was instrumental in placing one of our Ministers of the Southern District at the First Baptist, Washington, Va. and I might also state that there is no vacant Churches in our District and we must look in other sections for work for our deserving Ministers as I have stated preached only three sermons out side of my field this quarter because of my almost physical break down, there fore the money coming from preaching is very small.

I received \$4.50 from our association the Anitoch Baptist in Deanwood in March, and \$26.10 from Ebenzer here in Baltimore. I came here at the request of my good friend Dr. Jordan and received a very warm reception at both services. In the afternoon I attended the communion services of our President. I must say here that this was the best organized communion service I have ever attended I was given the chance to talk about the Lords table. I talked 8 minutes and was given by the brothern after the services about \$1.25. To be exact they gave me \$10. Making the total for the day \$31.10 my expenses for the quarter during this quarter of which I am only including repairs on my car and rail road fair \$76. My transportation for this week since I have to commute from Washington to Baltimore each day on account of our Young People and Missionaries who look to me for many things will be \$8.00.

I feel that you should know that I no longer am employed in secular occupation. My full time now belongs to God and I shall untingtly give it to him. I have promised to give it to him and he has promised to supply all my needs. I shall furnish the will and know He will make a way. For the next two weeks after this session I am talking to the Young People in their Churches each night until I have gotten around. I shall then wait for the spirit to teach me the next step to take.

Dr. Williamson, Officers and Members of this great convention I am grateful to you for the unselfish support you have given me, and us in our work in our District. I have enjoyed my work under you. Now I have attempted to get you to see your feeble beginning in the Southern District in Past. I have called your attention to the progress of the present: but now look with me through the hazy mist of the future; I see it! ye! I see your vision of the past a reality, in the future I see the Southern District locking arms of strength and power with Baltimore and all of Md. Baptist with their hands in Gods hand moving forward at his will and his command

A God to Glorify
A never Dying soul to save,
And fitted for the Sky."
"To serve my Present age,
His calling to fullfill.
And may in all my power engage

# REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF OF MARYLAND

Baltimore, Maryland May 21st 1947

To the President, Officers and Members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland and Auxiliaries. Greetings:

Another year has passed into the archives of eternity. Duties we have done or neglected are now pass history. But we will face this new Convention year with Hope and courage (useing the words of Byron.) Who conquers me, shall find a stuborn foe. (Unquote The Home Mission Board of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland wish to give an account of our Stewardship.

A meeting of the board was called by the chairman, to meet at the Baptist Center after the close of our annual session in May 1946. At this meeting, the board elected Rev. J. C. Wyatt to be the Secretary, and Rev. A. J. Payne as Treasurer. On the recommendation of the chairman, The board agreed to pay all board members transportation who live out of Baltimore.

At the first quarterly meeting of the United Baptist Missionary Convention, held at the Second Baptist Church, Annapolis, Maryland July 1946. At this meeting the treasurer of the Convention Rev. V. T. Williams on the order of the Convention, turned over to the treasurer of the board Rev. A. J. Payne a check for \$150.00. The treasurer also paid to Rev. A. J. Payne \$60.10 money sent up to the quarterly meeting by churches for the Home Mission Board.

At the conclusion of the financial drive Nov. 23, 1946. The executive board allocated \$700.00 to the Home Mission Board to be used in the work of the board. \$928.20 was deposited in the Calvert Bank of Baltimore by our treasurer Rev. Payne to be checked out as needed.

At a regular meeting of the board held at the Baptist Center in December, the board let it be known, it was now in a position to receive applications from members churches, and others, and that all applications would receive careful consideration; in order as received.

The President Rev. Simon Williamson met the board at this meeting. In his address to the board. He said, he wanted us to help every worthy cause that came to our attention, because he wanted to see something tangible done by the board this year in the field of missions.

The board meet again on January 20th 1947 at the Baptist Center, for business. An application received from the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church of Cambridge Maryland, came before the board for consideration. The application dated Jan. 3rd. 1947 asked for a donation to help towards the rebuilding of the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church. After discussing the merrits of the request, the board appropriated \$100.00 to help in the rebuilding of the said church. A letter was received from the Pastor and Trustees of the Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, thanking the board for the check. The Pastor Rev. Asbury Jones stated in his letter that the check had been deposited in the bank in the name of the pastor and two trustees, to be used only for the rebuilding of the church.

Rev. J. C. Wyatt our field missionary for the Southerns District spoke of the condition of the First Baptist Church Fairmount Heights Maryland, Pastored by the Rev. J. R. Jones. He said the church was in a struggle, trying to finish the construction of their new church. After hearing the statement coming from Rev. Wyatt, I told Rev. Wyatt to have Rev. Jones send an application to the board, and I felt sure the board would give it due consideration.

The board meet again on March 10th. at the Baptist Center. At this meeting, three Applications was brought before the board for consideration.

One from the First Baptist Church Fairmount Heights Maryland, Harlem Square Baptist Church, and the Union Baptist Church Easton Maryland. during the discussion of these applications, Rev. Payne asked the question, if these churches had been properly investigated as to the authenticity of these requests. Rev. Luke Reynolds our Field Executive Secretary stated that he had visited the Harlem Square Baptist Church and knew of the work being done by Rev. G. W. Harris and his people. And he highly endorse any aid rendered this church. Rev. Reynolds also stated that he had visited the Union Baptist Church at Easton Maryland He recomended that we render some help to this church who is trying to build a parsonage, but he said there were some things he wanted to clear up before further aid was given. On these endorsements the board Appropriated \$50.00 for the First Baptist Church Fairmount Heights Maryland, \$50.00 for the Harlem Square Baptist Church Baltimore, and \$25.00 for the Union Baptist Church Easton Maryland. Letters of thanks were received from the three churches.

A letter was received by Rev. G. A. Crawley from Mr. Moses Fletcher Trustee of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church Cambridge Maryland dated April 27th. 1947, The letter was given to me by Rev. Crawley May 5th. The letter stated that the Rev. Asbury Jones pastor of the church was going to take the \$100.00 donated to the church by the Home Mission Board for rebuilding, and use it to purchase a lot. After reading the letter I called Rev. Reynolds on the phone and asked him to go to Cambridge and see what the trouble was, and report his finding Rev. Reynolds went to Cambridge Sat. May 10th. He saw and talked with Rev. Jones also Mr. Fletcher the trustee and got a statement from both. Being unable to ascertain all the facts He will make further investigations as to the condition of the church. After talking with President Williamson about this matter we decided to refer it to the

executive board of the convention for their consideration.

At this date we have taken care of all applications that have come to our board. And I can truthfuly say that we have tried to do our best to carry on the work of the Home Mission Board.

Brethren, do you think the giving of money to aid churches to build or rebuild, is the proper objective of the home missions. I think brethren the spirit of missions should go deeper than that. The building of christian character is of more value to the world, that the building of fine churches and cathedrals. If we build christian character in our people today, we will have more honest workers with which to build the churches of tomorrow.

For the board to engage in raising money to help churches build and rebuild, would be setting a precedent. If we help one church we would be obligated to help all who apply if found worthy, of help. And that would take more money than the board would be able to raise, unless the churches increase their donations to the board.

Brethren: think this over. There are churches in our state, that are closed, for the lack of money to pay a preacher or pastor. There are men and women young and old in our out lying communities who are waiting for the gospel. The Baptist Center is training ministers. What are we going to do with them? shall we let them stagnate sitting around our churches? or shall we send them out to these churches who have no pastors, and help to support them until they build up the work.

This should be the objective of Home Missions. Brethren think this over, shall we build churches or build character.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

To our honored President, Dr. Simon Williamson: Distinguished Officers; Fellow Messengers; Members and Friends, of this Great Convention.

It is with Faith in God--Confidence in you--Humbleness of Spirit-Love for the Work--Gratitude, and Appreciation, for all of my fellow Brethren, that I Greet you to-day.

I am reminded of the words of our Lord, the Captain of our Salvation, and Teacher of Righteousness, when He said to His disciples; "Whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister; And whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant." "Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many."

Greatness is a word often used, and people's ideas of it differ much.

some regard it as consisting in Wealth, Social, and Political position, Mental and Physical Strength. Christ places it in service, springing from love in the heart. Therefore, true greatness is to be measured by service. That is being useful. No man lives or dies to himself.

Florence Nightingale moved other women most when she her-self went to minister on battle fields. The greater men are in intellect and culture, the more imperative it is that they become leaders and helpers. If any man has the power to do good and refuses, he stands before Christ guilty, of failing to do his duty. Those who thus labor for the good of their fellow-men are the greatest.

Since the 17th, day of September, 1946, as well as in times past; The United Baptist Missionary Convention, of Maryland, through the Field Executive Secretary, has endeavored as never before to be USEFUL. Not only to the Churches which make up this Convention, but it has worked for the common good of all the people in the state.

Since September, this Convention, through the Field Executive Secretary, has travelled a little over three thousand miles in the state. Not on an excursion or sight seeing tour, but on business for the King. Where-ever the Convention has gone, whether it was received with open hearts or not, it has carried the good-tidings of Brotherly Love, Peace, and Good-Will to all man-kind.

The Convention, through the Field Executive Secretary, has not as yet covered the entire state in so little a time, nor accomplished what it has in mind, but if life lasts, and I am permitted, before another Annual session I hope to report the whole coverage of the state.

I wish to thank Dr. Simon Williamson, and Rev. Ward D. Yerby, Rev. V. T. Williams, and the Chairman of the Home Mission Board, and the Officers of this Convention for their unstinted support, and Co-operation, and encouragement. I also wish to thank the Pastors of the various churches, and the members, and friends who invited me to serve in the various fields, and who gave me an opportunity to say a word about the work of our Convention, and who supported me with their prayers and finance.

The Rural in the state of Maryland as I have observed it needs to but lifted to a higher plain. In Religion, Worship, Doctrine, efficency, along all lines. This is true about some of the sections in the City. Not that the Rural is the worse place in this world, but so far as an adequate religious program is concerned, the Rural is neglected.

The Rural is laboring under many handicaps. Some I shall mention. (I). Lack of more trained and consecrated workers, both in the church, and in the pulpit. Strong men, Morally, Spiritually, and Intelectually are needed ni the Rural. The Methodists, the Catholics, and other Denominations see the wisdom of placing srong men in the Rural, and supporting them while there

The Counties in Maryland are seeing to it that the rural is provided with adequate Teachers, and School facilities, inorder to lift the rural to a higher degree of intelligence, that the people in the Communities might be lifted to a higher plain, and the Communities made better. What is the Baptist Denomination doing in the rural to give its constituents an adequate program.

I would not dare say, that at such a time as this, this Convention is in a position to put a school of religion, such as we have on the corner of Mosher and McCulloh Sts; manned with such an illustrious Dean, and Faculity, as we have there; but it does seem we can at least take some steps to hold County Wide Institutes at some stated time each year; and in connection with this, and the School o Religion to have a correspondant Department, where those who see the need of preparing themselves for the work might do so.

Another handicap the rural is laboring under is: LACK OF PROPER TRANSPORTATION.

I think if the Convention owned a Station Wagon, or a Bus to carly trained workers from time to time, to, and from the rural would not be a bad idea. This is done in Virginia, and in North Carolina.

March 17. I visited Cambridge Md. I met Rev. L. Bayneum, an Undertaker, and also pastor. Rev. Bayneum's Church is a member of the Delaware Association. I invited him to cast his lot with us.

I endeavored to get in touch with Rev. Asbury Jones, the pastor of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, but he was at work. When I returned home I wrote him. Several weeks later he answered.

Coming back from Cambridge I visited Rev. Stamper, the pastor of the church there. He reports, the work is progressing. They are in need of Hymn Books. Badges were left.

March 18. wrote, and mailed letters to Rev's. Jones, Bayneum, and Franklin.

March 20. I visited the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, Harve DeGrace, Rev. M. C. Phillips, Minister. I spoke concerning Baptist Day, and left some Badges.

March 20. I visited Memorial Baptist Church, Westminister, Rev. Moss, Minister. It was Woman's Day. With the splendid co-operation of the Methodist church, and friends, the sum of \$200.00 was realized.

March 26. I visited Carver Heights, in St. Mary's County. There a praying Band was organized. 14 persons were present, among them were Baptist's, Methodists, and Catholics. These folk seem to be sincere, and very anxious to start a Baptist church.

March 27. In company with Dr. Simon Williamson, and Rev. M. C. Philips, I visited Community Baptist Church, Joppa, Md. Rev. E. Scott, Minister. The President delivered a very fine sermon, to the delight of all present. Rev. Scott has built a new church edifice, he needs our prayers, and help.

March 29. I served the Gospel Tabernacle Baptist church. This was Palm Sunday. There were two very fine services. The Officers are doing a nice job.

April 5. I again visited Carver Heights. Looked at a piece of land the prayer meeting band hope to purchase to build a church.

April 6. Easter Sunday. Preached morning and night at the Psalmist Baptist Church, to a full house. Through the efforts of Mrs. Goldie Minters, and others, more than \$2.000 were realized. This church is progressig in a very fine way.

April 13. Served at the Leadenhall Baptist Church, morning and afternoon. At the morning service there were two conversions, and three women joined the church on christian experience.

April 17. Typed and mailed Twenty-five letters to the choirs of our city, inviting them to attend a rehearsal preparatory to our Convention.

April 18. I again made a visit to Carver Heights, in St. Mary's County. There I met a committee from the prayer meeting Band to look the land over, and to decide upon the purchase price.

April 20. I preached for Rev. V. T. Taylor, the pastor of the First Baptist church Takoma Park. The service was quite inspiring. Rev. Taylor has the work well in hand.

On the evening of the same date, I visited the Mt. Moriah Baptist church, Rev. W. L. Green, Minister. It was Men's Day. The men laid on the table more than \$900. Rev. Green is doing a fine job. He has a live church.

April 25. I attended the First Baptist church, Balto', Rev. V. T. Williams, Minister. The Church was in Revivial. Due to the sudden illness of Rev. Pope, of N. J. whom the pastor had invited to conduct the meeting, ltev. Scott of the Faith Baptist church preached. Rev. E. T. Groves, and others assisted in the meeting. Though the illness of Rev. Pope was a shock to all, the meeting was a success.

April 27. 11 A. M., I preached for Rev. E. H. Eliott the pastor of Commuity Baptist church, Patapsco Park. Rev. Elhott is doing a nice job. He needs to be commended.

- 3 P. M., on the same date I attended the Memorial service of the late Rev. Junius Gray, at the Psalmist Baptist church. Rev. N. H. Toyer, pastor of Mt. Olive, Towson, delivered the sermon.
- 8 P. M., on the same date I worshiped with the First Baptist church Guildford, Md., Rev. C. Jackson, Minister. The service was well attended. The S. S., is in excellent shape. The building is clean and comfortable.

April 30. Twenty-five other letters were sent to the choirs, inviting them to join the Convention Chorus.

May 1. I preached for Nev. M. C. Phillips, of Harve DeGrace. We had a fine service there.

May 4. I preached to an over-flow audience at the Faith Baptist Church, Dr. S. Williamson, minister. Dr. Williamson is having the church edifice beautified. I am sure you appreciate the work. There were three conversions, and five other persons joined the church. Faith is doing things in a fine way.

At 3 P. M., on the same date I accompanied Dr. Williamson to the Gospel Tabernacle Baptist Church. There I witnessed a very fine and impressive Ordaination Service. Two Deacons were ordained. Our President preached a very instructive sermon.

May 7. Rehearsal, Convention Chorus.

May 10. I agained visited Cambridge, Md. I had a long talk with Rev. Jones, the pastor of Mt. Sinai Baptist Church. In my next report you will hear further details.

On this same day. I visited Rev. Stamper, at Easton, The work there is progressing.

May 11. I delivered the Mother's Day Sermon to a large and appreciative audience at the Gospel Tabernacle Baptist Church.

On the evening o the same date I administed the Ordinance of Baptism, at the above mentioned church.

May 12. I visited Rev. King, the pastor of First Baptist Church, Back River. In the short time Rev. King has served in this field he has accomplished much. He needs our hearty co-operation.

May 14. The Convention chorus held it last rehearsal. Fountain and Faith Baptist Church choirs were the only choirs to respond. These choirs responded in large numbers.

May 13. I attended a rally at the Faith Baptist Church, Rev. S. Williamson, Pastor. In less than One Hour and Forty minutes the Auxilaries, and Captains reported in cash \$977.79. Dr. Williamson is indeed a great Pastor, Builder, Preacher, and Organizer. A unique system in Worship, the Reception of Members, and the taking of the Offering has been inaugurated in Faith. The interior of the building is beautifully finished.

May 17. I talked with Rev. V. V. K. Stokes, the Pastor of Trinity Baptist Church. He informed me that on Sunday, May the 11th, services were held in the lecture room of the church, located on the corner of Druid Hill, and McMechen St. city. Rev. Stokes and the members of Trinity needs to be commended, and some financial help given by this Convention, for they have done a fine job. The building is far from being completed, they

are in need of finance to complete the work.

May 17. I received a long distance call from Bro. Ivory Moore, leader of the Praying Band in Carver Heights, Md., telling me he has the deed to the land purchased by that little group, and he is ready to deed the land to the Convention, providing the Convention will erect a small building on the site where they can worship. They are very desirous of having a Baptist Church in St. Mary's County. I hope this Convention will agree to do this. It can be at a very small cost. This is a very worthy, and needed cause.

Since January 30th, present year, there has been won to Christ, by the preaching, and the persuasion of this your humble servant Five souls; 13 has been added to the church.

At 8 P. M., on the same date I worshipped with the National Baptist Church, Rev. Saunders, Minister. Though traveling was some what difficult, the attendance was good. Rev. Saunders has the work well in hand. If things continue to go well, it wont be very long before Rev. Saunders will need a larger building.

March 8. I investigated a condition at Cherry Hill. I reported the matter to Dr. Williamson.

On the same date I distributed Badges for Baptist Day in Annapolis.

March 9. I visited the First Baptist Church, Guilford; Rev. C. Jackson, Minister. The pastor was glad to see some one from the Convention. He stated for nearly eleven years, since Dr. Crawley, and two Women visited him, I was the first to bring him and the church, the glad tidings of the Convention. Since that time I have kept in close contact with the Pastor, both by letter and personal visits. The S. S., and church are in fine shape.

On the same date I visited First Baptist Church, Takoma Park, Rev. V. T. Williams, Minister. The pastor preached an excellent Sermon. I said a few words about our work, and Baptist Day. I also left some Badges. The work is in excellent shape.

March 9. I worshipped with the Berean Baptist Church, Rev. Brown minister. The pastor informed me that in 1946, from the weekly activities without the selling of tickets, of any kind; the church raised \$2,364.84. This is a fact. I saw the Bank Book. The building has been renovated, and every thing is spic, span and clean. The church is debt free. Plans are now on for a new building.

March 11. I visited Mt. Sinai Baptist Church, Rev. J. R. Butler, Minister. Rev. H. E. Smith delivered a very fine sermon. The church was celebrating the Forty-third Anniversary. Rev. Butler is doing a fine job.

March 12. I attended the Quarterly Meeting of the Southern District Association, Fairmount Heights, Md., Rev. Lee Stewart, Pres. The brethren received me very cordially. I said a word about our work, and left some Badges.

March 16. I worshipped with the Second Baptist Church, Annapolis, Rev. N. Morgan, Minister. At Three P. M., I worshipped with the First Baptist Church, Earleigh Heights, Rev. N. Morgan, Minister. Services at both churches were excellent.

8 P. M. on the same date, I visited Pleasant Hope Baptist Church, Govans, Rev. Paul Harris, Minister. The service was well attended. The pastor reports the work is in fine shape, Badges were left.

Now I come to the work I have done. Since I made my last report in the Quarterly Meeting of the Convention, held at the Fulton Baptist Church, Rev. B. F. Jackson, Minister I made the following visits.

3 P. M., Jan. 30th, 1947. I visited the Perkins Square Baptist Church, Rev. W. D. Yerby, Minister. It was a season of Revival. Some Two Hundred and Fifty children were present. Rev. Yerby had a gentleman to show a moving Picture, entitle; A GREATER POWER. From the expressions of many of the children present, as well as adults, all were greatly benefited. During that week, so I am imformed by the pastor, the attendance was good, and several of the children gave their hearts to Jesus. Dr. Yerby is doing a nice job at Perkins Square.

On that same evening Rev. G. M. Harris, asked me to stop by his church and collect some money for the Convention. The money was turned over to Rev. Yerby. The reciept is in the hands of Rev. Harris.

February 2. I served morning and night GOSPEL TABERNACLE. The services were largely attended, and quite inspirational. 2 persons joined.

February 5. I attended a Committee Meeting at the home of Rev. H. E. Smith, Preparatory for Baptist Day.

February 9. I served morning and night at the Leadenhall Baptist Church, Dr. M. C. Allen, Minister. The services were well attended. I person joined the church. The work is in excellent shape.

February 12. I attended another meeting of the Committee on Baptist Day, at the Fountain Baptist Church.

February 16. I Worshiped with the Galilee Baptist Church, Dundalk, Rev. Nathaniel Mondie, Minister. Rev. Mondie is doing excellent work in this field; the church is well organized, and is in a fine spiritual condition. The service was well attended.

On the same after-noon I served Communion at the Gospel Tabernacle. The weather was quite enclement, snow was on the ground; but it was an excellent service.

February 23. I distributed Badges for Baptist Day.

February 24. the same.

February 25. The same.

March 2. 11 A. M., I preached at the Gospel Tabernacle. The ground was still covered with snow, but it was a fine service. 2 persons joined the church.

# Constitution of The United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland ARTICLE I—Name

This organization shall be known as the UNITED BAPTIST MISSION-ARY CONVENTION of the STATE OF MARYLAND.

ARTICLE II-Objects

The objects of the Convention shall be to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ: the promotion of His Kingdom by united efforts on the part of the churches composing it; to unify the church's doctrine and Christian polity; to promote home and foreign missions by establishing and supporting religious work in communities where needed and give unstinted support toward education in Maryland, as well as supporting it elsewhere; to collect, classify and publish statistic of the churches; to promote prosperity among the churches; to encourage brotherly love and to co-operate with other regular bodies doing similar work in our State, our country and the world.

ARTICLE III-Membership

The membership shall be composed of regular Baptist Churches and life members and associations within the bounds of the state of Maryland. Any regulra organized Baptist Church may become a member upon the payment of five (\$5.00) dollars and shall be entitled to the pastor and two (2) messengers, and one additional messenger for each five dollars (\$5.00); provided that the church shall be allowed more than fifteen (15) messengers—any such membership shall continue upon the payment of five dollars (\$5.00) annually. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in Maryland may become a life member upon the payment of fifteen dollars (\$15.00).

All applicants must be elected by a majority vote of the Convention. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in the State may become an associate members upon the payment of one dollar (\$1.00) and shall be entitled to the discussion, but not to vote—an associate members may become an annual member and enjoy all the privileges of the convention by the payment of five dollars (\$5.00) annually; any association in good and regular standing may become a member upon the payment or ten dollars (\$10.00) and continue payment of ten dollars (\$10.00) annually.

SECTION 2-Discipline of Membership

Any church or member belonging to this convention may be dropped from membership of the Convention, who may hold to and practice doctrines which are contrary, unbaptistic, and departing from the tenets, rules and laws governing the body or by the non-payment of the membership fees herein descibed, but in all cases, the church or the life member shall be given a fair and impartial trial; and if found guilty shall be suspended or expelled, thereby forfeiting all rights and privileges of the Convention.

The officers of this Convention shall be a president, three vice presidents, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, statistician and auditor, and Executive Board, who shall be elected annually and shall continue in office until their successors have been duly elected and installed

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers

The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of this body, maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the Constitution, preserve order, sign orders on the Treasurer and to have general oversight of the work of the Convention.

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence, resignation, illness or death.

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair, impartial and correct record of the transactions of the Convention in a book provided for that purpose, and the entire enrollment of the membership; superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes, for which he shall receive such salary as shall be designated by the Convention or Executive Board. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary and in his absence perform all duties of the Recording Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed as an assistant.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with this body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the State; collect funds from the churches for the

Convention; receive reports from the missionary and missionaries, as well as moneys collected or raised by them; paying the same over to the Treasurer, and taking receipts for same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the Convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the Executive Board. All letters, packages, etc. received by him officially shall be the property of the Convention. He shall be the Secretary of the Executive Board and shall draw drafts on the Treasurer and shall present a written report to the Board at each of its quarterly meetings. He shall report the doings of the Executive Board in writing at each annual session of the Convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all the funds of the Convention and provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution selected by the Convention or Executive Board and pay all orders of the Convention properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Board. He shall render a quarterly statement of the Board and an annual report to the Convention. His books shall be kept for inspection by any of the proper officers of the Convention. The Treasurer shal give such security or bond for his proper conduct in office and the safeguarding of the funds of the Convention as the body or Executive Board may require.

The Statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history and the condition of the Baptists in this state, as to heir domestic, economic, prosperity and resources numerical, spiritual and financial strength, and present the same at each annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI-Convention in Session

ne work of the Convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by the messengers and pastors, said mesengers holding membership in this State which are connected with the Convention shall be members of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the church composing the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII-How Churches Can Become Members

Churches desiring to become members of this Convention shall make application by letters bearing the name of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenents, and sentiments of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of this Convention this duty shall be performed by the Chairman of the Executive Board, to such as were not followshipped during the sessions of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII-The Executive Board

Executive Board shall consist of the Pastor and one messengers from each church which has paid its annal representation fees in the Convention last assembled. Provided that the officers of this Convention shall be recognized in law or jurisprudence as the Board. The Board shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and interests of this Convention. Seven shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the Convention shall be members of the Board by virtue of their offices. The officers may act as executors for the Board and Convention in case of emergency. The Board shall hold quarterly meetings and call meetings when necessary.

#### ARTICLE IX-Work of the Board

The Executive Board shall be the legal representative of the Convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend missions fields, appoint missionaries for the Convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, fix their salaries and make provision for the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the Convention. It shall issue orders on the Treasurer of the Convention, made up by the Corresponding Secretary and duly signed by the President. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the Convention.

#### ARTICIE X-Time of Convention

The Convention shall meet Monday after the third Lord's Day in May

and adjourn on Friday evening at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition, finaniial standing and work, the names of the messengers and the contingent fund shall be read.

#### ARTICLE XI-The Convention in Session

The President, on written request of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board may call the Convention in extra session whenever emergency arises and the work of the extra shall have the same legal force as the work of the Convention in annual session, the business to be transacted in the extra session shall be designated in the call by the President.

#### ARTICLE XII-Non-Interference

This Convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the Churches within bounds, regularly organized and recognized by this body and in no case nor under and circumstances will this Convention attempt to interfere with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserve the right to deal with the church insofar as its membership affects this body.

#### ARTICLE XIII-Co-operation With Other Bodies

This Convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance and extension of the Kingdom of Christ and in education; Home and Foreign Missions outside of the State of Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which holds the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE XIV—Auxiliaries

The auxiliaries to this Convention shall be subject to this Convention and shall always remain subservient and loyal to the same and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principles of the General Convention, he are she will forfeit his or her office, and the Executive Board will appoint his or her successor and that no resolution or document passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the Convention or Executive Board. The Recording Secretary of all auxiliaries shall turn over the minutes, records and all letters and other material received at the meeting of the auxiliary of which he or she is Recording Secretary to the Parent Body in fifteen (15) days after the close of the auxiliary meeting.

#### ARTICLE XV—Amendments

- This Convention shall plan its program for Kingdom Extension work as follows: Sunday School, B. T. U., Missionary Conventions and Associations throughout the state of Maryland. These shall be composed of local organizations and societies in each church. All of these organizations and their constituents shall operate under the direction and supervision of this, the Parent Body.
- 2. An effort shall be made to, as far as possible, help weak churches, organize new missions and Sunday schools in communities and places through the support and co-operation of the churches, missions and new Sunday schools organized, and through the support of the larger churches of the State of Maryland where needed, and render whatever assistance that may be possible through the State of Maryland, and shall be one big family in the work of Kingdom Extension.
- 3. The Associations, weak churches, and the places where missions and Sunday schools are to be organized and located shall be left to the discretion of the Board of the Convention.
- 4. In order that these objects may be reached among Baptists in the State of Maryland, a special fund of not less than ten per cent of all money raised by the Convention and its auxiliaries shall be set aside to foster this program.

#### Rules of Order for the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland ARTICLE XV—Amendments and Revisions

All amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing at an annual meeting, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting, being subject to modification in form, but not in character, and shall be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting. Amendments to this Constitution may be submitted in writing at any monthly or quarterly meeting of the Board, and shall lie over for consideration for three months, being subject to modification in form but not in character, and shall be adopted by the two-third vote of the members present and voting.

The auditor shall audit the accounts of the Convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the same preceding the electio of officers.

The officers of this Convention shall be elected annually ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the President and the report of the Executive Board, through the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor.

- Every meeting of the Convention or Board shall be opened with prayer and other devotionals.
- The Minister's Guide Book, by Hiscox, shall be recognized as the standard guide in all parliamentary matters of this Convention and the Board.
- 3. The President shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise provided for: (a) On Enrollment; (b) Finance; (c) On Nomination; (d) New Bodies; (e) Education; (f) State of Country; (g) Temperance and Prohibition; (h) Foreign Mission; (i) Home Mission; (j) Weak Churches; (k) Resolution and all other committees as may be necessary from time to time; a standing committee on budget for the Convention's annual budget.
- 4. The order of business shall be prepared by a committee appointed for that purpose, subject to ratification or change by the Convention, and shall include the following: The appointment of the following committees: (1) Enrollment of the names of delegates; (2) Report of enrollment and digest of letters from churches and auxiliaries; (3) Reception of delegates from relative bodies and associates; (4) Special committees; (5) Introduction of visitors and fraternal messengers. REPORTS—Enrollment Committee; (2) CLASS—Corresponding Secretary, Executive Board; (3) Treasurer; Auditor; (5) Standing Committee; (6) President's Annual Address.
- 5. The introductory sermon shall be preached the first day of the assemblof the Convention. Other sermons shall be preached, as doctrinal, educational, missionary and such others as in the judgement of the Program Committee. may be necessary.
- 6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, the rules of Order shall be read by the Corresponding Secretary.
- 7. No subject shall be opened for discussion until a motion has been made, seconded and stated by the President.
- 8. No person shall speak more than twice, nor longer than five minutes on anl motion without permission from the President of the Body.
- 9. When a motion has been made and seconded, any member opposing its being discussed, the President shall immediately put the question: Shall the question be discussed—which, if negative, the subject is dismissed.
- 10. If any motion under debate contains two or more propositions, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
- 11. Every member who wishes to speak on a motion shall rise from his seat and address the president and await his recognition before proceeding, and shall avoid using personalities in debate.
- 12. The election of officers shall taken place in the afternoon at the first day's meeting of the Convention, the Chairman of the Executive Board ma be elected by the Convention or the Board.
- 13. No member of this Convention shall absent himself without leave or permission of the president.
- 14. Standing Committees: (1) Finance; (2) New Bodies; (3) State of Country: (4) Weak Churches: (5) Foreign Missions; (6) Home Missions; (7) Budget for the Convention year.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEE BOARD OF THE BAPTIST CENTER AND SCHOOL OF RELIGION

Mr. President, Officers and Members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland and Auxiliaries.

The Trustee Board of the Baptist Center submits the following:

The Baptist Center was bought June 30th, 1942 for the sum of \$3475.00 subject to an annual Ground Rent of \$300.00 or value on ground of \$5000.00. Ground was not purchased at the time of building. Five hundred dollars was paid down on the building at the day of sale at Public Auction. Balance of \$2975.00 was paid in two installments — the first of January 1943; the last installment April 1943 and a deed for the property was executed to the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland and recorded free of debt.

The mortgage on said property was burned November 1943 at the Enon Baptist Church.

In September 1945 a loan was made and a mortgage of \$8500.00 was executed to the Calvert Bank for the purchase of first, the ground of the building for \$5000.00 and \$3500.00 to furnish the Center Building, Totaling \$8500.00. This amount \$8500.00 was reduced May 1, 1946 to \$5707.87 which amount was paid in full Dec. 3, 1946

#### REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

Mr. President, Offices and Members and Messengers of the United Missionary Baptist Convention of Maryland:

Having been appointed Financial Director for the year of 1946-1947, I feel that it is imperative that I should give account of my stewardship, and at the same time thank you for the confidence you imposed in me in appointing me to an office of honor and trust. When I started out, I had in mind some words in the "Model Prayer" which Christ taught his apostles "Thy Kingdom Come;" And I decided that "the thy Kingdom Come" must not remain merely my prayer, it must become my program. That is the travail of soul which has been upon the church and the convention in the late years as it has been realizing the responsibility which attended the transformation of a genuine prayer into an announced Campaign. I mean a Financial Campaign. We have prayed our prayer into a convistion, that has been manifestedly witnessed in the finance we have raised and the peace which went with it. We realized that men who prayed as Jesus taught them to pray could not keep that prayer on bended knee in mere waiting, but must arise to the full assumption of whatever the coming of an answer would entail. So after we finished praying, we got up and went to work.,

We had in mind that integrity wins its way everywhere, and what we strove to do was, to see that the forces of the convention were not divided by establishing a hostile campaign, into classes, because we did not intend for any walls to be built against the ambition of any one nor any barrier put in the way of any member performing the highest and best task in the gift of the convention. In view of this we met and outlined a program which meant one for all and all for one: For I am not one of those who would take a laurel from the brow of the President or any good worker or a jewel from the crown of this achievement; so to carry out the profour districts.

Abating none of our former interests, we moved out and up to new fields: and plans and steadily increased our time talent and financial giving. We found out that team work was indispensable to the creation and profitable use of our opportunity to do a bigger and better job. We knew that with increase and efficiency of more workers, the greater of success would be; and we went about organizing for that purpose.

How this was done may be summed up in a few words: The Financial Director met the Key men from each section of the City, and we formed a working compact for financial raising. The Pastors from the several district met at Enon Baptist Church of which Dr. A. J. Payne is the honored pastor; and there we divided the City into four districts, the President, Dr. Simon Williamson to proceed with what we thought best and that he would stand behind us. So we selected our co-chairman. The Western District, Dr. A. J. Payne; the Southwestern District, Rev. Dr. J. H. Matthews; the Eastern District, Rev. Eugene T. Grove, and the Northern District. Rev. Edward T. Jordan. I need not take the time to tell you the success which came out of this united effort; because the Baptists of Maryland had never laid on the table at any time Twelve thousand dollars. Dr. Williamson, the President was so modest, that he did not preside at this big affair but left it to the Director and his co-worker. That was the biggest night financially that Maryland has ever experienced on the part of baptists.

The quarterly meetings have been well attended, and the Director has striven to perform his duty in the best manner he knew how.

I am happy to report, that the work has been done by your director and his co-directors in an honest and straight-torward manner. We know that dishonesty eats the heart of man, destroys his social sympathies, dwarfs the generous affections, weakens self-respect and makes him a hindrance to the advancement of society. The convention was founded on trust. Without confidence in one another, we could not live in social relations a single day. We should relapse into barbarism, strife and mutual destruction. # THE FIRST ANNUAL MESSAGE OF REV. DR. SIMON WILLIAMSON, President of

# THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND

To the Vice President, Officers and Messengers to the 21st Annual Meeting of our great convention. Ladies and Gentlemen:

One year ago, by your mandates and without any solicitation on my part, you made me your choice as leader, for which I am glad to thank you, and to assure you, that I have striven to do my best. It is understood, that when any one enters a new position, that it naturally takes some time for one to adjust himself to the task, and to arrange a program which could be workable, both for himself and the members of the convention, and one which the people can fit into so that all will feel themselves a part of the convention. This I have aimed to do, I trust to the satisfaction of the members, and earnestly do I trust that the officers and members have found some degree of satisfaction in my effort and what I have done to bring about team work in our convention. I believe that the result has

been fully justified.

We do not claim that everything has been perfectly done, but I do claim that much progress has been made and much has been wisely accomplished. Let me first of all thank the officers who have worked faithfully and consistently with me during the years, and assure them of my most sincere thanks and deepest appreciation, as I believe that officers should be honest and sincere and that they should either cooperate with the President or quit. There has been peace and harmony in the rank and file of the members and workers. When I say workers, I mean those who have supported heartily, and who have not withheld their support morally, spiritually and financially. My deepest gratitude is extended to the members and friends who have cooperated with me in the work during this conventional year. I realize fully, that no man liveth to himself. No man ought to be satisfied with a good which is peculiar to himself, from which mankind as a whole are excluded. No man can be so satisfied. Ignorance, prejudice, selfishness, pride or anything else should blind men to this common good, and prevent them from making the efforts and sacrifices necessary to realize it. But the man or woman who deliberately prefer to see the convention of which he or she is a part, go to destruction or fail would be ungrateful to God and a terror to good works.

I also fully understand and realize, that the convention can not dictate to the churches, since the churches make conventions and no conventions make churches, yet there is such a strong feeling of Christian ties and the spirit of oneness, that Churches organize themselves into conventions for broader fellowship. A closer relationship, a more convival enjoyment and mutual helpfulness, and for the extension of Home and Foreign Mission, education, and for the relief and oversight of the aged, and the stimulation of a greater interest in the churches and individual religious life. The Church must at all time heed the voice of Christ by sending the Gospel into all the world, by training men and women, and the youth in leadership service and Christ-like endeavors, and to relieve the aged and distressed wherever it can, and to work harmonious together. The Church must, above all else be the house of refuge, God's Sanctuary on Earth, a Citadel of absolute integrity, with the spirit of forgiveness and sanctified Asylum for a benighted and persecuted world. I think that we have a past as a denomination, which we may ever glory, and a future which seems bright, clear and clean, if we can keep cool heads, ready minds, purified hearts, clear intellect, and let brotherly love be our watch-word and abiding faith as our guide, and Christ as our perfect standard. For the Church must at all times be a Voice Crying in the Wilderness, and making straight the path of usefulness and helpful-

ness, and giving encouragement to the less fortunate. It must be the spirit of one for all and all for one. The Church is the fellowship of

the servant of God.

This is a day bright with hopes if you would be doers of things and not dreamers of things, if you would each strive to enlarge your mental and spiritual vision and keep pace with the restless changing age, if you would strive to lift your fellow up above the common level, then join hands now with the Warriors already scarred in battle and with your churches. Let your loins be girded and your lamps be trimmed and burning for future march of victory. Facing these conditions I exhaut you officers and members first to be couragroups and ditions I exhort you officers and members, first, to be courageous and determined in your chosen fields of endeavor. This is a world where the generations would distinguish men for Courage and honesty in the line of duty. Generations worship at the shrine, that marks the courage of the Hero, and perpetuate the memory in Monuments of Stone and Iron. This is no age for coward; you must think your own thoughts, and acts in the line of rightousness. This is the age of building Causes and Institutions and not building men. A man must prove himself by his mental, moral, spiritual and economic worth. History and experience would make Courage sit as King upon ten thousand battle fields; Courage like MacArthur takes the place of a hundred thousand men; Courage makes Liberty glad; gives Equality the words so it can speak with Power; Courage puts his hand upon the arm of Truth and walks with Truth through the Fire; Courage rests his head upon the Lap of Faith and sings his Son from Dungeons, from prisons and from caves; Courage girds himself with strength to open paths through Seas and Rivers; he climbs the mountains and from the topmost peak Courage looks down upon perils through which he has passed and smiles back upon starvation, disease and death as they laid in the valley below.

Courage and Faith walk along the unbeaten tracks to seek new fields; Courage and Faith defy the burning torrid sun, and laugh at winter's chilling breeze; Courage and Faith run through troops and leap over walls; and in the darkest, longest midnight Courage and Faith lean upon their staff to wait for dawn tomorrow; Courage and Faith speak, Convention, when they say, "We will not retreat, we will not equivocate and we will be heard." A convention conditioned like this convention in our State, then their leaders must have Courage and Faith to the full. Twelve months of progressive and aggressive toil and labor, and forethought have brought us to a stage un-

paralleled in the history of this convention.

No man dreams himself into character and success but hammers out one for himself, so each puts his shoulder to the wheel, progressive Baptists; and up to his task, never leave it, until he can write upon that task "It is finished".

My Friends, my exhortation, now to each of you is to be a man. Allow no man to praise you because you can serve his purpose; if praise must come, then accept it; but accept it on the terms of your merit and achievements, and because you have met the challenge as a Man; and not to advance some individuals rather than the cause

of Christ and future glory of your convention.

Big with destiny, was the hour that gave birth to the expression "All men are created free and equal". Behold the new Japan drinking the influence of this expression like some new wine; she stands today upon her barren reef; flushed with new Manhood, but in the hands of her concurrence Commany the month of her concurrence. hands of her conquerors; Germany the proud mistress of learning and arts, stands today in mourning, with her leaders sleeping beneath the sod, and her past glory gone up in smoke and ashes, and all the rest of the nations, that thought that they were God's privileged people are now almost crawling in the dust. Members of this Convention, it rests with each of you to show yourself a loyal member, a man and a Gone forever is the privilege incident to Birth and class; Gone forever is that institution Special Privilege entrenched behind old bulwarks of greedy lust and power; Gone forever is the privilege incident to the relation of the Master to the Slave; and the Leader to

the Followers; that privilege incident to the man who has little, and the man who has much; that age is doomed and dead. qualifications this convention needs is the man with the vision, moral integrity, honesty in his dealing, fair in his leadership; truthful and dependable, and a willingness to follow as well as to lead. We need to have some introspect as well as retrospect and prospect. We need to see our own heart and what we are now doing and are willing to do, and then we are better prepared to talk about the past and look forward to the future.

Attending Conventions and Board Meetings

In the month of June less than a month after my election to the Presidency of our convention, I attended the New England Baptist Missionary Convention which met with the Leadenhall Baptist Church and delivered the welcome address on behalf of our convention. I attended the National Baptist Convention at Atlanta, Ga., in the month of September, there we met one of the greatest gatherings in the history of that Convention. In the mouth of October I attended the Afro-American Baptist Convention in New Jersey. I also attended the Board meeting of the National Partial Convention in tended the Board meeting of the National Baptist Convention in Cleveland, Ohio, in the month of February. I carried greetings to each of these bodies from our great convention.

The Mortgage Liquidation of Our Center

When I assumed the office of President, I found that we had a mortgage debt of more than six thousand dollars, but I am happy to say that the mortgage has been cancelled. Your mortgage burning a couple of years ago, was only a half mortgage burning. I am saying this so that you may know that some bills had to be met, that you may not have been acquainted with. You are sure enough out of debt financially now. We praise God for this. Oil heat has been installed in the Maryland Baptist Center, and things have gone on in a fine manner. For this we thank God and the Dean and the manage-ment which is the Trustee Board.

Our Quarterly Meetings

We are safe in saying that our quarterly meetings have been some of the finest and best in the history of the convention. They have been well attended and the spirit has run high in these meetings have been well attended and the spirit has run high in these meetings and the finance has been surprisingly good. We held our first quarterly meeting at Annapolis, Md., the day was some what enclement, yet the delegation was good, and a fine program carried out. The Second meeting was held with Shiloh Baptist Church, Turner Station, of which Rev. Dr. D. B. Banks, is the very busy pastor, the third was held with Fulton Baptist Church of which the hustling and eminent, Rev. Dr. B. F. Jackson is the honored pastor. In these meetings we had the opportunity of discussing things for the benefit of the Convention and projecting our fall program and our Baptist Day, which I will mention later. These meetings were inspirational and informative. Music was led at these meetings by Rev. Luke G. Reynolds, our most gracious, sterling and hustling, efficient and Reynolds, our most gracious, sterling and hustling, efficient and stimulating Field Executive Secretary.

The Auxiliaries Departments of Our Convention
The Women's Auxiliary led by Mrs. Ellen G. Wilkerson did a most commendable work during the past year. In our financial campaign the women were asked to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, and they did it without dissenting voice. This auxiliary must continue its good work, for the world is calling every day for consecrated women who are willing to lay their lives upon the alter for the cause of Christ and the uplift of humanity. To the President, officers and members of this organization, I extend my sincere thanks, and here they greater things are thanks. and hope that greater things may be done in the future. The battle cry is for fearless and consecrated women who have courage enough to think for themselves, and to make their decision on the grave questions now confronting them, what they need is vigilant action and sober thinking and nerve to contend for the things which they believe to be right, just and true. No one person anywhere has the last word on any question of public import. Go forward women and wave the banner high.

The Young People's Department under the leadership of Mrs. Bertha C. Winston deserves great consideration. We asked her department to raise two hundred dollars in the drive, and the work was done in an admirable manner. When you remember, that she leads the children who are not wage earners but school children, and must look to their parents for money, is a thing worth complimenting. Mrs. Winston knows what to do in her job, and fits in wherever she is assigned. The finest and most exciting and acceptable scene that I witnessed at the last session of the National Baptist Convention, was the Demonstration by the Young People. The Camp Demonstration and Pageant by the Young People's Department on the Campus of Moorehouse College, was the greatest scene that I have had the pleasure to see of young folks in my life. It shows the ability of Mrs. Winston for leadership. She is the Eastern Director of Young People's Department of the National Baptist Convention as well as Director of the Young People of Maryland. I am urging that we give this department a better support. Any who withhold help from this department which means the future hope of the denomination is not true at heart nor real in spirit. God bless her and her fine and loyal counsello'rs and associates in the fine work you are doing for our young people.

The Sunday School and B. T. U. Convention that is led by that fine Scholar, writer and friend to men and women, Dr. Miles W. Connor comes in for great honor and appreciation. Not in the history of Maryland that I have ever witnessed such a fine record of the convention as I have in the past year. Dr. Connor has on an intensive program, and he is the man of the hour for the work which he is doing. We requested the Sunday School and B. T. U. Convention for six hundred dollars in our campaign, and they over did themselves. If my memory serves me rightly, he presented eight hundred and fifty dollars by going the second mile as according to the rule laid down by Christ. Dr. Connor needs to be congratulated for the fine work he is doing. He has a fine corps of officers, who believe in him and who follow him gladly. His new book from the press recently should be purchased and read by all Sunday School and B. T. U. workers. It is entitled "Leadership in Religious Education". Dr. Connor unlike many educators has given and is giving his time and talent to develop his race and denomination in leadership service. I have read it with pleasure and great satisfaction. To Dr. Connor

and his good workers goes my congratulations.

#### The Different Board of Our Convention

The Home Mission under the leadership of Rev. V. T. Taylor, its very able and most proficient Chairman has at last realized the full significance of that position, because the money that is designated for that Board is turned over to the Chairman, and he with his secretary lookout for the interests of the Churches seeking aid, thus giving the Board an opportunity to do something in reality rather than just in name

The educational interest of the Baptist Center and Schools outside of the State are receiving due consideration. Please be liberal in your giving for Education.

Rev. Matthew W. Wilkerson, President of Maryland Baptist Home for the Aged, has always been an untiring worker. Great improvement is to be done from time to time by the Chairman and his Board. He must have our unstinted support, because the old People are our problems and God wants us to see that they are not forsaken nor go begging bread. You will hear a full report of the working of the Home by the Chairman and Secretary later. We have turned to the Home this past year all monies that were designated to it and more besides, and that is what is to be done all the time. I am pleading that there be a more liberal contribution on the part of the churches to this cause.

Maryland Baptist Center and School of Religion

The Rev. Dr. Benjamin Franklin Jackson is the very efficient and capable Chairman of the Trustee Board of this Institution, and he has been at all times on the job. He has done a most commendable task and deserves the appreciation of the convention and all lovers of Education. He has with the Board set up a fine banking system, and all the bills are paid by checks, and no one person can withdraw any of the finances without being authorized by the proper banking committee. Everything that is in his power and judgment to be done has been carried as far as he and the Board have had power to do. The work is in fine condition financially and otherwise. The Board has been very diligent in its efforts to keep the institution going in a manner befitting to its name and that of the promoters and the con-vention in general. You will hear more from the Board in this session.

Words cannot express our deepest thanks to Rev. Dennis Barrow, Financial Director and his Co-Chairman, Revs. A. J. Payne, J. H. Matthews, E. T. Jordan and Eugene T. Grove for the fine and most successful financial rally ever held by the Baptists in the State of Maryland. These chairmen united and arranged a financial campaign that excelled any that I have seen in this State. And more money was realized than has been in any rally that the Baptists have ever launched in this State. When you can organize and line up your forces like that with a couple of months notice that more than fourteen thousand dollars can be realized, the convention is getting somewhere.

Never have I been more proud than I was Sunday, March 30th, when the great host of Baptists marched through the streets of the City and assembled in the Armory celebrating the 131st Anniversary of the Beginning of the Baptist as an organized Body in Maryland. This was the biggest demonstration that has ever been staged by the Baptist in Maryland. It demonstrated our strength and for what we stand, and our ability to do things with numbers and intellect. The program was carried in the most unique form, and the addresses were up to the standard, and Dr. Mordecai W. Johnson, President of Howard University was guest speaker. Dr. W. J. Winston stated well the occasion to the delight of all present, and Dr. A. J. Payne in most fitting and timely words presented Dr. Johnson who delivered one of the greatest addresses in the history of his career, followed by Rev. Dr. Hiram E. There are those obsessed with the idea, that fine clothes make fine men and women, the teacher in the school house must insist that Dives dressed up in fine linen and purple, discarding Right Living and Right Thinking, finally "lifted up his eyes in hell".

May I remind you, that every work of God has a purpose; and everything a destiny; no man lives for naught; the man without a purpose is already dead, his shroud is ready; his place is in the cemetery. Beat no back retreat but press forward with faith in God and hope in the final triumph of this race of ours, and contend for what is just, honest and pure. Love one another, be sober minded with purity of heart, and remember now and forever, "That the Just Shall Live by Faith".

Baptists have always refused to be guided by tradition and human authority, arm chair advice, but have settled conclusions on the basis of the scriptures. Hence, we study and cultivate the fine art of thinking.

There are many angles to this subject we shall discuss it further from two classes of people—one class who thinks, and one class who does not think.

During the vears that have passed, there were two conventions. The Maryland Cooperative Convention and the Colored Convention. This was a thought provoking situation, and through concerted christian thinking these groups dissolved and today, we have the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland. If you reflect over the program and work of our United Baptist Missionary Convention, you will agree with the artist Mrs. Henrietta Miller "It Just didn't Happen". It came by the continuity of christian thinking. Through these twenty years of thinking, there stands a monument to Baptist and to the man that led us there, that shall last through the age. If we continue to walk upright, we will succeed and make progress.

Group thinking is stronger than individual thinking. The committee on Public Relations, constituting, Northern Baptist, Southern

Baptist and the National Baptist Conventions, representing approximately eleven million Baptists pooled their strength to speak on "Religious Liberty", and other relative questions. This produces power.

Poor Thinking

It is some what pathetic to realize just how little real thinking many of us do. Many of us are content to take the easy way, to imitate others, to accept customs and habits. Thinking effectively is an art. Goldsmith says that, "Those who think must govern those that do not". Many people think little and poorly because they are not willing to pay the price. Basing an argument on prejudice—thinking a thing must be true because he wants it to be true, is poor thinking. Consequences of poor thinking are many-ignorance, prejudice, false ideas, narrowness, superficiality, dependence on others. Yet, there is little excuse for people of normal minds to be poor thinkers.

Sound Thinking

By sound thinking we mean thinking that has faced a problem squarely; that has taken into account all the available facts, that has employed reasoning without prejudice, that has reached conclusions upon the basis of tested experience. Sound thinking has these characteristics; open mindedness, fairness and reliability. The highest test of good thinking is that it squares with the thinking of Jesus, is in His spirit, and seeks the ends which he Himself sought.

Sound thinking will give us correct ideas about leadership and develop the correct type of fellowship. It will help us to select a leader that will serve and not exploit. Listen to the words of Jesus— "Ye know that they that are accounted to rule over the gentiles exercise lordship over them; and their great ones exercise authority upon them". "But so shall it not be among you: but whosoever will be great among you shall be your minister, and whosoever of you will be the chiefest shall be servant of all". "For even the son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister and to give His life a ransom for many". (Mark 10:42-45).

Finally, the time has come when we must inject more thought into

our thinking. We must re-think our thinking. We need specialized leaders and more definite methods of procedure. The haphazard hit or miss method of mediocre minds will never produce the maximum of results in the supreme effort to win the world for Christ. The powers of the intellect, the forces of the brain, plus growth in knowledge through study, is the correct formula for efficiency in the service of

Christ.

The Apostle Paul writes in the fourth chapter of Phillipians, 8th verse, "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; If there be any virtue, If there be any praise, Think on these things."





# CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY. CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND

#### ARTICLE I. - NAME

This organization shall be known as the UNITED BAPTIST MISSION-ARY CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND.

#### ARTICLE II - OBJECTS

The objects of the Convention shall be to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ; the promotion of this kingdom by united efforts on the part of the churches composing it; to unify the church's doctrine and Christian policy; to promote home and foreign missions by establishing and supporting religious work to communities where needed, and give unstinted support toward education in Maryland, as well as supporting it elsewhere; collect, classify and publish statistice of the churches; to promote prosperity among the churches; to encourage brotherly love and co-operate heartily with other regular bodies doing similar work in our State, our country and the world

#### ARTICLE III. - MEMBERSHIP

The membership shall be composed of regular Baptist Churches, life members, and associations within the bounds of the State of Maryland. Any regular Baptist Church may become a member upon the payment of ten (\$10.00) dollars, and shall be entitled to Pastor and two (2) messengers—five (\$5.00) dollars for each additional messenger.

All applications must be elected by a majority vote of the Convention. Any Baptist in good and regular standing, and residing in the State, may become an associate member upon the payment of one (\$1.00) dollar and shall be entitled to the discussion, but not to vote—an associate member may become an annual member and enjoy all the privileges of the Convention by the payment of five (\$5.00) dollars annually; any association in good and regular standing may become a member upon the payment of ten (\$10.00) dollars annually.

#### SECTION 2.—DISCIPLINE OF MEMBERSHIP

Any church or member belonging to this Convention may be dropped from membership of the Convention, who may hold to and practice doctrines which are contrary, unbaptistic, and departing from the tenets, rules and laws governing the body, or by the non-payment of the membership fees herein described, but in all cases, the church or the life member shall be given a fair and impartial trial; and if found guilty shall be suspended or expelled, thereby forfeiting all rights and privileges of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE IV.-OFFICERS

The officers of the Convention shall be a president, three vice presidents, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, correponding secretary, treasurer, statistician and auditor and Executive Board, who shall be elected annually and shall continue in office until their successors have been duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of this body, maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the Constitution, preserve order, sign orders on the Treasurer and to have general oversight of the work of the Convention.

The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his absence, resignation, illness or death.

The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair, impartial and correct record of the transactions of the Convention in a book provided for that purpose and the entire enrollment of the membership; superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes, for which he shall receive a salary as shall be designated by the Convention or Executive Board. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary, and in his absence, perform all duties of the Recording Secretary. He shall receive compensation for whatever work performed as an assistance.

The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on the correspondence with the churches connected with the body and with other similar bodies doing work in and out of the State; collect funds from the churches for the Convention, receive reports from the missionary and missionaries, as well as monies collected or raised by them, paying the same over to the Treasurer, and taking receipt for same. All communications from churches and auxiliaries must be made to him when the Convention is not in session and he shall transmit the same to the Executive Board. All letters, packages, etc., received by him officially shall be the property of the Convention. He shall be the Secretary of the Executive Board and shall draw drafts on the Treasurer and shall present a written report to the Board at each of its quarterly meetings. He shall report the doings of the Executive Board in writing at each annual session of the convention. He shall receive a salary for the full performance of his duties.

The Treasurer shall receive all the funds of the Convention and provide for their safekeeping in a banking institution selected by the Convention or Executive Board and pay all orders to the Convention properly drawn by the Corresponding Secretary and signed by the President and the Chairman of the Executive Board. He shall render a quarterly statement of the Board and an annual report to the Convention. His books shall be kept for inspection by any of the proper officers of the Convention. The Treasurer shall give such security or cond for his proper conduct in office and the safeguarding of the funds of the Convention as the body or Executive Board may require.

The Statistician shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respectdomestic, economic, prosperity and resources, numerical, spiritual and ing the history and the condition of the Baptists in this State, as to their financial strength, and present the same at each annual meeting.

### ARTICLE VI.—Convention in Session

The work of the Convention when in session shall be carried on and conducted by the Messengers and pastors said messengers holding membership in the churches in this State which are connected with the Convention shall be members of this body and shall have the rights and privileges as messengers from the church composing the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII .- How Churches Can Become Members

Churches desiring to become members of this Convention shall make application by letter bearing the name of the church or churches, containing a declaration of their tenents, and sentiments of doctrine, faith and adherence to our laws, rules, practices, fellowship and mutual cooperation by extending to them the hand of fellowship. In the interim of

this Convention this duty shall be performed by the Chairman of the Executive Board, to such as were not fellowshipped during the sessions of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII .- The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of the pastor and one messenger from each church which has paid its annual representation fees in the Convention last assembled. Provided that the officers of the Convention shall be recognized in law or jurisprudence as the Board. The Boards shall use all necessary means to accomplish the objects and interests of this Convention. Seven shall constitute a quorum to transact business. The officers of the Convention shall be members of the Board by virtue of their offices. The officers may act as executors for the Board and Convention in case of emergency. The Board shall hold quarterly meetings and call meetings when necessary.

#### ARTICLE IX .-- Work of the Board

The Executive Board shall be the legal representative of the Convention in the absence of that body and shall designate its own time and place of meeting, superintend mission fields, appoint missionaries for the Convention, assign and direct them in their field in which they are to labor, fix their salaries and make provision for the payment of the same. It shall do this in the absence of the convention. It shall issue orders on the Treasurer of the Convention, make up by the Corresponding Secretary and duly signed by the President. The work of the Board shall be subject to the inspection and approbation of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE X.—Time of Convention

The Convention shall meet Monday after the third Lord's Day in May and adjourn on Friday evening at a place previously selected; when letters sent by the churches embodying their statistical information of their religious condition, financial standing and work, the names of the messengers and the contingent fund shall be read.

#### ARTICLE XI.—The Convention in Session

The President, on writaen request of two-thirds of the members of the Executive Board may call the Convention in extra session whenever emergency arises and the work of the extra session shall have the same legal force as the work of the Convention in annual session, the business to be transacted in extra session shall be designated in the call by the President.

#### ARTICLE XII.—Non-Interference

This Convention not being an ecclesiastical body will hold sacred the independence and the New Testament as giving the integrity of the Churches within bounds, regularly organized and recognized by this body, and in no case nor under any circumstances will this Convention attempt to interfere with the internal affairs of any church connected with this Convention. It only reserves the right to deal with the church in so far as its membership affects this body.

#### ARTICLE XIII.—Co-operation With Other Bodies

This Convention shall co-operate with other bodies in the furtherance and extension of the Kingdom of Christ and in education; Home and Foreign Missions outside of the State of Maryland and the work carried on by its constituency which holds the same religious views and doctrines and especially the Maryland Union Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE XIV.—Auxiliaries

The Auxiliaries to this Convention shall be subject to this Convention and shall always remain subservient and loyal to the same and should any official of the auxiliaries refuse to carry out the principles of the General Convention, he or she will forfeit his or her office, and the Executive Board will appoint his or her successor and that no resolution nor document passed by an auxiliary will be considered final or legal until acted upon by the Convention or Exerutive Board. The Recording Secretary of all auxiliaries shall turn over the minutes, records and all letters and other material received at the meeting of the auxiliary of which he or she is Recording Secretary to the Parent Body in fifteen (15) days after the close of the auxiliary meeting.

#### ARTICLE XV .- Amendments

- 1. This Convention shall plan its program for Kingdom Extension work as follows: Sunday School, B.T.U. Missionary Conventions and Associations throughout the State of Maryland. These shall be composed of local organizations and societies in each church. All of these organizations and their constituents shall operate under the direction and supervision of this, the Parent Body.
- 2. An effort shall be made to, as far as possible, help weak churches, organize new missions and Sunday schools in communities and places through the support and co-operation of the churches, missions and new Sunday schools organized, and through the support of the larger churches in the State of Maryland where needed, and render whatever assistance that may be possible through the State of Maryland, and shall be one big family in the work of Kingdom Extension.
- 3. The Associations, weak churches, and the places where missions and Sunday schools are to be organized and located shall be left to the discretion of the Board of the Convention.
- 4. In order that these objects may be reached among Baptists in the State of Maryland, a special fund of not less than ten per cent of all money raised by the Convention and its auxiliaries shall be set aside to foster this program.

#### ARTICLE XVI.—Amendments and Revisions

All amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing at an annual meeting, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting, being subject to modification in form, but not in character, and shall be adopted only by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting. Amendments to this Constitution may be submitted in writing at any monthly or quarterly meeting of the Board, and shall lie over for consideration for three months, being subject to modification in form but not in character, and shall be adopted by the two-third vote of the members present and voting.

The Auditor shall audit the accounts of the Convention and all auxiliaries working under it as to financial accuracy of these organizations and the general financial standing and property holdings and report the same preceding the election of officers.

The officers of this Convention shall be elected annually by ballot or otherwise; the election to follow the annual address of the President and the report of the Executive Board, through the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor.

# Rules of Order for the United Baptist Missionary Convention of the State of Maryland

- The Ministers' Guide Book by Hiscox, shall be recognized as the standard order for devotionals.
- 2. The Ministers' Guide Book, by Hiscox, shall be recognized as the standard guide in all parliamentary matters of this convention and the Board.
- 3. The President shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise provided for: (a) On Enrollment; (b) Finance; (c) On Nomination; (d) New Bodies; (e) Education (f) State of Country (g) Temperance and Prohibition; (h) Foreign Mission; (i) Home Mission; (j) Weak Churches; (k) Resolutions and all other committees as may be necessary from time to time a standing committee on budget for the Convention's annual budget.
- 4. The order of business shall be prepared by a committee appointed for that purpose, subject to ratification or change by the Convention, and shall include the following: The appointment of the following committees: (1) Enrollment of the names of delegates; (2) Report of enrollment and digest of letters from churches and auxiliaries; (3) Reception of delegates from relative bodies and associations; (4) Special committees; (5) Introduction of visitors and fraternal messengers. REPORTS—Enrollment committee; (2) CLASS—Corresponding Secretary, Executive Board; (3) Treasurer; (4) Auditor; (5) Standing Committee (6) President's Annual Address.
- 5. The introductory sermon shall be preached the first day of the assembling of the Convention. Other sermons shall be preached, as doctrinal, educational, missionary and such others as in the judgment of the Program Committee, may be necessary.
- 5. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, the rules of Order shall be read by the Corresponding Secretary.
- 7. No subject shall be opened for discussion until a motion has been made, seconded and stated by the President.
- 3. No person shall speak more than twice, nor longer than five minutes on any motion without permission from the President of Body.
- 9. When a motion has been made and seconded, any member opposing its being discussed, the President shall immediately put the question:
  Shall the question be discussed?—which, if negative, the subject is dismissed.
- 10. If any motion under debate contains two or more propositions, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
- 31. Every member who wishes to speak on a motion shall rise from his seat and address the President and await his recognition before proceeding, and shall avoid using personalities in debate.
- 12. The election of officers shall take place in the afternoon at the first day's meeting of the Convention, the Chairman of the Executive Board may be elected by the Convention or the Board.
- 13. No member of this Convention shall absent himself without leave or permission of the President.
- Standing Committees: (1) Finance (2) New Bodies; (3) State of Country; (4) Weak Churches; (5) Foreign Missions; (6) Home Missions (7) Budget for the Convention year.

### HISTORICAL SKETCH

The United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland was organized December 10, 1926. PLACE: Macedonia Baptist Church, Rev. Daniel G. Mack, pastor. The Co-operative Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland and the Colored Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland, after prayerful and due consideration of the need of the Baptist of Maryland to unify under one head all the interests of the Baptist Family in our State and unite the forces of our Denomination in Maryland for the good of the Cause of Jesus Christ in our State, and the Denomination, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world; the two Conventions agreed to dissolve and unite under a new name: THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND.

### FORMER PRESIDENTS OF THE UNITED BAPTIST MISSIONARY CONVENTION OF MARYLAND

At our last Session, much discussion was rampant concerning uniting the Independent Colored Baptist Convention with the United Baptist Missionary Convention — corralling the Baptist Churches throughout the State in one united effort in the program of kingdom building. But to our sad disappointment, this too has "gone with the wind".

May we pause here in silent tribute as we note during our conventional year the passing of the great national head of the Baptist of the nation, the Masterly Dr. D. V. Jamison who piloted the Baptist Ship of State successfully for twelve (12) or more years. But, thanks to God that before his passing another master leader had been selected and had assumed the responsibilty in the person of Dr. J. H. Jackson, Pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church, Chicago, Illinois. Those of us who were privileged to hear him last evening can truthfully say that no mistake was made when we stayed up until 4 o'clock in the morning in Miami, Florida, electing him as our President.

With the gracious assistance of the Women's Convention and Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Convention, the Baptist Center and School of Religion under the direction of Dean Matthews is a credit to the Baptists of Maryland. It would do your souls good to take your visiting friends, when they come to town, to see this monument to Baptists. A very enthusiastic group of young students and a very faithful faculty are fostering a program of Religious Education, —the like of which cannot be duplicated in any other state of our National Convention. ## AFTERNOON SESSION - TUESDAY, MAY 18, 1954

Devotionals were conducted by Reverends R. C. Williams and Peter Jennings.

## REVEREND DENNIS BARROW, Presiding

In very befitting words Dr. Barrow thanked the brethren for conducting the devotions. Dr. Barrow then invited Reverend J. Logan Kearse, A.B., pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church to the rostrum, who in turn spoke on the theme: "The Christian Hope for a Hopeless World—Through Evangelism".

Music—Mrs. Florence Copeland at the piano. In well chosen words Reverend M. W. Wilkerson, pastor of Zion: Baptist Church, presented

Dr. Kearse. After brief remarks Reverend Kearse proceeded to speak on the topic mentioned above. Points of emphasis: 1). Wherever hope exists there can be no hopelessness; 2). Jesus offers hope in a hopeless world through evangelism; 3). God seems to be saying today His church must be enthusiastic; 4). It is tragic our churches are not "singing churches". The message was very informative and inspiring. Music—"O How I Love Jesus."

Vice President Barrow thanked Dr. Kearse, after which he called for the reading of the morning journal. The same was read and corrections noted. A motion prevailed to adopt the minutes.

The presiding officer then invited Reverend J. Stanmore, Moderator of the Southern District Association to the rostrum. In well chosen words Reverend M. W. Wilkerson presented Dr. J. T. Boddie, the illustrious pastor of New Shiloh Baptist Church, and president of our State Convention. In appreciation for the services of our president, the Convention gave Dr. Boddie a rousing ovation. In addition, a fine group of women from New Shiloh Baptist Church presented Reverend and Mrs. Boddie with a beautiful basket of flowers.

In well chosen words Dr. Boddie thanked Reverend Wilkerson for his encouraging words, and the women of Shiloh for the lovely flowers. Mrs. Boddie also make brief remarks.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Tuesday, May 18, 1954

Brother Vice President, Officers, Members and Friends assembled:

According to invitation and our acceptance, we were due to be holding this annual session at the historic First Baptist Church, Rev. V. T. Williams, Pastor; but because of the demolition of buildings in that area and proposed plans for rebuilding, the church was in a state of uncertainty. Because of this, adequate preparation could not be made to properly entertain the Convention; therefore, in the emergency, this church, Shiloh, accepted this annual meeting.

Beginning on October 13th, 1902, the late Dr. W. W. Allen, founder and pastor of this church, with two members, set in motion an institution that was to increase numerically to over five thousand during his life time. He laid a foundation for her spiritual fervor, her warmth of tellowship, her feeling of at-homeness and all her distinct marks which give to her a certain individuality.

During the nearly twelve years or my ministry at Shiloh, I have been able to build upon the foundation laid by my predecessor. The crowds have been organized, the property has been made debt free, the worship service has been meditative and every element has had spiritual significance and meaning, the physical structure has been modernized and beautified within and without, the organ has been thoroughly reconditioned, electrified and the console moved to the side of the altar. An annex has been erected in the rear giving some rooms to the officers, choir members and young people.

Shiloh truly is a great church with a cooperative group of Deacons and Trustees, a responsive leadership, a loyal and faithful membership.

Mrs. Boddie, my wife, has been a powerful asset not only to my ministry but to everything within the church that she has been requested to do.

Four years ago, at the Macedonia Baptist Church, you assigned to me the task of heading the work of our state. You alone are to determine whether my administration has been an asset or a liability. I want to thank you for confiding in me this privilege. It has been a crown and also a cross. It has had its sweets, but also some bitters. Thanks for everything.

#### Executive and Quarterly Meetings

Since our last Convention session, at Leadenhall, there have been held five Executive Board Meetings at the Baptist Center: May 29, 1953; July 8, 1953; November 20, 1953; January 30, 1954; and April 30, 1954. We have held three Quarterly Meetings: July 30, 1953 at the First Baptist Church, Earleigh Heights, Rev. W. H. Morgan, Pastor; October 29, 1953 at the First Baptist Church, Ellicott City, Rev. James H. Johnson, Pastor; and on January 25, 1954 at the United Baptist Church, Baltimore, Rev. G. E. Vanderford, Pastor. All of these meetings have been important in the transactions of matters of Conventional and been important in the transactions of matters of Conventional and denominational interest.

Our efficient Corresponding Secretary, W. D. Yerby, has in details the minutes covering these meetings.

#### The Annual Dinner Conference

The Annual Dinner Conference was held at the New Shiloh Church (Baltimore) on Thursday, October 8, 1953 at 12 noon. After a very appetizing and delicious Turkey and Smithfield Ham dinner, \$5,425.00 were pledged and \$970.00 given in cash.

The Fall Rally terminated in November at the St. Paul Baptist Church, Dr. G. A. Crawley, Pastor, where we heard a powerful message delivered by Dr. E. C. Smith of Washington, D. C.

To date a total of \$6,781.26 have been paid in this Drive. The detail report of this will be given by the Finance Committee and in the report of the Corresponding Secretary.

#### The Baptist Center

Dr. B. L. Matthews, Acting Dean of our Center, has been directing the work. What he does depends upon what we do in influencing our aspirants for the ministry and religious leaders, to attend and prepare themselves for religious work in our churches. We need more religion in education and surely more education in religion. The Center presents an opportunity to those who have not had advantages for formal training otherwise.

#### The Aged Home

The people whom the Aged Home benefits have expressed themselves as deeply grateful to the Convention for being responsible in purchasing for them a new place of residence. Mrs. Bessie Lewis, the fine matron, says that the spirit of all of the inmates have remarkably changed. They are more cooperative, more happy, more peaceful, and more contented than ever before.

The entire matter relative to the Home has been adopted and recorded in our minutes. The Aged Home, located at 2801-2803 Rayner Avenue, is owned and controlled by the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland and not by a few churches or any few individuals. The Trustee Board is to be elected annually, at the May session by the Convention.

All things considered, it was a blessing that we left the property on Lexington Street, when we did. Just go by there and see it now,

then take a look at the present place. The price of \$10,725.00 received for the old property was a gift. Right now, if we had the property, we could hardly give it away. Brother Wilkerson needs to be given credit for papering and painting it up to make an impression, for like some people who paint and powder the outside, the outside is no real index to the inside. What was behind those plastered walls could not be detected with the naked eye.

Atty. U. Theodore Hayes took care of the legal aspects of the Home proposition.

The Rally for the Home on April 4, 1954 totaled \$3,771.04. Since the rally the amount has increased to \$4,459.19. I am grateful to all the Pastors who used their influence to raise this amount. Special commendation is due Rev. T. B. Davis, whose church, Leadenhall, was one of the founders of the Home, for bringing in \$500.00 at the Rally. Shiloh, the church I pastor, also gave \$500.00. Since the rally Rev. A. J. Payne has increased Enon's contribution from \$300.00 to \$500.00. Surely we will hear from more of you concerning the Home at this session. We could not leave this point without stating that Dr. G. A. Crawley, even though on his sick bed, was the only pastor to make a personal contribution (\$50.00) aside from what was reported by his church.

The amount owed on the first mortgage of the Home is \$10,990.42, on the second mortgage \$4,792.08, making a total of \$15,782.50. None of the rally money as yet, has been applied to either mortgage, but will be at the conclusion of this annual session.

#### Foreign Missions

Many of us direct our Foreign Mission efforts to both the National Baptist Convention, Inc., Dr. C. C. Adams, Corresponding Secretary and the Lott Carey Convention, Dr. W. C. Somerville, Corresponding Secretary.

Our Foreign Mission work has been headed by Reverends W. L. Clayton, representing the National Convention and V. T. Williams, the Lott Carey. Our response to the Foreign Mission Work of the National last year was about on par with previous years.

#### **Home Missions**

Our Home Mission work is headed by Rev. Virgil T. Taylor. In his last statement he reported no special requests had been made for assistance from the Board.

The First Baptist Church of Annapolis, Rev. Leroy Bowman, Pastor, is building a new edifice and surely we should assist this worthy work as well as other churches of the Convention. As we remember other work, let us also keep in mind the First Baptist, Frederick, Md., Rev. T. J. Houston. Pastor.

#### The Woman's Auxiliary

Whenever any work undergoes a change in administration, there must be adjustments and orientations to the change. Ofter times during this interim the work is slowed down a trifle. This was the situation as it related to the Woman's Auxiliary and the present administration. All must understand that the success of any work doesn't depend alone upon the leader but the cooperation given that leader by the members.

Mrs. Evelyn Clayton, President of the Woman's Auxiliary and her staff will give an account of their stewardship in their reports at this session.

### Sunday School and Training Union Convention

The Sunday School and Training Union Convention, led by Mrs.

Mabel Stokes Gee, has continued in an aggressive and progressive manner. The Mass Meeting at Gospel Tabernacle Baptist Church with Dr. Vernon Johns, guest speaker, was a great inspiration. This and their other efforts during the year have been worthwhile achievements. This Convention has responded to the parent body in a fine way.

#### The Institute

The annual Institute, held in March, by the Convention was much in information, inspiration and fellowship. The instructors were rich with experience and religious knowledge. The speeches in the general assembly were helpful, resourceful and challenging. The theme, "Stewardship in the Christian's Life", claimed the interest and response of those present.

#### Meetings Attended

In June 1953, I attended the New England Baptist Convention, presided over by the tall, cedar of Lebanon and prince of preachers, Dr. W. P. Hayes. It convened at the Baptist Temple, N. Y., N. Y., Rev. O. C. Maxwell, Jr., Minister.

Last September, it was my privilege to officially represent you at the annual session of the National Baptist Convention, convening in Miami, Florida. Much has been said and written about this session, so I need be brief. According to reports and rumors we thought we were going to face some embarrassing situations, so deep in the South, but to the contrary the green light was turned on to us—not the red—and we were given the right of way. We enjoyed hospitality and cordiality in the hotels and taxis such as has not been given to our Convention anywhere.

This convention was largely attended. The magnetic attraction was the election of a new president, which was won by a large majority by Dr. J. H. Jackson, Pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church of Chicago.

Dr. Jackson was installed in an atmosphere of spiritual warmth and dignity. The pleasure was mine to present the vows to the new president and his cabinet. It was also my privilege and pleasure to preach to the Woman's Convention, Miss Nannie H. Burroughs, President.

In November I attended a special Board meeting at Olivet Baptist Church, Chicago, Ill. Here President Jackson set in motion his convention program. We were privileged to witness the 12th anniversary celebration of Dr. Jackson. The program was a tribute. The financial response by the clubs, auxiliaries and church was a marvelous manifestation of love and appreciation for a great leader.

In January of this year we met in Hot Springs, Ark. at the call of President Jackson, for the adjourned session of the National Baptist Convention. This, being the first meeting of the new administration, was largely attended. President Jackson's program was adopted here. His ability as a leader was expressed not only in his speech, "What Constitutes a Big Preacher", but the manner in which he presided, and the ease and alertness in which he met every question and situation which arose.

Dr. D. W. Hoggard of Philadelphia preached the Convention sermon, "God's Family".

Those present from Maryland were Reverends A. J. Payne, L. G. Reynolds, Hiram E. Smith, J. A. Moore, J. L. Moore, Charles Churn, and your president.

#### Progress of Churches

The Union Temple Baptist Church, Dr. C. H. Churn, Pastor, has acquired a new church home on the corner of Madison and North Avenues. It not only has a large and spacious auditorium, but many rooms

where group meetings can be held. From all reports the services are largely attended and the congregation is liberally and enthusiastically supporting the program of the church.

The Greater St. John Church, Rev. David B. Banks, Pastor, has built their first unit at Turner Station. This church was dedicated on the third Sunday in March, this year. The New Shiloh Baptist Church, Baltimore, Pastor, Officers, Singing Groups, and Ushers participated in the dedication. Rev. Banks and his people are to be commended for their sacrificial efforts in doing so phenomenal a work in such a short time.

The Union Baptist Church, Sparrows Point, Rev. Carlton Cook, Pastor, has added a unit to their building. The unit gives more rooms for various purposes. Under the dynamic leadership of Rev. Cook the church has rallied in a remarkable way. It has not only asserted herself financialy, but numerically and spiritually.

The Southern Baptist Church, Rev. J. Grant, Pastor, has given the interior of their church a face cleaning and decoration. It is a place of beauty and should do much in creating the kind of spiritual atmosphere conducive to worship.

The Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, Govans, Rev. James A. Moore, Pastor, has recently installed a beautiful set of church pews. During the few years of Rev. Moore's pastorate, the interior has been redecorated, the floors tiled, the altar has been rebuilt, a new organ installed and the property fenced. The members of Pleasant Grove have much for which to be thankful.

The St. Paul Baptist Church, Rev. G. A. Crawley, Pastor, has been made a temple of beauty. It has been artistically decorated. It is a monument to the vision and leadership of a great leader. Even though illness has shut Dr. Crawley in, his work stands as a glowing tribute to his leadership. Young George, his son, carries on in a wonderful way.

The First Baptist Church of Annapolis, pastored by Rev. LeRoy Bowman is undertaking to build a church. This church is in a section where there is very little encouragement for such an enterprise of our denomination. I am hoping that we will contribute in a large way to the work of this church. The responsibility is theirs but the cooperation and encouragement are ours. Wherever the word Baptist is used it ties those of us with the same name to it. We are interdependent.

The United Baptist Church, Rev. G. E. Vanderford, Pastor has transformed a building formerly used as a manufacturing plant for heating facilities into a House of Worship. Both pastor and congregation are happy in this new location and the future looks exceedingly bright and promising.

The Psalmist Baptist Church, Rev. T. D. Atkins, Pastor found the present site on Riggs Avenue too small and inadequate to carry on the expansion work of the church and have acquired a new church home on North and Druid Hill Avenues.

The above churches do not in any way exhaust the list of those who are making improvements and renovations. God is blessing our churches with abundant and unprecedented success. To Him be the honor and glory.

#### New Pastors

Rev. Richard Page was called to succeed his late father as pastor of Gethsemane Baptist Church. The membership is responding loyally to his leadership and we foresee for both pastor and people a joyous and happy relationship.

We welcome to our fellowship the Rev. James E. Everett, Pastor of New Shiloh Baptist Church, Turner Station. Rev. Everett comes to us with a good record as a preacher, evangelist and pastor. He is off to a good start at Shiloh and we are wishing for him a successful

Another distinguished and outstanding minister in our midst is the Rev. I. Logan Kearse, D. D., pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church. This preacher has a marvelous record. The Union Baptist Church, his former pastorate in Stamford, Conn., was loathe to give him up. Dr. Kearse is a preacher, evangelist, pastor, financier and administrator. He is an expert on "Tithing". Surely Ebenezer will respond loyally to his leadership. We welcome him to the brotherhood.

### Ordination Councils

Brethren, it seems to me that we should revise the matter of examining our candidates of ordination. Most of our examination predicated upon a memory by rote, of the articles by Hiscox. Most of our examination is possible to memorize all of these and not have knowledge concerning the same. I think the candidates should enlighten himself upon whatever sources of information he can obtain, but feel free to make his own statement. Certainly he should be familiar with the Scripture to back up any affirmation he makes.

Young men in our theological seminaries are taught to study everything for enlightenment, but to think and speak for themselves. It is not whether a candidate says what you or I have memorized, but whether he can intelligently and deliberately state his convictions and views in keeping with the doctrine and policy of the church.

#### Denominational Unity

I wonder what effort, project or program could bring all of us as Baptists together at one time. We have more numerically than any other denomination and more in every other way, but we stand out individually.

Just recently the Baptist Minister's Conference endorsed a City-Wide Revival, yet about nine pastors out of thirty were a part of the meeting. Many of the others had their own revivals or inspirations the meetings, separately and distinctively. Maybe someday we'll learn the wisdom of the oft quoted adage: "In Unity there is Strength."

### The Community Situation

Baltimore is slow in breaking down racial and social proscriptions. She is more southern in many of her traditions and customs than Atlanta, Ga. Governor McKeldin's Interracial Commission, of which our Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Ward D. Yerby is secertary, has done a marvelous job in bringing about a healthier climate interracially. The sky is still overcast with clouds, but in time the sun will shine.

Our Governor, at the expense of political fame and fortune, has taken a strong and courageous stand interracially. His position on the Hotel situation was unequivocal and uncompromising. How any of our race could by-pass him for any of the present nominees of other parties, is beyond my comprehension.

As far as the Hotel situation is concerned, we must remember that it's recorded in Luke 2:7 — "There was no room for them in the inn." Had the hotel manager known the possibilities and potentialities wrapped within that expected child of Mary's and Joseph's he would have made room. The hotels of Baltimore are not just keeping the local Negroes out, but keeping out the teeming millions of darker races throughout the world, keeping out progress and civilization, keeping out brotherhood.

#### Necrology

In July of 1953, Rev. Doctor Page, Pastor of Gethsemane Baptist

Church received his eternal summons.

In February of this year, our former National chieftan and titular leader, Dr. D. V. Jemison, fell asleep. His stentorian voice has been hushed, but his works and his worth continue to live. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, Yea, henceforth saith the spirit, for they shall rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

#### Recommendations

- That the new Trustee Board of the Aged Home, approved at each Conventional session, will elect its own officers, annually, at its first meeting in June, following the Convention.
- That a Trustees Aid of twenty-one, will be made up of women of our churches of the Convention. Their duty will be to assist the Trustees and the Home in whatever way is necessary to benefit the Home.

Financial support of the Home.

- (a) That more churches will become monthly regulars to assist the Home in its monthly maintenance.
- (b) That the fall and spring efforts launched will be directed toward liquidating the mortgage debt of the Home.
- That Brother George V. Lottier will be named as Executive Secretary of the Aged Home—to be the official representative of the Convention in the Home. His job will be to serve in a supervisory capacity in connection with the Home. For such he will be the convention. Any further receive \$15.00 weekly, to be paid by the Convention. Any further adjustment relative to his office or stipend shall be made by the Executive Board of the Convention.
- That the churches of the Convention will be requested to increase their support to the Institute expenses from \$15.00 to \$20.00. (b) That the personal fee be raised from \$ .25 to \$ .50.

Now for just a brief spiritual reflection. I like the theme: "The Christian's Hope in a Hopeless World." You remember the scene at the sea of Galilee when Jesus and his disciples were journeying by boat to the other side. A great storm arose. It did not come up as they pushed out from shore, for if it had, they could have quickly returned to land; it came up when they were out in the midst of the sea. It came up suddenly and without warning. A storm never gives prewarning of the devastating fury of its impact and velocity.

Every storm does not come from the sky. There are many storms we mortals have to face. If you haven't faced any storms, you will. Every preacher will have some storm to rise in his church. They come without warning. What to do when the storm arises is the key to your success or failure.

In the Galilean storm the sun was hidden as the black clouds formed a covering upon the canopy of the blue ether; claps of thunder reverberated as a belching cannon in the field of battle; the forked lightning was playing its nimble game across the horizon; the flood gates of heaven were opened and the rain was falling with much rapidity; the wind blew with huricanic intensity and the mad-capped, dashing, turbulent, frolicking voluptuous waves were rolling and somer-saulting, causing the ship with Jesus and his disciples to be tossed hither and thither as if it were nothing but a toy. This was a hopeless situation, not only helpless.

Fear gripped the disciples as Nature had never been so violent and angry. "What shall we do? Shall we be swept into the bosom of the mighty deep?" I see them conferring with each other.

Finally, Peter frantically said, "There's nothing we can do, but where is Jesus? He's on board the ship, let's go to Him. He touched the eyes of the blind and restored their sight, he might be able to do something in a time like this. He abated the scorching fever of my mother-in-law; multiplied the loaves for the starving people; made the cripple walk, the deaf hear, the dumb talk and recalled souls from the vaults of eternity. Let's go to Jesus."

Need I tell you what happened? You know Jesus gave a command as a superior would in a military set up. "Winds go back into your cavern of obscurity, waves calm down, lightning stop flashing, behave yourselves." And the Bible says, "There was a great calm."

Well, there are some storms on the horizon today. Black clouds are gathering above and the sun is hidden from view. There are national and international storms, economic storms, racial storms, interracial storms, political and ideological storms. The Korean storm has passed over to Indo-China. It isn't over.

The atom and hydrogen bomb threaten the peace and security of our present day civilization. The U. N. has proved to be a meaningless instrument for the guaranteeing of world peace. Somebody says, "What shall we do, we're out in the middle of the sea?" Some say, "Don't worry, we have a military genius on board the ship. President Eisenhower knows what to do, he showed the genius of his military ability in the last world war and what Eisenhower doesn't know, Dulles does. He's an international expert. Then too, Churchill is a statesman of world renown and Laniel, premier of France, is a powerful figure."

But with all the brilliant leaders in the world, the storm is still raging. Brethren, military leaders can't stop the storm: statesmen and diplomats can't stop the storm. Psychologists and psychoanalysts can't stop the storm.

Some of us know who can. He's the Christian Hope in a hopeless world. He's the Master of storms. The winds and the waves obey His will.

Jesus my God, I know His name, His name is all my trust; Nor will He put my soul to shame, Nor let my soul be lost.

Firm as His throne, his promise stands, And He can well secure What I've committed to his Hands Till the decisive hour.

Then will He own my worthless name Before His Father's face, And in the new Jerusalem Appoint my soul a place.

# REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

May 19, 1954 Baltimore, Maryland

Mr. President, Officers, and Members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland, and its Auxiliaries: Greetings:

It is again that the Lord has blessed me to be able to bring to this grand body of Christian Brethren and Sisters, the report of my stewardship as your Finance Director.

I must say that th Lord has done many wonderful things for us this year in our Convention. We have been able to keep abreast with our work by His help. Yet, there is much more that might have been accomplished if we could have cooperated a little better.

I have not been able to do all that I had hoped to do, but I have done my best under the conditions that I had to work; the members of my committee have worked very faithful in trying to put the financial program over.

I also have had very good cooperation from the pastors and churches. Many of them that did not pay at the Annual Drive mailed their checks in to me; and many of them paid that did not pledge, which made our mid-year Drive a great success.

We had 18 churches to pledge, to the amount of \$5,425.00, but there were three churches that did not pay anything.

The amount pledged was \$5,425.00; the amount paid is \$6,746.26—which makes us receive \$1,321.26 more than had been pledged, for which we wish to thank the pastors and churches.

More money came in since the last report, which will be accounted for a little later in my report. The reason for this breach in my address is that the monies came various times, and could not be added all at the same time.

As your humble servant, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the constituency for the very fine cooperation it gave my Office, in putting this great job over. Most of the churches lined up with the work, and I feel like they did the best they could with what they had to work with. We must get it in our minds, that every Pastor cannot do in his Church like others. Many of us give our personal check, in many cases for the cause, and go back to our church and they will be glad to refund the money you paid in; and if other Pastors would do that, they would stand chances of being asked to resign.

We must remember some of us built our churches, and called the people; and other churches were already built, and they called the pastor. So it makes a difference in the working of that church. I don't think we should hide our negligence behind the larger churches, by saying "my church is small." All of us can do something, and will do something if we want to. As your Finance Director, I have done

my best in trying to show all of the pastors the need of supporting the work of the United Baptist Missionary Convention, since we have a great job to do as Baptists in the State of Maryland.

We have two major objectives in our city and state that are depending solely on the Baptists of Maryland, namely: the Aged Home for Colored People at 2801-2803 Rayner Avenue, Baltimore 16, Maryland, and the Baptist Center and School of Religion, at 1434 McCulloh Street, Baltimore 17, Maryland. We also have State Mission, and Foreign Mission work that has to be taken care of by the Convention, and the Religious Educational work in and out of the State (that of preparing our ministers and workers for the future), are looking to us for help, and we must help them for we are looking to them for able men and women.

So in order to have the kind of people it takes to carry on this work, or any other kind of work, they must be prepared to do the job. And they cannot be prepared unless we support the schools that are giving that kind of training—such as: The Virginia Union University at Richmond, Virginia; the Virginia Theological Seminary and College at Lynchburg, Virginia; the National Training School for Girls, at Washington, D. C.; the National Training School for Women and Girls, at Nashville, Tennessee; and the Baptist Center and School of Religion at home here in Baltimore, Maryland.

So I hope all of us can see why the Convention needs so much money. Many of the members of our Convention feel like some of the members of our churches, who think all the money that is taken in the church go to the pastor—not realizing that it takes money to operate the church. Yet they are looking for a good record of the church work, a clean church, a warm church, a cool church, and everything else it takes to make a nice church; good music and good choirs. Yet they don't see what they do with so much money. The same is true with the unconcerned members of the Convention. They think all the money that comes in to the Convention, goes to the president and the officers of the Convention. Yet they will not come to the meetings when they are called to see just what is going on.

I would like to suggest here that we would attend our board meetings, and know for ourselves what is being done, and we would not have to say so many things that we know nothing about. We have a wonderful president, and I think we should support his program. He is working very hard for all of the Departments of the Convention, and he needs the support of all of us.

Rev. Yerby, our corresponding secretary, has been very cooperative in helping me and everyone else. He does everything he can to work with everybody to make the Convention a success. I could not close this little message without speaking about one of the most faithful workers of this Convention, namely, Mrs. Madison Williams. She is always ready to answer to your call, and she never leaves a job until it is done right.

And I must say, all of the officers of the Convention has played a fine part as far as I am concerned in trying to put this job over. So let us pray that the Lord will bless the work as we enter into a new year's work. We may not have the same officers, but I am urging everybody to do the best you can for the cause's sake.

#### REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

New Shiloh Baptist Church Baltimore, Maryland May 19, 1954

The Nominating Committee of the United Baptist Missionary Convention met on the above date. Dr. A. J. Payne, the chairman, called the meeting to order, with prayer by Dr. C. Edward Brown. Then the meeting was declared opened for business.

After much discussion, pro and con, it was motioned and seconded to recommend to the Convention to accept the same slate of officers for the coming year.

The motion prevailed. Those voting for the recommendation, A. J. Payne, B. L. Matthews, C. Edward Brown, C. H. Churn, E. W. Williams, Simon Williamson, V. T. Taylor, N. A. Wicks.

Immediately following the report of the Nominating Committee, Dr. Boddie objected on the grounds of a constitutional error on the part of the Convention, failing to elect the officers of the Convention on the day and time specified in the Constitution. The chair sustained the objection. At this point, Reverend John L. Tilley, pastor of New Metropolitan Baptist Church, offered the following resolution:

#### RESOLUTION

Regarding Waiving Points in the Constitution Relative to the Term of Office of the President of the Convention.

Whereas the Constitution of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland states in Article IV, the following:

the President shall not continue in office more than four (4) years; he shall not succeed himself more than three

(3) consecutive years." and
Whereas the same Constitution states in Article XVI the following: "All amendments to this Constitution must be submitted in writing at an annual meeting, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting, being subject to modification in form, but not in character, and shall be adopted only by a vote of two thirds of the members present and voting." and

Whereas Dr. J. Timothy Boddie, the present President of this Convention has served in said office for four consecutive years or

terms; and

- Whereas this Convention, under the leadership of President Boddie, has recently purchased a building to be used as the Maryland Baptist Home for Aged Colored People, at 2801-2803 Rayner Avenue for which there is a balance owed of approximately \$14,000.00;
- Whereas it is the feeling of this body that the best interest of this Convention would be served in the continued leadership of Dr. Boddie for another year as it would, we believe, promote the liquida-tion of the indebtedness more promptly than would a change at this time;

Be it resolved, therefore, that the application of the clauses in the Constitution referring to the election of the President be waived for this annual session and that Dr. J. Timothy Boddie be eligible for reelection.

#### REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD

May 18, 1954

Brother President:

Officers and members of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland:

The Home Mission Board is before you again at the closing of an-

other year of service, to report our stewardship.

I will begin my report with this prayer:

ALMIGHTY FATHER, of whom the whole family in heaven and on earth is named, we pray Thee to guide the nations of the world to live as members of one family; inspire the people who have found in conflict the strength which comes from unity to preserve that unity in peace; and so to order the world in righteousness that all mankind may know the joy of fellowship in the service of Thy kingdom, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. In his name we pray and in his name we trust for life that is life indeed. He is our light and he will lighten our darkness. Amen.

Brethren, we have done a little missionary work this year. have helped several struggling churches who are trying to build better places of worship. We received a very urgent letter from the Zion Baptist Church, Hill Top, Maryland. I quote:

Dear Brethren, we are in a desperate struggle trying to complete our new church edifice. We are in dire need of figure the struggle of 
nancial aid, therefore we are appealing to you for whatever assistance that you feel that you can afford. Certainly, whatever you do for us will be greatly appreciated. Thanking you for whatever aid you may give us, we remain yours for the cause of Kingdom Building.

We also received a second request from the First Baptist Church of Highland Park, Md., asking for further assistance in their struggle to build a church building. The Board heard these applications and being well informed regarding the condition of these two churches, the Board donated \$100.00 to the Zion Baptist Church, Hill Top, Maryland, and \$50.00 to the First Baptist Church, Highland Park, Maryland. The Board also received an application from the First Missionary Baptist Church of Frederick, Maryland asking, for further aid. This request was presented to the Board. The application was rejected by the Board on the grounds that we have extended help to the First Missionary Baptist Church, on two occasions, and the Board felt that our factors is so limited that we could not give only in a limited way to the former of the first our could not give only in a limited way to the country of the country o finance is so limited that we could not give only in a limited way to these requests for aid.

Brethren, we feel that all these requests for aid coming from our sister churches are urgent and valid, but what can we do with the money sent up to the convention by our churches. And many of the churches who are asking for help do not send up any money for Home Missions. If you don't send up the money to the Home Mission Board, how in the world do you expect to get help from the Board when you need it? We are only operating on the money that we get from the churches who think of Home Missions when they send up money to the convention. The majority of our churches never think of the Home Mission Board until they need help. Charity begins at home, then spreads abroad.

Our rural churches are moving forward in a progressive way. The First Missionary Baptist Church of Frederick, Maryland has done a fine job in renovating their church building under the leadership of their progressive pastor, Rev. T. J. Houston. The First Baptist Church of Highland Park is working night and day on their new building which will do credit to its pastor, Rev. J. C. Wyatt, who is doing almost a superman job in trying to get his people out of a building that has been condemned. Make a trip down to Highland Park and see for yourself the great work that is being done by the First Baptist Church.

We have another up and coming Church in the rural, namely, the First Baptist Church, Fairmount Heights, Maryland. This church is pastored by one of our progressive pastors, Rev. T. J. Andrews. This is one of the churches we helped when they were trying to build. To-day we have in Fairmount Heights a beautiful church building, com-plete in that which is necessary for a modern church building.

Then we have two other churches that are under construction. The First Baptist Church, Capitol View, Maryland, pastored by the President of the Southern District Association, Rev. J. H. Stanmore, who is now working hard to build the upper floor on the present structure. The Sylvian Vista Baptist Church is under reconstruction. Rev. Arthur Luckett who have been ill in the hospital for several months. I am allow to report that Bay Luckett is now convalesing at his home. glad to report that Rev. Luckett is now convalescing at his home.

I am also glad to report the reconstruction of the First Baptist Church of Ellicott City, Maryland, which was destroyed by fire. When the pastor, Rev. James H. Johnson, came to the Board for help, we were glad to do what we could to help in this worthy cause. We have in our files a fine letter of thanks from the First Baptist Church. I take this time to name these churches and their accomplishments, because the Board was able to help in a small way these struggling Pastors and Churches.

Three years ago I organized in Montgomery County the Central District Association, composed of three churches, namely: Parker Memorial Baptist Church, First Baptist Church of Kensington, and the Macedonia Baptist Church. The President of the Association is Rev. James W. Murphy; and the president of the Women's Auxiliary is Mrs. Maggie Taylor. This year the Association has voted to represent in the Convention.

## Life Is Not A Pool, But A River

Here is a man who had always thought of his life as though it were a pool. He thought he had so much power and no more. His resources, like a pool's, were limited, fed by the immediate countryside. As the years passed and the droughts came, on long hot days he became aware that pools can dry up, and he lived an insecure, unstable life. Then great religion came to him, and now he thinks no longer of his life as a pool; he thinks of it as a river. That is different. For a river's power is not so much in it as through it. It comes from unfailing springs; and if the cluttered waterways be opened to the living fountains, then, in rain or drought, power flows on. So that man's life has been changed. All his friends see the difference; all his work shows it, etc.

Brethren, I believe the Home Mission Board should be more than a financial reservoir from which can be drawn from time to time moneys to help build and renovate churches. The greatest investment the Home Mission Board can make, is to invest in the souls of men. I close my report with the words of Edith Lovejoy Pierce:

# Report of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the MARYLAND BAPTIST AGED HOME, INCORPORATED

to the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland Mr. President, Delegates and Friends assembled:

For the last few years we have ended most of our reports to this convention with the phrase—"Yours for a better Old Folks Home." That was indeed a prayer and we are happy to report today that that prayer has been answered. We do have a better Old Folks Home. If

you don't accept my word, come and see. It is sometimes easier to get a thing than to hold and maintain it after we get it. It is our cherished hope and belief that this new Home will so enthuse and inspire the Baptists that there will be no problem of maintenance and support.

# Our President, Rev. M. W. Wilkerson.

When I speak of support and maintenance I think of our president, Reverend Wilkerson, who for nine years has been president, and vicepresident for a number of years. Any person who heads an institution that depends for its support from charity and free will offerings has a hard job on his hands. Being close to the president I know very

intimately what he has gone through.

With the purchase of 2801-03 Rayner Avenue for our Old Folks

Home we enter a new era — a new spirit is born we hope, and Rev. Wilkerson, or whoever is president, will not suffer, but will be adequate-

ly supported and encouraged to go on.

#### Our New Home

We moved into our new Home on March 4, 1954. It is situated on a high location in West Baltimore called Walbrook, a section of our city our race is fast taking over with many comfortable and beautiful homes. There is no probability of this location becoming a slum area in our generation or the next. It is diagonally across the street from the Lutheran Hospital of Maryland We understand our Home was formally a nurses home for the Lutheran Hospital, which accounts for the arrangement, of the interior so well suited for our institution

arrangement of the interior so well suited for our institution.

The building is situated on a lot with 78 feet frontage on Rayner Avenue at Dukeland Street, and a depth of 132 feet. The grounds are beautiful with grass, flowers, shrubs and fruit trees. The large, beautiful rear yard is well suited for outdoor religious services and lawn forter was might even set and a proportion. fetes; we might even set up a croquet game. That is an old people's game. Don't be surprised if you see Sister Marie Carter and Sister Hattie Danie's and others trying to bat the balls through the wickets.

It would be fine exercise and recreation.

The building has 30 rooms and we can accomodate 22 persons in comfort. All the rooms are outside rooms with windows. We have a large pantry and linen room and plenty of space in our cellar for laundry purposes and our heating plant and hot water heater. On the first floor we have a kitchen, dining room, matron's room, reception or living room and a chapel. There are six modern bathrooms, with toilets, bathtubs and showers, so there is no excuse for not being clean. The hot water tank holds 500 gallons. What more could be expected in the purchase of a new home? We settled for the sale of our old Home on March 3rd and moved in the new Home the next day, March 4th. We were able to move in so quickly because we bought the building with all the bedrooms furnished with clean modern furniture. purchase also included linens for the beds, blankets, spreads and scatter rugs; also a Norge automatic washing machine and electric ironer for the laundry, and a Westinghouse television set and some furniture for the lounge. We have bought new furniture for our chapel, living room, dining room and some for our lounge in the basement. This had been provided for in the sale of the old Home. What we do not have there is plenty of room for expansion.

#### Dedication

The new Home was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies on Sunday, April 18th, Easter Sunday. Loud speakers carried the program to our rear lawn where chairs had been provided for those who could not get in the chapel. It was a great day. We might well repeat the first message that went over the wire when the telegraph was invented "What has God wrought!"

Since our fiscal year began the 1st of May 1953 we were in our old Home for 10 months of the year, and have been a little over two months in the new home. During those 10 months were going along

about as usual with our many problems of caring for the old people under our care. We had not given up hope of finding a new site, but in the meantime we were trying to make the most of what we had. We had asked the Sunday School and B.T.U. Convention to give us an automatice hot water heater and they had decided they would just at the time we discovered our new site. We asked them to withhold their gift until further notice. There are still some things that can be done to improve our Home. If you are interested talk to the matron or secretary.

#### Our Finances

This has been an abnormal year because of our moving from the old Home, and the renovations we have made at the new Home.

The financial statement being circulated at this Convention shows:

We have \$655.11 in outstanding obligations.

This statement includes what was spent for the renovations and furnishings we bought for our chapel, reception room, dining room, kitchen, lounge and laundry. \$2,500.00 were allocated, from the sale of the old home for these renovations and furnishings, and we have about spent that amount.

# Mr. Thomas Hill

We want to pay a tribute to a young man who helped us greatly with our renovations. Mr. Hill is a member of New Metropolitan Baptist Church, and custodian of the Baptist Center. He is an all-around contractor and mechanic and can do almost anything about a house, and do it in a professional way. He has good taste and ideas and gave us the benefit of them. What is more he worked as though it were his cwn home giving of his time and talents at a very low pay. We feel Mr. Hill deserves our hearty thanks.

#### Our Matron

There is one essential person in our aged home, and that is the matron. A little over two years ago we secured our present matron—Mrs. Bessie Lewis. She has proven to be a faithful and valuable asset to the Home. She lives in the Home and has a 24 hour job. We try to give her a day off each week, but when there are problems of sickness and otherwise she cannot get off but stays on the job. There are not so many people who would want such a job at the price we pay. We hope to reward her some day for her faithfulness. She doesn't want another husband so we'll have to think of something else. May I again suggest to the ladies especially of this convention to visit the Home tand encourage and help our matron with her many problems.

We should like to mention another very fine lady who has fallen in love with our Home and have been of invaluable help to our matron. I refer to Mrs. Bertha Black, a member of Sharon Baptist Church. She is a practical nurse. We are now employing her on a part time basis, and wish we could employ her full time.

# Our Pantry

One of the show places of our Home is our pantry. Our Pantry Shower just before the Christmas holidays was a great success, we think the best we have ever had, and although we have used much that was given us, we still have our shelves pretty well stocked with food products. The Ways and Means Committee is still thanking all who helped.

A Ladies' Auxiliary
Somehow, whenever I come to this convention I think of the need Somehow, whenever I come to this convention I think of the need and possibilities of a group of women as an auxiliary to the Trustee Board, dedicated to the task year 'round of helping the home. I understand there was such a group years ago. In the Methodist Church they have such a group called the Golden Cross Society that helps is a wonderful way the Carroll Aged Home. I have learned they assume responsibility for the fuel bill and do other things for the Home. Carrowe as Baptists not do something like that? Think that over, Ladies.

**Our Guests** 

From the beginning of our Old Folks Home we have called the persons who lived in the Home inmates. Since the term inmates is now generally applied to persons in penal institutions, poorhouses, jails, etc. we have decided to call those in our home "guests", a term used in similar institutions. During the year we have had as many as guests in the Home, 5 passed away leaving us nine. We have vacacies and would like to get more guests.

Rev. George A. Crawley, Sr.

This report would be incomplete if we did not mention one or the veterans of this convention, and a friend of the old folks home. He may not be here because he has been seriously sick since we got possession of the new Home. I refer to Rev. George A. Crawley, Sr. It was Rev. Crawley who discovered the property and interested Rev. Wilkerson and the Trustee Board of the Home, and later the convention took over and made the purchase. We wish and pray that Rev. Crawley will fully recover and be with us a long while.

Rev. J. Timothy Boddie

As in physical statue there is one man that stands out among the men of this convention, also in the acquisition of our new Maryland. Baptist Aged Home this man stands out above his fellows. I refer to the president of this convention—Rev. J. Timothy Boddie. When it seemed that we had lost the chance to get the Rayner Avenue property, even the deposit we made had been returned, Dr. Boddie stepped into the breach and asserted a leadership that saved the day, and we now have an Aged Home of which we are not ashamed. To say we are not ashamed does not express our feelings, but we are happy because of the big improvement it is over our old home, and the many congratulations we have received from those who have visited the new Home. We are also indebted to Mrs. Boddie, who stuck so closely with Dr. Boddie and with her fine taste and sense of quality and beauty helped greatly in our purchasing of the furnishing for the New Home helped greatly in our purchasing of the furnishing for the New Home.

We feel sure that Rev. Boddie does not want a lot of thanks and praise for what he, and those who followed his leadership have brought about: he would much rather you show your appreciation by giving the Home your whole-hearted interest and support.

Our final word is, let us thank God for this blessing, our new Aged Home, but not think that we have arrived. Let us now address ourselves to the test of paying off the balance we owe for the new site, and look forward to even greater achievements in denominational endeavor.

This statement is presented each year at the Annual Meeting of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland to inform its constituency, and other interested persons, of the sources of support and cost of operation during the year May 1, 1953 to April 30, 1954.

This statement should be of special interest to the members of this Convention for the Maryland Baptist Aged Home is now beyond any doubt not only an objective of the Convention, but the property of the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland.

During the year we have had as many as 14 guests in the Home; 5 have died leaving us nine. We have vacancies for ten. If you know elderly persons who need aged home care suggest our Home to them.

# STATE OF COUNTRY

Mr. President, delegates and visitors to the 28th Annual Session of the United Baptist Missionary Convention and Auxiliaries of Maryland: The Committee on State of the Country submits the following report:

America still heads the list as the leading financial and industrial nation in the Free World, and on her shoulders is still the responsibility of helping other countries in education, finances and otherwise. Therefore, America should be in position to lead morally, socially and

However, discrimination and injustices are practiced in our country, much of which is condoned and legalized by our State and local government. Since we as citizens have a part in the government through our vote, it is up to us to try to correct these undemocratic principles and practices, so that our nation can reverse the leadership, that America will lead the nations in the Free World morally, socially, and exprintipally are well as formerically industrially and convergible.

and spiritually; as well as financially, industrially and commercially.

We are happy to report that progress is being made in many areas.

Integration has been order and put into operation in all branches of the military forces, which will perhaps do more to remove segregation

the military forces, which will perhaps do more to remove segregation from our society than any other factor prior to the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Some of the southern states have opened their colleges and universities to Negroes within recent years. Several thousand Negro students are enrolled in institutions that were formerly "for whites only." Although many predictions were made that there would be riots, and other forms of racial friction. The opposite is true. Not one incident has been reported of racial conflict or trouble on these campuses. Rather fine experiences of understanding and mutual cooperation between these races have been reported.

Locally, several 5 & 10 cents stores have opened their lunch counters to Negroes. These stores are: Kresge. McCrory. Woolworth. Shulte-

to Negroes. These stores are: Kresge, McCrory, Woolworth, Shulte-United and Grant's.

The general social outlook is better, but there is much more to be desired. The attitude in some stores concerning serving Negroes has changed considerably — Hutzlers, Hess, Stewart's, May Co., and Lane. Bryant's.

· Our nation is fast becoming alcoholic and it is prevalent in our churches among some of our leaders, and it is the duty of every minister and Christian leader to try to educate our people against the use of alcoholic beverages. This can be done by visual aid and lectures. Also we can encourage citizens to use their influence against opening liquor stores in our communities. We urge that we watch for violations of places operating, solicit persons to protest against permits being granted and become acquainted with the law covering the licencing and operating of all stores handling alcoholic beverages of any kind.

In Kenya, East Africa, a revolution led by the Mau-Maus which started out as a religious movement about nine years ago, is still attracting world-wide attention. The exploitation is still going on in South Africa.

Various studies show that the Negro is a victim in a larger measure to several kinds of diseases that other races — much of which is due to social and economic conditions. This could be greatly lessened by information. Therefore, we urge that we support public health agencies such as Chest X-Rays, Cancer, Tuberculosis, Mental Hygiene, and other such funds.

January 1954 the Baltimore Fellowship, Inc., presented Miss Marian Anderson at the Lyric Theatre—although it has been its policy not to grant the use of the theatre to a Negro artist.

The decision handed down by the Supreme Court, Monday, May 17, 1954 was perhaps the best thing that has happened in America since the Emancipation Proclamation. This decision of the Supreme Court making integration mandatory, brings a great responsibilty to whites and Negroes to prepare themselves for this challenge.

The churches profess and preach Brotherhood, one of the fundamental and basic elements of Christianity, but they unfortunately allow the field of music. dramatics, television, radio, labor movements, sports and many other worldly agencies to do more in exemplifying these principles in practice than the churches in general. Here in (this city) Baltimore, the major sports: football, basketball and baseball have mixed teams and we know of no church in the city that has gone so far as to integrate its congregation.

The pastors and churches can play an important part in outlining an effective program to develop Christ-like character in children, youth and adults.

We deplore the fact that the Baltimore hotels continue to refuse to admit Negroes, despite the fact that Governor Theodore R. McKeldin has tried repeatedly to get managers of the hotels to change their policy.



# CONSTITUTION OF WOMAN'S CONVENTION, U. B. M., C. OF MD.

#### I.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the United Baptist Missionary Convention of Maryland.

#### II.

The object of this convention shall be to promote Home and Foreign Missions and Christian Educational Work among women, young people and children in the State of Maryland, and to cooperate with other bodies doing similar work in our state, country, and our world. To unify the Missionary Circles and Associations through Christian fellowship.

#### Ш.

Section 1. The members of this Convention shall be composed of missionary Societies, young people's organizations, individual, annual and life members, and also district associations within the boundaries of the State of Maryland.

Section 2. All applicants must be elected by the majority vote of the convention. Any Baptist in good and regular standing and residing in the State of Maryland may become an associate member upon the payment of \$1.00 and may be entitled to discussion, but not to a vote. An associate member may become an annual member and enjoy all the privileges of the convention upon the payment of \$5.00 annually. Any association in good and regular standing may become a member upon the payment of \$10.00 annually.

#### IV.

The Officers shall be: President, Vice President at Large, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, 3rd Vice President, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, Historian, Director of Young People.

#### V.

- 1. The duties of the President shall be to preside at the annual session of the Woman's Convention and all executive Board meetings and quarterly meetings, to maintain the principles and carry out the laws of the constitution. She shall appoint all committees and shall be a member and ex-officio of all standing committees. The President may call special meetings of the executive Board when in her judgement there is need.
- 2. Duties of the Vice Prresident at Large: She shall cooperate with the President in promoting the interest and goodwill of the Women's Convention throughout the State of Maryland. She shall perform duties same as other vice presidents.
- 3. Duties of the Vice Presidents shall be to assist the President in any way possible in the promotion of the work of the organization when they are requested to do so. And to preside at the meetings in her absence in the order of their rank or assignments.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep an accurate report of all proceedings of the Annual Executive and quarterly meetings, compile and distribute the minutes and see that a copy is available to all of the members. At the close of each Annual Session, keep a copy on file for future reference, and give a copy to the Corresponding Secretary and President. The Assistant Recording Secretary shall faithfully assist the Recording Secretary in all of her duties.

- 5. The duty of the Corresponding Secretary shall be to carry on the correspondence with the missionary societies and associations connected with the body and similar bodies doing work in and out of the state; receive funds from the missionary societies for the convention and reports from the committees when the board is not in session. To report through Finance Committee to the Treasurer and taking receipts for the same. She shall compile the annual report and conduct all correspondence assigned to her by the President.
- 6. The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all funds from the Finance Committee of the Woman's Convention and keep an accurate account of the same, and provide for its safekeeping in a reputable, reliable banking institution. She shall pay out monies due on order of the President and with signatures of the President and Corresponding Secretary.
- 7. The Historian shall collect facts, arrange and classify data respecting the history and the condition of the Baptists in this state, as to their achievements, domestic, economic, prosperity and resources numerical, spiritual and financial strength, and present the same at each annual meeting

#### CONVENTION IN SESSION

The annual session of the Woman's Convention shall be held at the same time of the Parent Body, unless otherwise provided for by that organization at which time election of Officers shall be held annually.

All Officers shall be nominated for office by a nominating committee appointed by the President and elected by a majority vote of the body. The president shall not succeed herself more than five successive years.

- Section 2. Quarterly meetings will be held at time designated by the parent body.
- Section 3. The Executive Board shall mee<sup>+</sup> monthly. Its members shall consist of Officers of the Woman's Convention, heads of departments, chairmen of committees, presidents of missionary societies and other workers. Seven shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business. The chairman and secretary, respectively, shall be president and secretary of the Executive Board.
- Section 4. Executive Committee shall consist of the president, vice president, corresponding and recording secretary, treasurer, and chairman of the Finance Committee. These will have full power to look after all unfinished business and transact any business needing immediate attention. Five shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall recommend the compensation salaries or honoraniums. The same to be approved by the parent body.

#### SUBSIDIARY BODIES

The Young People's Department

The Director of the Young People shall be selected by the official staff of the Woman's Convention and approved by the Executive Board of the same. She shall appoint a committee of five to supervise and direct the financial affairs of the department. The Director of the Young People shall have full supervision over the work of the Young People's Department. This department's objective shall be to devote its interest toward Christian Education; Home and Foreign Missions; Recreation and Health of Youth. To develop Christian womanhood and bind together the Youth of the denomination for leadership and participation in the programs of our various churches.

OFFICERS—The officers of the Young People's Department shall be: President, three (3) Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and the Treasurer.

The Young People's Department shall consist of Young Matrons Association, Young Woman's Association, Red Circle, Children Bands and other similiar organizations. And shall be recognized as a Subsidiary body to the Woman's Convention. This Subsidiary body shall be under the sponsorship of the said Convention, and shall be guided and supervised by a Director out of that body.


MEETINGS AND FUNDS—The annual meeting of the Young People's Department shall be held at the same time of the Woman's Convention.

All monies of the Young People's Department shall be turned over to the Treasurer of the Woman's Convention through the Finance Committee to be paid out as designated by the Young People's Department. A full and concise report of the Young People's Department shall be made through the Executive Board and at the Annual Session of the Woman's Convention. They shall contribute as far as they are able to the general needs of the said convention.

RULES OF COMMITTEES—The Committees of the Woman's Convention Board should raise the designated quota in money and do so in the month assigned by the Executive Board. Committees should also study and promote a program of education in the field of service to which they have been assigned. All contributions raised by committees must be turned over promptly by way of the Finance Committee to the Treasurer at its assigned Board Meeting.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEW BODIES

We, the chairman and members of the New Body Committee, submit. the following:

#### THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Officers, Members and Friends:

I greet you today in the name of our Heavenly Father who has made all things possible this past year. Through the interest and prayers of Christian men and women, we can give an account of a successful stewardship of the fiscal year. We have had our share of complaints and also plenteous joys. We are aware that with the change of leadership there must be some adjustment, but there would not be too great an adjustment if there was less destructive criticism and more constructive and cooperative aid from able workers. Christian organizations are not destroyed by the world, but are destroyed by bitter, envious and office-hungry Christians. We have encounterd all of this and we want you to know that we are still strong in the faith of Jesus Christ.

The Woman's Convention used the theme, "I Am My Sister's Keeper" for our board meetings and this annual session of the convention, the women adopted the theme, "The Woman's Role in a Hopeless World." Combining the two, "I Am My Sister's Keeper in a Hopeless World," we look forward to a brighter day when there shall be a brighter world.

Christian women view the world of our day without rose-colored glasses. We see the wars that have passed—and the wars that are being fought and can even see those that are to come. Every war that has been fought within 40 years, every territory conquered has been of some material or personal gain to the country seeking to gain supremacy. Beginning with World War I, Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany was interested in expansion; France with no coal wanted the Saar which was rich in coal. World War II — Hitler wanted world domination and France again wanted the Saar; England wanted to keep her monarchy intact and her colonial possessions. Why is England keeping a huge portion of Africa under her thumb? Diamonds—Ivory—Rubber—Ore (for the atomic and hydrogen bombs). The United States has joined her by way of the Firestone Company, who pays some of their employees under two dollars weekly wages and acts as a great benefactor. Firestone can afford to build schools and fine buildings in his area by using only a portion of the interests of his fantastic profits.

The U. S. didn't fight for Korea for Synghman Rhee and his people—our industrialists and diplomats didn't want China and Russia to get the mineral deposits. We were not defending the Pacific Islands for the Polynesian or Asiatics during World War II, but vested interests have large rice fields, rubber plantations, cocoanut oil for soap and other cosmetics, pineapple and ad infinitum. If we send men to Indo-China to aid the French, it won't save the Indo-Chinese, it will mean another toe-hold for money hungry U. S. and European monopolies.

Our sons and daughters are sent all over the world to die for a freedom that doesn't exist in the land of the free and the home of the brave. We, as a race, have had to fight for every inch of progress we have made since the Emancipation Proclamation. We have raised churches from log cabin status to cathedrals, schools from discarded shacks to modern glass and brick structures, homes from huts to mansions, people from illiterates to Ph.Ds. We were left to die on the roadside because we couldn't be admitted to their hospitals — we built them.

All these indignities and many more have we suffered and may suffer more but Christian women have a duty to do — we must instill faith in our familities, hope in our Sisters and love for mankind. That is the protection against all this world's enticing wiles.

Our Christian women are facing the future with courage and determination that active participation in the affairs of the home; knowl-

edge of the entire church program (spiritual, social and financial) is essential, active participation in community projects, including politics (know who is in office and see that they are keeping their promises) is also essential. The day is long past when woman's place is only in the home. She must broaden her area but not neglect her home.

I would like to call your attention to some of our accomplishments during the past year. We had a most successful Pew Rally last July at Macedonia for the raising of funds to help send a delegate to Miami. Many Marylanders were in Miami for the National's inspiring sessions.

Our Echo Meeting at New Metropolitan was fine with accounts from the National and the South American Youth Conference.

In November we carried \$500 to the Parent Body for the annual Fall drive. We wished for more funds but our spirits and prayers were stronger than our finance.

In December, we had a Foreign Missions Mass Meeting at Enon with an exceptional view of Sierra Leone from Magnus Macauley, a native, who is a student at Morgan State College.

The Institute in March was rich and satisfying with Rev. J. L Moore as instructor. Also in March, the week of prayer met in strategic points of the city most effectively. Our grand affair that promotes wide interest was our United Nations Pageant at Union (Baltimore). Mrs. Mae Barnes, our chairman, and the officers and women of the Convention were happy for the fellowship as well as the financial gain.

On the first Sunday in April, the women gave \$300 towards the purchase of the New Old Folks' Home and on Easter Sunday, I was privileged to be a part of the dedicatory services. The inmates are happy for the new building and we are proud.

Our last affair was the beautiful Easter Monday Luncheon at Leadenhall. This, too, was a worthy tribute to the Baptist women of Maryland.

As your president, I have represented you at the new England Convention at N.Y.C.; the B. T. U. and S. S. Congress in Brooklyn; National Convention in Miami; and the mid-winter Board Meeting at Hot Springs; also the Southern District of Maryland at Glen Arden. This, to some may be measured in miles traveled or money spent, but to me it represents knowledge gained, carrying good will from the Baptist women of Maryland to the Baptists of the various sections mentioned. As your president, I have been Women's Day speaker in local churches, also carried your greetings to many occasions. I thank you for the honor you have extended me. To my way of thinking the Baptist of Maryland have had a great and successful year. Seldom has there been more peace and harmony among the Church and with the Convention and her auxiliaries. Miss Greene has developed as a singer to be nationally acclaimed and was recently presented within our city. We rejoice with this faithful mother in this accomplishment.

The last person I desire to mention is Mrs. Bertha C. Winston, who served this Women's Convention so faithfully for a number of years. Alpha Zeta and Gamma Chapters of the Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, during its Finer Womanhood Week at Morgan College last March, named Mrs. Winston as Maryland's Woman of the Year, and before a huge assembly did her befitting honors in recognition of her outstanding work among the youth of Maryland.

All in all, the Baptists of Maryland have had a fine, peaceful and prosperous year and God has smiled richly upon us. Let us give thanks for our success and accept the challenge this offers us.

Madam President, Pulpit Guests, Officers, Members, Delegates Assembled, and to the United Church Nurses:

#### GREETINGS:

Whenever I think of a Nurse I am reminded of Women at work. I would like to discuss briefly the word work. It's a physical or intellectual effort directed to some end. I am sure I express the sentiment of your Pastor and mine when I say a great amount of it is needed in the entire church and not only in the Nurse's Unit. However, for the Nurse's Unit to be successful each one must work zealously. So often we like to shift our obligations to the other fellow but each time we do we become weaker and the other person stronger, therefore, let each of you accept your responsibility as a Nurse. Sometime I think of work because from babies on and up to adults we have had to have some one to to care for us, during certain illness in the home or in the hospital. Even in the church we have a great need for a

nurse, therefore, I say to each of you to support your Nurse's Unit. Help it to grow. Health is your greatest treasure. Medical science has discovered that one half of sickness and diseases as well as death are preventable. Health and disease are a physical condition upon which pleasure and pain, success and failure depend. Health is the prosperity of a nation. Life is incomplete without the enjoyment of health organs. Nursing is a sacrifice — it is serving God and humanity. Nursing is

superior to any profession aside from teaching.

Nurses, you should be proud of your profession, yet you should be modest and humble, so tonight I salute the Nurses. The first colored trained nurse in America was Linda Ann Richards. Linda means "beautiful"; Ann "full of grace" and Richards, "a full heart". Nursing is a woman's organization; it cares for the public health sanitation of its people. Countless hours are given, most of them are given free. The church nurse cares for the health of its members.

I would like to encourage a better cooperation among all church ses. I would like to remind the nurses of Marylard that we are connected with the Church Nurse's Committee of the New England and the National Baptist Convention Nurse's Committee. We are incorporated with these conventions so we must work. We cannot allow the churches in Maryland to let the old flag drag in the dust, for work is the wheel of progress. We cannot follow Christ and turn our backs on the sick and the suffering. Christianity must move forward and Christians must follow the great Missionary, who is Jesus the Christ.

I want to thank all nurses for having found time in the midst of all your manifold activities to come here tonight. That is cooperation. In conclusion, I would like to leave this thought: "A lady with a lamp shall stand in the History of the Land — a noble type of good heroic womanhood.

Too much praise and commendation cannot be given to the people and their pastor. This is a beautiful, spacious church; well adapted to the furtherance of a program of Christian Education. We feel that it was the Hand of God in disguise which sent you to this part of His vineyard.

May His richest benediction ever be with you and your leader.
I am happy to report that the Sunday School and Baptist Training
Union Convention has enjoyed a profitable year. True, we have not

attained all of the goals we set for ourselves but we have excelled and surpassed in some others. Let us review briefly and cursively our year of activity. I think that you will be able to see what I mean.

Our first effort for the fall was our Annual Mass Meeting which was held the fifth Sunday in October at the Gaspel Tabernacle Baptist Church of which Dr. Luke J. Reynolds is pastor. I think that all of our chests are stretched with pride as we recall this occasion. The crowd—well suffice it to say that there was "standing room only!" The Finance — Our goal was \$500.00 and we raised \$604.81. The speaker—well you just would have had to have heard him to have behind your ears. Rev. Vernon Johns took three of the most familiar parables we know and wove them into one of the most provocative, stimulating and practical messages it has been ours to hear. I really think that the quality and tone of our local program was affected by his message to us. For fear of being unenterprising, many of us have worked overtime.

Add to the above mentioned factors the beauty and solemnity of Gospel Tabernacle, plus the dignity, refinement and warmth of Gospel Tabernacle and its most unusual leader, Dr. Reynolds, you can readily see that we had all of the necessary ingredients for our Great Mass Meeting.

What a fellowship it was ours to enjoy at the Morning Star Baptist Church on February 23, 1954! We had more than 210 persons present and could have entertained more had space permitted. Many thanks go to Mrs. Copeland and Miss Benton for the very unique program. It was short, spicy and timely. It proved to all that Christians can have an evening of fun. Rev. Everett is not a newcomer amongst us since his initial appearance on this occasion. He rendered to us a most timely fellowship message in a short span of time. I don't know where the Fellowship will be in '55 but it will have to be a superb, super, spectacular affair to trump that of '54. At the rate the Fellowship is growing, we may have to rent the Armory.

We are proud of the way we attack a problem in our Convention. After each affair we have a meeting where we evaluate what we have done. If it was done well, we say so; if it was done poorly we say so

and proceed to do something about it.

For a long time we have been concerned about our Talent Night Program. We hate to feel that we must have a contest before people will prepare and become stimulated to send worthwhile participants to the program. Instead of having two programs this year, we decided to have one large program. Union Baptist Church was comfortably filled and the participants showed some of that old zeal and lustre for which we have been working for a couple of years. You would be amazed at the talent in our churches. We have some Roland Hayes, some Marian Andersons, some Clara Wards and Chopins in the making. I trust that our churches are not merely sending these persons to a talent program but are using them actively in the local church.

Our Board Meetings have been well attended. Some nights we have had to get more chairs. Superintendents and directors have been inter-You would be surprised to know the number who are satisfied not only to send someone to represent them when they cannot come, but who call to state why. With this kind of interest the organization must go forward. These people know what we are doing for they help plan it.

Mrs. Branch and her Worship Committee has seen to it that at each meeting we have had a timely, well-prepared worship, which set the impetus for the meeting. Many thanks to her and her wonderful committee which has worked so beautifully with her.

Our Church-Wide Institute was a telling success again this year. We can tell by the increased enrollments annually that people are meeting the challenge of the day — the need for a trained leadership.

We are not boastful but we are happy to report that since the program is still set up in a departmentalized fashion—our department had the largest enrollment. This is as it should be since we foster the educa-

tional and leadership programs in our local churches.

Our night was Friday night. We were happy and honored to have had Dr. W. H. Jenagin as our speaker. We feel that his coming did much to cement relationship between the local and national program. He is a marvelous old young man of international, interdenominational; transcontinental fame.

Our relationship with the Parent Body has been a wholesome one—the kind that exists between a child and a parent. The kind that exists when the parent realizes that the child seeks guidance and protection and yet is free to live a life of its own, in so far as none of the family traditions and principles are violated. We have had to call upon Dr. Boddie many, many times during the course of the year. At no time have I felt him too busy to listen to our problems and then to give the counsel necessary for the situation.

Maybe I am partial in that I love to hear him say, "Well, my girl..." Or maybe the occasions have demanded the value of his experience whatever the reason — The result has always been the same. We look upon him as our leader — Physically and Spiritually, Head and Shoulders above the crowd.

We are happy that he is our leader—the captain at the helm for a while longer. All of us realize that there is no indispensable person but we feel that there are men for various eras in our history — that some "men are come into the kingdom for such a time as this." We pledge him now as we always have, our most sincere support.

Amid our happiness we are sad, for another great soul who meant so much to our work has been called to his reward—Dr. George Crawley. He did much to help us enjoy the place in the sun which we now enjoy. He was responsible for the change in our organization from a S. S. Convention and a B. T. U. Convention to a S. S. and B. T. U. Convention The Church-Wide Institute was his idea. The Baptist Center was his heart. Trained teachers and leaders in our church was his dream. Now is not the time for weeping, but working — working to make his dream our reality.

On Sunday, June 20, 1954, 52 workers from our S. S. and B. T. U.'s boarded a lain for the National S. S. and B. T. U. Congress which was convening in Birmingham, Alabama. I feel today that there was a spirit gotten from that trip that not only enriched our experiences but did much to cement the work here in the state. Traveling together as one unit for more than 18 hours brought people together who had never been together before. People shared experiences, talked about the work. Ate together, slept side by side in the restricted confines of a reclining coach seat and enjoyed it all. Prayed together and sang together as we met in Vespers on a Sunday evening's rapidly moving train. We felt more like ONE.

Aside from the fellowship which we received, it did much to publicize us. When we started, we had no idea that we would have that many delegates going to Birmingham. The party really formed itself and we just acted from there to help save ourselves some much needed

money.

Amid all of its imperfections, Congress remains to be a stimulating force in our denomination in specific and in our work in general. Nowhere else in the world can you find this many people gathered together for one week to study systematically God's word. As Dean Fisher intimated, it is truly a university on wheels.

Let me tell those of you who think that Congres is play, that you have never done a more strenuous job anywhere in any one week, against so many odds. Birmingham was hot but that didn't stop our delegates. All of them with few exceptions took two classes, attended general

assembly. Just you try a schedule like this, aside from shuttling back and forth from home to school to auditorium and back again while trying to grab a meal in between

All Maryland was proud on Wednesday night as our own Dr. Miles Connor brought the inspirational message. As people sat around us and asked "Who is that man?", we gladly said, "He is from Maryland." He was his usual quiet, unassuming, forceful self as he delivered his masterful message. Not only were we happy to have someone from our state speak on the program at a general assembly, but we were happy to have such a representative person speak for us. We would be selfish enough to hope this appearance would be an annual one.

I could not close this part of my message without saying a word about the faithful roster of officers whom you selected to carry on your work. Each has been at his or her post of duty through the year. Each has worked unselfishly and at a great sacrifice. We have people who know that it is not enough to seem to merely say, I am with you or my heart is in the work. Each knows that where the heart is there the body must be also and thus he or she finds his place. Words fail me as I attempt to express my personal gratitude to you but I sincerely trust and pray that God will give you strength to continue in this very fine way.

# Oh For A Faith

I think that these words are most appropriate as we pause a few moments to reflect on our theme for this year — "Fostering Personal Christian Faith in the Home." The longer one reads these words and reflects upon them, the more forceful they become.

In the first place the topic suggests that somewhere along the line there has been some waiving in our personal Christian faith, and secondly, that something can be done about it right in the home.

A disordered generation such as ours shakes the confidence of many in religion's basic truths. This confused world can easily be seen as a purposeless one, with everything pointless and transitory.

People really are afraid. People have really lost faith. It matters to them little what they do or how they react. Times have made them like this.

There is a story about Sinbad the Sailor, anchoring his boat on what seemed an island, but finding it to be instead the great beast of the sea—that went charging off with him, boat and all, across the tossing ocean. So our trusted stabilites fail and disturbed societies and nations drag us with them in turmoil. Just such critical times as these, however, can light up religious faith's profoundest meaning. Its assertion that this fugitive earthly scene is permeated with the eternal, that transiency is not the last word in this universe, that life's changefulness is underlain and penetrated by an unchanging purpose, that behind and within all recessitude, "from everlasting to everlasting" there is a God.

I was reading the paper recently in which an incident was likened to the story in the Bible of a man journeying down the Jericho Road. An insurance man was coming down Baker Street at 2:30 P.M. Sun was high and people were sitting on steps everywhere. Two fellows pounced upon him to take away his earnings, \$130.00. He could not yell for his neck was in a grip and yet no one called the cop. No one came to his aid, that is, not until his pockets had been robbed of all his cash, and then the paper records—he had help aplenty. To this incident he replied that he had lost faith in mankind.

Contrast this with a woman who watches her husband slowly but surely dying of cancer. She accepts the inevitable. When folks come to comfort and to pity, she sits with assiduity and says that "God knows best." If my religion has done anything for me. If it means anything—it gives me faith for times like these.

These times strengthen faith. These times break down faith.

Certainly our contemporary world is a mess. Everything nailed down is coming loose, says on writer. International relations, economic conditions, moral customs, are inconstant and confused and such instability unsettles us, that Jeremy Taylor's picture of a man clapping his shoulder to the ground to stop an earthquake is understandable by anyone who has labored hard and steady to improve the world. Ideas, habits, institutions, ethical standards, once apparently solid and durable now seem to many frail frost landscapes or a window pane. The hydrogen bomb makes everything on earth seem perishable and modern astronomy confirms the ancient Psalmist's words: 'Yea, all of them shall wear like a garment. As a vesture shalt thou change them, and they shall be changed."

In our vocabulary, however, is another set of word: unchangable, permanent, eternal. What do these words mean to Christians? Is there something in our lives even today which is abiding, everlasting? This

question goes to the very heart of our religious faith.

Indeed a chaotic era such as ours, presents not only the need for discerning the abiding amid the transitory, but as well the opportunity of discerning it. The highest use of a snaken time is to discover the unshakable. When everything that can totter is staggering then is the time to get our eyes on what stands firm. As Jesus put it in his parable—two houses, one built on sand and the other on rock, look much alike in tranquil weather. Who can discern the difference between them? But when the rains descend, the floods come, and the winds blow and beat upon them—then one sees which is solid and which insecure. In troubled era this is the secret of the soul's triumph, using the shaken time to reveal all the more clearly the unshakable.

The Epistle to the Hebrews was written in a time like this. The Roman Empire, unifying the known world, had broken through the barricades which hitherto had separated people from people. The Jews had lost their most cherished securities. Their dearest affections had turned about the Temple. The Temple gone! The central symbol of their worship had been the sacrifices upon Zion. The altars gone. The priesthood had been the venerable medium for their sin's confession and God's returning pardon. The priesthood gone! Everything vanishing away.

One who in a time like that could write a letter worth preserving all these centuries has message for us. He took advantage of an era when everything else was being shaken to discover what nothing could shake. He used the world's upheaval to distinguish between the solid and the insecure, the substantial and the flimsy. When he speaks of hope it is an anchor, sure and steadfast. When he talks about his Lord, he is Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever. When he interprets his times, he says "removing of things that are shaken, that the things which cannot be shaken may remain.

In our own way, we to whom Christian faith is real should be doing now what that ancient writer did. And, if we do it well, we shall affix

to the hungry the Bread they cry for.

It fortifies my soul to know That, though I perish, Truth is so, That, howso-er I stray and range, Whate'er I do, Thou dost not change. I steadier step when I recall That, if I slip, Thou dost not fall.

The home, as insignificant as it might seem to some, is the agency

which can do most to strengthen our faith in a time like this.

A family gives its children a creative security, creative trust, mutual self-expression. In the family one gets a sense of values and the basic principles of getting along with others. The family is that relationship of parents and children, initiated and fostered by creative interaction which generates, individualizes, and integrates personality

on the one hand and permits the growth of culture in the community, on the other hand. God is the certainty of life which speaks to us through creative interaction.

Some denominations have the slogan — "The Family that Prays Together Stays Together. Others have reworded it to read the family that worship together stays together - The Family that Plays together stays together. We are saying today that the family which lives together, permitting the Almighty to be the Constant Guide and Companion of the Home, has no fears. For it will instill in all of its members a security —a faith, a basic Christian belief that cannot be dissuaded, it matters not what obstacles life may bring.

#### Recommendations

- 1. In search of a suitable place in which to hold our annual Sunday School Picnics and Family Outings, many of us go to beaches and amusement parks, etc. One of the outstanding ones has been Forest Park, to which we have gone in profusion. We have to correspond with the owner to tell him we are coming and after we get there we wonder why. It is not well kept, lavatory facilities are not adequate and we receive no special consideration as the amusement parks for whites in our areas offer large groups. Therefore, I recommend that as a united body we form a letter expressing our complaints and having it signed by the organizations which have used or are using its facilities. While this may not bring about immediate change, it will let the management know that just anything is not good enough for us. If no action is taken on his part, I further recommend that we boycott the park.
- 2. Last year it was decided that we would attempt to have our convention on a larger scale at one of our state colleges. Committees were set in motion to survey the possibilities. Our findings were that unless we change our time of meeting it would be impossible to use the facilities of Morgan's campus. I am recommending that our C. Education go into action to enlarge our work within the framework of this organization and facilities of the local church before going to a campus. By arranging our convention program to include more class time with B Credit Courses. I further recommend that some type of suitable recognition service be given in connection with this activity.
- 3. We find that our present Constitution is in need of amendment. I recommend that we have a revision of our present Constitution in the forthcoming year.
- 4. It has been our desire to do something in the way of scholarship for young people who are making Christian education their major. While we have not set fund at this time or program. I recommend that since we have one of our young people who is now studying theology at Virginia Union, who was an active member of our Convention and Board, we renew our donation to him this year to help him in his work.
- 5. I recommend that we invite the Field Workers from Nashville, Tennessee to be a member of the staff of the Church-Wide Institute to be held in March.
- I recommend that we set up a Leadership Education Program for Lay Workers at the Baptist Center and that this work begin this fall.

# REPORT OF THE BAPTIST TRAINING UNION DIRECTRESS

Madam President, officers, delegates, and friends, after twelve more months of harmonious work with the churches of this Convention, I submit this summary of my actions as Training Union Directress.

We have had a very busy and successful year. We feel that we are making progress toward obtaining our goal in having a Training Union in each church of our Convention. The opportunity before the church is a great one, and the need for leadership and a well-rounded program in various fields is obvious.

The influence of the Training Union is being felt in all of the program areas of the church. It is easy to see that the Study Course is a very effective instrument in the hands of the church for educated

leaders.

To my mind this has been the most enthusiastic year for Training Union Work. I received and accepted the invitation to conduct Study Courses in eleven (11) churches this year. We have advanced the Unions in two (2) churches. Twenty (20) churches were visited, and four (4) churches had Study Courses for the first time this year. in two (2) churches.

I was guest speaker on five occasions at churches to which I was There are now twenty-seven (27) churches working toward a invited. standard Training Union, and an increase of three (3) churches over the previous year. This was our banner year for the Church-Wide Institute. We had sixty-three (63) to enroll, and fifty-nine (59) to complete the course.

On the eighth of March, I conducted a study course at New Shiloh Baptist Church, Rev. J. Timothy Boddie, Pastor. One hundred enrolled in this class. I make mention of this because of the inspiration and enthusiasm of this church in response to our efforts, especially this being the week before the Church-Wide Institute, everything was set for this week of study. I know, because of statements made to me by the Pastor, of the rededication by leaders of that church to the workers of the Training Union after this course.

I also conducted Study Courses in September at Providence Baptist Church, Rev. Marcus Woods, Pastor, to to a class of one hundred (100) people, and was asked to return in April to a class with the enrollment

of eighty-six (86).

I would like also to make mention of the new COMPREHENSIVE MANUAL edited by Rev. R. N. Faulkner, that I used in my classes this year, and urge that we use this Manual for guidance in our Training Union work, because of its beautiful philosophy of Training Union work.

I wish to thank the pastors, directors, and workers of various churches that have accepted me so cordially, and at this time I also want to thank our President, Mrs. Mable S. Gee for her very fine counselling, and for the inspiration of her very fine leadership.
