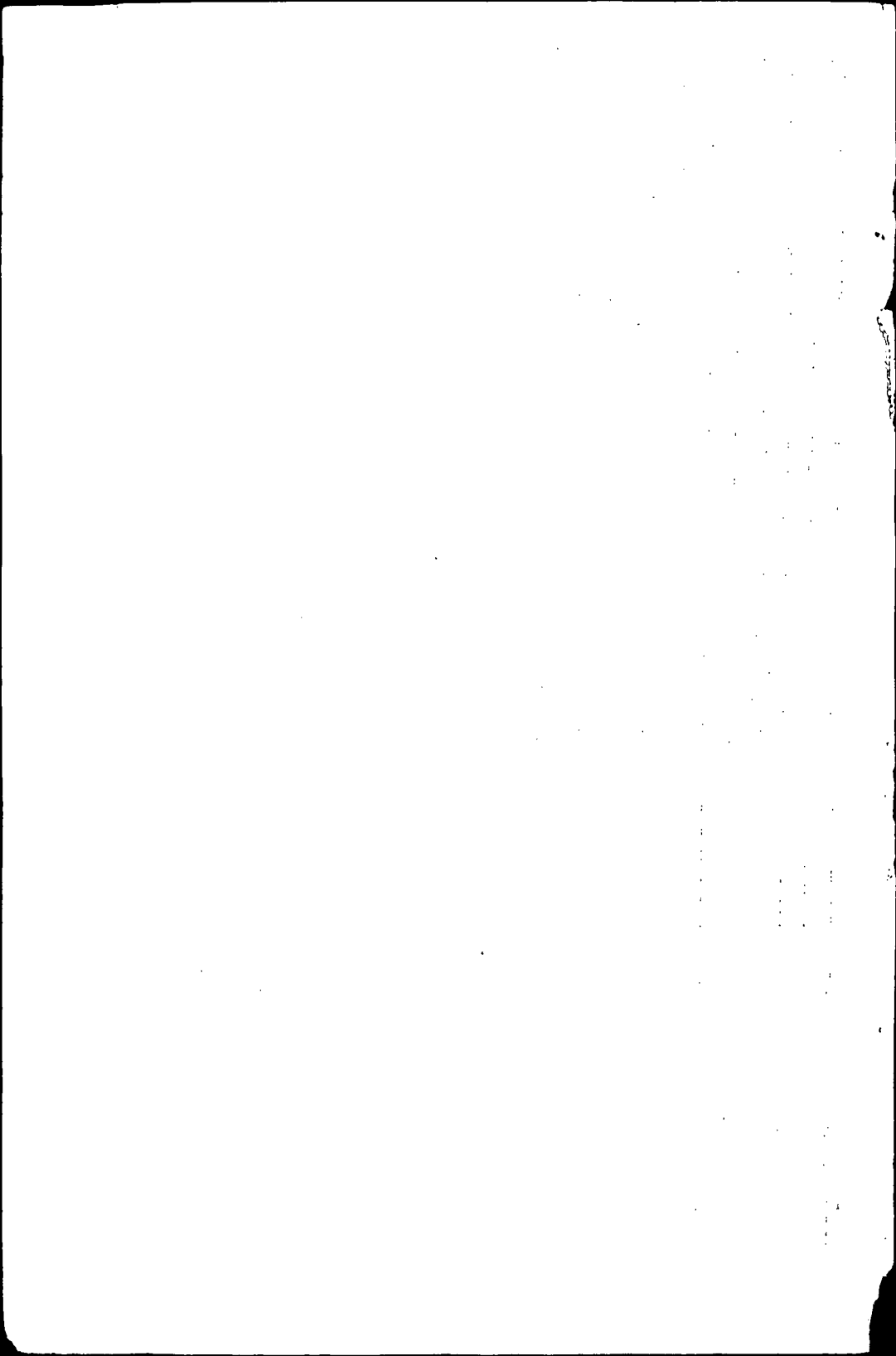

**REVISED CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL
BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.**

PREAMBLE

Whereas, it was the sense of the Negro Baptist of the United States as represented in several Baptist organizations convened in Atlanta, Georgia, September 28, 1895, and known as the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention hitherto engaged in Missionary work on the West Coast of Africa; the National Baptist Convention which had been doing missionary work in the United States; the National Baptist Missionary work on the West Coast of Africa; the National Baptist Convention that these organizations should unite into one organization for the purpose of putting into effect the benevolent intentions of their constituents by eliciting combining and directing the energies of denomination; therefore said organizations did unite and agree upon certain fundamental principles of organic rules, which as amended from time to time, are as follows:

ARTICLE I—NAME

This organization shall be known and styled as the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

This Convention by uniting Baptist churches and other Baptist organizations, such as may desire an organization of this kind, shall undertake to promote home and foreign missions; to encourage and support Christian education; to publish and distribute Sunday school and other religious literature; and to engage in whatever other Christian endeavor is required to advance the Redeemer's kingdom throughout the world.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this Convention shall be representative, annual and life.

Section 2. Representative membership shall be composed of messengers from churches, associations, district conventions, and state conventions all known to be in harmony with the purpose of this Convention, such sums as are set out in sections of this Article.

Section 3. Basic of Representations: a) Churches with less than 200 members, \$10.00. No church will be allowed more than 10 delegates for \$10.00 each; Churches with 200 to 500 members \$25.00; 500 to 1000 members, \$35.00; Churches above 1,000 members \$50.00 paid in as representation. b) State Conventions, \$200.00, not to exceed two messengers and \$50.00 for each additional messenger. c) District State Convention, \$50.00/d) Associations \$35.00.

Section 4. Life Membership—Any person who is in good and regular standing in any Missionary Baptist church that is a member of this Convention may become a life member of this Convention by the payment of the sum of \$200.00 into the treasury of this Convention.

Section 5. Annual Membership—Any person who is a member of a church that is in good and regular standing with this Convention may become an ANNUAL mem-

ber of this Convention by the payment of the sum of \$10.00 into the treasury of this Convention. Said ANNUAL member may engage in the discussion of the Convention, but not vote.

Section 6. Associations and State conventions shall elect their messengers to the National Convention in their annual meeting preceding the Convention and certify that said messenger to the secretary.

Article 3 would be so amended that section 7 would read as follows:

"Since the convention is primarily a fellowship, and since the fellowship owns the corporation, membership in the fellowship does not give to any individual member or group of members equity or special property rights in the assets of the corporation. The annual representation fees are designed primarily to carry the expenses of the convention and to help in its work in general and cannot be construed as capital investment in the corporation.

✓ Section 8. The question of the rights and privileges of membership are settled only by the convention itself or its Board of Directors in the convention's absence.

Section 9. No member or group of members of the convention shall have the rights to use the civil courts to settle matters regarding membership rights and convention procedures. In these matters the convention itself is the supreme court from which there is no appeal. The majority vote of the fellowship is therefore binding on the individual, the convention, and the corporation itself.

ARTICLE IV

✓ Voting in this convention shall be by the delegates assembled without reference to member organizations, states, or sections of the country, and shall be by voice, or show of hands, or standing.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS AND THEIR ELIGIBILITY

"Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a president, a vice-president-at-large, four (4) vice-presidents, and a vice-president from each of the states and territories from which messengers to this Convention may come, a secretary, four (4) assistant secretaries, a treasurer, a statistician, a historiographer, an editor, an attorney, all of whom shall be selected at each annual meeting of this Convention and shall hold office until their successors shall have been elected."

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS

"Section 1. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. The Board of Directors shall consist of the president, vice-president-at-large, the four (4) regional vice-presidents, the vice-president elected by the Convention from the various states and territories represented at each annual session, the secretary, the treasurer, the attorney, the editor, historiographer, statistician, the assistant secretaries of the Convention, and (15) members-at-large to be elected by the Convention, annually, fifteen (15) of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Board of Directors shall organize by electing a chairman and a secretary, who shall perform the duties usually assigned to like officers. It may, if so desired, create from among the body, such sub-committees as it may deem proper and make such rules and regulations not inconsistent with the Constitution of this Convention as it may deem necessary.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to complete the unfinished business of the Convention; and to adjust such matters, as maybe referred to it by the Convention and to fill any vacancies which may occur in the roster of the Convention,

to nominate and fix the time and place of the meeting; to enforce the orders of the Convention or any of its Boards; to examine and pass on, and recommend all claims against the Convention; and during the recess of the Convention have entire charge of its affairs.

Executive Committee of Board of Directors. There shall be an Executive Committee of nine (9) consisting of the president, secretary, treasurer and six others whose duty it shall be to look after any unfinished business of the Board of Directors or of the Convention, and to transact any urgent matters demanding immediate attention of the Board, and report same to the Board of Directors.

The chairman and corresponding secretaries of the several Boards shall be accorded the floor of the Board of Directors and the privilege to speak on and discuss all questions but not to vote.

The Board of Directors shall meet at 8:30 a.m., the first day of the Convention: first, for more perfectly arranging for the sessions of the Convention; second, to hear any suggestions from any state convention looking to the good of the work of the Convention; third, the newly elected Board shall meet during the recesses or after the adjournment of the Convention to wind up any unfinished business of the Convention.

"Section 2. OTHER BOARDS. The work of this Convention shall be done by boards. There shall be elected at each annual meeting as many Boards as may be necessary to carry out the objects which this Convention may undertake to foster, all of the members and officers of which Boards may remain in office until their successors shall have been elected. Each of these Boards shall consist of one member from each state or territory from which messengers to this Convention may come and eight additional members from the state or territory in which the Board is located, provided that the twenty-four (24) members of the Controlling Board and the four (4) members of the Holding Board of the American Baptist Theological Seminary, and who are appointed by this Convention according to the plan of cooperation between the Southern Baptist Convention and this Convention and by which plan said Theological Seminary is operated, shall by virtue of their office, be, and the same are hereby made members of the Educational Board of this Convention and provided further that a Board of Managers may be constituted under this section for the purpose of conducting affairs of the national organ of this Convention, and that the status of said Board of Managers shall be the same as that of other Boards of this Convention. Each Board is hereby given power to nominate its own officers; and to appoint its own employees, subject to the approval of the Convention or the Board of Directors.

The compensation of its officers and employees shall be fixed by the Boards. But the salaries of the officers of the Boards shall be passed upon by the Board of Directors, and before becoming effective shall be ratified by the Executive Board of this Convention. During the interim of the Convention, each Board shall have sole management of the affairs connected with the business for which it is created; but such management shall be in strict accordance with the constituted provision adopted by this Convention and with such other instruction as may be given by the Board of Directors of the Convention or by the Convention. Each Board is hereby authorized to make its own by-laws and to fill any vacancy occurring in its membership during the interim of this Convention. But all such by-laws must be in harmony with the laws and regulations of the approved by the Convention.

ARTICLE VII—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The duties of the officers of this Convention shall be in general terms, such as recognized customs devolves upon them, and which are suggested or indicated by the name of the office together with such other duties as may be required

of them by this Constitution.

Section 2. The treasurer of this Convention shall receipt for all money turned over to him and shall pay out the same only upon order signed by the president and attested by the secretary. At each annual meeting he shall submit a written itemized report of receipts and disbursements.

Section 3. An auditor shall make annual examination and audits of the books and accounts of all Boards of the Convention. For this purpose he shall have full and free access to all books and records in the custody of the same and shall report his findings to this Convention at its annual meetings. But nothing in this section shall be so construed as to prevent Boards and officers involved from having a survey and audit may be necessary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the statistician to gather statistical data for the denomination as represented by the Convention by procuring such statistics from churches, district associations, and state conventions participating in this Convention and from denominational schools within the domains of this Convention as will contribute to this end, and report the same to this Convention, annually.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the historiographer to gather all historical data bearing on the rise and progress of the National Baptist Convention and publish the same. He shall work in harmony with all Boards in pursuance of the ends set out above.

ARTICLE VIII—SUBSIDIARY BODIES

Section 1. The Woman's Convention, Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention; Sunday School and B.T.U. Congress; and the Baptist Laymen's Movement are and the same are hereby recognized as subsidiary bodies shall work in harmony with this Convention, contributing as they are able to the general needs of said Convention.

Section 2. The subsidiary bodies shall make annual reports to this Convention and said reports are hereby subject to the approval of said Convention.

ARTICLE IX

All Board members and missionaries and agents appointed by this Convention or by any of its Boards shall be members of some church in union with the churches composing the Convention.

ARTICLE X

The churches, district associations, state conventions, and other organizations composing this Convention shall have the right to specify the object or objects of which their contributions shall be applied. But when this right has not been exercised the Convention shall make the appropriation at its own discretion.

ARTICLE XI

In addition to the powers granted to and vested in this corporation by operation of law, this corporation is also hereby given the express and exclusive right, authority and control over the management and properties of the following auxiliary Boards, which were heretofore created and established by the National Baptist Convention of the United States of America, prior to its incorporation, namely:

The National Baptist Publication Board, incorporated under the State of Tennessee; The Foreign Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention, incorporated under the laws of the State of Kentucky; The Baptist Young People's Union Board, incorporated under the laws of the State of Tennessee; The Women's Auxiliary Board, incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia.

That said auxiliary Boards and their officers and directors shall have and exercise no power or control over the affairs and properties of said Boards independent of this corporation, and said Boards shall forthwith amend their charters so as to show that each and all of said Boards are under and subject to the jurisdiction and control of this corporation. And this corporation shall have the exclusive right and power at its annual session, or at such other time as shall be provided in the by-laws to nominate and appoint the officer, managers, or directors for each and all of said auxiliary boards.

ARTICLE XII

Missionaries appointed by this Convention or by any of the Boards must, previous to their appointment; furnish evidence of genuine piety, fervent zeal in the Master's cause and talents which fits them for the service for which they offer them.

ARTICLE XIII

There shall be an annual meeting of this Convention, the same to be held at the time and in order stated in the by-laws of this Convention.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote of the members present provided that such a vote is taken without regard to the total enrollment and provided further that no amendment may be considered after the second day of the session. All amendments before having been presented to the Convention for adoption, must have been presented to the Executive Board of this Convention for its consideration.

All constitutions and laws or parts of constitutions and laws in conflict with this Constitution are hereby repealed and are of no force and effect.

This Constitution shall take effect upon its adoption.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The committee considered Article VI, section 1 of the Constitution with reference to the Executive Committee, and recommended that the above article VI, and Section 1, shall be so amended as to read:

"The Board of Directors shall have power to create from its own body an Executive Committee consisting of nine members to wit: President, Secretary, Treasurer, and six others to be selected out of the Board, with full power and authority to transact such business as may be referred to it by the Board, reporting their action in detail to the directors for information and approval. The Executive Committee shall not have power to transact any new business not referred to it by the Board of Directors."

Further:

The office of auditor is hereby discontinued.

The Following Constitutional amendments were presented by the Board of Directors and approved by the Parent Body in the September, 1939 session at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania:

Article V, Section 2—Provides "That the Board of Directors shall also have the power to investigate and suspend any officers or members of the Board when deemed necessary for the good of the service, subject to the approval of the Convention in annual session."

Article VI, Section 2—This article reads "The work of this Convention shall be done by Boards." Amended, "The work of this Convention shall be done by Boards subject to the will of the Convention."

Article VII, Section 2—Further, the article states, "The compensation of its

officers and employees shall be fixed by the Boards etc." Amended to read "The compensation of officers and employees of Boards shall be fixed by Boards, subject to review and approval by the Board of Directors whenever it is necessary."

Article VIII, Section 1—Amend by changing "B.Y.P.U." to "B.T.U."

Dear Brethren: April 5, 1886, an open letter to the Baptist clergy and laymen was issued by Rev. Wm. J. Simmons, an American Baptist, asking if we should have a National Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denominations. At that time the following reasons were given.

1. To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of each other.
2. To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the denomination.
3. To encourage our literary men and women, and promote the interest of Baptist literature.
4. To discuss questions pertaining especially to the religious, educational, industrial, and social interests of our people.
5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard.
6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the denomination.

Having been solicited to write the Call by many whose names and endorsements are here unto affixed, the Call is hereby made by their advice and solicitations for said convention to meet in St. Louis, Mo., August 25, 1886, 10 o'clock a.m., in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangements, with power to select his associates.

Wm. H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. R. H. Cole, 2609 Goode Avenue, St. Louis, are hereby requested to serve as a Committee on Transportation.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

Hot Springs, Arkansas

January 21 and 22, 1970

The meeting opened with Vice President Charles H. Hampton presiding. The song service was conducted by Mrs. Johnnie Howard Franklin and the conventional singers. Vice President Hampton called for the Reverend Roy Love to lead the devotions.

The agendas for the meeting were passed out to Board Members and to the brethren as far as they would go. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Secretary T. J. Jemison and were adopted on a motion by the Reverend W. T. Crutcher and seconded by the Reverend A. L. Davis, Jr., the motion passed unanimously.

Much discussion, led by President J. H. Jackson, went into the type of program we would have in New Orleans during the Annual Session. It was finally approved by voice vote that the program would be altered from the usual form so as to give as much time as possible to the young people from across the nation who would be featured this year on Friday.

It was agreed that the Oratorical Contest would be held in the afternoon so as to make way for the Musical that would be presented on Friday night.

It was also agreed that a panel discussion would be held on Friday morning on Crime, City Gangs and Dope. These discussions were to be led by the Reverends Phale D. Hale, O. B. J. Burson and Moses Newsome.

The report from the committee on entertainment for the New Orleans session was made by the Reverend A. L. Davis, Jr., General Chairman. Dr. Davis stated that all things are ready and the New Orleans and State of Louisiana will give one of the finest entertainments the convention has ever received. He stated much time is being given to the housing of the thousands of young people expected to come into the city on Friday. Dr. Davis stated the committee has secured some rooms on the various college campuses in and around New Orleans. He felt that this would not be a real

problem and that it would be taken care of to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The need for more housing became real when President Jackson called for Presidents of State Conventions who would send bus loads of young people to New Orleans. There was an enthusiastic response from Presidents pledging at least one bus load for their State Conventions.

Dr. S. T. Alexander again extended the invitation to meet in Fort Worth, Texas in September of 1972. On motion by Dr. W. T. Crutcher and seconded by Dr. Roy Love the invitation to go to Fort Worth in 1971 was again voted unanimously.

President Jackson presented Editor C. A. W. Clark who spoke of his desires in making the Voice a better paper and to see to it that it is printed and mailed on time each month. Many spoke of the need for reporters who would come from various sections of the country and who would report on news of interest from his section. There were some volunteers present who gave their names as interested persons who wanted to see the National Voice improved.

President Jackson presented a request from a farmer in Fayette County Tennessee for the Convention to advance \$6,100.00 to pay the mortgage on his farm that is worth at least \$50,000.00; the farm one hundred ninety (190) acres. After a brief discussion led by President Jackson, it was moved by Dr. A. L. Davis and seconded by Dr. W. H. Robinson that we would make the loan. The motion passed.

The matter of the request from a Natchez, Mississippi lawyer to sue the city of Natchez for the National Baptist Convention to recover several feet of land belonging to Natchez College but now in the possession of the city. After discussing the idea of the letter he thought that this matter should be handled by the college and not by the convention. On a motion to this effect by Dr. E. A. Freeman and seconded by Dr. W. L. Wilson the motion to refer the matter to Natchez College was adopted unanimously.

Dr. D. C. Washington, President of Townsend Press and Executive Secretary spoke briefly concerning the new book soon to come off the press "They Also Spoke" written by Dr. Kenny J. Williams. Dr. Washington was hopeful the book would be ready by September and urged the brethren to come prepared to purchase a copy. The author, he stated is the daughter and only child of our President Dr. Jackson.

The matter of earlier publication of our annual minutes was discussed. It was felt that earlier publication was possible by Secretary Jemison. It was thought by President Jackson to have the minutes of each days sessions read and approved on the morning of the next day. It was felt by President Jackson that if this could be done we could get the manuscript to the Printer thirty (30) days following the session. Secretary Jemison stated this was possible, but that it would require a great deal of work without let up.

The matter of where the minutes would be mailed from was discussed by the President. He felt that the minutes while printed in Nashville could be mailed from Nashville. Secretary Jemison stated the only reason the minutes were mailed from Baton Rouge was because it was cheaper. The late Dr. Townsend was unable to get the minute book recognized as a book so as to get the book rate for mailing. Secretary Jemison was able to get the book rate out of Baton Rouge hence the mailing had been done in Baton Rouge.

The matter of what we would refer to ourselves in our publications Negroes or Blacks. It was voted by Dr. W. T. Crutcher and seconded by many we would use the word Negro.

There were two sermons delivered during the Board Meeting on Wednesday and Thursday nights. The Reverend Richard Wood of Connecticut preached on Wednesday

night and the Reverend Louis S. Beauchamp preached on Thursday night.

The meeting adjourned with the benediction being pronounced by Dr. Charles H. Williams.

JUNE BOARD MEETING

of the

June 24, 1970

The Song Service was conducted by the Convention Singers led by Mrs. Johnnie Howard Franklin.

Vice President-At-Large E. Doyle Billoups, presided and called for the Rev. Victor H. Wells of St. Louis, Missouri and the Rev. L. A. Hamblin to lead in devotions. Rev. Wells called for a selection and the Convention Singers sang, "He's Sweet I Know." The First Psalm was recited in unison for the Scripture Lesson. "In My Father's House," was sung following the Scripture. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Dr. Hamblin. Following the singing of "Precious Lord," Vice President Billoups presented President J. H. Jackson who brought opening remarks and stated why he had been detained.

President Jackson called for the Secretary to pass out the Agenda and Assistant Secretary I. H. Henderson, Jr., read the agenda. It was moved and seconded that the agenda be adopted.

The minutes were adopted upon motion and seconded, after some discussions and necessary corrections.

Rev. W. H. Dudley spoke of the matter decided by the board that "Negro" would be used in all our publications. Secretary Jemison spoke on the progress of item 3 on the agenda regarding the record of our convention (Financial and manuscript). Dr. A. L. Davis made report for committee on entertainment of the annual session in New Orleans. Then followed the discussion of the purpose of the Youth Day at the convention. Secretary Jemison read a statement giving some reasons for the special Youth Day. President Jackson made statement concerning topics to be discussed. Rev. C. C. Coleman offered motion that the purpose as stated would be adopted, there were many seconds, motion carried.

Dr. Jackson asked the secretary to read a statement, "Campus Peace Anonymous" and "With Christ for Character and Country." Rev. Victor Wells offered motion that Friday's program of the convention be modified so as to give the major portion of the day to young people's discussions, etc. There were many seconds, motion carried. It was suggested that the History of the Negro in the United States of America in music be told as a part of the Friday program (every session) by Dr. Fred Hall, "Crime—Gangs—Dope," were suggested as topics. Suggested persons to lead topics are "Crime"—Phale Hale, "Gangs"—Moses Newson—"Dope" O. B. Burson. Other specialists would be invited to participate.

Suggestion was made that those bringing young people to New Orleans would contact Mrs. Nimitz, Chairman of a special committee to secure housing.

Dr. D. C. Washington mentioned a new book published by the Sunday School Publishing Board. "They Also Spoke"—by Dr. Kenny Williams, President Jackson's daughter. All were urged to purchase a copy. Dr. William Harvey spoke of the "Missionary Manual," which would be ready in September. A necessary publication

for National Baptist Churches. The session adjourned until 2:30 P.M. Rev. F. W. Coleman pronounced the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION—Board Meeting

Devotion led by convention singers—Mrs. Johnnie Howard Franklin and others. Rev. M. J. Brackett of Maryland offered prayer. Vice President Hampton presented Dr. J. H. Jackson who called for the New Orleans local committee to give further information. Secretary Jemison read a recommendation having to do with the names and work of the Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Congress. (See recommendation.) Vice President Hampton offered motion that recommendation be adopted, Rev. W. H. Dudley seconded, motion carried.

Rev. Phale D. Hale presented a proposal on Townsend Hall. After some discussion it was moved and seconded that the proposition be endorsed in principle and that the attorney would look closely with the committee into the feasibility of the proposition. Dr. C. H. Hampton was given \$500.00 to help in his trip to the World Alliance, upon motion duly seconded. After some discussion the motion was amended that the full fare of Dr. C. H. Hampton be paid. Motion carried. Rev. J. L. Ware reaffirmed the invitation to come to Birmingham in 1971 for the Annual Session of the Convention. Rev. W. T. Crutcher offered motion that report be adopted. Rev. Morris Burrell seconded, motion carried.

Dr. S. T. Alexander extended invitation for the 1972 session to meet in Fort Worth, Texas, which was accepted upon motion by E. T. Caviness and seconded by L. G. Carr, motion carried.

Rev. Louis Beauchamp extended invitation for 1974 session. Rev. L. G. Carr and Rev. William Harvey presented invitation for the 1974 session, which was withdrawn after some discussion.

President Jackson requested that the convention honor Vice President-At-Large E. D. Billoups. This idea was adopted on motion by O.B.J. Burson and seconded by W. C. Trotter and others, motion carried.

A letter was read from the National office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People giving appreciation to President Jackson for his support and leadership and requesting continued cooperation of National Baptist Churches. Rev. Charles Williams offered motion, Rev. Louis Beauchamp seconded, that we follow through with this request. Vice President Hampton expressed gratitude to the Board for the privilege of representing the convention at the World Alliance. The session closed with thoughts given to the memory of Board Members and brethren who had answered the roll call. Remarks were made by Rev. M. Brackett, the new President of Maryland Baptist Convention. Silent Prayers were offered and Rev. Brackett pronounced the benediction.

Recommendation

From President J. H. Jackson that was adopted
by the Board of Directors Unanimously.

The Sunday School Publishing Board, The Foreign Mission Board, the B.T.U. Board, and the Women's Auxiliary of this convention are legally related to said convention as auxiliary corporations, with the rights and authority of the parent corporation clearly set forth in the Charter and in Article 11 of the Constitution of the parent corporation.

The Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress of the National Baptist Convention,

U.S.A., Inc., is related to the parent corporation as an auxiliary corporation only as said Congress is the Congress of two member corporations of the parent corporation, namely: the Sunday School Publishing Board and the B. T. U. Board.

Therefore, I would recommend that the old legal name of the Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress will remain until such time as the parent corporation deem it wise and expedient to take the legal steps to guarantee that said Congress shall always be related to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., as an auxiliary corporation as specified in the Charter of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., and Article 11 of the Constitution of said body.

This recommendation does not in any wise limit any of the teaching and training experiences of the Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress in any of the aspects of Christian education, but the doctrinal position of the Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress is somewhat limited and restricted by its denominational affiliation.

This recommendation is given for the following reasons:

1. The new administration of the Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress should have more time to develop the program that has already been launched without becoming involved in a debate on the revision of the Charter and further amendments to the Constitution of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

2. The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. needs now to address itself to more urgent and important things than name changing of organizations, and the amending of its Constitution, unless said amendments will affect vitally the life of the convention for better work.

3. We do not need to engage in any kind of discussion at this time that would run the risk of dividing any of our forces when we need a more united front.

**THE PURPOSE OF YOUTH DAY IN THIS 90TH ANNUAL

Some have asked why this special Youth Day in the convention this year. In answer to this question we give the following reasons:

1. We seek to dramatize the fellowship between adults and young people as one of the methods of demonstrating the fact that some bridges have already been built over the so-called generation gap, and we know that it is possible for peoples of different generations to live together and work together in a spirit of goodwill.

2. Also, this is an effort to help build bridges where the generation gap is a tragic fact. It is our hope that young people and adults can be related in the American ideals of justice, freedom, and the equality of opportunity, and thus realize that age, occupation, race, or nationality should set no limits on the essential fellowship in a democratic society.

3. We believe that the capacity of our young people to build, to correct, and to improve this nation is great enough to summon them now to assume some constructive responsibilities. We do not believe that the call to destroy that which is imperfect should claim more of our attention than the summon to correct and to build.

4. We believe that our young people should help the young people of the nation to become more creative and more dedicated to the ideals of the nation.

5. We desire to rally the young people of this nation to study carefully the ideology of America and to do all within their power to help save this nation from further division and decay from within.

6. We seek to extend to our young people our concern, our care, and our confidence in them and to indicate to them our reliance on them as the constructive leaders for the future.

7. We seek a closer partnership between the young generation and the adults in the effort to preserve the tested values of the past as we build on a solid foundation for the new and untried events of the future.

8. We seek from our young people their evaluation and support of the principles of national unity endorsed by us and many leaders of the nation in 1965.

9. We seek to encourage as many young people as possible to join the campaign for national unity, or to inaugurate one of their own, designed to reduce tensions and eliminate the social evils of our nation by emphasizing the practice and the application of all the constructive principles of justice, freedom, and equality.

10. We wish to encourage young people as well as adults, in their commitment to Christ. We believe that through commitment to Christ there is inner strength and character for the individual, and that there is a tie that binds men together both as children of God and as members of the family of the redeemed with obligations to all of those who know not Christ.

In brief, we are asking young Americans to join us and the nation in uniting the ideals of Christianity and Patriotism to save this nation.

Wednesday Morning

The song service was conducted by Mrs. Johnnie Howard Franklin, the Reverend Emory L. Johnson and the Convention's singers.

The Season of Silent Prayer was called for by Dr. C. H. Hampton, Vice President. Following the Silent Prayer, Sentence Prayers were given by the following: For Our National Baptist Convention, Rev. M. R. Lemon, Illinois; For World Missions, Rev. W. T. Bigelow; For Our Nation, Rev. J. D. Henderson; and for the Peace of the World, Rev. Paul Fullilove, Massachusetts.

Dr. Hampton, in well-chosen words, presented Dr. J. H. Jackson, Our President, who made timely remarks and officially opened the 90th Annual Session. Dr. Jackson presented Brother Frank Davis of New York formerly of New Orleans who sang "How Great Thou Art."

Dr. Jackson in turn presented Dr. A. L. Davis, Jr., chairman of the local Entertainment Committee for the Welcome Program. Thursday Evening

A beautiful demonstration was presented by the Reverend Donis Myers and Boy Scouts from throughout the nation and the state. Reverend Myers worked hard to give a fine demonstration that was received well.

Time had now arrived for the Annual Oratorical Contest. Dr. I. H. Henderson,

Jr., was presented to give the guidelines for the contestants. The theme of the contest, "The Federal Constitution As a Basis for National Unity." In the absence of Dr. F. D. Haynes, Chairman of the Oratorical Commission, because of illness, Dr. E. A. Freeman presided. Judges for the contest were professionals from the City School System of New Orleans. The young people representing various states did a very excellent job.

The General Baptist State Convention of Mississippi paid \$23,000.00 to the National Baptist Convention on its indebtedness of \$100,000.00.

Secretary Jemison made a motion that was duly seconded by Dr. Morris Burrell that the book written, by Dr. Kenny J. Williams, "They Also Spoke" has been graciously accepted by the Convention, that 1000 would be purchased and given to the young people of the Convention. The motion was approved.

Friday Evening

A capacity audience had gathered to witness what was really to be a unique evening in the history of the National Baptist Convention. The idea of an Afro-American Song Pageant was born in the mind and heart of President J. H. Jackson.

The Rivergate was a fine setting for the expression of a way of life in song. Youth For God and Country. An Afro-American Song Pageant based upon times from early days of slavery to the present time, was written and directed by Dr. Frederick Hall.

The chorus of young people were members of the choirs of Dillard University and special groups from New Orleans, Baton Rouge and other cities of Louisiana.

The program was thrilling from start to finish. Dr. Jackson was presented and expressed appreciation to Dr. Hall for a fine presentation.

The Benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. H. Jackson.

Saturday Morning

The morning session was presided over by Vice President Charles H. Hampton. The devotions were led by the Reverend Foster S. Goodlett of Omaha, Nebraska. He read the 34th Psalm and offered the prayer. Music was rendered by the Convention Singers led by Mrs. Johnnie Howard Franklin.

The annual report from the Women's Auxiliary was given by Mrs. Mary O. Ross, the President. President Ross pledged anew the cooperation of the women and presented \$1,000.00 to the Parent Body. The report was received and adopted.

The Moderator's Hour was presided over by Reverend J. L. Vaughn, the President. All new Moderators were presented. The program as presented was very inspiring. The Moderators turned over to the Parent Body \$2,120.00, and spent \$774.00 as operating expense. The annual report was given by President J. L. Vaughn. The officers for the new year were approved on voice vote of the convention.

Saturday Afternoon

The afternoon session was presided over by Vice President, A. E. Campbell. Music was presented by the Convention Singers. The devotions were conducted by the Reverend W. C. Jackson of Memphis, Tennessee and the Reverend L. B. Sanders of Memphis. Scripture lesson was read by Reverend Jackson from 90th Psalm 1-10 verses. Prayer was offered by the Reverend Sanders.

President Jackson's Address

Mr. Presiding Officer, Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen:

As we are caught up in the struggle that is plaguing the nation, and feel the currents and the cross-currents of thought and actions, and hear claims and counter claims, and observe the effects of the blowing winds of change, and sense the tug of the forces of preservation at work to save the past; the question arises, where are we now in the history of our nation?

Is this the drama of constructive and creative change, or is this the tragedy of a falling and dying nation?

Are we now passing through another stage of growth, or are we lapsing into what future historians might elect to call a new stage of primitivity or another period that might be described as the dark ages in American civilization?

Are we now in the throes of the death pangs of modern history?

Has the bright and glaring lights of modern science blinded the eyes of the young and the old, and occasioned an inner darkness that sends us staggering through the streets of our cities as mad men lost in a hell of our own making?

Is this nation in travail and pain of a new birth of culture and moving towards new and higher ways of human association?

Is this our day of destiny, or the hour of doom for this republic?

Until the advent of the seventies, the weight of expressed opinion seems to have been that this is a new age of growth and a great awakening for the American people. Some said that our young people had seen new visions that impelled them to rise up and challenge their elders, and that they are now demanding of the present leaders to give to youth more traveling space by removing the hedges of tradition that hamper them and the barriers of custom that impede their progress. Then the young would be free to rise to greater heights—free to go on with the task of self-fulfillment and of building a broad new world better than the old and outmoded, evil and corrupt establishment of the present.

Hence there have been many demands made on the leaders of culture which seems to be just, reasonable, and true. And many of the present leaders of American culture have felt a sense of guilt and they have been willing to yield to the demands of youth. Some say that the issues, the conflicts, the political errors and the evils of our social order have impelled our young people to dissent, to revolt, and to resent the old order and to demand of their elders radical changes—not tomorrow, but now.

The View Of Destructionists

There is also another view that is being expressed with passion and purpose. This view is that we are now experiencing a serious confrontation with a movement and with an effort to dismantle the machinery of this our democratic state, downgrade her institutions, and destroy the whole fibre of Western Civilization.

No one needs to go witch hunting to find this group. There are some leaders who have been bold enough to put this philosophy in print and to record their destructive intentions in pamphlets, magazines and books; and some have been heard on radio, and others have been seen and heard on television screens.

So that we do not need to wait to ask Mr. J. Edgar Hoover who is doing what in this particular. We can go to our bookstores and purchase much of this literature on the destruction of America and also Western Civilization.

Jerry Rubin in his book entitled, **Do It**, has clearly and forcefully portrayed the nature and the purpose, and the philosophy of the Yippie revolution. Rubin calls himself a drop-out. Says he: "I dropped out of the white race and the American nation." (Page 13.) Hence he is detached from the nation and has no responsibility and no obligation to support it and help it to grow. He further states: "Yippies say if its not fun, don't do it. (Page 85.) Then he states further, "The Yippie idea of fun is overthrowing the government."

Regarding the universities, he says: "We got to destroy the universities." He then describes or prophesies some tragic results for this nation. Says he: "Every high school and college in the country will close with riots and sabotage, and cops will circle the campuses standing shoulder to shoulder." In his dream of destruction, he sees "millions of young people surging in the streets of every city, dancing, singing, and smoking pot, burning draft cards and stopping traffic."

In his view, "high government officials will defect to the Yippies, and black cops will join the black-and-white liberation army in the streets and then high school students will seize radio, T. V. and newspaper offices across the land, and police stations will be blown up.

"Yippie helicopter pilots will bomb police positions with LSD gas. As he sees it, 'kids will lock their parents out of their suburban homes and turn them into gorilla bases, storing arms. Banks will be broken into and they will join the bank tellers in taking all the money and burning it in gigantic barn fires in the middle of the city.'" Rubin says, "we're not protesting 'issues;' we are protesting Western Civilization." (Page 105.) In this philosophy the issues of war, peace, and racism may be used as occasions to dramatize their efforts at destruction and to win supporters of issues to their side. Says Rubin, "polit-

ical commentators in America are always looking for the causes behind campus disturbances. They blame the Vietnam war. As soon as the war is over the campuses will be back to normal, they think." But Rubin admits that it matters not how many demands are satisfied, they will not turn back from their campaign of destruction until the whole structure of American culture and civilization has been turned to dust. He says the following: "Give us an inch—we'll take a mile. Satisfy our demands, and we got twelve more. The more demands you satisfy, the more we got." (Page 135.)

Here we are today, facing a group of well-informed, intelligent, and committed people whose sole objective, according to their own words, is the utter destruction of the nation. And there is the other group in America who are using direct action, protest and demands for the purpose of improving the social order. What must we do in this tragic hour?

First, we must recognize that there are two distinct points of view—one to destroy, and another to correct. One to wreck the whole system and destroy both good and bad; the other is determined to right the wrongs of the nation.

We must not now call every dissenter an enemy of the nation and a member of the Yippie revolution. with the determination to destroy the nation. The right of dissent must not be taken away out of fear. All Americans must remain free to protest, to criticize, and to find fault with that which is wrong.

But now in our use of legitimate dissent we must be judicious and careful that we do not find ourselves helping those who desire to destroy and not to correct.

We must now study carefully the methods and the timing in dissent so that we will not allow our good intentions for social, political and economical correction and improvement to be used to corrode and to destroy our American democratic system.

But the right of dissent must no longer be used as a cloak to conceal the daggers of destruction that are in the hands of those who are committed to the overthrow of the nation's life.

We must not allow the presence of those committed to the overthrow of this nation prejudice us against those who love America and who still seek to work for full first class citizenship and for the attainment of all the civil and human rights to which all Americans are entitled.

In the struggle to save America it must be recognized that the true kinship of all citizens arises not from color, but from the cause embraced—not from pigment, but from the principles that impel; and not from race, but from the reason of what is right.

Keep in mind always that a white destructionist has more in common with a Negro destructionist than a Negro destructionist has in common with a Negro constructionist.

Therefore, the serious division in America today is between the two groups that we have just discussed—those who believe in America and seek to preserve her life, and those who recognize themselves as detached from the nation and who have resolved to destroy all the constructive things for which the nation stands.

The Polarization That Is Needed

I am against the polarization of the races, or the polarization between any groups of loyal American citizens; because such grouping in American society does violence to many human values and tends to enslave the souls of the innocent, and creates unnecessary factions among those Americans who have every reason to be united. People who believe in America and have no intentions of supporting those who are committed to national destruction will help them unnecessarily by the divisions among themselves. This country can become much stronger against those who work for its destruction, if all Americans will now banish from among themselves the conflicts that arise because of race and because of unjust practices between labor and management, and the jealousies between liberal and conservative Americans, and stand united for the health and strength of the nation. There is enough fundamental agreement between all the races, nationalities, economic, political and social groups, for them to unite and work for the preservation of America. For if these groups do not draw closer together on their fundamental agreements, they will by the defense and support of their differences drift further apart and be forced into the columns with those who have pledged the destruction of the nation's life.

It will require the united efforts of all Americans who believe in America to save this nation from the determined and passionate drive of these American destructionists. At the present time the destructionists within this nation are in the minority by far. But the longer they go on posing as the modern saviors of the nation and the Twentieth Century champions of freedom, the more they will influence others to join their ranks, and their influence will be increased.

There is a possibility of winning back to the cause of freedom those who are now arrayed against America because they have been misled, if we act in time. This united effort on the part of all Americans will generate a courageous patriotism that would help to purify the nation's life and heal many of the wounds and afflictions of the

past. Further, it would serve as a moral, social, and political deterrent that will make the propaganda and the work of the would-be destroyers of America more difficult, if not impossible.

When I was a boy on a farm in the south, chopping cotton was one of the essential steps in the cultivation of a cotton crop. The plow alone just could not keep the grass from growing on the row, and the grass and the weeds would choke out the life of the cotton stalk by stalk. But now science has produced a chemical that has all but put cotton chopping out of business. I'm sorry this discovery did not come earlier. Now this pre-merge put into the soil at planting time will kill the grass and weeds, and thus protect the cotton and it can grow unmolested and come to maturity and productivity.

Our patriotism and our devotion to the ideals of America can and will become the pre-merge that can kill off the weeds of prejudice and the grass of selfishness and discrimination, and will give the plants of justice and freedom a chance to grow and bear fruit; some thirty, sixty, and a hundred fold. We cannot do everything with the hoe of politics and with the guns of policemen; and the bayonets of soldiers. Even our courts, our judges and our jail houses cannot do everything to force the growth of freedom among all Americans. The land must be well prepared with the breaking plows of understanding, and the soil must be pulverized with the disk of goodwill and fertilized with appreciation and respect for others. Then, with the pre-merge of patriotism we may expect a better harvest in our national life without the unnecessary weeds and grass of social and political corruption. That is, we must do all within our power to bridge the gaps between all groups, including those who would destroy the nation. But if they cannot be won, I am for recognizing them as avowed enemies of the nation.

I am for the polarization between the would-be destroyers of America and those who seek to save the nation's life. I believe in dissent, but I do not believe in destruction. This nation cannot and should not try to incorporate into its body politic those who have resolved never to live within the framework of American laws and ideals. There is a distinct difference between loyal Americans who work to correct the nation's ills, and those Americans who have renounced all of their obligations to the nation and have told America by word and deed that their sole mission is the nation's destruction.

I also believe that any sinner who repents should be given another chance, and any criminal who has gone wrong and confesses his wrong and voices a willingness to come back and live in harmony and in fellowship with the people of his nation, should be given consideration and shown any possible degree of mercy. If criminals can be reclaimed all the better, but if they are determined to keep on their

way of destruction and use every means to rob, to kill and to destroy, then they must be regarded and treated as persons outside of the fellowship of the nation.

Let the wheat and the tares grow together only if the tares will compete simply by their growth. But when tares begin to move across the wheat field mowing down the wheat, then I say cut down the tares to save the remaining wheat. If any leniency towards criminals will encourage their crime and endanger more lives of innocent women, unarmed men and helpless children, then I say capital punishment must not be wholly dismissed. The Old Testament teaches an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. Where men are indifferent to the message of the New Testament, and will continue to spread vengeance and death upon innocent people, then the Old Testament doctrine must not be taken too lightly. Decent citizens must not be intimidated and desecrated by the avowed enemies of organized society. There is a difference—however painful the admission might be, there is a difference. Men who encourage their animal passions and take delight in proclaiming their intentions to turn the social order into a jungle as dangerous as a forest of wild beasts, must not be pampered or encouraged.

But I am convinced that this nation must devise a new penal code and a new method of dealing with mass crime. Our present system was built years ago when crime was more of an individual matter. But today group crime is becoming very prevalent, and there are many criminals that have no intention of ever obeying the law or becoming a part of the American system of life.

People who fall into this category should be separated from the rest of the population where they can live out their theory of human relations without jeopardizing the rights and the lives of others.

The penalty for those who have declared their intention to destroy the nation should be immediate and firm, but such persons should be allowed the opportunity to grow out of their destructive state of mind. They should be assigned places in a community where they could live with those of like minds, and they should be responsible for the economic life they build. The nation should advance to them essential loans to help in their economic efforts and to help to create a market for their economic produce, and allow them to run their own affairs in their own walled city or separate community. And as they grow in social refinement and responsibility, they should be allowed to return to the main stream of American life if they so desire. Sociologists, social psychologists, business men, labor leaders, lawyers and psychiatrists, should be allowed to work on such a plan with the people in question, that would give to them a community and field of experience that would be educative to them and protec-

tive for those loyal citizens who wish to pursue their lives in the mainstream of American culture.

*Three Attitudes Towards The Present Plight
Of The Nation*

First, there are those among us who have adopted a pollyanna attitude towards the present plight of America. They assume that America is too strong to be weak, too rich to be poor, and too secure to suffer defeat at the hands of enemies. They say this nation cannot fall, and hence they go on their merry way spending their time in pursuit of all the pleasures and all the benefits that can accrue from this existing social order.

But while such indifferent people slumber in their chambers of ease and comfort, the work of national destruction goes on all around them, and when we compare the state of this nation with other great nations and civilizations that have fallen, we warn the indifferent that America can fail. High skyscrapers and low ethical standards cannot preserve the life of any nation. Strife, bitterness, group prejudices, oppression, hatred of one's country, and the growing desire and determination to wreck the nation, can destroy America.

2. A second attitude which is also most dangerous is a defeatist attitude. There are some leaders among us who have already surrendered, and they have said the moral decay within America is too far gone now. The confusion among national leaders cannot be corrected in time. The strife among groups is too deadly, and the divisions that are plaguing America stand in the way of that essential unity that is required for the life and continuity of any democratic society. Some have gone to the extreme of setting the date and the year of America's death, and they have announced that there is no hope for this nation because she is afflicted with a moral and spiritual cancer for which there is no cure. The prophets of doom can be heard in many sections of the country. Some are in school houses, some in churches, and some are members of political parties. The domestic enemies of the nation are most determined and utterly committed to the overthrow of this nation. Flag burning and campaigns of economic, moral, and political destruction are designed to bring the nation low, and the opponents from across the seas are just as certain and sure of America's death as are those who are boring from within. The prime minister of communist China said a few days ago, that "America was a paper tiger," and prophesied the defeat of so weak a creature. The prime minister of the Soviet Union, reflecting on America's confusion, expressed the certainty that this nation would fall from inner strife, and is no longer able to extend

it was never intended that the nation should be controlled by a small committee, though representing the several states. These men in the Congress of the United States have their share of responsibility, but the task is too much for them alone. The labor of deliverance for this great republic is beyond the bureaucrats, local and national politicians. Washington has its place and its function, but no one city in this nation can save us. The task belongs to all of the people. Every group, every race and nationality, and every individual American is called today to enter the field of service and become brave and determined soldiers in the army of freedom and in the cause of democracy; for there are many more reasons to join this army with a constructive purpose than there are to join the conspiracy of national destruction and death.

The Meaning Of American Salvation

What do we seek to save when we commit ourselves to the task of saving this nation?

First, let us note what we do not seek to save:

We do not seek to save the past sins of the nation or to keep intact the evils found in the status quo. We do not seek to resist necessary and essential changes for good and for a better life for all American citizens. We would not save racism in any form or preserve segregation and discrimination and oppression. We would not preserve the political, social, and economic corruption that have enslaved the weak and innocent, pauperized the homes and the spirits of the poor. If we could, we would banish from the records of history the cruel and iniquitous deeds of chattel shavery and all of the results thereof, and would erase from memory the exploits of the old lynching mobs and wash away from our souls with the flowing tears of repentance, every murderous deed that has been committed upon the bodies, minds, and souls of every victim of hatred and prejudice. But when we speak of the salvation of America, we mean the preservation of all of those sacred principles that have made the nation great, such as justice, freedom, goodwill, and human understanding. We mean the preservation of the freedom of speech, freedom of the press, the freedom from fear, the freedom from want, and the freedom to worship God according to the dictates of our conscience.

In this venture we mean further to preserve and develop our system of public education by which the knowledge and the wisdom from the past may be passed on to coming generations in such a way that they will be encouraged to become creative thinkers and builders of a greater and a more democratic society.

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America saved, is the continuation of an association of men, races, and nationalities from many countries on the basis of the Constitution that relates all men morally and spiritually as children of a common father and not in terms of the external costumes they wear and the material goods they possess. We will keep before us that moral climate and moral imperative that impel us to respect ourselves and which compels us to respect the dignity of other men. America is an opportunity, a way of life, and a dedication that makes proper use of all the material resources of life without turning them into golden calves to be honored and worshiped as idol gods.

If our huge skyscrapers should bow their heads to mingle with the elements and to return to the dust that they once were, and if the massive nature of our present culture should be forced to shrink by misfortune, or the unwelcome cataclysm of nature, and many of our present comforts should fade and die; America is that patience, that desire, that will, and that determination that would sustain our morality and our morale as we go forward to face the future with the vision to create in our minds, and the tools of production in our hand.

If anyone has seen a new social order coming down to earth from the heavens of creation, we ask of him to allow us to keep the tested values of the order that we now possess until the social engineers have had a chance to read and decipher the blueprint of the new order and make it known to all who await the day of better things. Until that day shall come, count us among those who will go on working, sacrificing and praying for the purity, the continuity of the social order called America.

What Are Some Of The Elements Of This Struggle?

1. We must seriously rededicate ourselves to the American ideology and philosophy. We cannot expect the ideology of any other nation or any other society, or any other social philosophy to save us.

To those who have urged and advocated the destruction of America, I say to them, let us not be too hasty and commit ourselves to the act of destroying the good with the bad. There is enough soundness in our body politic to warrant this venture of salvation. A study of the 194 years of the history of this republic will reveal to all of us that wherever and whenever this nation has failed, it has been due to the fact that she has left her prescribed way of life. She has broken her own laws, sinned against her own adopted principles, broken her promises, and substituted some other way for her own way of justice, righteousness and truth. It is too early to think of

destroying the achievements and fruits of our American civilization with so many of her constructive principles remaining to be invested, accepted, and followed.

It has taken civilized man many decades and centuries, yea, millions of years, to come from his primitive beginning to his present level of culture and human understanding. It will take far more than 194 years for the citizens of America to develop the insights and the moral stamina that will enable them to develop a grasp of the oughtness of conscience that will lead them from theory to practice in the matter of human brotherhood and the understanding of our responsibility to each other and to the social order in which we live. Let America be America. Let her pledge of loyalty to her people be kept, and let her duty to her citizens never be forgotten, and let all Americans learn anew the true meaning of citizens' responsibility to their nation as well as the nation's responsibility and debt to her citizens.

2. America must re-appraise all of her constructive institutions before surrendering them to the blowing winds of change. We must study these institutions and understand their relationship to the past history of the nation and to the growth of our culture before surrendering them on the advice of politicians or the recommendations of liberals who have little or no commitment to the historic values that have made this nation great.

The American home must not be destroyed on the advice of physical scientists or on promises from any sociologist. The unlettered mother and the ordinary father in a family, know that the technique and practice of abortion is no way to build a family, a community, or a nation. While we are pledged to respect the law, we are not obligated to depend on the law to tell us how to maintain creative relationships within our family circle. If abortion laws are written on the statute books of every state, and if the federal government approves the practice, and the Congress of the United States should sanction them, I urge upon all Americans to be slow in their employment of the weapon of death against the amateur and infant cells before they are fully formed into a living human specimen chartered by nature for its journey from the matrix of conception to the gates of birth. The very idea as normal medical procedure carries with it overtones of moral laxity and human defeat.

In the name of progress, let us be slow to commit ourselves to a way of life that would tend to lead us against the idea of the sacredness of all human personality and our responsibility to generations yet unborn. For the laws of life cannot be violated or vitiated without flirting with the horrors of the death of human kind. Let us be as scientific as we can, and as well-informed on the problems of population explosion as we must, but let us not put more confidence

in the determinism of pills than in the providence of God. Without the family and all of the sacred ties that go with it, a democratic society is threatened, and western civilization is imperiled.

Time would fail me to speak at length on the courts as tabernacles of justice and referees of human failures and struggles. We know without argument, that a government of the people and for the people, and by the people must always cherish the untarnished ballot and the freedom to make use of the same.

The institution of public education must not be played down or disrespected if the generations yet to come will learn to appreciate their heritage.

As Americans, we must not be ashamed or afraid to re-trace our steps and seek to correct our errors and mistakes in our efforts to improve our social order. We need to re-study the whole course of integration as it relates to the racial struggle in these United States of America. In such a study we may discover that in too many instances we have deviated from the purpose and objectives of the matter as defined by the supreme law of our land. Based on the Federal Constitution, and especially the Bill of Rights, I would say that integration means the right to enjoy all of the privileges and the opportunities of our American democratic system, and to assume all of the responsibilities pertaining thereto. This principle is to be applied to every area and facet of our lives. The American philosophy of freedom does not grant to any people special privileges and rights that would infringe upon the rights of others; neither does this philosophy restrict or set limits on any person or persons because of their race, nationality, or economic status.

Once this basic right is granted, how well it shall be used, and what individuals and groups may achieve thereby; must depend largely on individual initiative and group commitment and participation. It was never intended that integration would be used to disintegrate the talents and the abilities of any race or any group. It was never intended to be a political weapon employed by politicians to get votes and to deceive the people. It was not designed as a device to use young people and innocent children as a means of punishing adults who have been slow to change from their self-centered commitment to segregation, and who have not been willing to accept the American concept of freedom and justice to all Americans. Integration in American culture can never succeed as a means of population control and the forced association of the races on a percentage basis. It is as unfair, unreasonable and un-American, to attempt to force one race to stay where it does not desire to stay, as it is to keep another race from moving in another community where it has not only elected to live, but has the means to do so. If our educational system is not to

be compromised and down-graded, the nation must accept the scientific tests approved by educational psychology to determine a student's fitness to remain in any particular class. Students must be classified according to their intelligence quotients and promoted according to their educational achievements.

When the Department of Health, Education and Welfare decides that in a particular school room there must be a certain percentage of white students and a certain percentage of Negro students, they are setting standards of racial mixing that cannot be justified according to the findings of educational psychology. We know well that not all white people are assets to a class room or a community, and not all Negroes are liabilities. There are in both races criminals, morons, idiots, and the mentally retarded—and a white criminal is just as dangerous as a Negro criminal, and a white idiot is just as dumb as a Negro idiot, and a white fool is as much fool as a fool whose skin is of a darker hue.

We must now leave off the gimmicks, the hypocrisy, and the cheap politics in this matter, and accept one universal standard of American citizenship as proclaimed and promised in the supreme law of the land. Integration must not be used as a tool of revenge—it must be simply a matter of observing the laws of human relation as expounded in the Bill of Rights, and as sanctioned by the American philosophy of freedom, and by the Judeo-Christian ethics of life.

Negroes And The Dangers Of Deception

In our anxiety to win complete victory for ourselves and our cause, we now have the added responsibility of guarding ourselves against the many deceptions that are thrown against us.

There are those who would make us believe that we can move forward faster by allowing people to set us against each other and against the nation, and against peoples of a different color. They would make us believe that we have attained sufficient strength so that we need not worry about hard study, hard work, and dedication to a task. This is not an easy struggle, and the victory ultimately, will still go to those who are best prepared and most dedicated.

Some of us have been told that the time has come for the use of guns and weapons of destruction, but we have learned most painfully that a community that will shoot down policemen with snipe's fire and teach disrespect for public officials and for the officers of the law, will also murder girls enroute to school and assassinate young boys on the doorsteps of their homes and in churches. Once we let loose vengeance and unbridled lust for murder, we make

ourselves the victims of the same. Some have led us into a way of life that has resulted in our communities being called the most criminal in all the major cities of the nations.

Beware of those who make gestures of kindness by using the memory of the dead to cover up their misuse and mis-direction of the living.

A story appeared in the Chicago Sun Times Friday, June 19, 1970, that seems to be one of vicious deception. It stated: "The Cook County Young Republican Club narrowly voted Thursday night to endorse the establishment of a national holiday in honor of a civil rights leader. The vote, after heated debate, was 47 to 46 in favor. Speaking in favor of this holiday, Roy PIPPS, executive director of the 60th Ward Young Republicans said: 'It is time the Republicans showed we are not a right wing racist organization.' The vote on the proposed holiday came after a vote to revise the entire race relations plank eliminating the words black and white in favor of more general words such as individuals and peoples." This is most interesting.

Why did not this young Republican Club of Cook County make the race relations plank stronger for the good of the living and for the advancement of the cause of first class citizens? Why did they seek to make more general what is most specific, and that is the age-old conflict between black and white? For we cannot by the use of new terms or a new use of old ones, dismiss a problem that is so basic in our culture. And we cannot by the use of language refine out of our social experiences this tragic fact that had its genesis in chattel slavery and has continued in the form of racial discrimination and segregation.

This statement of Mr. Roy PIPPS is a serious inditement against the Republican Party as the party in power. What has happened or has not happened in this party that could lead one of its own members to think and to say that "IT IS TIME THE REPUBLICANS SHOWED WE ARE NOT A RIGHT WING RACIST ORGANIZATION." Making a statement like this on the 19th day of June 1970, gives to the Republican Party an image that it should not have. I agree with Mr. PIPPS that it is time for the Republican Party, and every other party for that matter, in the United States, to show that it is not a racist organization—be it north or south, white or black, right wing or left wing.

It is unfortunate that Mr. Roy PIPPS and the members of the Cook County Young Republican Club did not turn to Attorney Leonard Garment who is President Nixon's liaison man in civil rights for information that could establish the fact that such a statement was not necessary. I fear that Mr. Garment as a liaison man in civil rights must take some of the blame for the image of the present administra-

tion in matters of human rights. Mr. Garment had the opportunity to help the present administration in carrying forward the work that had already been started in better human relations and improved civil rights. Sixty days after Mr. Nixon took office there were leaders in this country willing and ready to join with the new president to help him both with domestic policies as well as foreign policies. Names of outstanding leaders were sent to Mr. Garment who had voiced a willingness to join in the battle for a stronger and better America. Mr. Garment either forgot these communications or overlooked the importance of them.

I fear that too much political propoganda has been made out of the statement by some of the presidents aids such as, "President Nixon's administration was willing to give consideration to civil rights but he did not owe the Negro anything because they did not support him.

The fact is, that there was a coalition between Negroes, Republicans and Democrats, white and black, who voted for President Nixon because they were concerned about the preservation and unity of the nation. These voters wanted to encourage further development in the struggle for first class citizenship without the confusion and the destructive tendencies that some had associated with the worthy cause of civil rights. And without these votes, President Nixon would not have been in the White House today. There were some judges of our courts who felt moved if invited, to serve with the Nixon administration. Mr. Leonard Garment could have assisted in capturing this force, and this force scattered throughout the nation would have been in position not only to help the president with his program, but to interpret the forward moving work in the field of civil rights.

It is always unfortunate when a program for the betterment of all the states and communities, and all groups, is so little known out in these communities that an aid to the president of the United States must seek to defend the administration after the attacks have been made by organizations and leaders of long standing in the nation. Some have asked the question, did Mr. Garment expect that the philosophy of the executive director of the 60th Ward Young Republican Club would be sufficient to placate and satisfy those loyal Americans who still believe that much remains to be done before this nation can be united and strengthened in all of its democratic commitments and responsibilities?

It is well to honor the past and to remember heroes who have gone before us, but do not do it to the neglect and the disregard for the needs of the present. I say to Negroes, we must not be too easily fooled or deceived when men seek to satisfy us with memorials while they are indifferent to the active and positive ventures in on-going programs designed to give to every American their full democratic rights.

We say to our leaders, do not tell us what you do not mean, and do not wave banners of peace when you are committed to a war of oppression and subterfuge.

We still ask and seek the full loaf of American citizenship with all the rights and responsibilities pertaining thereto.

Our souls thirst for the clear and pure waters of love and respect—poison them not with the arsenic of hate and oppression. Holidays for the dead are fine if they are not expected to co-exist with the hovels and ghettos for the living, and with the privation and suffering of the hungry and the needy. For if human needs are not met in the present, memorials represent hollow mockery and a shame before God and man.

As sons of America we ask bread. Do not feed us the embellished rocks for the dead.

Our children cry for the fish of equality, feed them not the serpents of political intrigue and deception.

We are entitled to the flesh of the fatted calf in our Father's house. Give us not the husk of the swine of hypocrisy from the filthy pens of a foreign ideology.

Do not freeze the cause of universal freedom in monuments of stone or embalm the movement for civil rights in cold plaques and lifeless statues, or bury the noble thrust for human dignity in the silent tomb of the past and in the lifeless graves of yesteryears.

Sing as loudly as you may the songs of yesterday, but do not drown out the pleading voices of the present and the future, and forget not the unsatisfied desires of the here and now, and the unfulfilled dreams of the days yet to come.

Say what you will, write what you must, but do not attempt to hold back the rising sun of better human relations, or stay the break of a better and more glorious day in the experience of human justice and freedom.

*We Call Upon Negroes Now To Help Lead
America Into A New Day Of Justice And Freedom*

Because of my faith in the maturity of my people, and because I believe we are qualified to assume this type of leadership in the nation, I appeal to the American Negro to assume now some of the responsibility for helping to lead this nation out of its present chaos. It does not necessarily require millions of dollars or a mastery of the material things of the nation to give to people the power of leadership

in the nation today. The humble and the ordinary people who are dedicated to the higher moral principles of life can give moral leadership to a divided and confused nation. The issue today is an issue of correct human relations and the method of working together in such a way that the highest good may be achieved for the greatest number. The problem then, is more moral than political or economic.

Let us now continue the drive for enriching America's life and helping to win more civil rights battles by making the nation as a whole MORE CIVIL and MORE RIGHT. For the PURER THE NATION, the PURER will all of her gifts be to her children; and the higher the nation climbs in knowledge and appreciation of better human relations, the clearer will the majority see and appreciate the moral and social values that make all of us brothers under a common flag and kinsmen under the Federal Constitution. Those of us who have drifted from the nation's ideals, let us come back to America and re-dedicate ourselves to her task and mission.

We must no longer believe that because of the sins or the mistakes of a few people in the white community we ought to proceed to punish or to attack the whole community. Because an unfortunate event takes place in one part of a city, we need not picket the whole city; for there are people in the white community who do not condone the sins of white racists and white criminals. It is wrong to punish the righteous with the wicked, and to condemn our friends with the enemies among us.

This blanket condemnation of white people by some Negro leaders is the same kind of punishment that was once meted out to the whole Negro community by those white racists who sought to intimidate and to punish a whole Negro community for the mistake or the crime of which some one Negro had been accused. When there is conflict and disturbances in a community, that is the time when peoples of goodwill of both races ought to find a common meeting ground and move together for the purpose of reducing tensions, apprehending the criminal, and bringing justice to pass; but at the same time, saving as nearly as possible the peace and goodwill of the community.

We must be firm in our refusal to follow those Negro leaders who specialize in the task of inflaming a community and encouraging strife and division between the races. Time has proved that Negro leaders who seek to stir up and to keep alive conflicts and misunderstandings are working in their own interest and against the welfare of both races, and against the whole community. There have been cases when such apostles of mal-content have spoken in the name of the entire Negro community without the knowledge of the people whom they say they represent, and some of them who have asked us to help drive white people from our communities have gone behind our

backs and formed agreements with respectable white leaders for their own aggrandizement. Let me recall one case in point.

The Vivian Curfew

On December 15, 1969, the Rev. C. T. Vivian announced as spokesman for more than one hundred black community organizations, a curfew to be imposed against all white people in Negro communities in Chicago. These were his exact words: "Effective immediately, a 6 P.M. to 6 A.M. curfew is established for all whites in the black community."

This was one of the most racist and most inflammatory statements made on the race issue in Chicago in 1969. It was both senseless, hostile, and fraught with emotional tensions that could have set the whole city aflame. For at the time of the statement, there were many Negro people still on their jobs in white communities, and some Negro women who worked in domestic services were en route to catch busses in all white communities, and there were white businessmen in their offices and stores in the Negro community. It would have been impossible for some of these people to get out of the Negro community by 6 P.M., and yet Rev. Mr. Vivian makes the statement and announces it goes into effect immediately. White people could have retaliated, and irresponsible Negroes could have launched an unprovoked attack on every white person they saw in the Negro community. The truth was, no organization had empowered the Rev. Mr. Vivian to make such a statement, but he makes it in the name of the Negroes of Chicago.

When many Negro leaders in the Chicago community began investigating Mr. Vivian's position and his right to make such a statement, it was discovered that Rev. Mr. Vivian had been selected to head what is known as the Black Strategy Center, the funds for which were to be raised by some of the outstanding business men in downtown Chicago, and the pledge of \$800,000.00 had been made, and the Rev. Mr. Vivian had been promised a salary of \$25,000.00 to head this Black Strategy Center.

It is strange and almost unreasonable that a man being supported by some of the finest business men in the white community would make such a pronouncement. He knew when he made the statement what his relationship was to the white community and how he was depending on them for financial support. And yet, he was trying to convey to Negroes that he was anti-white. In this fact he was a traitor to the business men in the white community with whom he had made an agreement, and was a liar and a hypocrite in his attempt to incense Negroes against whites while he himself had formed an

alliance with them.

Too much of this kind of hypocrisy is being used in America today by those who profit by their propaganda and grow fat on their campaign of vilification, misunderstanding, and confusion. Negroes must be on the alert and take a public stand against such duplicity and such campaigns of hatred and discrimination on the part of supposed Negro leaders themselves.

Full time agitators who are paid to work for confusion must no longer be tolerated or supported by Negro people or white people. We must recognize them for what they are—deceivers and enemies of this nation, and workers for the cause of divisions, hatred, and national destruction.

Let us not deceive ourselves; we are not by nature weaklings. We are strong enough now to assume our share of responsibility in helping to lead this nation out of its present chaos to a new day of deliverance and freedom. We have new opportunities in practically every area in American life. We must use those opportunities to do more than react against, and protest the remaining barriers of first class citizenship. We must now use all of our strength to help preserve this nation and to bring it to a new level of fulfillment. We must not overlook the fact that we have new and higher positions in institutions of learning, and some of the members of the Negro race not only are heads of departments and full time professors in our best universities, but some of them are now presidents of some of the best and largest universities in this country. At this time the ballot box is in the hands of more Negroes north and south, than ever before in the history of this country. We must use this strength as a means of helping to correct the errors of the nation and to support the cause of justice and freedom.

We can well afford now to enhance the march to the ballot box. for the more effective we are in this march, less time we may need in the so-called direct action and protest. With such an opportunity at the ballot box we cannot afford to spend all of our time seeking revenge over the failures of the past and asking this age and generation to pay us reparations for what was done against our forefathers.

The politics of cooperation is far more constructive and creative than the politics of revenge and retaliation. Already many white Americans have not only voiced their willingness to cooperate with us in the field of politics, they have actually joined with us in helping to elect Negro candidates to some of the highest offices in the nation. According to a recent report, this year Negroes now have 10 members in the Congress of the United States of America, 173 state legislators, 51 mayors of towns and cities, and 701 other city and county officials. We may boast now of 423 school board members, 228 law enforcement officers, and 1 United States Senator.

In many of these cases the election of Negroes would have been impossible without the support of many of the white voters. It is expected that the year 1970 will set a record in election gains for Negroes. The doors of the establishment are opening to us and we are being called upon to share our talents and to enjoy the blessings of our democratic system. These are some of the reasons why we must do all within our power to preserve the nation and make it greater still.

My hope is that we are going to do more than blame the members of the majority group for all the failures in our respective communities and in the nation. Since 1954, we ourselves as a people, have not only had great opportunities; in so many instances, we have not used these opportunities as constructively as we might.

Today we are called upon to help save our young teenage groups generally called youth gangs. This is our responsibility primarily—the responsibility of the home, the responsibility of the church, and the responsibility of all the leaders within the Negro community. It does not take millions of dollars for us as adults to set new standards of behavior for the young. We need not be wealthy to apply the wisdom and the common sense that time has taught us. A person need not wait until he lives on the finest street in the city and owns the biggest car, and has a fine bank account before he thinks in terms of the development of character and the enrichment of human personality.

What shall we now do to make our own streets safe from ourselves for ourselves? What shall we do and say to our young people to encourage them to turn from the evils of dope and to resist the temptations of crimes, and to refuse to join with gangs to destroy both property and human life? There are many parents living in the so-called ghettos who can tell you of the fine fellowship within their families and with their sons and daughters.

The Leadership Of The National Baptist Convention In Recent Years

The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. has given leadership to this nation. In 1957 when there was much doubt about the passage of the so-called Eisenhower Civil Rights Bill, it was the leadership of the National Baptist Convention that launched from the city of Chicago a nationwide "Urge Congress Movement," by sending telegrams and letters to senators and congressmen urging that the Bill would be resurrected and passed. Some historians have said that without the "Urge Congress Movement" this piece of legislation for civil rights would not have passed.

In 1965 it was the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., through its leadership, that called the nation's attention to the importance of appreciation of itself, uniting its strength, and developing the resources to make it possible for the nation to go forward with strength and dispatch. It was the National Baptist Convention who issued the **Call To National Unity**, an appeal to governors of states, mayors of cities, and city councils. Our efforts in this respect bore fruit, and an editorial in the Nashville Banner, Nashville, Tennessee, applauded the **Call**, and then said in these telling lines: "Heed it America: A call to unity as elementary as the vision of need and sense of duty on which it rests." We rejoice that on July 4, 1970, there was a response led by Billy Graham and Bob Hope five years after the **Call** was issued by us, and after the Nashville Banner had called upon America to heed the challenge of the **Call**.

Youth Rally

In the 90th session of this convention we have dedicated a whole day, September 11, 1970, to be used to strengthen America, to inspire Americans, and to dramatize the type of fellowship that can save this nation from despair. This comes about because of our sense of responsibility to our race and to all America, and to our God.

We have invited young high school people, people from colleges and universities, and from other denominations. We have included Protestants and Catholics, Gentiles and Jews. This special day is not an attempt at proselyting or winning others to the Baptist family. We are inviting our fellow-Christians to join with us in a quest for answers to some of the staggering problems before the nation today.

This is not to be a partisan political rally, for we have invited members of both major parties to share with us their ideas and their thinking on this occasion.

We have not restricted our concern to the field of religion, hence we have invited college presidents and have sent out purpose to Harvard University as well as to other institutions of learning. This is not a meeting to widen the generation gap, for along with the students we have invited parents and other adults. Some of the young people will speak to us on the topic, **The Federal Constitution—The Basis Of National Unity**. Others will discuss their relationship to the problem of campus peace; and on Friday evening, Dr. Fred Hall, with a great choral group of possibly more than two thousand, will tell the story of the coming of Negroes to America, their experiences in the shadows of servitude, and their struggles and attainments since the day of emancipation.

At the close of this great concert we have asked that some of us will conduct an all night prayer vigil asking God's guidance for the nation and its people, and forgiving all of us for our sins, that the nation might be enriched by divine mercy and be moved to disseminate justice and to share freedom and understanding for all the people.

This special day does not come in response to demands or threats; we have had neither from the young people of our denomination. This comes as an inspiration and as guidance, and as a sense of responsibility for the needs of our people. All Americans who desire to join us in prayer are welcomed. It matters not what may be their political faith and their religious belief. We require only one thing—and that is, whoever comes will be in sympathy with the ideals of justice, freedom, and democratic fellowship.

The support of the principles of the purpose of our Youth Day, by July 31, 1970, was most encouraging. Many of the leaders throughout our convention were most enthusiastic, and thousands of our supporters lauded the idea.

There were leaders from other denominations in their admiration—eighteen college presidents gave their unqualified support, and twenty members of the United States Congress and ten United States Senators joined us in their support and praise of the ideals involved.

A New Appreciation For The Philosophy Of The President Of This Convention

Critics once said that I did not love my race, I was against civil rights, and hated some of those who worked for civil rights. But in spite of all of our critics, we have enjoyed a working fellowship, and have been sustained by the members of this convention. Since last year, a growing number of other people have expressed a constructive appreciation for the philosophy advanced by the leadership of this convention.

First, allow me to mention an organization of conservative white American citizens who selected me last year as their American Patriot, and presented this citation: "To Dr. J. H. Jackson, Dedicated American For His Years Of Service To God And Country To Keep Our Nation Free. Patriot Of The Year, September 21, 1969."

Second, Professor, Herbert J. Storing, a liberal professor at one of our most liberal universities, The University of Chicago, in the Department of Political Science, said of the president of this convention:

Said he: "He is an American patriot, and it is his understanding

of the American ideal that guides him even while he is criticizing America. . . He gives thoughtful expression to the idea that the Negroes' aim is to be fully a part of America, not to reject it or to separate from it, and that he should adopt means consistent with that end. Jackson emphasizes the need for political action and for strenuous efforts toward black self-improvement in business, education, and elsewhere. Clearly he has strong links to the tradition of Booker T. Washington. Yet even more interesting to the present-day reader, perhaps, are the similarities to black nationalists and black power arguments. Many leaders who scorned Jackson's ideas as uncle tomism have themselves adopted some of these same ideas under the name of black power." ¹ (Page 133-134)

But the title of the author's book is a question: "What Country Have I?" I do not have to argue this question, for he knows from what I have said, I have long since made my choice. I belong to America. I owe a debt of gratitude to her for allowing me a place to be born and space to live and move and work for my own fulfillment and for the fulfillment of this nation. I can say with James Weldon Johnson:

"This Land is ours by right of birth
and by right of toil."

Fellowship But Not Merger

Do not misunderstand, I believe in fellowship with all peoples and all groups, but this does not mean that I am willing to sacrifice the mission of the National Baptist Convention by merging with other groups.

There are several Negro denominations that have opened talks toward a merger with other white religious bodies. For this I have no word of criticism, but I have not taken part in this, and I do not recommend merger or organic union.

What I have said about organic union with other denominations I say also regarding a proposed Pan Baptist Movement in America.

Pan Baptist Movement In America

From the newspaper account of the address of the president of the American Baptist Convention May 13, 1970, Dr. Thomas Kilgore, Jr. called for a Pan Baptist Movement under which "more than twenty million church goers, black and white, could make common cause against racism, war, and secularism." We of the National

Baptist Convention believe in fellowship between all of our Baptist groups in the United States of America and of the world. We enjoy that fellowship in the Baptist World Alliance. Historically the North American section of the Baptist World Alliance has had a peculiar fellowship of its own because of their proximity and a common language, and a close cultural kinship. But personally, I do not believe that there is a great need for any kind of merger between Baptist groups that would tend to expand the size of the body politic without deepening the spiritual experience of all concerned.

If the Pan Baptist Movement in America means the kind of fellowship to which I referred above, then we have it already without the merging of the autonomy of all of these groups under one organic body. But if this Pan Baptist Movement in America means any form of organic union, personally, I would not recommend it to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., or merger with other white denominations, for several reasons.

1. Many of the so-called liberal white Christians in America today are known for their repentance of the past record of racial segregation and discrimination in America. (For which we are grateful.) They have now accepted guilt for white racism of the past, and for some of our militant Negroes, this repentance and change of heart among white Christians in the matter of race, is to these said liberals a form of victory over racism.

But it is not healthy for Negro Baptists, or Negro Christians to merge with white Christians at the point of the concern and repentance for the past sins of white racism. For our sins of racism have not as yet led us to repentance, and we have little or no sense of guilt for white racism. At this point Negro people would be weakened in a merger of this kind, for we would be on what we think is the receiving end, and white Baptists would be on the giving or the concession-making end. While the white Baptists would be growing in grace through their repentance, Negro Baptists would be standing still and atrophying, and this atrophy would hurt us in other areas of our moral life. In order to grow as Christian believers, we must always live in an attitude of repentance and confession. A merger of all Baptist groups would get for us (or at least we think would get for us,) a larger share in the economic possessions owned by white Baptists, and would get for us exemption from the sting and penalty of racism, but would not necessarily put upon us a greater kingdom burden and a greater sense of personal responsibility for improving the relationship between all human beings.

2. In the next place, to become a part of an organization that is rich in material substances and to fall heir (as it were) to institutions and resources that have come from stocks and bonds, oil wells, and other areas of American wealth, might further teach a form of de-

pendence that would weaken the desire for racial and denominational independence, and might hurt or hinder our growth in stewardship. A people should never learn to be satisfied with bragging about things that they have not been willing to help build themselves. It is better to build than to brag if we wish to grow in the stewardship of the Master.

3. If all Negro Baptists joined with white Baptists of America in forming one big Baptist organization, we would still have some Negroes forming units that they might well call a black caucus, and these black caucuses would not be for the purpose of urging Negroes to refine the talents that they have and to harness the same in making the new body politic more spiritual and more dedicated to the cause of freedom and redemption. But there would be the drawing up of a list of demands and then protesting to the white majority for certain things the black minority felt that they should have and receive. This was true in the American Baptist Convention before Dr. Thomas Kilgore was elected president.

In May of 1970, a group of Negro Baptist leaders in the Chicago Baptist Association formed what they called "a fellowship of pastors of Afro-American churches of the Chicago Baptist Association," and they drew up a statement to be presented to the board of directors of the Chicago Baptist Association. The statement says in part: "Be it known to the Association that the pastors of the Afro-American Baptist Churches in the Chicago Baptist Association have come together and formed a fellowship."

"We believe that in these turbulent times we have been called together by Jesus Christ in order to effect a more adequate ministry. In obedience and hope we form this fellowship, (1) to provide a mutually supported ministry and share with one another ideas and resources to meet problems and situations in the black community which we have in common. (2) To exercise new forms of ministry and leadership in the Chicago Baptist Association to effect church renewal and social change. (3) To deal more specifically with problems which affect our local ministry."

Then they point out that one of the problems is black identity. "Black people have long found out that in order to bring about their total inclusion within our society they need to find their own identity and affirm their cultural heritage so that this inclusion takes place with mutual respect and appreciation."

"We feel that the Chicago Baptist Association and the American Baptist Convention can aid this process by taking further steps in making its materials, educational program, and its total structure included in the black experience."

This latter statement made by some of our brilliant ministers could be interpreted as both comical and tragic in the light of the facts. Some of these men were once members of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., and some of them now hold a dual relationship. Most all they ask of the Chicago Baptist Association, and finally the American Baptist, is in reach of them in our own National Baptist Convention.

When they seek and ask the aid of the Chicago Baptist Association and American Baptist in helping black people to find their own identity and affirm their cultural heritage, they seem to imply a dependence that I personally hope our people do not have. I hope this does not imply that any Negroes feel that in order for them to do their best they have to be led or aided by white organizations or white leaders. If they are seeking a black experience they left one that is ninety years old. The time ought to soon come when Negro people will more and more have confidence in their own leaders and in their own institutions.

When I was a boy in the old-fashioned revival meetings, some candidates were actually turned down because they had not seen a little white man leading them across hell on a spider web. Anybody who has ever started across hell on a spider web, went to hell, and should have gone.

Of course I do not hold that the influence and dependence on white people should be strong enough to determine in any wise our religious faith and commitment. Personally, I appreciate leading my own people, but I here and now confess if there are any of our people that need to be led across hell on a spider web in order to be saved, I would be too glad to give any man that assignment, for that type of leadership in that place.

In the next place, we have not as Negro Baptists completed our growth and our unique contribution to the religious and spiritual life of this nation. Our mysticism must not be diluted, weakened, or dimmed by too much faith and reliance on material things as a sign of success, and as an indication that we are in truth building the Kingdom of God. We have learned something by experience as a race, that men of material substances do not know yet. We have learned how to suffer without the inner bitterness that is a cancer of the soul and a damnable impediment to spiritual insights and visions. Our foreparents acquired certain gifts and certain insights that gave them the vision to see beyond the darkness that engulfed them. They endured the afflictions of slavery, but never accepted as their lot in life.

*An Example From The Founders Of The
National Baptist Convention*

Three generations ago a group of courageous and dedicated believers organized what is now known as the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. They were less than two decades removed from the cruel institution of chattel slavery. They were still tired and weary from the long years of painful toil and the most inhumane suffering. Their backs were still marked from the lashes of the master's whip, and the grim shadows of despair still dogged their steps, and the walls of separation that accompanied the auction block stood high and lingered on in the memories of mothers as they had departed from their own flesh and blood never to meet again.

So short was the distance that they had come on the highway of freedom that they had not as yet acquired the best education or amassed an economic fortune that would stand them in good stead for the days ahead. They had every reason to be bitter, discouraged, and frustrated, but they did not allow themselves to linger "sloughed despond;" neither did they yield their souls to hatred and revenge.

These noble souls dreamed of the victory of the Kingdom of God and allowed themselves to be identified with the lofty purpose of the Kingdom of God. They advanced in faith as worthy heroes of the Cross of Christ and made plans to build churches, associations, and then this great National Baptist Convention through which their witness could be carried throughout this nation and sent to foreign fields.

The founding fathers of this great organization did not wait until times were better. They did not procrastinate or spend long hours in remorse, bitterness, and campaigns of destruction—they worked to advance the cause of the Kingdom of God and to do their share to advance the program of redemption that had been so clearly defined by the Man of Galilee. They worked and prayed that the discriminating hands would be lifted and the shackles broken, and that fetters would fall.

They did not wait until the children of ex-slave masters learned to accept the children of ex-slaves as first class citizens of this great republic. They moved forward with plans of human development and purposes of intellectual and spiritual growth.

THEY DID NOT WAIT for the segregating church to give them all the rights of responsible citizens. They did not beg their masters for church positions, they did not seek to howl down the voice of the white preacher; neither did they burn down the master's church houses. Our fathers moved forward with dispatch, organizing their own churches, producing their own preachers, and sang their own songs of deliverance and of love and grace. **THEY DID NOT WAIT**

until they were thoroughly equipped with the best literary training, they used what they had and consecrated the talent given them to the service of their Maker. The doors of educational institutions were closed to them and libraries and books were not easily accessible. But THEY DID NOT WAIT—they took their one talent and invested that talent. They did not bury it in the soil of revenge or lose their spirit to work, in the deadening throes of fear, or in a fit of despair and hopelessness. Wherever they could, they purchased the oil of grace and kept the lamp of hope burning brightly through the long night watches awaiting the break of a day when they could with patience possess their souls. With little book learning and much religion they pressed on, and like Abraham of old, went out not knowing how long the journey would be and if there would be a successful return.

They left us no legacy of gold, but a dynamic and creative faith.

They left us no stocks and bonds, but a certainty of life and a certainty that was for them a wall of fire against the wild beast of hate and oppression. They left to us a gospel, and through the preaching of this gospel churches have continued to grow and this great National Baptist Convention has stood for ninety long years, braving the deepest storms, surviving the darkest nights, and proclaiming a day of deliverance because the spirit of God has been with the founders, the builders, the leaders, and servants of this convention.

We are proud of our heritage, we are proud of our legacy, we are proud of those pioneers who cast in the seeds from which so copious a crop has come.

Our Unfinished Task

I do not mean to say that we have done our full duty. I do not summon you to rest on the achievements of the past and to take refuge in the glories of our yesterday. We must confess in all humility that many failures dog our steps, and there are many opportunities we did not seize, and we as a people are guilty both of the sins of commission and the sins of omission. But we must not despair; the times demand that we make our contribution in this our day and generation and pass on to others our unique experiences, insights, and convictions.

People cannot find peace and happiness for themselves by searching for it directly within the confines of their own little world. A self-centered life is a life of loneliness and disappointment. We soon grow bored and weary with every passing hour if we spend our time waiting for a busy world to pause and bless us individually.

To seek our rights as first class citizens is a noble task and one that has been granted to all of us by America's supreme law and by the nation's tradition of freedom. But no people can find the peace they seek and the fulfillment they need unless they become aware of their responsibilities and their higher task both to themselves and to the world in which they live. We must assume our responsibilities if we are to come to maturity and to a meaningful interpretation of life. We have a job to do. We are a part of this nation and a part of Western Civilization. People who carry responsibilities are not as easily discouraged as others, and people who assume their responsibilities soon learn how to blame themselves for some of the failures in the social order in which they live. Hence they do not spend all of their time cursing their fellowman and assuming the determinism of the social sins that surround them. People who are committed to building are not as ready to burn and pillage and destroy. Home owners are more careful about where they drop matches or where they start a blaze for fear that the same flames that burned down their neighbor's house might spread to theirs.

History has reserved the higher place in our society to those who assume responsibilities and who work to make the world in which they live a better place for themselves and others.

If this nation is not what it should be, it is the responsibility of all of us to make it better. What better way can individuals spend the time allotted to them on this earth than to use it helping to build a better social order, helping to beautify the ugly places, lifting up valleys, building bridges, decorating landscapes, and irrigating the desert spots of envy and malice with the fresh waters of goodwill, trust, and friendship. What better task than to help save our nation and to rescue the best in Western Civilization for ourselves and our posterity.

Worthy Living Needs A Worthy Cause

One of the things that kept David of the Old Testament from being discouraged by his brothers who rebuked him when he stood ready to challenge the great Philistine giant, Goliath of Gath, was, David felt that he had a cause.

The founding fathers of the United States of America did more than to react against the oppression and the evils of the mother country. They did more than protest the sins of the king and the economic crimes committed against them. They were impelled by a great cause—the cause of justice, the cause of liberty, and the cause of freedom. As we have intimated above, the founding fathers of this

great convention felt that they had a cause which impelled them to action and led them to face the future with hope and promise.

Jerry Rubin said in his book entitled *Do It*, Page 129, the following: "American youth is looking for a reason to die. A reason to die is a reason to live." What Jerry is saying in so many words, is this: American youth is looking for a cause—a cause to live and a cause to die.

I say with all firmness that every man needs a cause or a reason for his efforts and for his struggles. Every life needs a cause; for the cause we embrace will determine the character of life we will achieve. Every life needs a cause big enough to save it from the narrow island of its little self, and broad enough to embrace all of the essential elements of human life, including the welfare of our neighbors, and goodwill for our enemies or those who wish not the good for us.

We need a cause high enough to embrace the greatest and most creative upheavals of the human spirit. We need a cause that gives a place to the songs of poets, the dreams of philosophers, the visions of prophets that reveal to men the blueprint of a social order whose purpose is justice, and whose tenets are human dignity, equality, and freedom.

Men need a cause that will send them out as servants of their fellow men with a determination to heal the broken-hearted, to secure deliverance for the prison bound, to feed the hungry, and to clothe the naked and to answer the cries of the sick and to bring healing remedies to those in the anguish and pains of biting diseases.

We need a cause whose glory will out-distance human gloom, and whose robe of righteousness will displace the filthy rags of deceit, envy, and hate. **WE NEED A CAUSE.** Where there is no cause, creative desire will turn to apathy, and every problem we face will be as giants that we cannot conquer.

But happy are those who found a noble cause. We as Christian believers have a cause in this life. We have found that cause in the life, character, and teachings of Jesus Christ. He teaches us to render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's. He gives us a challenge; and in fact, the greatest challenge of moral refinement that has ever been proclaimed to mortal men. The moral directives from His Sermon On The Mount probes the depths of our inner lives more thoroughly than any Freudian hands has ever done, and enriches our emotions and our minds as no human philosophy can or will.

Our cause is to complete what Simon of Cyrenia started twenty centuries ago outside the city's gate; and that is to help our Christ

carry His Cross up the hills of oppression, evil, corruption, and sin—and if needs be, die with Him on Calvary's trembling heights. Our cause cannot be limited by clocks or measured by calendars, or defined in terms of the passing years or the flight of the hoary ages. Time has not tarnished it, evil has not defied it, corruption has not marred it, and death has not taken from it its lustre, its light, and its life immortal. For beyond every dark, tearful and agonizing Calvary there is always a bright, joyful, and glorious resurrection dawn. We endure the night because we await the dawn. We do not falter because we are sustained by a great faith:

*“ . . . A faith that will not shrink,
Though pressed by every foe.
That will not tremble on the brink
Of any earthly woe.
That will not murmur nor complain,
Beneath the chastening rod.
But in the hour of grief and pain
Will lean upon its God.”*

The Cross Of Christ Needed

In the tragic days ahead the Christian church will need to stay near the Cross. If the present trend continues we will come upon days when gospel preachers will be asked to surrender their pulpits to other people for the purpose of speaking in the name of another ideology and another cause in opposition to the Cause of Jesus Christ. Believers in Jesus Christ may again be imprisoned for their witness, jailed for their testimony, and persecuted for their stand with Christ. In such times our only hope will be the Cross of Christ. It is the Cross of Christ that proclaims the tragic confrontation of the righteousness of God with the unrighteousness of man. It is the Cross of Christ that announces the victory of the God-man over the forces of the evil one.

Too much humanism and too many man-made programs in the church will destroy its power. We must come back to the Cross of Christ. The Cross of Christ is not popular, but My God it is so powerful!

The Cross of Christ is not easy, but the message of it is everlasting.

The Cross of Christ is not always understood, but it always stands under the tired and weary feet of those who need a foundation firm and sure.

The Cross of Christ has in it some pain, but its pleasures are forever more.

Many theologians have rationalized the Cross of Christ out of the gospel, and a cross-less theology degenerates to a social welfare program without a standard to determine its heights or its depth. A cross-less theology is a faint word about a nebulous event that never took place. It is a theory about a god who never lived, and such theology runs into a dead-in. This theology is at its best in its analysis of man's sin and guilt, but falls short of telling the way to take to find eternal salvation.

This type of theology can describe well the sins and the plight of the prodigal son. It can in truth describe the depth of the filth of the hog pen and measure the foul air and the pollution among the swine, but it cannot point a prodigal boy back to his father's house. For in such cross-less theology, there is no home to which the boy can go. In a theology based on the logic of process philosophy, the boy never had a father to have a home. No wonder that this theology ends with the tragic message that God is dead and leaves sinful men shipwrecked and alone on a surging sea without a life raft and without a rescue ship in sight.

I say to our theologians, if you would bring to this age a theology of hope, then put the Cross of Christ back into your religious thought.

I say to those churchmen who have selected as their primary task the condemnation of the establishment and the humiliation and the punishment of the rich for their sins, put the Cross of Christ back into the church and you will see by the light of the Cross that all men have sinned—both the rich and the poor, the learned and the unlearned; white and black, and come short of the glory of God.

To those Christian people who feel that they have done their full duty when they have become involved in demonstrations against the sinners of this generation, and have won the right to dissent against what is evil in our social and political system, and have joined with those who would destroy the whole system because of the sins of a part of the members of the same, I say put the Cross of Christ back into your lives and into your churches.

To those preachers who can find nothing good in the past, and who always complain because of what their churches do not do for them, and who have no message for the weary and the downhearted, I say to you, put the Cross back into your gospel. Preachers whose sermons begin and end with current newspaper stories, and move along the pathway of popularity, are sure to miss the peaks of redemptive power that can come only from the light of the Cross. Put the Cross back into your gospel, then you will not be ashamed nor

afraid to preach the good news of salvation to wretched sinners, to skeptics, atheists, and doubters. For the gospel with the Cross in it is the power of God under salvation to all that believe. It is the power of God that breaks down the stubborn opposition in the soul and makes unsaved men new creatures in Christ Jesus. Put the Cross of Christ back into the gospel then it becomes good news to the lost, good news to the poor and needy, good news to the afflicted, the weary, the lonely, and the dying.

The story is told of a poor, dejected woman whose doctor had given her out. This woman called her child and asked her to go and find a preacher to come and talk with her and pray with her. The preacher came. He sat down by her bedside. The dying woman told him her story of loneliness and dejection, and felt she needed some power or some persons to sustain her. The preacher took his New Testament from his pocket and read a portion from the Sermon on The Mount. The woman opened her eyes and looked with amazement at the preacher and said: "Then I'm too late. I'm too late to do all those things that you have just read to me. I have lived a very wicked life and my life cannot meet the standards of the passage you have just read. I am wretched and lost. I am too late. I am too low to be included in such high requirements."

Sensing the problem, the preacher then turned to another passage and read as follows: "FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD THAT HE GAVE HIS ONLY BEGOTTEN SON THAT WHOSOEVER BELIEVETH ON HIM SHOULD NOT PERISH BUT HAVE EVER-LASTING LIFE."

A smile of appreciation spread across the woman's face and she asked the preacher: "Will you read that passage again?" The preacher read it a second time, and then she said, "read it again." and the preacher read a third time. Then the poor dying woman stretched forth her hands to the preacher and said: "This is what I have wanted all of my life; someone to love and care. This is good news for me. Preacher, did he really mean me too?" "Yes," said the preacher. Then said the mother, "I accept Him as my personal Savior," and fell asleep in the arms of Jesus.

If you feel the pull of forces that would drag you from the Cross of Christ, you had better ask some power to keep you near the Cross. For in the days burning with the sun of human affliction we need to be near a fountain whose waters are cooling and healing. This is why Fanny J. Crosby uttered this prayer:

*Jesus, Keep me near the cross;
There a precious fountain,
Free to all a healing stream,
Flows from Calv'ry's mountain.*

Near the cross, a trembling soul,
Love and mercy found me;
There the bright and morning star
Shed its beams around me.

Near the cross! O Lamb of God,
Bring its scenes before me;
Help me walk from day to day
With its shadow o'er me.

Near the cross I'll watch and wait,
Hoping, trusting ever,
Till I reach the golden strand,
Just beyond the river.

In the cross, in the cross,
Be my glory ever,
Till my raptured soul shall find
Rest beyond the river.

Our Conclusion

And now my friends, I bring this message to a close with thanksgiving and praise. I am thankful to the men of the Board of Directors who have stood with me and have worked with me as we together have tried to carry out your program and your wishes for the past twelve months. They have been loyal to you and faithful to their task.

Some who were in our ranks last year are not here today. They have answered the final call and will never attend another session of this convention on earth. Time would fail me to mention all of their names.

J. A. F. Finlayson of Florida, who served as vice president of this convention from 1957 to 1969. He was faithful and dependable. R. P. Means of Newark, New Jersey was a member of the Board of Directors for more than twelve years. He ended this life as he stood in the pulpit concluding his last sermon. P. F. Parker of Canton, Mississippi, one of the vice presidents of the General Baptist State Convention. J. H. Parker of Leland, Mississippi. For seventeen years he served on the Usher Board, and for many years he was the faithful chairman. If he were not over there, he would be here today on this platform with us. C. M. Smith, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the president of the New England Baptist Convention, and a member of the Board of Directors, who was a great servant. A. Henson Jarmon of Cleveland, Ohio, who was chairman of the Stewardship Commission. God bless the memory of these and other faithful leaders who have gone on before us. We miss them and regret their passing,

but we are thankful that we have again been brought face to face to review the past and to make new commitments to the present, and to look with hope towards a great and unknown future.

The longer we live the deeper are the experiences of life, and the more clearly we can see the meaning of the great expression from the Apostle Paul, "all things work together for good to them that fear the Lord." Even pain and affliction teach us not only of the frailty of our bodies, but teach us not to trust in ourselves or to rely wholly on our strength and our personal resources.

He Leads Through Illness

On the 30th of January 1970 about midnight, I was taken ill and rushed to a Chicago hospital. None of our friends or members knew what had taken place, so that the journey was made almost alone through the quiet and lonely streets of the city. The case was diagnosed as pneumonia. For awhile I was kept under oxygen. After ten days I was allowed to return home with the battle against pneumonia successfully won.

About a week later I suffered a severe attack of a chronic illness that had plagued my system for almost forty years. For twenty-five years I had as a family physician one of the finest surgeons in Chicago, Dr. Roscoe Giles. Just a few days before he had gone to his long home, and I did not have his counsel, his advice, or his scientific knowledge on which to rely.

It dawned upon me that there was no hope without surgery, and the name of a friend and physician close to our family in Jackson, Mississippi came to mind. I called Dr. Miller for advice, and he suggested two teams of surgeons; one was in Jackson, Mississippi headed by Dr. Raymond F. Martin. I was led to accept the surgeon in Jackson, Mississippi. Dr. Martin is a great physician, a great scientist, and a great humanitarian. On Sunday evening, March 8th, I had a conference with the Board of Deacons and informed them that I would be out of town for awhile but did not tell them why, aside from the fact that I needed rest. They were gracious and kind, and gave me every assurance of their concern. I did not tell them of my plan for surgery, but I did ask the chairman of the board and the treasurer to take over the responsibilities carried by the three of us, and told them I did not know when I would return.

The next day, March 9th, Mrs. Jackson and I left for Jackson, Mississippi, arriving in Jackson March 10th. We met and held our first conference with Dr. Raymond Martin at 11:00 A.M. March 10th. At 2:00 P.M. I entered the Baptist Hospital. In the evening Dr. Martin

came to the hospital and gave a very thorough examination, at which time he said to me frankly: "This is a very difficult case, and one of the most difficult I have ever seen."

After many tests, the day for surgery was set for Friday, March 13th.

The evening of March 12th Dr. Martin visited with me and Mrs. Jackson and was very positive and frank. He had told us that surgery was an absolute necessity and I could not go on without it, but in the light of all of the x-rays and others tests, he was not so sure whether the condition would permit surgery. "It depends on what I find tomorrow," he said.

When the conference was over the doctor left the room, and finally Mrs. Jackson departed and I was left alone; but not altogether alone. As I said earlier, Dr. Roscoe Giles, a physician of twenty-five years, had just passed, and was no longer available to accompany me to an operating room, but I felt there was another who had gone with me before, and who was with me still. Friday morning came; we went to the operating room. By the guidance of God, the surgeon did his job well, and the whole operation was a great success. It has been almost six months now, and the health and comfort of life that I have enjoyed are beyond description. I am thankful to Dr. Martin for his skills and for his scientific services. I am also thankful for his spirit as a Christian and as a deacon of his church. But I am thankful also to Him who guides the sparrow in his flight and who superintends the planets and determines the destiny of all men. I now understand more fully the meaning of a song that had been placed upon my heart while I was ill in Chicago, and the burden of this song is that God leads His dear children along.

So here we are today because He has led us and brought us to this hour.

*In shady, green pastures, so rich and so sweet,
God leads His dear children along;
Where the water's cool flow bathes the weary one's feet,
God leads His dear children along.*

*Sometimes on the mount where the sun shines so bright,
God leads His dear children along;
Sometimes in the valley in the darkest of night,
God leads His dear children along.*

*Tho' sorrows befall us, and Satan oppose,
God leads His dear children along;
Through grace we can conquer, defeat all our foes,
God leads His dear children along.*

Away from the mire, and away from the clay,

God leads His dear children along;
Away up in glory, eternity's day,
God leads His dear children along.

Some thro' the waters, some thro' the flood,
Some thro' the fire, but all thro' the Blood;
Some thro' great sorrow, but God gives a song,
In the night season and all the day long.

Here we are again assembled in one of the deep south states, in what is commonly known as America's most interesting city, the Crescent City, New Orleans, Louisiana. This as you know the home of the world famous Canal Street and the Mardi Gras.

We are here on invitation of the Louisiana Missionary Baptist State Convention, whose President is Dr. E. Doyle Billoups. As you know, Dr. Billoups is the Vice President at Large of this Convention. The general chairman of the entertainment committee is the well known Dr. A. L. Davis, Jr. He is assisted by a well organized group of loyal ministers of New Orleans and the State of Louisiana. Under Dr. Davis's leadership, this group has left no stones unturned to give you one of the finest entertainments you have ever had. Before leaving the city we believe you will agree with this also.

Each year it has been my happy privilege to report to you as your General Secretary that your Convention continues to grow. This year will not be an exception. The Educational Foundation, as you know, is to provide funds for struggling private Baptist Colleges and Churches. We need your cooperation now if we are to meet the needs of schools and churches throughout the country.

The Retirement Fund under the leadership of Mrs. Isabel Hoggard, the chairman, is doing a wonderful job in pooling and using this fund. Many appeals have gone out from Chairman Hoggard but many have gone unheeded. We are standing in our own light when we don't support this fund. The Retirement Fund was organized with the Pastors and Ministers welfare in mind. Your support is needed now to make this fund what it should be.

The Minutes of the Convention have been mailed to you. We hope you have received your copy. However, if you have not, please inform us and one will be sent immediately. We are forever indebted to Dr. D. C. Washington, Executive Director, Sunday School Publishing Board for his cooperation. Without his understanding and Christian Spirit we would be unable to get the Record to you.

We are happy to report to you again our office works in complete harmony with the Office of the President of this Convention. We take pride in being a co-operative Secretary.

We were given the usual amount to operate the office of the Secretary for the ensuing year—\$5,400.00.

President Jackson, Officers, Members of the Board of Directors, and Messengers assembled here in New Orleans, Louisiana, I am very pleased to submit the Annual Report of the stewardship of the Officers, Board of Directors and Employees of the Sunday School Publishing Board:

"Write the vision and make it plain upon tables, that he may run that readeth it."

This excerpt from Jehovah's response to the testimony of the prophet, Habakkuk, fittingly describes the efforts of your Sunday School Publishing Board during the past year, as we have sought to publish doctrinally sound, interestingly presented, inspirational curriculum materials with eye appeal, for Baptist young people and adults.

In times as turbulent as in Habakkuk's day, we are now brought face to face with our disgruntled youth, who are disgusted with ancient structures, and traditional patterns; who refuse to fall in step with what they term "The Dead Past," and who feel themselves captives of a social order that they have not made, and with which they cannot identify.

In this climate of social unrest, it becomes increasingly essential that the Sunday School Publishing Board continue its systematic and comprehensive presentation of the age old spiritual truths, which remain relevant for every era, and upon which satisfying lives must be built.

Our world is "Sick unto Death." Its disease has many symptoms, such as materialism, intolerance, hatred, racism, injustice, regionalism, and immorality. But its basic illness is spiritual deficiency—resulting from a lack of the proper soul food. The Sunday School Publishing Board specializes in offering soul food for the spiritual nurture of our constituents, and seeks to provide the ingredients necessary to produce matured and informed Christians.

THE EDITORIAL DIVISION

During the fiscal year just closed, we have furnished over twenty-five thousand Churches with Sunday School quarterlies and Church supplies, sharing with them the vision of the "Lowly Nazarene," whose sacrificial love for all people inspires us to run with His redemptive Message. We enjoyed a ten per cent increase in sales over last year, and appreciate the faithful patronage of all our valued old customers, as well as that from new Churches who gave us an opportunity to serve them for the first time. Many of you now purchase only a portion

of your materials from us, and we urge you to avail yourselves to our total offerings. In addition to our curriculum materials for all age levels, we have devotional and worship aids, missionary tools, laymen's materials, Bible Commentaries, leadership training aids, and the **Baptist Standard Hymnal**, which is not only the finest hymnal for Baptist Churches on the market, but may be found in leading Churches of other denominations.

Our editorial staff, headed by Dr. Maynard P. Turner, is dedicated to the constant upgrading of our literary offerings.

Work on Sunday School literature is moving forward according to previously set plans as much as possible. However, there are still many innovations which, because of limitations of staff, or financial resources, or other causes, we are not yet able to see materialize. This is especially true in regard to the teacher's quarterlies and plans which were announced in the **Annual Report** for 1968.

We have published Vacation Church School materials Series 1-A, 1-B, and 1-C. Series 1-D has been assigned to writers and will be offered for use during the summer of 1971. This material is a distinct contribution to the denomination, and to American Negroes. Series 1-A has a strong daily denominational emphasis. Series 1-B combines a study of Bible heroes with a study of outstanding Negroes. Series 1-C is a study of the History of National Baptists. Series 1-D is an attempt to build bridges of understanding in a world of hate and polarization. It is titled, **Living Together in Today's World**. The Vacation Church School material is undated; and its use may be repeated in a four-year cycle.

We invite you to visit our Booth here at the Convention, where you may examine our Vacation Church School materials, as well as our other offerings.

THE DIVISION OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Sweeping social changes, growing alienation of youth from traditional values and authority, and the mounting attack on the Church, as an institution, challenge us to develop leaders who are committed to Christ, knowledgeable of enduring values and skilled in sharing their faith. Seldom, if ever, has the Church, the nation, and civilization itself been in such dire, pressing need of trained Christian leaders. The Sunday School Publishing Board offers leadership program services through its Department of Christian Education. You may participate through your local Church, district Association, State and Sunday School and B. T. U. Congress. Our ultimate goal is to have every member of every Church in our constituency engaged in an on-going training program. The Department of Christian Education has staff members available to assist in planning programs of Leadership Education to conduct Area Work Shops or to appear on State or Regional programs.

To improve the quality and scope of our services, Rev. Paul B. Calloway, who has several years of successful experience as a minister and administrator, was appointed Director of the Department of Christian Education, March 3, 1970.

A new pamphlet, "Why Christian Leadership Education?" has been published to aid in the recruitment of students for leadership education classes. A new hand out designed to enlarge the fellowship of Christian leadership education and to improve the quality of Christian education through sharing innovative ideas across the denomination has also been made available. Content of the Quarterly Newsletter, available to members of the Fellowship, has been revised to include timely and helpful articles, and a question and answer column to better inform leadership personnel of new developments and changes in the field of Christian education. We are encouraged by the re-institution of leadership training in one state, and agreement to institute and promote the program in another. Rev. Calloway has participated in the planning of the program of workshops, conferences and congresses in Tennessee, Georgia, Florida and Pennsylvania.

The Handbook for the Leadership Education Curriculum is currently being revised and updated to assist deans and instructors in performing their work more efficiently.

The Department of Christian Education of the Sunday School Publishing Board which serves as the Accrediting Agency for our denomination's program of leadership education is responsible for certifying faculties of training schools, issuing Course Cards and Certificates of Progress in recognition of study. The Departmental statistics for the year are as follows:

DIVISION OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

A denominational constituency informed of the composition and use of its literature and other helps not only results in increased distribution of these materials and supplies, but also helps to increase the effectiveness of the teaching and training ministry of the local church. The Division of Public Relations continued to expand its balanced program of orientation and promotion of our publications and services through research, leadership education activities, communication, and evaluation.

Special efforts were made this year to promote our total ministries in all divisions. An 80-frame color presentation, "The Sunday School Publishing House Story" was produced by our Public Relations Division. This audio-visual presentation is being used very effectively in local

church groups, district associations, and in state and national meetings. An evaluation is being made as we move more and more into these newer communication channels.

The Leadership Education Guidelines Kit produced by this division is proving to be a very helpful tool, and many of our leadership training groups throughout the nation are taking advantage of these new promotional materials. We are adding to the promotional folders in this kit so that all working groups of the church may find some helpful information and guidelines to progress.

Among the services offered to church and denominational groups is the use of personnel from the Division of Public Relations to assist in orientation and training in the more effective use of our literature and other helps. Our workers served with groups in Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Missouri, Tennessee and Texas this year.

New and regular channels of communications were made available to the increasing number who inquired of our National Baptist history and heritage. The Division of Public Relations has answered special requests and has guided certain research projects in this area of study involvements. Our unique reference library of select sources for our writers and other denominational leaders is under the direction of this division.

J. Robert Bradley, our Music Co-ordinator, appeared in numerous states, including North Carolina, Missouri, Michigan, Alabama, Indiana, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, Florida, Tennessee, Ohio, Louisiana, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Texas, Virginia, Georgia, Nebraska and Maryland.

In addition, Mr. Bradley served as Guest Soloist at the Baptist World Alliance in Tokyo, Japan and afterwards participated in a mission tour around the world.

Mr. Bradley's services are available for your state Sunday School Congresses or other Conventions, as a service of the Sunday School Publishing Board.

Other representatives of the Board have appeared in New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Arkansas, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Washington, D. C., Nebraska, Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina, Michigan, Illinois and Indiana.

We are appreciative of your invitations to participate in your state Conventions, Congresses and other meetings, and trust that you will continue to afford us this opportunity for the interchange of ideas, and the presentation of improved methods of using our curriculum aids.

THE FINANCIAL DIVISION

In order to "write the vision" and make plain the message to mankind, the Sunday School Publishing Board must have capital, labor, materials, and equipment. It is the responsibility of management to secure the capital which makes possible the other components of production.

Modern printing machinery is geared toward combining more than one process, and therefore in some instances has trebled in size. The new larger equipment poses a problem for us since we are limited in space and will eventually be forced to expand our plant. We must continue to replace worn-out and obsolete machinery at breath-taking prices if we are to remain competitive and therefore have had to seek outside financing. The equal opportunity policy of many large firms makes trained personnel difficult to come by, as we must contend with industry as well as local, state and federal governments, for skilled and experienced workers.

The deeply regretted death of Mrs. Nellie Gordon, Sales Manager, was a shocking blow to all of us. She had been a faithful employee for forty-six years. The end came suddenly, thus causing immediate changes, so as to keep the sales department moving with the greatest degree of speed and accuracy.

During the year, we experienced other personnel changes that tested our strength and put a strain on several departments.

The prices of paper, ink and other raw materials have advanced sharply, yet your Sunday School Publishing Board has absorbed most of these additional costs, and has increased the prices of our materials only slightly. We are presently involved in a tax suit with the City of Nashville over the right of religious publishing houses to be exempted from property and ad valorem taxes. We have already been advised by our Auditors that loss of this tax suit will make immediate price increase necessary to cover the additional cost of taxes.

OUR ENABLING ARM

Through the wisdom and foresight of the Fathers, the Convention created the "debenture bonds," the one instrument that has been and still is the life blood of the Sunday School Publishing Board. Every ten years, the Convention breathes new life into these bonds and this is a significant sequence. This provision has enabled the administrative staff to keep the Sunday School Publishing Board free and firm in the midst of economic changes that have closed many like businesses, and has made possible the short, yet progressive steps toward our ultimate goals. The use of this instrument, combined with good managerial sense has merited the faith of cooperating banking institutions, and so we have come thus far.

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION SUPPORT

The Morris Memorial Building, the home of the Sunday School Publishing Board, and the proud possession of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., stands tall in downtown Nashville and holds its place in the sun, in the midst of the radical urban changes that are now in rapid progress. However, we have not slept at our post of duty, for thousands and thousands of dollars have been and still must be spent to meet the downtown building code requirements.

During the past year, we operated the Morris Memorial Building at a cost of \$13,270.79 above rental income. We published and mailed the National Baptist Voice at a cost of \$4,450.00, and did printing for the Convention in the amount of \$20,942.46, making a total contribution in support of National Baptist Convention objectives in the amount of \$38,663.25.

The Sunday School Publishing Board pledges continued support for all objectives of our Convention and cooperation with all of its subsidiaries.

Reaffirming our faith in its purpose, we, the Officers, Board of Directors and Employees accept this challenge in the words of the familiar hymn,

Gentlemen:

We have completed our examination of the books and accounts of the Sunday School Publishing Board a subsidiary of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970. We have examined the balance sheet as of that date and the related statement of income and expense and supporting schedules for the year then ended. We reviewed the system of internal control and the accounting procedures employed. We tested accounting records and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included all procedures we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet, statement of income and expense, and supporting schedules present fairly the financial position of the Sunday School Publishing Board as of June 30, 1970, and the results of their operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTSChanges in Financial Position

The condensed comparative balance sheet in Exhibit I, will show the changes which have taken place, in the assets, liability, and surplus accounts between July 1, 1969 and June 30, 1970. There was an increase of \$62,990.73 in the assets, and a corresponding increase in the liabilities of \$67,529.78. Exhibit II, presents a summary of income and expense for the year. The net profit for the year ended June 30, 1970 was \$34,124.20 an increase of \$17,356.33, over the previous years net profit. Sales increased by \$92,845.55 or 10% over the previous year. Cost of sales increased 2.5%, and the net profit was 1.5%. The Sunday School Publishing Board borrowed

\$299,704.48, and made note payments totaling \$180,345.44. The balance of notes payable at June 30, 1970 was \$274,536.04. Saving accounts totaling \$35,000.00 was used as 100% security for notes payable of \$35,000.00. Proceeds from the loan was used to reduce old outstanding accounts payable and to establish a tax and contingency reserve for a possible tax liability of \$35,000.00 that at present is being contested in court. The loss of this case could create a cash problem that would necessitate an increase in the sales price of their publications, reducing operating expense wherever possible or both. This has to be accomplished within the framework of competitive prices.

Exhibit V, reflects the items causing the decreased in net worth of \$4,539.05.

SCOPE AND VERIFICATION

The scope of our examination included an examination of checks issued during the current fiscal year. Cash balances in banks and special reserves of June 30, 1970, were reconciled with the balances per book. Cash journal were footed, cross footed, and posting traced to ledger accounts. Bank balances were verified by written confirmation to each depository. We examined the flow of the cash receipts from the mailed receipts, posting of accounts, and the bank deposits, to determine that the system was properly functioning.

We examined order and bill procedures to determine whether proper safeguards were employed to protect the assets of the Sunday School Publishing Board. Other areas examined included, shipping, receiving, production flow and control, and the minutes of board meetings. The extent of certain procedures employed, including sampling of transactions, was based principally on our review of the systems of internal control, and the efficiency of its functioning.

Our esteemed President, Dr. J. H. Jackson, Officers Members, and other Fellow Believers in "The Sufficiency of Christ for the Modern Crisis," greetings!

In the words of the **New English Bible**, 1 Corinthians 1:2, 3b, 4, "Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ . . . the all-merciful Father, the God whose consolation never fails us! He comforts us in all our troubles so that we in turn may be able to comfort others in any trouble of theirs and to share with them the consolation we ourselves receive from God."

Sixty years ago the past May 13, the National Baptist Training Union Board was chartered to serve this convention with printed resources.

I was elected Assistant Secretary of the National Baptist Training Union Board, September 1951, in Oklahoma City when the Convention convened there. Professor E. W. D. Isaac, Jr.'s health had begun to fail, and in 1952, realizing he would not be able to fulfill his duties, he gave me a written statement to have full charge. We can exceed our goal if each Pastor will respond to my letter with the request to order at least 100 quarterlies at least one quarter this year.

The concern of the publishing department of the Board is to help you with the ministry of:

- 1) Equipping people to participate in God's mission to His world.
- 2) Communicating the gospel, that is, using the process of presenting an idea, a feeling, or an action in such a manner that it can be responded to by another person.
- 3) Finding the point at which learner needs intersect with gospel truth. For it is at such crossing points that teaching-learning begins.

The National Baptist Training Union Board is an agent of relevant materials from other publishers as well as publisher of five publications oriented to the needs and programs of our Convention. Special mention should be made of the **Baptist Training Union Leader**, a magazine which costs \$2.00 per year. The July issue emphasizes "National Unity." It contains resources for the implementation of President's Jackson's National Unity program.

Please don't let afternoon services kill your Baptist Training Union. Please use resource material from the Board for your Sunday evening, mid-week or small-encounter discussion-action groups.

Mr. President, Mr. Presiding Vice-President, Officers, Messengers and Visitors to this the 90th Session of the National Baptist Convention, United States of America, Incorporated:

It is with the greatest degree of satisfaction of my eleven-years tenure of office as Corresponding Secretary of your Home Mission Board that I herewith submit the Annual Report of the Home Mission phase of our great Convention. Let me hasten to explain that this optimistic opening statement is not meant to convey the idea that the Home Mission Board has reached the "ne plus ultra" stage of accomplishment in the home field; nor is it meant to imply that the Board personnel is by any means satisfied with the past year's degree of success in the vast field of missions on the home field. We who carry the Convention's obligations in this phase of its work realize, perhaps more fully and certainly more painfully, than anyone else that we are merely beginning to scratch the surface of the swiftly growing needs and demands of the home field. However, the increased manifestation of confidence in our Board and interest in its work as shown by the growing support given during the past year, would seem to justify the belief that, at least, we have begun to scratch the surface. While our finances make but a poor showing when compared with other auxiliaries of this Convention, yet when thought of in terms of the depths from which we have come, I believe we have every reason to be optimistic. When it is remembered that my first report as your Corresponding Secretary 11 years ago showed a grand total of \$1,030.39, and then note that the grand total of receipts for the fiscal year 1969-70 show a grand total of upward of \$24,000; when we note that a single church—viz., the Zion Hill Baptist Church of Los Angeles, California, Dr. Bernilee Faison, Pastor, contributed \$3,000 in the fiscal year 1969-70 — almost three times the total amount received by the Board ten years ago; and when we note the extended scope of active interest and support currently received as compared to the mediocrity of such interest and support ten years ago — when we make these comparative notations and remembering that we have come this far by faith, we can but feel an humble but real sense of justifiable pride over the past ten years and optimism over the future outlook of the home mission phase of our great Convention under the unequalled and unique guidance of our great and God-given leader, Dr. J. H. Jackson.

SOME QUESTIONS

Perhaps there have been certain questions in the minds of some of our Convention constituents that have no doubt somewhat held back some support of the Board's work. One of these questions may have been as to the proportion of intake spent for operational expenses and that spent for Home Missions. Another question may have been as to the amount of honorari given to seemingly non-functioning officers of the Board. Still another query may be as to the item in our report designated "commissions." These queries may be answered as follows:

As to the proportions of financial intake spent for operation and that spent for missions suffice it to say that as our intake grows larger our scope of missions will expand while our operational cost will remain practically the same. Any good cook knows that it requires the same degree of heat to boil one egg as it does to boil a dozen and that the oven must be brought to the same temperature to brown a single biscuit as would be required to brown a pan-full of biscuits. Therefore gas economy does not consist of cutting down on the heat, but in increasing the amount to be cooked. Yes, the ratio of operational expenditures may have seemed rather high, but as support increases we will be more able to do a bigger job with practically the same operational expenditures now being made. A later portion of this report will show that the current encouraging trend has already inspired our Home Mission Board to additional and bigger projects.

As to the item marked "honorarium" in previous reports, it should be explained that these are not honorari in the sense of giving a gift of honor alone to someone who is ineligible to receive salary but these recipients of previously called "honorari" are elected officers of our Board as required by the Constitution of our Convention. Therefore the amounts received by these elected officers of the Board though small, are salaries and are therefore listed under the heading of operational expenditures in this report.

As to the term "commissions" listed in our report, the explanation is simple and brief. Our Home Mission Board has not yet reached a position that would enable it to have salaried workers stationed in various sections of the home field. However, we cannot and do not expect persons to travel and go to other expenses to collect funds for the home mission work at their own expense. While this does not include amounts sent in for the work direct from pastors, churches and others where there is no expense involved, we do gladly give a commission to workers who have travelled or gone to other expenses to collect funds for the work. All persons earning this commission are requested to so indicate on special report blanks which may be obtained at our booth here or in writing our office in Philadelphia.

CURRENT REGULAR PROJECTS

Little need be said about the home field projects formerly adopted and with the Paradise Baptist State Convention of Arizona, pursues regular circuit currently carried on by the Board. These projects are:

- (1) The circuit evangelism team of the mid-west which in cooperation evangelism and other phases of Christian missions in the sparsely settled sections of that region.

(2) Educationally, the Home Mission Board sponsors a two-fold program, viz., (a) sponsorship of the M. C. Cleveland Chair in Old Testament History at the Northern Baptist School of Religion, Newark, New Jersey by underwriting the total annual salary of the instructor for this course; (b) our Board maintains a salaried chaplaincy and off-campus Baptist Student Club at Howard University as a part of the interdenominational religious center for that Institution and (c) our Board maintains a sizeable student-aid fund from which to aid worthy and qualifying students who find themselves in temporary financial straits.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

In addition to the regular projects of our Board entailing a monthly expenditure of some \$800.00, our Home Mission Board initiated one and instrumented another special project. Realizing how wide-spread in these times of race and other tensions in this nation as well as throughout the world; and realizing how equally widespread is the oft-repeated but false charge that the Churches, Conventions and other religious forces do not concern themselves with nor become involved in, these mundane sorrows of this present world, our Board thought it certainly to be within the perimeter of home mission prerogative to initiate a tangible effort to show that our great Baptist Church is interested in things terrestrial as well as in things celestial and that Baptists are civic-minded as well as spirit-minded. As an evidence of our civic-minded concern in our time and country, our Home Mission Board in the past year subscribed to and paid for a \$500.00 "Life Membership" in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People -- an organization that throughout the years has followed the democratic legal-American-way in going to and standing at the fore-front in the fight for unhyphenated justice and human rights and dignity for all.

The other special project undertaken by our Home Mission Board was that of sending relief to the victims of the destructive tornado which ripped through large sections of the South in August of last year. This project was not initiated by, but was -- quite correctly -- given to the Home Mission Board by President Jackson. Of course when we got started this relief effort numerous appeals for the cause had already gone out from numerous churches and organizations throughout the land. We received and sent to this area something less than \$3,000.00, which we thought was fairly good under the circumstances. However, we must agree with the good reverend brother who took the floor to criticize our January report in Hot Springs -- although he at that time nor has he until this moment contributed one dime, either personally or through his church, to this special effort or to any other phase of our home mission work during the eleven years of my Secretaryship of the Board. After hearing the good brother's sermon in the afternoon of our morning report, I feel that the handsome devine could much more profitably have spent his time in preparatory prayer for his afternoon sermon.

Agreeing with the aforesaid brother that the amount collected for this catastrophe of nature may not have been very representative of our great Convention, I am not being defensive of our Home Mission Board when I say that the figure given here does not represent the grand total of relief going from this Convention. However, it would seem that this amount collected and sent, and in the light of the fact that this special relief project was quite

clearly, authoritatively and correctly delegated to the Home Mission Board by our President; and in view of the fact that all Convention department heads were contacted and asked to cooperate, although only a very small amount was received from these contacts, it is my understanding that a number of our Convention departments, auxiliaries and official personnel, as well as a number of Convention churches, made individual direct relief contributions. While we cannot dictate to churches in matters of this sort, it is possible that had we as a Convention pooled our contributions and efforts we not only would have rendered a greater service to the tornado victims but would have presented to the world a much better image of our beloved Convention, even though to have done so may have been at the cost of individual auxiliary or departmental credit. To some this may be too high a price to pay.

MY TRIP TO TOKYO

While it may seem far-fetched to connect the World Baptist Alliance to any phase of our Home Mission work, it was my privilege to attend the 1970 session of the Alliance held in Tokyo, Japan July 12-18. By decision of our Area Executive Committee to contribute \$500.00 (included in the Secretary's travel expenses in this report) toward this trip — the balance for the trip for himself and his wife being borne personally by the Secretary and his church in Plainfield, New Jersey.

This was an enlightening, heart-warming exhilarating and profitable experience. The high-speed jet travel to and from Japan and visit to the indescribable Expo -70 some 300 miles out from Tokyo were most exhilarating and enlightening, while our participating attendance of the sessions of the Alliance held in the great Budokan Moselum Temple in Tokyo was most heart-warming and enlightening. It was reassuring to be a part of that great throng of Baptists representing 57 nationalities and varied languages from all over the world and to join in with this host from many lands in sounding the praises of God by singing many of the Gospel hymns and tunes so familiar to us all through use in our own churches. "The Church's One Foundation," "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name," "Lead on O King Eternal," "Amazing Grace How Sweet the Sound," etc., sung in English, gave our spirit a lift and made us feel a sense of universal brotherhood in Christ. Our status enabled us to participate in voting for the new President from Philadelphia as well as in other business of the Alliance. Thus we could feel that our Home Mission Board was a participating part of this world-wide Baptisthood.

The trip also put us in acquaintance with an official representative from Alaska, the 50th state of the Union and secured for your Secretary a tentative invitation to visit that state to explore the potential for our work there. There is a strong possibility of such an exploratory trip during the ensuing year.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

If the increasing interest in and support of our home mission work in 1969-70 are indicative of a carry-over into the ensuing year 1970-71, we can anticipate a corresponding extension of the scope and degree of missions here on the home field. With sustained and increased interest and support we will be able more nearly to fulfill the ever-mounting spiritual material and

educational needs of this disturbed age. While we must be careful not to infringe upon the territory of our Evangelistic Board, we find the fields of

the Home Mission and the Evangelistic boards so closely related — if not indeed so interrelated — that it is difficult for us to pursue certain spiritual needs without seeming infringement upon the field of our sister-board. Mindful of this closely drawn line between certain phases of the two boards, we plan in our 1970-71 program to extend to other needy sections of the country the ministry of our "Itinerant Ministry" project now being pursued in the mid-west in cooperation with the Paradise Baptist State Convention of Arizona. This expanded Itinerant Ministry will be functional not only in sparsely settled regions, but will also pursue an inner-city ministry intended to dialogue the ever-increasing number of youth, drug addicts, street gangs and others who do not attend anybody's church. This project will be known as the "Hedges and Highways" phase of our Itinerant Ministry.

Still another phase of our anticipated work is in the field of education. When we review the wide-spread and oftentimes violent and destructive uprisings on our school, college and university campuses, and when we note that it has been on the Christian-controlled campuses that these uprisings have been less violent and less frequent, it becomes clear and morally mandatory that we do all we can to keep these institutions of learning in full operation. Therefore, in addition to our continuing the sponsorship of the M. C. Cleveland professorship in Old Testament at the Northern Baptist School of religion and the student aid fund already operative, it is in our 1970-71 program to make a contribution of \$1,000 each to Shaw University, Raleigh, N. C., Virginia Union University, Richmond, Va. and Bishop College, Dallas, Texas; \$500 to American Baptist Theological Seminary, Nashville, Tenn., \$500 to Piney Woods Industrial School in Piney Woods, Mississippi and \$100 to the Christian School for Orphan Indian Boys in Flagstaff, Arizona. This proposed educational budget is not intended to preclude or exclude other qualifying educational institutions, but is set as the Home Mission Board's 1970-71 goal in educational missions and is subject to amendment by suggestion or necessitated by circumstances.

GENERAL COMMENTS

1. The Commissioners of the National Baptist Hotel-Bath House were instructed by the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., at the Mid Winter Board Meeting, January 1970, in Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas to offer a compromise settlement of a disputed debt alleged to be due the Estate of James Ferguson deceased, Court Case No. 11124 in the amount of \$5,500.00. A compromise settlement was offered by the Commissioners in the amount of \$1,500.00 as a settlement of the claim against it. This offer was accepted by the Attorneys Walter J. Wright and Ben J. Harrison, Attorneys for the Garland County Probate Court.

The sum of \$1,500.00 has been paid and accepted by the Executor of the Ferguson Estate as payment in full for the alleged debt of \$5,500.00 against the National Baptist Hotel-Bath House.

2. Mr. Dane Harris owner of the Parking Lot used by the guest of the National Baptist Hotel-Bath House demanded \$500.00 the full amount of an old balance due him for rent. This old debt of \$500.00 was paid Mr. Harris. The rental of this lot is \$125.00 a month or \$1,500.00 a year.

3. Although we are in direct competition with multimillion dollar Hotels and Motels our business has grown and each year we have shown a substantial increase over the previous year. We have the largest Hotel-Bath House in America owned and operated by members of our Race. We have 42 regular paid employees. Our Hotel and Bath House features "Everything Under One Roof," 96 rooms and luxury suites, with down to earth rates beginning at \$3.10. Air Conditioning, Colored Television, Radio, 24 hour Telephone Service, Dining Room, Beauty Shop, Doctor's Office and a free Parking Lot. Modern Improvements must be constantly made if we are to continue to compete with the Modern Business World.

4. Submitted with this report are photostatic copies of the two checks mentioned in the first part of our report in the amount of \$2,000.00. Accompanying this report

is a check for \$4,000.00 giving the National Baptist Hotel-Bath House a credit of \$6,000.00 to the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc.

REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

Corresponding Secretary's Annual Report

President Jackson, Members of the Board of Directors and Messengers to the Ninetieth Annual Session of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated:

With humble hearts we give thanks to Almighty God for his continuing mercies in the year that is past. The year 1970 marks the Ninetieth year of uninterrupted service in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in overseas evangelism by the Foreign Mission Board, and we are grateful for the opportunity and privilege to serve as your Secretary at this significant period in our denomination's history. We shall ever be grateful not only for the encouragement given us by our President, Dr. J. H. Jackson, but also by the hundreds of Pastors and churches throughout our country who by their prayers and contributions have enabled us to carry out the command of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ when He said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15)

We would also express our gratitude to the program committee for granting to the Foreign Mission Board, for the second time during our administration, the privilege of having sufficient time to present these dedicated servants of God—our Missionaries, to the Convention so that you who support our overseas enterprise can see and meet these persons to whom we owe so much. They are your representatives; they serve in your stead; they are the physical embodiment of the concern and prayers of National Baptists for their black brothers and sisters in Africa, in Central America and in the Caribbean area. These are the ones who walk the dusty roads, endure the intolerable heat, eat the strange foods and, dwell among strange people, and in your stead, sing the Lord's song in a strange land. Despite the difficulties that may be involved they join the Foreign Mission Board in saying, "continue to support the cause and send some of your own to help us bring Christ to a sin-sick world!"

Our Missionaries

Following our Convention last year Mrs. Erma Bailey Etheridge of Brandywine, Md., began her work as Matron at the Suehn Industrial Mission, Liberia. Mrs. Etheridge is eminently qualified to supervise the dormitories for our orphan children and is making a real contribution to the spiritual and physical welfare of our children.

Mrs. Josephine Minter of Topeka, Kansas after transferring from the Suehn Mission in Liberia is now serving as a missionary-domestic science teacher at the Providence Industrial Mission at Chiradzulu, Malawi. Her work is so commendable that the Malawi Ministry of Education has publicly commended her. She has been asked to set up classes of a similar nature in other areas of Malawi.

Rev. Benjamin Stephens of Nicodemus, Kansas who serves as coordinator of the Suehn and Bendo Industrial Missions has excelled in supervising the physical plants at both Missions, especially as it relates to buildings, mechanical and technical equipment. He has received certification from the Ministry of Tele-Communications to operate an amateur radio and is now in a position to keep in immediate com-

munication with the United States. Because of this knowledge the Board was able to send emergency funds to meet the needs caused by a roof-destroying storm this past October.

Miss Annie P. Littlejohn of Kansas City, Missouri, a member of the Paseo Baptist Church of that City, left on September 3rd to serve as a secondary-teacher at the Suehn Mission in Liberia. Miss Littlejohn is a graduate of Benedict College, Columbia, South Carolina and had been teaching for the Kansas City Board of Education. Her term of service will be two years.

We have already presented to you Rev. and Mrs. Rufus Prunty of the Bendoo Mission, Liberia whose furlough has been extended one year, as well as Mrs. Ophelia Shepard of Saint Louis, Missouri and Mrs. M. L. Sanders of Holdenville, Oklahoma both of whom gave two years of service to the Suehn Mission. Miss Della Mae McGrew of Spencer, Oklahoma after serving a three year tour of dedicated service is now on a much deserved furlough of one year. We have also presented Rev. and Mrs. Fernando Downs, of Bluefields, Nicaragua who are well representing National Baptists in Nicaragua, Central America.

Greetings to the Convention are hereby conveyed from Mrs. Sarah Cyrus of Bendoo Mission, Miss Gladys East of the Suehn Mission both in Liberia; Dr. and Mrs. Daniel Malekebu of the Providence Industrial Mission, Chiradzulu, Malawi, the Rev. Elliot D. Ngubeni of the Republic of South Africa and one hundred and ninety-one native workers from Africa, the Bahamas and Central America.

Our Mission Stations

Messengers to our Convention must keep ever before them the knowledge of the extent and scope of our overseas Mission services. On the continent of Africa your Foreign Mission Board supports Missionaries and Mission Stations in Sierra Leone, Liberia and Ghana in West Africa; Malawi in East Africa, the Republics of Lesotho and South Africa in the South of Africa. The work in these areas consists of over 300 churches with a membership exceeding forty-four thousand. Our elementary and junior and senior high schools serve sixteen hundred and ninety-seven student. Our medical services in Liberia and Malawi record over 21,000 treatments annually, and our Seminary and Bible School in the Republic of Lesotho has twenty-nine men from South Africa who are receiving Ministerial training. Of the one hundred and ninety one workers regularly employed or on furlough, sixteen are Missionaries from the United States. This comprises our work on the Continent of Africa.

In the past year political upheavals and civil disorders in some of the countries wherein we serve have created innumerable problems. In Sierra Leone the political situation caused the exile of the Headmaster of the Roosevelt-Vine School in Freetown, Mrs. Constance Cummings-John. Mrs. Cummings-John was also the Mayor of Freetown, the Capital City of Sierra Leone, and an outstanding Baptist; but a military junta exiled or imprisoned many of the prominent citizens and she was in that group. Our Secondary School with over seven hundred and seventy pupils is still operating along with our Mission Church, but it calls for delicate diplomacy on the part of the Foreign Mission Board to continue our work.

A political upheaval in the Republic of Lesotho caused us to close our Secondary School at Leribe and also discontinue our Seminary classes for seven months. Fortunately the crisis has lessened and the Seminary is in the process of reopening. The Secondary School will begin clases in January.

Perhaps our most serious loss is the result of a recent law passed in the Republic of Ghana depriving all aliens of the right to own businesses or be employed. Most of our Baptist strength in Ghana has been composed of Nigerians from the Yoruba Tribe, thus they were forced to leave Ghana where many have lived for over twenty-

five years. This "Compliance Order on Aliens" rendered churches almost empty, because our church membership at Accra is now only 23 of the former 550 members. This same situation exists in the Asokwa-Adanse Province. We are praying that the few members remaining who are Ghanians will be sufficiently equipped to carry on the work.

Our Missions in the Republic of South Africa still struggle on despite the severe racial segregation and discrimination laws. A recent letter from Rev. Elliot D. Ngubeni informs us of two churches that are being rebuilt at Gugulethu in Cape Colony Province and at Gilton in the Transkei Province. He further reports that the 29 men in our Seminary are continuing their studies despite the closing of the school for seven months due to civil disorders. We must emphasize the fact that the Gospel is the last bastion of hope for these oppressed people. They are looking to us for continued support as they seek to survive under the intolerable circumstances which have been forced upon them by a white minority.

On October 12, 1969 a devastating storm struck the Suehn Industrial Mission. Windows were blown out, zinc roofs from two of the boy's dormitories were blown great distances. A large tree fell on a third dormitory collapsing the roof and wall. One of the teacher's homes was smashed by falling trees; rubber and plum trees were uprooted. Fortunately as God would have it no one was injured. Because of your generosity all roofs have been replaced and a new building is being erected. Funds have also been placed in escrow for replacing Strong Hall which was built in 1929 under the principalship of Mrs. Sarah Williamson Coleman. This building formerly housed the medical clinic, the library and living quarters for teachers. The erection of these two buildings marks the conclusion of an unannounced program started six years ago to completely rehabilitate the Suehn Mission, and upon their completion, every building save one (to be used for a museum) will have either been newly erected or entirely rehabilitated.

In the Western Hemisphere we support the Zion Baptist Mission in Bluefields, Nicaragua, Central America. This Mission supports two smaller Mission Churches: one at Pearl Lagoon and another at Tasbapoani, both in the State of Zalaya. On the Eastern Coast of Nicaragua elementary education is provided primarily by the Roman Catholic and Moravian churches. Baptist parents are often faced with the problem of having to beg for scholarships in order for their children to obtain an education. Because of this they appeal to the Board to aid them in this scholarship program, for once they pay for their own children, then they can insist that the children be relieved of Catholic and Moravian instruction. The Board is now supplying scholarship funds for twenty-four of these children at \$50.00 per year per child.

In the Bahama Islands the Foreign Mission Board is working in cooperation with two Bahamian Associations, the St. John Native Baptist Society, Rev. M. L. Symonette, Moderator and the Salem-Union Association, Rev. Enoch Backford, Moderator in supplementing the support of one hundred and sixteen Pastors in the outer islands of the Bahamas Island Chain.

Signs of Advance

Because of the certification of Rev. Benjamin Stephens with the Liberian Ministry of Tele-Communication we have now a radio communications set-up at each of our Mission Stations in that country, so that every day at 5 P.M. direct contact is made with the Co-ordinators office in Morovia. This system is especially useful in emergency situations where Missionaries or students may suddenly become ill or injured.

Our use of modern methods of communication have further been enhanced by a gift from Rev. Ulysses Grant Upshaw of the Mt. Calvary Baptist Church of Tucson, Arizona who gave to the Board five Cassette Recorders for use at five of our

African Mission Stations. Monthly messages go out from the Board to the Missionaries and they in turn may send their verbal reports through the Cassette tapes provided by the Board.

Our Financial Condition

Messengers to the Convention may receive a complete financial statement in the "Mission Herald" Magazine which may be obtained at the Foreign Mission Booth. We are happy to report to you however that our income for the past twelve months exceeds by \$108,894.97 the income of our first year of service. In 1961-62 you contributed to the Board \$143,893.10. In the past year you have contributed \$252,788.07. During this period the Board has met all of the overseas salaries and Budgets three months in advance. At this moment all of our overseas obligations are paid up to September 30, 1970. It has met six transportation costs of Missionary personnel returning to their post of duty or furloughs to the United States, and in each instance this involved expensive air transportation. It is underwriting the complete individual support of one hundred and twenty-three students on the elementary or secondary level in Africa and is also supporting three students on a college level in Liberia. Twenty-eight South African students who are Seminarians are being completely supported pending the reopening of the Seminary in Lesotho and twenty-four students in Nicaragua are receiving scholarships for elementary school training.

As of January all of our Missionaries have received basic salary raises 100% above their basic salaries nine years ago, for it has always been our conviction that when servants of God work in His vineyard at home or abroad they should receive decent livable salaries and be provided with comfortable living quarters on their field of labor.

This is where your money is going. Raised salaries for Missionaries; better living conditions with new housing, new electricity, new running water; adequate vehicles for transportation, more children supported; more churches being built and more souls being brought to Christ.

Our Expansion Program

On a national level we have found that informed people are supporting people. As more and more of our National Baptist congregations learn of our overseas missions, as more of our people realize their obligation under Christ to proclaim the Gospel to every creature, more spiritual and financial support will be given. To aid in the dissemination of this work we are urging the organizing of a special Women's organization known as the Boosters of Foreign Missions, who at least four times a year will organize and promote special programs designed to acquaint larger numbers among us with detailed information of our work on Foreign fields. The Board has appointed Mrs. Leola Stephens of Philadelphia as the National Organizer, and we are praying that State Conventions, Associations, Congresses and Alliances will aid Sister Stephens in promoting this auxiliary effort to the work of the Foreign Mission Board.

To further expand our work the Foreign Mission Board is publishing a new Missionary Workers Manual. Here is a book which contains not only historical information pertinent to National Baptists, but it contains detailed, specific information as to the duties of the officers of a mission group, how to improve the programs, mission study classes and topics, community emphases and programs, suggestions for strengthening your organization, activities for men in missionary societies, lists of our Missionaries and the location of the various Mission Stations and a host of other materials which conform to our unique, National Baptist way of doing things. It is a Manual written by our own people, for our own churches, within the frame-

work of our own objectives and aspirations. Every National Baptist Church should have copies of this book, purchasable from the Foreign Mission Board for \$3.00. *No longer do you have to turn to the Southern Baptist, American Baptist Convention or any other group but your own!*

On an international level we did not believe that we should expand our work until our present work especially in Liberia, had reached a moderate standard as it relates to our physical plants and services. Today, we have reached that point and the spirit of the Lord has laid it on our hearts to strengthen our work in South Africa. It is this area where ten million members of our race are subjected to such systematic segregation and discrimination that there must be an area nearby which can serve as a haven of refuge. One such area is the independent Kingdom of Swaziland. Formerly a Protectorate under British rule it achieved its independence in 1968. Because it believes in freedom of religion many of our South African members have migrated to this land and there they are endeavoring to serve God in an atmosphere of peace and freedom. The opportunity to bring thousands to Christ is unlimited in this new nation, and we believe that God would have us proclaim His Gospel through the establishment of a Mission Church. The Swaziland Government has allocated us four acres for this purpose and we are hereby requesting that four churches would contribute \$5000.00 apiece for the erection of this building. Thus far we have received commitments from Dr. George Lucas of Dayton and Dr. Fred Haynes of Los Angeles.

We have further been importuned by Baptists in Jamaica, West Indies to consider their area for supplemental help and the Board has voted to send an investigating committee in May of 1971 to study this situation.

Three years ago the Foreign Mission Board led a preaching Team to Liberia, West Africa where in cooperation with the Liberian Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention, 313 persons accepted Christ as a result of churches organized. In February of 1971 it is our intention to lead another Preaching Team to that same country. The team will be limited to twelve members and any of our Pastors who are interested in serving on this team, should contact the Secretary for the detailed information. Do not be misled into believing that this will be a sightseeing tour, in every instance it will be a soul-saving and Christ-emphasizing campaign; each man will be the living embodiment of the words of Jesus when He prophesied that "ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, in all Judea, in Samaria, and unto the Uttermost Parts of the Earth." (Acts 1:8)

For ninety long years this has been our witness to the world. Deprived though we were as a race in America, yet our forefathers were convinced that as believers in Christ 'a charge to keep they had, and a God to glorify.' Despite their lack of educational opportunities, despite their economic inequalities and cultural disadvantages, yet they gave for themselves to bring Christ to Africa and the world and we their children, are continuing the work so nobly begun. I thank God for such a heritage and readily accept the challenge to emulate and even surpass the efforts of our forefathers in being used of God as a tool to another's salvation.

Let us then as National Baptists remember that we have come a long way in carrying out the Great Commission. The God of our weary years, the God of our silent tears, has brought us thus far on the way. And now that we as a Race are finding our place in the sun, may we never forget that 'to whom much is given, much also is required.' Of all the Christians in America, we have paid for our faith, we have been through the fire, we have been through the flood, and despite all that we have achieved we still have a long way to go. Even though some of our people have achieved some degree of affluence, even though some of our churches have grandiloquent music, vested choirs, copious educational facilities and outstanding budgets, we must still remember that the primary purpose of the Church is to give witness to the Gospel. It must demonstrate the truth in terms of flesh and blood,

so that the Word becomes flesh before mens very eyes. This is what your Missionaries are endeavoring to do. This has been and will be the emphasis of your Foreign Mission Board. With your prayers and gifts we shall press on in the Name of Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord. This ends the report of your Foreign Mission Board.

OVERSEAS EVANGELISM

It is still true that the salvation of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is for all men, and the efforts of men to evangelize are not to be confined to a given or selected area. For a long period of time we have unconsciously confined our preach-and teaching efforts to traditional and familiar locations. The ideal conditions to be found at these well known locations have been the inducement for many who have made themselves a part of the business of preaching. Though many have found Christ through this program of preaching, are we really on the high road of evangelism, the road that carries us to places we know not? Do we bear the zeal of Jesus Christ to preach to the lost wherever they may be found? Are we spiritually geared to go in the Master's name, even through days of deprivation and nights of discomfort?

With the day of opportunity yet with us, we are happy that the Foreign Mission Board, National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., is aware of the fact that "... night cometh when no man can work."

Rev. William J. Harvey, III, corresponding secretary of the foreign mission board, has just recently announced a second preaching mission to Liberia, West Africa. This preaching mission, to take place in February, 1971, is to duplicate and hopefully enlarge upon the preaching mission to Liberia two years ago. We are asking you to pray much for the success of this mission, for this is not a demonstration just to draw attention to the Foreign Mission Board, rather it is a spirit-led venture. I quote for you a paragraph from the letter our corresponding secretary addressed to potential candidates for this mission:

"... we are hereby inviting you to participate in a preaching mission in Liberia in February 1971. You will be expected to preach not only in urban communities, but in towns, villages and in the 'bush. You will walk many miles, eat native foods and to some extent duplicate the every-day experiences of our missionaries on the field. This will not be a vacation but hard work for God. Though there will be periods of relaxation and rest, we anticipate an intensive three weeks of vigorous activity in a soul-saving campaign. I mention these anticipated details so that you may be alerted to what we are asking in depth. In truth we shall go as soldiers for Christ, under orders."

Those expected to go thus far are: Rev. J. B. Brown of Jackson, Mississippi; Rev. J. Thomas Jennings of Washington, D.C.; Rev. W. W. Weatherspool of Atlanta, Georgia; Rev. F. L. Henley of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania and Rev. Charles H. Hampton of San Diego, California.

Our corresponding secretary will lead the mission, and will take on full capacity with the rest as a soldier for Christ under orders.

Let us keep these men on our prayer altars.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON DENOMINATION COORDINATION

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.

90th Annual Session

September 8-13, 1970

NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA

Illustrious President Jackson, Other Officers, and Delegates:

Let us consider Denominational Coordination under the headings 1st. Now, and 2nd. Then.

I. Now. A scripture clearly states what God wants. "In everything give thanks: for **this is the will of God in Christ Jesus** concerning you." In our tremendous National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc. there is very, very, very much for which we must more and more express our gratitude. It is assumed that this Commission will point out steps or procedures through which can come increase in our heaven-bestowed peace for soul-winning, and for Christ-sharing, ability-development. Thanks be to God that this Convention is not static, but is dynamic and forward and upward moving!

Now there is an arrangement for more efficiency by the placing of an office for records of the National Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Congress in the Sunday School Publishing Board at Nashville, Tennessee. Very much thanks can be given to the Lord for that!

The most unusual, unassuming, burden-bearing, Christward-pointing Dr. Charles L. Dinkins, Director of Christian Education for our denomination-wide work, and former Dean of the National Congress, with the versatile, unique, perceptive, most brotherly Dr. Edward A. Freeman, President of the National Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Congress; and the stalwart, very efficient, reassuring Dr. D. C. Washington, Executive Director of the Sunday School Publishing Board are quietly giving attention to forward advance ways—organizations, and individuals as well, can better relate in the task of living Christ. For this thanks be to the Lord!

In every auxiliary Convention, and in every Board more and more updated procedures for building Christlike character and for practicing Christ-following steps are available. Thanks be to God for this! Our world-renowned President, Dr. Joseph Harrison Jackson yearly presents a project which in results reminds of those after the Prophet Ezekiel preached to the wind. The children of Israel stood upon their feet, "an exceeding great army." The two projects as we were coming to this the 90th Annual Session of the greatest of Conventions of descendants of Africa were followed by calls, which coordinated efforts across the country to bring young people by the thousands to the September 11, 1970 evening session; and to have lighted churches across the nation the same night praying for the unity for which we must beseech that God bless America. Thank the Lord for that!

II. Then. With God one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years is as a day. God takes time. He allows us time. Thank God for that! "Then" as used here applies to the future. This Commission trusts that it applies to the **near** future, "just a little while." For we are "redeeming the time." Adjustments are carefully

and prayerfully made for the needs. Momentum of our Convention has constantly increased in a remarkable way in spite of the restrictions of the past on our people. And in far less decades than others we have come to match the quality in publications, and in progress in some areas of those of anybody else. Let us assign definitely eminently qualified leaders to set for us deadlines that we may have:

1. **A Denominational Calendar.** A few years will be required to do this adequately. It should include fall and spring revivals with study courses preceding vacation church schools with training preceding, stewardship or enlistment campaigns, an annual census with worked out follow through, and the various National meeting dates. Sectional variations, of course, would be provided for.

2. **Proper Timing.** Six months advance possession by local people or individuals congregations would be necessary to digest the thinking, to align the planning in individual or local congregations, and to have adequate time in a unified effort to promote the movements. All that implies terrific pressure on the denominational calendar makers. Prayers are extremely necessary that they can continue to live with a heavenly inner peace in spite of the many hectic involvements through which they intend to survive.

3. **Directors of Christian Education and Missionaries** (state, and associational) as directors of promotion where available. Beginning with the Director of Christian Education of the National these key people should be at least responsible for guiding to individuals, who would carry on necessary alerting, and encouraging the together steps of our own denomination.

4. **Better Support of and Cooperation** with every one of our own denomination's producers of literature and of papers in order that they may relate their producing of writings, and of application of the same to precise, relevant, then, immediate promotions.

5. **A Clear and Continued Focus on the Individual** that such a one increasingly will realize that we can do far more working together than we can do apart. Each can be led to be militant only as the disciples were militant under the exact commandment or commission of the Risen and Glorified Lord with a will to continued union with the Heavenly Father in personal prayer, a will to suffer as a Christian, a will to win souls, a will to reassure in Christ, and a will to witness everywhere possible.

This Commission recommends that the five preceding goals be given deadlines by the National Director of Christian Education with the advice of the Presidents of the National Congress, the Women's Convention Auxiliary, and other auxiliaries; the Executive Director of the Sunday School Publishing Board, the Executive Secretary of the National Baptist Training Union Board, and any others that the President of the National Baptist Convention determines.

Brothers, this was the handiwork of God for we could have nosed into a mountain or been lost at Sea. We have had to make many decisions and these decisions were based upon what we thought was in the best interest of the Laymen's organization. We have lost many of our old soldiers of the cross, and they had to be replaced. Shall we stop here? No, we must take a stand to fight on, though there may be mountains before us and dark valleys in our pathway so we must say to ourselves "peace be still." I am often reminded of those that exalt themselves, but in the midst of confusion, conflicts and the things of this world, moving so fast I also tell myself wait, as in the 40th chapter of Isaiah and the 31st verse, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings as eagles, they shall run and not be weary, and they shall walk and not faint."

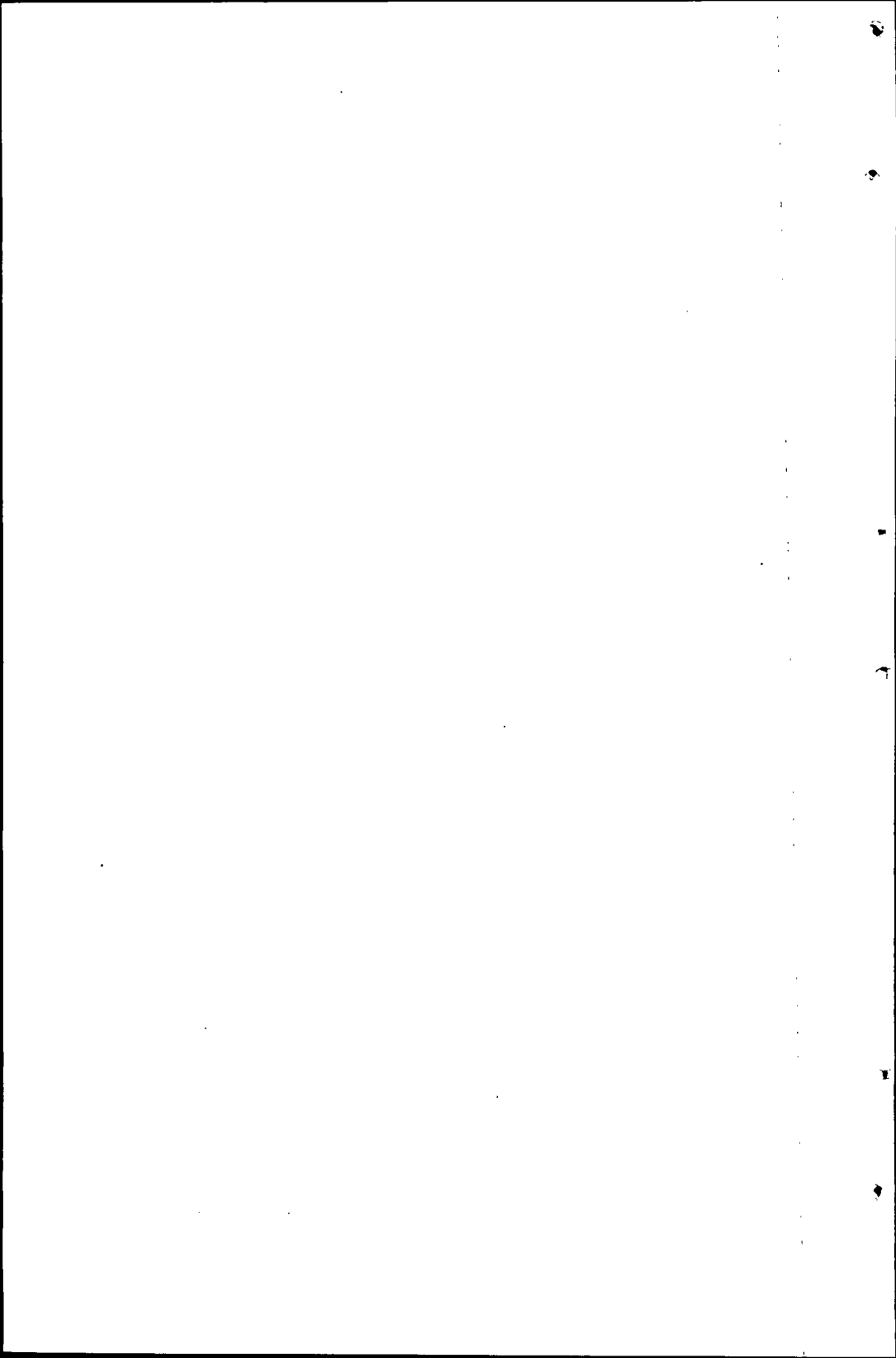

CONSTITUTION OF THE WOMAN'S CONVENTION, AUXILIARY
TO THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.

Preamble

We, the women of the churches connected with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, being desirous of stimulating, developing and transmitting the Missionary spirit of service and giving, among the women, young people and children of the denomination, by prayer, study of the Bible and Missions, do associate ourselves together in a national organization for the purpose of studying, promoting and giving to the causes of missions and Christian education and human welfare at home and abroad.

ARTICLE I—NAME

The organization shall be known as the Woman's Convention, Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT

The object of this Convention shall be to study and promote home missions, foreign missions, Christian education and general welfare of the women and children in the United States of America, in Africa and throughout the world.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this Convention shall consist of state and district conventions, missionary societies, other organizations of the church, young people's organizations and children's bands of Baptist churches appointed by said organizations to attend and represent them in the Convention; and life and annual members.

Section 2. Any Missionary Baptist Woman's state or district convention, local missionary, young people's organization or children's band of churches connected with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, may become members of this Convention by paying the required representation fee.

ARTICLE IV—REGISTRATION

(a) The annual registration fee for each messenger shall be two dollars (\$2.00)

(b) The annual registration fee for each officer, state president, members of the Board of Directors and each chairman and co-chairman of a committee, shall be five dollars (5.00).

✓ (c) The registration fee for annual membership shall be two dollars (\$2.00) and one dollar additional, for special annual membership badge. An annual membership shall be extended the courtesy of the floor, but not the privilege of voting.

(d) All officers and all members of the Board of Directors shall receive without additional cost, registration card, a kit containing the record, badge, program, digest of reports, important recommendations and all general information about the annual meeting.

✓ (e) All messengers shall receive a registration card, a kit containing badge, program, digest of reports, important recommendations and all general information about the annual meeting without additional cost.

(f) The life membership fee shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), and each life member shall receive a certificate and badge. Life members who give one dollar (\$1.00) annually shall receive program and the record.

ARTICLE V—REPRESENTATION

Section 1. The following annual fees shall be paid:

- (a) State Convention—fifty dollars (\$50.00)
- (b) District Convention—twenty-five dollars (\$25.00)
- (c) Missionary Societies—ten dollars (\$10.00)
- (d) All organizations are entitled to two (2) delegates for each five dollars (\$5.00).

Section 2. All representation, registration and enrollment monies brought to the Convention shall be paid through the convention business office and receipted for by the treasurer of the convention. A memorandum receipt may be given by committee chairman of Committee members, but the official receipt must come from the treasurer.

Section 3. Representation money shall not be designated by the organization paying in the money. The Board of Directors or Executive committee shall disburse equitably and in keeping with needs of the causes for which the convention is responsible all representation money above the authorized expense of operating the convention.

ARTICLE VI—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the convention shall be: a president, first and second vice president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, treasurer, historian, parliamentarian, pianist, assistant pianist, organist, legal adviser, director of music, national director of the Young People's Department, Eastern, Western, and Southern regional directors, and Board of Directors, composed of Presidents of State Conventions.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected at each annual meeting of the convention and shall hold offices until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 3. Officers shall be nominated by a Nominating Committee of seven—one from each of the five regions, a chairman and one selected at large—by the president and voted on by the convention.

Section 4. There shall be a Board of Directors. It shall consist of the officers of the Woman's Convention, heads of departments, chairman of standing committees, and state presidents, fifteen of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The president and recording secretary of the Woman's Convention shall be chairman and secretary respectively, of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Elected officers of the Woman's Convention (including the elected officers of the Young People's Department) and the State Presidents constitute the Board of Directors.

Section 5. Executive Committee: The Board of Directors shall have power to create from its own body, an Executive Committee of twelve members consisting of the President, Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, National Director of Young People and five others to be selected out of the Board of Directors with full power and authority to transact such business as may be referred to it by the Board of Directors of the Convention, and to transact any urgent business demanding immediate attention of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

The Executive Committee shall report its action in detail to the Board of Directors at the next Directors meeting.

The Executive Committee shall recommend compensation salaries or honoraria to the Board of Directors for consideration and final action.

Section 6. The regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held as follows:

- (a) During the mid-winter session of the Board of Directors of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

- (b) At the same time and place that the Board of Directors of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated, holds its meetings, for the purpose of making the program for the annual meeting of the Convention.
- (c) The afternoon before the opening of the annual meeting.
- (d) At any other time during the annual meeting when called in session by the president of the Convention.

ARTICLE VII—ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting for the election of officers and transaction of business shall be held each year at the same time in the same city as the meeting of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

Officers shall be elected Friday afternoon of the annual meeting.

The roster of officers to be elected shall be presented by the chairman or secretary of the Nominating Committee to the regular session of the Convention, Friday afternoon, and voted upon in that same session by the registered delegates to the Convention.

ARTICLE VIII—CONDUCT OF MEETINGS

Every session of the Woman's Convention shall be opened and closed with appropriate worship.

ARTICLE IX—REGIONS

The National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., divided the country into five regional or district groups, embracing the following states:

North Central—Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia

Southeastern—Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia

Western—California, Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming

Southwestern—Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas

Northeastern—Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Virginia.

At each of the regional meetings of the National Convention, the Woman's Convention will hold a Christian Workers Institute.

The presidents of the State Conventions, included in each region constitute a Regional Board of Directors, with a chairman, vice chairman, recording and corresponding secretaries and a treasurer.

These officers shall be elected bi-annually, at the meeting of their respective regional convention.

Their duties shall be those usually performed by persons in similar positions. The Regional Board of Directors shall:

- (a) Help to select the church and arrange for the entertainment of the women who attend the regional meeting.
- (b) See that information Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention is given the proper circulation.

ARTICLE X—SUBSIDIARY BODY

The Young People's Department consisting of Red Circles, Y.W.A.'s, Children's Bands and other similar organizations shall be recognized as a missionary body to the Woman's Convention. The subsidiary body shall be under the sponsorship and supervision of the Woman's Convention—guided and supervised by one National director and three Regional Directors, elected by and out of the membership of the Woman's Convention.

ARTICLE XI—OBJECT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT

The object of the Young People's Department shall be to enlist, inspire, train and prepare the youth of the denomination for participation and leadership in the various activities of our churches, and to bring them together in the bond of fellowship, cooperation and mutual interest that will make them a blessing to the world.

ARTICLE XII—MEETINGS

The annual meeting of the Young People's Department shall be held at the same time and in the same city as the annual meeting of the Women's Convention.

The place of meeting of the Young People's Department shall be arranged by the Committee on Annual Convention-Arrangements in consultation and cooperation with the committee of the Woman's Convention on Annual Convention Arrangements.

ARTICLE XIII—MEMBERSHIP

The membership classification in the Young People's Department shall be:

- (a) Sunshine Band Circle (Ages 5-12 years)
- (b) The Junior Girls of the Red Circle (Ages 13-15 years)
- (c) The Senior Girls of the Red Circle (Ages 16-18 years)
- (d) The Y.W.A.'s (Ages 19-25 years)
- (e) The Young Woman's League (Ages 19-25 years)
- (f) The Young Matron's League—Married Women up to 25 years of age

ARTICLE XIV—REPRESENTATION

- (a) State Convention—Twenty Dollars
- (b) District Convention—Ten Dollars
- (c) Local Circle—Five Dollars
- (d) Children's Band—Two Dollars Fifty Cents
- (e) State and District Conventions and Local Circles shall be entitled to two delegates for each Five Dollars
- (f) Children's Bands shall be entitled to one delegate for each Two Dollars Fifty Cents (\$2.50) paid in for representation.

ARTICLE XV—CAUSES

The cause to which the Young People's Department shall devote its interests shall be Christian Education; home and foreign missions; recreation and health (A national camp) and a scholarship fund. All contemplated projects shall be presented by the national director to the Women's Convention for consideration or action.

ARTICLE XVI—FINANCE

The national director shall appoint a capable Business Committee of five (5) to supervise and direct the financial affairs of the Young People's Department, to make full reports of all receipts and expenses to the young people in session; and to report to the Woman's Convention in session on Saturday morning of the annual meeting of the Convention to turn over all monies to the Treasurer of the Woman's Convention through the Finance Committee, to be paid out as designated in the report of the Young People's Department. Funds raised by the Young People shall not be used to promote the general work of the Woman's Convention.

ARTICLES XVII—OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1. Directors: The Directors of this department shall be a national director and regional directors. There shall be a director for each state who shall have general supervision of the work of their respective states in cooperation with their state Convention.

Section 2. Duties of the National Director: The national director shall have general supervision of the work of the respective states in cooperation with the work of the entire Department.

Section 3. Duties of the Regional Directors: It shall be the duty of the regional directors to form local or state organizations and build up the work in their respective regions in harmony with the program and plans for the Young People's Department and in harmony with the Women's State Convention and local missionary societies of their respective regions. The responsibility for any special program or project may be assigned to a director for development or execution.

Section 4. Officers:

- (a) Officers of the Young People's Department shall be a president and second vice president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, pianist, director of music and historian.
- (b) The term of officers shall be two years.

ARTICLE XVIII—CONSTITUTION OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT

The Constitution of the Young People's Department or any amendment thereto shall be subject to the approval of the Woman's Convention before presented to the Young People's Department for acceptance.

ARTICLE XIX—AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting, sixty days previous notice having been sent by the corresponding secretary of the Woman's Convention, to each state through its state president. The proposed amendment or changes shall be definitely stated in said notice.

BY-LAWS

The following by-laws are adopted for the government of the Convention and for the efficient conduct of its business.

ARTICLE I—CONVENTION MANAGEMENT

The president shall notify members of the Committee on Convention Planning and Management when to report for work, at the place of the annual meeting. Preparatory to the opening of the annual meeting, said persons will arrange for enrollment and other business that will insure the smooth and efficient running of the Convention.

ARTICLE II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at the annual meeting of the Woman's Convention and at all meetings of the Board of Directors; shall appoint all committees, not otherwise provided for; shall organize new societies; shall be an ex-officio member on all standing committees. She may, through the corresponding secretary call special meetings of the Executive Committee, when in her judgment needful or at the request of at least five (5) members of the Executive Committee. In her absence, a vice president or one of the state presidents may be selected to preside. State Presidents shall represent the interest of the Woman's Convention and Boards in their states, in cooperation with state boards, or state conventions.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the corresponding secretary to send the corresponding secretary of each state convention and to local societies, three months before the annual meeting, a blank for the report of these organizations, and from their reports, the corresponding Secretary shall compile her annual report for the National Body. She shall conduct the correspondence of the Executive Board, and is authorized to organize local societies.

Section 3. The recording secretary shall keep a faithful record of all proceedings of the annual meetings. She shall prepare all minutes and records of the board and the annual meeting for publication in the record. All persons or committees handling any funds of the Convention shall turn copies of said receipts or financial reports over to her for inclusion in the annual financial report of the Convention. She shall read the printers proof to insure accuracy of the Record. She shall have the Record shipped to them in kits and she shall mail out other Records on order or request. She shall be assisted in this work by the assistant recording secretary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the assistant recording secretary to notify all chairmen and members of standing committees of their appointments within thirty days after the Convention closes on printed forms provided for that purpose.

It shall also be her duty to assist the recording secretary in the discharge of her secretarial duties and in her absence keep records of all proceedings and attend to such duties as her official relationship requires.

Section 5. The treasurer shall be adequately bonded by the Executive Committee and said bonds shall be paid for out of the funds of the convention and kept in the office of the recording secretary; the treasurer shall receive all money collected on the field by any representative or through any office of the Convention.

She shall keep a regular account of all receipts and disbursements in well-bound records, and report same to the Convention in regular session to the Board of Directors or whenever requested by the Executive Committee. Designated funds and authorized bills shall be paid within thirty (30) days unless otherwise ordered.

Any remaining representation money above the authorized expense of operating the Convention shall be divided as authorized by the Board of Directors, equally between a selected National Denominational School and National Trade and Professional School for Women and Girls, Washington, D. C. and sent by the treasurer to said schools within thirty (30) days after said authorization. The treasurer's book shall always be open to the inspection of the Executive Committee.

She shall pay out no money without an order from the recording secretary, signed by the president. Her accounts shall be audited annually by a certified accountant.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the historian to gather and record the facts pertaining to the work, development and achievements of the Woman's Convention, and also to present the stories of the lives of those women of the denomination who have made outstanding contributions in Christian service. She shall report or feature her work, as historian, by-annually.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the parliamentarian to instruct and guide the Woman's Convention in correct parliamentary rules and usages (according to Roberts' Rules of Order) when called upon, by the president or the body for instruction or ruling.

Section 8. The duties of any other officers, elected by the Convention, shall be such as usually appertain to the office to which they are elected, together with any other duties that may be assigned to them by the Convention.

Section 9. Appointment to chairmanship of committees shall be made on the basis of the financial ratings of the states and active interests and participation in the general or special work of the organization. As far as possible there shall be an equitable distribution of offices and committee appointments in the states.

ARTICLE III

The Convention shall support and operate the National Baptist Missionary Training School, Nashville, Tennessee; the National Trades and Professional School, Incorporated, Washington, D. C. and the "Carrie V. Dyer" Hospital at Monrovia, Liberia, West Coast Africa, and such other institutions, as have been endorsed by the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

ARTICLE IV

A concise report of the work of the Woman's Convention shall be made to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated in annual session, through the president or corresponding secretary or someone empowered by the Woman's Convention to do so in arrangement with the President of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated. The treasurer shall make a summary report of finances.

**MINUTES OF THE CAMP AND RETREAT BOARD OF DIRECTORS

**KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI
SEPTEMBER 9, 1969**

The Camp and Retreat Board of Directors of the Woman's Convention, Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., met on the above date in the Muelebach Hotel, Kansas City, Missouri, with the Chairman, Dr. Mary O. Ross, presiding.

Total number of members present 20.

Prayer was offered by Reverend Wilford McKinley.

The chairman made opening remarks and called for the reading of the last minutes. The minutes were read by the secretary. Minutes adopted.

Business brought forward from previous meeting as follows:

1. **Emergency repairs.**
2. **Bids on Over-all repairs at Camp-site.**

1. True to the promise our chairman made a report on emergency repairs as follows: Some repairs on Maison House, a portion of lake and lifting of well-pump in order to use the camp in 1969. Of the \$2,500.00 on hand, \$2,000.00 were used on these emergencies. This met the approval of the members of the board.

2. We then listened to some suggested facts and figures on the over-all repairs as follows:

(1) The Farm-House brought up-to-date. We were given an estimate price of \$21,351.09. This price would include the adding of 2 extra rooms.

(2) Motel repairs, \$3,771.51.

(3) The Masion-House, \$3,206.50.

The three (3) buildings, total cost, \$28,334.10.

These prices were presented in writing, they were left in the hands of Reverend McKinley. He will see to it that the members will have a copy of the same. Dr. Ross also presented the committee a tentative offer for purchasing of camp cabins at a cost of \$4,000.00 per cabin, that perhaps it would house 25 persons. She also stated that there is a possibility should we purchase 2 or more cabins that the contractor would deduct \$100.00 on the cabin. After much discussion, questions and favorable answers, a motion was in order to accept or reject. It was moved by Mrs. W. O. Mays and seconded by Mrs. Wood, that our chairman check with the contractors and purchase 2 cabins if the price seems in keeping. This motion was carried.

Mrs. Marsetta Wells asked about the restoring of our beach. In answer to this question it was stated that our chairman is working with Michigan State officials on re-daming the lake. Answer accepted.

Mrs. Zee Anderson Barron suggested that someone be named on this committee. This met the approval of the members. A motion was carried, and our chairman was asked to appoint 5 men of her choice to the Board. Reverend Wilford McKinley was named. Others to be named at a later date.

Mrs. Pauline Campbell suggested that each state would help build and support our National Camp and that a space be given on their annual program for a person to talk about the National Camp. Mrs. Campbell also suggested that this plan be presented to the Woman's Convention in this September annual session for its ap-

proval.

Reverend Mrs. Trudie Trimm offered words of praise to our chairman for her untiring service as chairman of this Board, president of the Woman's Convention and Editor-in-chief of our Baptist magazine. A standing vote of thanks was then expressed by all present.

The purpose of the Camp was well stated by our chairman. It is to be a Camp-site beautiful, where all types of religious retreats may be held, to compete with Ridgcrest, Glorietta, Green Lakes and other such places.

The Board was adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.

New Orleans Wonderful

Proudly, we Salute and Congratulate our Host city, New Orleans Wonderful, and the State of Lovely Louisiana—for your robust vitality and beauty that quicken the roots of personality and give strength and stability to life's movements and structures.

What a supreme delight and a profound privilege it is for us to be the Guest in the heavenly, historic, hopeful and, happy New Orleans Wonderful here on the east bank of the Mississippi River—One of America's Most Interesting Cities—whose windows open on many breath-taking landscapes, and whose Sights and Sounds are famous across these United States as well as around the world.

We pour out our gratitude to God and to New Orleans Wonderful, for her gracious invitation and her generous friendship to invite us to this palatial paradise and mix and mingle in Sacred and secular movements. We are happy to know about your past, present and expected future:

New Orleans History is exciting—The city having been founded in 1718, by Jean Baptiste le Moyne, and Incorporated as a city in 1805; having been pledged to four (4)

flags—France, Spain, the Confederate States, and the United States; and now is the largest city in Louisiana, the third largest in the southern part of the United States, and one of the Great Ports of the world, serving as a Commercial Link between the Mississippi River and the Atlantic Ocean. Much of America's trade with Latin America, flows through New Orleans the second largest United States port in value of foreign trade. The city is also a center of Industry, Finance, Education, Communication and Transportation. In New Orleans East, is a division of National Aeronautics and Space Administration Operations.

Her People — The Creoles (Descendants of the early Spanish and French settlers) contribute the most toward making New Orleans unusual among American cities. Most Creoles speak French and English. They make up only a small part of the population, but some still follow many customs of their ancestors. Many other New Orleanians have adopted these customs. For example, All Saint's Day (November 1) is a city-wide holiday that honors the dead. Families go to the cemeteries in groups and stroll around the flower-laden tombs.

Negroes make up about a third of the population and some yet engage in customs of the 1880's such as bands playing for funeral processions to and from cemeteries. There are 36 cemeteries the oldest being the St. Louis Motuirie Ceme-

tery, one of the most beautiful in the world.

Cultural Life – The New Orleans Opera House Association produces six operas each year. This group brings some of the world's leading singers. The New Orleans Symphony Orchestra performances are praiseworthy.

New Orleans is the home of Tulane University, Loyola University, Dillard, Xavier University, St. Mary's Dominican College, Notre Dame Seminary, and a branch of Louisiana State University and more than 225 public, private and parochial, elementary and high schools. Libraries in the City of New Orleans, contain more than 500,000 volumes. The largest collection is in the Public Library. There are more than 600 churches, representing all denominations.

New Orleans has 90 parks and public playgrounds. The South's largest zoo is located in the Audubon Park.

Her Museums and Research Centers own world-famous and historical relics.

Annual Events – Visiting New Orleans is interesting almost any time of the year. Mardi Gras is a gay holiday that reaches a climax on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Lent begins. Street parades begin 10 days earlier, and Masquerade Balls are an exciting feature of the New Orleans Carnival.

Spring Fiesta, usually held shortly after Easter, celebrates the city's historic past.

Without a doubt, we are assembled in a Great City, and I believe all of the Blessed Benedictions of life will flow in us for our sojourn here, and teach us how to make our lives a Sacrament in the Hands of God.

In the deepest spirit of humility and gratefulness, I wish to thank all of the wonderful men and women who worked so diligently for the success of this New Orleans Wonderful Session. May this Great and Charming City, here and now, resolve to Walk With God in Renewed Life and to move with reverence through its every endeavor, as it holds and grows in the principles we have imparted herein.

And the Low Soul gropes the
Low,
And in between, on the misty
flats,
The rest drift to and fro.
But to every man there openeth
A High Way and a Low
And every man decideth
The Way his Soul shall go!

In these confused days of catastrophic changes and calamitous uncertainties—Is it nothing to you that our minds are sick with frustrations and divisions; that fear has eaten away the foundations of our faith, and that our world is almost overwhelmed by corruption, corrosion and diver of disease?

Is it nothing to you—that too many of our young people are groping the Low Way of life, while ever looking for a new high and seeking a refuge for their souls?

Is it nothing to you—that many of our supposedly, intelligent women with great potentialities of becoming High Souls, are denouncing marriage and motherhood as well as the sanctity and serenity of family life; in the fellowship of the New Feminism, some women march in the streets in the nude proclaiming to lift womanhood to a New Level of Living?

Is it nothing to you—that too many of our churches have become happy houses for the sanctimonious, the sentimentalists and the self-satisfied; and fail to teach us to pledge ourselves Anew to the Cause of Christ and His Mission?

Is it nothing to you—that we have assembled here in our 69th Annual Session believing in our theme—"The Sufficiency of Christ In Renewed Life—" and knowing that we are saved by his power divine. For His creative power is not exhausted by this earthly life, nor is His majestic love locked within the limited walls of time and space?

We, the Anointed and the Appointed of the Lord, knowing that Christ is Sufficient to Revise, to Renew, and to Reassure, will emphasize our theme on the following pages of this address.

The Gospel and The "Now Generation"

At the 12th Baptist World Congress of the Baptist World Alliance, recently held in Tokyo, Japan, two outstanding American ministers made passionate and persuasive speeches about the relevancy of the Gospel to our youth—the "Now

Generation." The Reverend Bill Lawson, Pastor of the Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church in Houston, Texas, and the world renowned Dr. Billy Graham, called to our attention the reams of paper and gallons of ink, of the commissions and the committees that have been used in recent months to discuss the actions as well as the alternatives of today's youth. They renewed our memory of how the news media have given much time and attention to violence on campuses and in the streets, to skyrocketing juvenile crimes, to the use of narcotics by young people, to changing sexual standards, to hippies and yuppies, to draftcard burnings and to the generation gap.

A look within ourselves helped us to see that obviously youth of today have unprecedented problems and frustrations, and we who are older have shaped the society in which such problems have developed. In truth, we have yielded to a permissiveness in which discipline has had little place. We have bombarded our youth with false materially based concepts of success. Our Christian commitment often has been marginal, and we have failed to build adequate spiritual and moral foundations.

Reverend Lawson commented, to which I wholeheartedly agree, "we recognize this weakness, and we need clear, strong voices to speak now; for the world today is moved by the powers of numbers and money. The people of God must not be controlled by either numbers or money, for the power of God is not based on these things, but rather,

on Love and Service. Your elders may not speak the truth to you, for they have learned diplomacy. You who are young must keep us mindful of the ideals of Christ, in the presence of the powerful mechanics and materialistics of the world . . . Young people, you are the Voices of the Times. Half the world is under twenty-five years of age. You are setting styles and morals. You are changing national traditions and philosophies. You have a strength too. You demand consideration for all people, including the underdog. Very few will do that—not even many Baptists do that. So, you must teach as well as challenge the churches to have more consideration for all men. Since your strength is sensitivity, you must help us whose sin is insensitivity."

" . . . You have a weakness, too. You are naive, because you have not experienced the hazards you face daily. At times you are hypnotized by other young people who have only a dazzling dream, and follow them blindly down dangerous paths before you or they have seen the danger. Drugs lured thousands of young people away from sanity before they realized the high price of its mere temporary pleasure. The exciting oratory of the militants attracted millions of youth to doom and destruction before the bewildered followers realized that their youthful leaders did not have any alternatives to the systems they condemned and often sought to destroy. Now, there is less excitement about new pleasures or perfect

social orders—only the silence of new and sad wisdom that man does not change—only calendars do. In your simple honesty, you must admit, you need us as much as we need you.” We do not have your quick mind, your clear vision, or your still-pure ideals . . . You do not have our patience, our knowledge of unseen dangers and the signs of human weakness. Let reconciliation begin in your own homes between father and son, between mother and daughter. Then, let us go outside of our thresholds, each respecting the strengths and the weakness of the other, to deal with the divisions of men beyond our doors.”

Dr. Billy Graham said “the youth of today are the most analyzed in history . . . This is also the first generation in history in which the older generation imitates the young. Styles in clothing and language start with the young and go up. Youth has become an obsession with the older generation. We are told to think young, live young, smoke young, drink young, exercise to stay young, eat certain foods to stay young, and even get plastic surgery to look younger . . . Today the young are rather bored and disgusted with the older generation. They have lost their respect and veneration of old age . . . The leaders of the church throughout the world are in danger of making three mistakes with young people: First, we are in danger of ignoring them. Second, we are in danger of worshipping them. Thirdly, we are in danger of resenting them. The very sight

of a long-haired young person causes some older people to explode.”

With little parental, educational discipline and authority, our young people are searching and questing. They are rebels without a cause says Dr. Graham. “They are not only plagued with the problems of a long drawn-out war in Vietnam, poverty, and pollution, but they live in an unreal world, which has been created by movies and television. Modern advertising has created within them an expectation gap—young people have been taught to expect ‘instant’ everything—even instant solutions to age-old problems. They are expecting the world to be transformed and changed instantly . . . Young people are empty. There is a lacking of purpose in their lives, and they want to feel and experience something different.” Some of them are tired of running from reality. Many people are asking, ‘what are the young people searching for? What do they want?’—They are searching for purpose. We must teach them that God has a purpose for their lives. We are created in His image and our purpose is to glorify Him—They are searching for hope and security. We have made the mistake in our generation of putting too much emphasis on material things of this life and grossly neglecting our spiritual powers—They are searching for lasting pleasure. We must teach them that permanent pleasure is only found in the presence of God.”

Our conscience, which has been anesthetized by mechanical pro-

ductivity and material progress, is now awakened. We are now at the place where we see that progress simply must be made in the realm of morals, ethics and character, if civilization is to be saved. For the sake of our youth, and the salvation of our selves, we must face the solving of the world's true problems—the human problem—the problem of lying, which is called propaganda; the problem of selfishness which is called self-interest or nationalism; the problem of greed, which is often called profit or good business; the problem of licentiousness disguised as liberty; the problem of lust masquerading as love, and the slick holds of materialism—the crooked hook which is baited with security to sink our souls into a living hell.

So, we join the chorus of Dr. Graham, and Reverend Lawson and simply say to our young people “you are teaching your elders the need for a personal experience with spiritual realities. We, then, recommend you to the pinnacle of all personal experiences—the surrender of your selfishness to the Savior of the World, the One who loved us enough to die for us—Jesus Christ. Do you know any holy man, any teacher of wisdom, or any social hero who loved us that much?”

Our personal tragedy is that too many of us have grown so selfish that we exclude some people from our concern. Now to our dismay, we have planted in you, youth, those same seeds of selfishness. Rightfully, your idealism cries out for human rights and social justice.

Too often we draw into our own little world circles of certain concern rather than stretch ourselves to help draw all people to Christ—Young people, you have said that we need more active passions of mercy. Help us to learn compassion. Point out to our dull eyes the sick and the suffering, the hungry and the helpless, the wounded and the weary and remind us that Christ says “inasmuch as ye have done to the least of my little ones ye have done unto me.” Help us to become agents of sacrifice, committed to a Living Christ, who is ever reconciling our world unto Himself. Follow our Christian examples, but shun every form of shabbiness our lives display or attempt to hide in hypocrisy. You can tell a Christian by whether his life unites or divides, by whether his religion enriches many or only himself.

Youth—the God of this great universe and Christ of the Gospel challenges you “to take no thought of what ye shall eat, or what shall ye drink, or what ye shall wear . . . for your heavenly Father knoweth what ye have need of all these things.” “But seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.”

The Women's Liberation Movement

In this period of social protest, the old cause of U. S. feminism has flared into a new and angry life in the Women's Liberation

Movement. These New Feminists are thousands of women, many college educated, who are denouncing marriage and motherhood, and talking about changes in social attitudes and customs that will allow every female to function as a separate and equal person. Several of our most popular magazines have carried Special Reports on the Women's Liberation Movement. Newsweek (March 23, 1970), sought out Mrs. Helen Dudar, a top flight journalist, to write about Women in Revolt. Her report declared that "the leading figures in the Women's Liberation Movement range from women who want to abolish conventional sex roles — or give up sex altogether — to those who stress equal pay for equal work and free day care centers for working mothers."

On Wednesday morning, March 18, 1970, two hundred members of the Women's Liberation Movement walked — unannounced — into the offices of the Ladies Home Journal, and stayed for eleven hours because they stated, they had many things to say. A member of the group said "we occupied the Journal's offices because we wanted to articulate our dissatisfaction with the editorial content of the Journal — and all other women's magazines —." A Special Section prepared for the Ladies' Home Journal by the Women's Liberation Movement entitled "The New Feminism", (August, 1970) will help many of us to explore some of the ideas of this movement on various subjects and question its wisdom and its true worth.

Dr. Pauli Murray, a Black woman, lawyer, poet, author and Professor of Politics and American Civilization at Brandies University, has been a dynamic force in the Women's Liberation Movement for the past five years. She looks upon "the central thrust of this movement as a frontal attack upon male dominance of the major social institutions, and demands that women participate directly and fully in the fundamental decision-making which will determine the course of our society." Dr. Murray asserts that "A new wind is blowing through this country which will touch, in a deep personal sense, the lives of 53 percent of the population and which has potential consequences so vast that conceivably they could mark a clear turning point in our history."

The fifty-year anniversary of the Women's Bureau, U. S. Department of Labor, was celebrated by a conference, June 11–13, 1970, at the Washington Hilton Hotel in Washington, D. C. The title of the conference was "American Women at the Crossroads, Directions for the Future." Time and time again, we were reminded that "a social phenomenon is occurring which cuts across the complex issues of war and peace, racial or class polarization, and economic deprivation; and may compel women to seek new perspectives of themselves in relation to these issues during the coming decade. The first stirrings of a woman's revolution are evident in many places and in numerous ways."

Mrs. Elizabeth Duncan Koontz,

Director of the Women's Bureau, and former President of the National Education Association, insisted that the "feminine virtues—the conservation and nurturing of human life, the concern for human values, and the intuitive qualities often ascribed to women—are precisely what are needed to redress the imbalance in public housekeeping and public management." The invitees to the 50th Anniversary Conference enthusiastically responded to Mrs. Koontz's address, when she said "the Women's Revolution presents a challenge to all women, but it also presents the greatest opportunity of our time. The uniquely creative talents of women have been lying fallow for centuries while men have ruled the earth. Women are beginning to realize that a society in which the major decisions are made by only one sex is a society in dangerous imbalance on both moral and biological grounds."

In short, women are being called upon to transform themselves into creative, spiritual, and social forces, potent enough to point the way toward constructive alternatives to the use of this force in implementing social change and in the settlement of disputes between men and women; to replace competitive aggression with cooperative living; to change impersonal objective decision-making into a process in which all human beings are central and none bound either by their strengths or their weaknesses, and to act, in the Spirit of Christ, as a conciliatory and unifying force in the complex area

of human relationships. To meet this all-important challenge calls for Spiritual Surgery—Divine Guidance—A New Self-discovery—A Reordering of Priorities—and A New Sense of Values.

The real issue of the 1970's in the matter of the Women's Liberation Movement, is how women are going to react to this so called New Freedom. Does it mean that a man's vices are to become a woman's virtues? Today, in many instances, some women have interpreted the Emancipation of Women as the freedom to smoke like a man, to drink like a man, to use rough language, to swear, to work, to look, to dress and to act like a man; and in the name of progress to treat the sanctity of sex as loosely as some men. Those who would call this progress must be made to see that whatever it is, it is not progress.

No person ever became great by lowering his or her standards.

No people ever became good by adopting a loose morality.

No nation has ever made any progress in a downward direction.

In the name of progress, shall the finer qualities of womanhood be abandoned or should women realize that what is socially correct may not be morally right? Perhaps we need to look again at Christ's concept of womanhood. Then, we would know that the Emancipation of Women did not begin in the twentieth century. It began with

Christianity, and it ends with Christianity. For Jesus was first to usher women into a new place in human relations. More than nineteen hundred years ago, Jesus accorded woman a dignity she had never known before and crowned her with a glory, so that all women thereafter, would be respected, protected and loved. Wise men have always recognized womanhood as a sacred and noble gift from the Hand of God, and graced their lives with her creative talents, her commodious time and her colossal treasures.

I believe the modern challenge to womanhood is the Eternal challenge to all the women in the world—that of being Godly women, seeking to be helpmates of men. I believe that marriage and motherhood are still two of the most blessed events of woman's experience. I believe if the home fails, the church, the community, the city and the country are doomed. For I firmly believe that the breakdown of home and family life and influence will mark the breakdown of human personalities and the downfall of the nation. I believe that women are fashioned of finer clay, and are often in touch with the angels of God, and have the noblest functions that life affords. I believe the women of the world, must bind themselves together with their brothers in a mission to reclaim society so that all individuals are free to bring their gifts to full fruition, to make each life an abundant experience in living. I believe this is the deeper meaning of the Women's Revolution. Dr.

Moreland, our guest, will talk to us later on this program about the Negro Woman and The Liberation Movement.

Renewal And Reconciliation

Because our day calls for consecration and cooperation that will compel us as Christians to become constantly conscious of our full obligations and responsibilities to the cause of Christ, His Church and His Children, we have passionately pursued our theme of Renewal for two years. Knowing that each Christian woman must avail herself for both discipline and duty, and always be ready to do her best to meet God's approval as a workman who has no need to be ashamed, we have stressed Renewal—In Our Spiritual Life—In Our Social Life—and in our Stewardship Life.

As this is a Day of Judgement on Yesterday as well as a Day of Decision for Tomorrow—let us, here and now, take an honest, personal inventory of ourselves to determine whether or not we have caught the vision of Renewal—Have the faulty foundations of our lives been undergirded with a New breadth and length and height and depth for service and sacrifice—or have we remained smug, selfish and satisfied?

Have you stretched your soul to a New Age? How old are you?—You are as old as your crusted ideas, and as young as your ever increasing scope of concern and compassion. How old are you?—You are as old as your years, but

you are also as young as your desire to give the best that you have to your home, to your church, to your neighbors, to your community and to causes that will outlast you.

During these days of difficulties—What is your business? Dr. Elton Trueblood has well said, “A person who seeks to lift our sagging civilization will teach the message that the world is one, secular and sacred, and that the chief way to serve the Lord is in our daily duties.” Let us then raise some questions well worth asking and answering. First: Is personal religious growth your business? Frequently, we no longer feel the importance of further developing philosophies of our religion and practice of Christian ethics—No one is too old to learn; and no one is so good that he can not be better. Second question: Is Kingdom Building your business? Are you interested in the propagation of those institutions dedicated to the lifting up of human hearts? Are you glad to give of your time, talents and treasures to the maintenance of the great missionary enterprises? Do you look upon your participation in the program of your church as a problem or a privilege? Third question: What are you doing to bring greater unity, peace, and love to the world today? Fourth question: Do you know that Christ has given us the power of Renewal for Reconciliation to shake the mightiest throne, to defeat chaos, to renovate old ideas and to reconstruct new hearts, and reshape the directions and destiny of mankind? Thanks be

to God for the power of Renewal and Reconciliation to saturate our lives with His Spirit.

A whole New Spirit needs to be introduced to the land. We all agree that we need to bring into sharp focus the clear Gospel of Jesus Christ in our lives, which will cause a shift away from competition, hostility, exploitation and greed, to a New Spirit of cooperation and trust, sharing and love. Each of us must become A New Spirit Now! There is a universal urgency for a personal, social and spiritual stability—this urgency can be fulfilled only by having our Stewardship of life rooted deeply in Discipleship of Christlike involvements and actions. In essence, it is Being in Christ, and working willingly to channel His grace to our wounded world. As New Spirits in Christ—we know it is safe to forget the past, to be diligent in the present, and be sure of the future.

Our mission in the Seventies is addressed to the challenge of change—a change in every area of human experience. There are no easy chairs for a Christian today;

ours is an era of earthquakes; of unending problems and often of agonizing wrenchings away from old customs and comfortable attitudes and assumptions. In all these changes we must remember that the world, not the Word of God changes. Our mission as "New Spirits," is not simply to change what must be changed in the best interest of all, but to preserve what must be preserved. For we are The Heirs of Christ and must live His message and guard precious values, painfully acquired. To preserve and protect His way of life is our charge and our joy.

To achieve this we shall use more effectively every existing system, in the church and in Society, which can enlarge human opportunity and help each life to march in triumph, as we follow the Risen Lord of Life.

A "New Spirit" who would faithfully follow the Risen Lord of Life, must adhere to the penetrating words of the eminent Rev. J. L. Roberts, of Detroit, Michigan: who reminds us that Pharaoh was told to let my people go. He emphasized that today the people should let Pharaoh go.

"Tell My People Let Pharaoh Go"

The Pharaoh of Immaturity
The Pharaoh of Partial or Superficial Commitment to Christ.

"I Dream a world where man,

“THE BLACK WOMAN IN THE LIBERATION MOVEMENT”

President Ross, platform guests, delegates, friends of the National Baptist Convention, concerned women, fellow Christians, I have a thankful heart as I remember the National Baptist Conventions I attended as a child. I had no thought then that one day I would be honored by your invitation to appear here today. Thank you.

If there is to be any hope for the salvation of this country, it is my firm belief that moral leadership must come forth. That moral leadership must come from you and those like you who seek the kingdom of God. It takes courage to defy popular movements. But that which is popular is not always right. In all our struggles, let us be led by the spirit of the Lord.

There is a popular song recorded by a group called the Temptations which vividly describes the status of this country. It is called “Ball of Confusion.” The ball, of course, is the earth. They sing about the racism, drug addiction, violence, unemployment, fear, crime, but nobody does anything about it. The song is a cry for help. The words are something like this:

Ball of Confusion

Ball of confusion, that's what the world is today
Fear in the air, tension everywhere
Unemployment rising fast
Politicians say more taxes will solve everything
And the band played on.

The sale of drugs is on the all time high
Young folks walking around with their heads in the sky
The city's ablaze in the summer time
And the band plays on.

People moving out, people moving in, Why?
All because of the color of their skin.
Run, run, run, but you sure can't hide
An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth
Vote for me and I'll set you free
Rap on, brother, rap on.
The only person talking about love thy brother is the preacher
And it seems nobody's interested in learning but the teacher.

The Black Woman in the Liberation Movement

Women, how should one answer this cry for help? One more revolution has been added to the ball of confusion, Women's Liberation, a question comes to my mind as one ponder the role of black women in the liberation movement. Should liberation be confined to the liberation of women as the topic implies? The word liberation means freedom. To black people, it means freedom for males, females, dark ones, light ones, little ones, big ones, young ones, old ones and those in between. It is freedom for all, not just for some. To speak of liberation as it applies to women exclusively is, too narrow and too limited under this condition, the black

woman still would not be free because the black woman has two strikes against her as she moves into the larger white community. First, she is black; second, she is a woman. She is the two-fold victim of the superior attitudes of white males.

The Women's Liberation Movement, popularly called Women's Lib, has been characterized as white, college-educated, affluent, middle-class. By this characterization, black women as a group are excluded because we do not fit the description.

The struggle for women's freedom dates back to the days of abolition. But, the movement is largely remembered for its success in securing addition of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States on August 26, 1920. This Amendment provides that women cannot be denied the right to vote because of their sex. It is Mrs. Betty Friedan, through her book, **The Feminine Mystique**, published in 1963, who is credited with resurrecting the idea that woman's role is not exclusively in the home. Her book asserts that women have the same psychic, emotional need to be personally fulfilled as have men. She says that men can satisfy this need for fulfillment through their jobs. According to Mrs. Friedan, having a husband, caring for children and running a house do not give many women a sense of personal satisfaction. It does not fulfill their need to have a sense of identity apart from their home life.

In addition to the difference in the working life-styles of the black and white women, other factors limit the appeal to join Women's Lib. Now Blacks are demanding that advertisements use pictures and ads of beautiful black women. The community wants to see pretty black women's faces on TV and movie screens and in newspapers and magazines. Black feminine beauty is now being emphasized in many sectors of the black community. Appreciation for Negroid features is increasing. The broad nose and thick lips, we are learning, are beautiful, too. Black women want to be appreciated and loved for their feminine charm and winning ways as well as appreciated for their mental abilities.

In 1966 Mrs. Friedan became the President of the newly formed National Organization for Women, sometimes called NOW. It has some male members, too. The goals of this group include elimination of job discrimination, removal of the legal inequalities and injustices directed against women and catapulting more women into positions of political power. Some of the problems to which this organization addresses itself were described in a recent woman's magazine. It was stated that the median income in 1968 for full-time employed males was \$7,764, for women, it was \$4,457. Less than three per cent of the women who work full-time earn \$10,000 or more; and in 1968 women held only 3.7 per cent of government jobs that pay \$14,000 and over.

"There are no women members of the Cabinet. There are only 12 women judges at the Federal level. There are three women ambassadors. There are ten women in the House of Representatives and only one in the Senate. In 1967 women held 318 out of 7,608 seats in state legislatures, although there are more women voters than men."

This magazine also stated that "in one state a man own the clothes on his wife's back; in four states (California, Nevada, Florida and Pennsylvania), before a wife can go into an independent business venture, court... (approval) and in some cases the husband's consent are required; in Louisiana a woman cannot serve on a jury unless she applies."² Elimination of these discriminatory practices by the National Organization for Women is not controversial. They are much needed reforms. Despite these very commendable objectives, Betty Friedan's group is called the "Uncle Tom" of Women's Lib.

It is difficult to determine how many women hold membership in the movement. Estimates range from 10,000 to well over 400,000. Women's Lib is composed of

women who hold different views about what the goals should be. Some are valid, some objectionable and some questionable. The more radical groups call for a restructuring of society and of the relationships which exist between men, women and children. They maintain that women's inferior status is culturally determined by males.

One group, the Witches, their name is Women's International Terror Conspiracy from Hell, is described as ready to bring about change, and is "open to all possibilities—theater, revolution, magic, terror, joy, garlic, flowers, spells."³ Can you imagine calling upon witchcraft to gain freedom? That in itself says something. Another group, the Feminists, are interested in changing the social institutions which oppress women. They are opposed to marriage. Some names of other groups are the Gallstones, Sisters All Learning Together (SALT), the Radical Feminists and the Redstockings.

Some individuals in the movement say that women should pay their own way on dates, keep their maiden names after marriage, stop wearing girdles and bras, forget about watching their weight, give up association with men altogether except when unavoidable, learn karate for self-defense, resort to homosexuality, group marriage and free abortion.

Less radical goals include the establishment of 24 hour child care centers, requiring men to share equally in the care of the children and household chores so that women may be more free, elimination of separate schools for males and females and addition of a woman's equal opportunity amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Like other movements, obviously, this one has its conservatives, moderates and extremists.

Women's Lib has been compared with the civil rights movement. It does, indeed, use the same language. For example, the literature abounds with the words liberation and racism, oppression, exploitation. It also employs the techniques of non-violent demonstration and protest politics. It has even sought to assert the rights of women under the Fourteenth Amendment. The same Amendment which granted citizenship rights to the newly freed slaves. There is a fundamental difference, however, between the two struggles. Whereas black people are considered by whites to be sub-human and inferior in everyway, white women are placed on moral pedestals. They are idolized by their men as beauties. Another difference is that while Women's Lib advocates the right of each individual to do her own thing, the civil right's movement subordinates individual rights to group rights. The civil rights goal is to attain maximum freedom so that the quality of life for all black people will improve. Rather than asking for a restructuring of the relationship which exists between men and women, black liberation advocates a restructuring of society so that black men can be in positions of power to develop full political, economic and social status for the black community. Black women want and need the protection of their men.

The image of the bored, dissatisfied woman who stays at home all day is not applicable to the many black women who have found it necessary to work, or who for other reasons work outside the home. Perhaps this difference between black and white women as regards their life-styles in their working lives is one reason why the majority of the movement's membership is white.

Women's Lib has limited appeal, I think, partly because the black woman already is working outside the home and is contributing to the support of her family. She already has some sense of self-identity, self-pride and value. This feeling may be enhanced if she has a job which makes her feel she is making a contribution to others as well. Although some may look forward to the day when they no longer are forced by economic necessity to go to work and leave their families, some may want to continue.

It appears to me that the relationship between black men and black women is somewhat different from that of whites. Black women have been help-mates to their men. White women have been described as ornaments for theirs. Economically work outside the home, was forced upon us. We have not, as a group, been able to stay with our children and keep house while the husband worked. It was necessary for us to go to work, too, if the family were to have the necessities and some of the comforts of life. For those who have become members of an economic middle-class, it is largely because both husband and wife are working. We have been helpmates, not antagonists; partners, not competitors. Because of segregation, job opportunities for our men were limited. Often the woman earned more than her husband. Women have been favored in educational opportunities, too. Sometimes the males were forced to get jobs to help support their parent's families, while the females were urged to get an education so that they would not be forced to work as maids in white homes.

Some aspects of Women's Lib show hostility and rage toward men. Black women do not appear to be filled with hostility and rage toward their men. The rage which black women harbor, if they do, according to psychologist Cobbs and Grier's book, **Black Rage**, is directed toward the larger society which emasculates the black man and dehumanizes the woman. The black woman has been beside her man and has given what comfort she could. She cannot abandon him now.

This relationship which exists between black men and women can change, however. Much depends upon whether black people ultimately are freed, and just as importantly, on the attitudes of black men. If, as blacks attain middle-class status, the men adopt the misguided superiority attitudes of whites, black women also may go the way of Women's Lib. I hope the men have too much sense for that. At any rate, our goal at this point in history is freedom for all of us. We cannot dissipate our resources, and talent or be sidetracked from our goals.

Because the black woman has been such a great source of strength and help to her man and to her community, she has been accused by some of draining him of his masculinity and pride. She has been praised, however, from unexpected sources. Stokely Carmichael and Charles Hamilton dedicated their book, **Black Power The Politics of Liberation**, to their mothers and to all black mothers, because they "have struggled through the centuries so that this generation could fight. . . ." Dr. Kenneth Clark said in his book, **Dark Ghetto** that it was the black mother who taught her son how to survive in this hostile society.

There is no difference between the human rights of men and women. Each sex has the right to equal opportunity to develop one's maximum potential within reasonable limits. But there is a division of labor, a difference in function, a different role to be performed. This division of labor exists within the sexes. We can't all be philosophers or mathematicians or judges. Our abilities are different. The division of labor principle applies to our sexual roles also. At least one role is biologically defined. Women are mothers. Men are fathers. Neither role should be burdensome. There must be cooperation between the two if there is to be a successful home. If the wife works, the husband must share some of the responsibilities of running the house. This decision is a personal affair. Much of Women's Lib hostility appears to revolve around this particular issue, and I wonder if the movement is merely a reflection of a problem in the home which is much more fundamental than the right of women to be relieved to household responsibilities and legal discriminations. White men are threatened. Their positions of power are being challenged by white women.

According to a sociological view not necessarily the Christian view, of the origin of marriage, marriage developed out of a need to populate the earth in order for mankind to survive. The male's role was to protect the home and provide some of the food. Females tended the children and provided some of the food. Both were to rear the children. This was the division of labor between the sexes. Marriage was

a convenient and practical way to populate the earth and to provide security and companionship. There may be some cultural variations on this theme.

Dr. Margaret Mead, the noted anthropologist, has said now that there are enough people, women are not as needed as child bearers. The original need for woman's role has changed, she suggests. As needs change, society's values change. Women's Lib is an example of a value which is undergoing change. Dr. Mead's statement may offer the beginning of a sociological explanation for the resurgence of Women's Lib in the 1960's. Citing air and water pollution problems, some say there should be no more than two children in a family. Some individuals have vowed not to have any children. Others vow not even to marry. It has been suggested that the national government penalize families by not giving income tax deductions when they have more than a limited number of children. This movement is predominantly white, too.

What answer can be given to those who say that women, no longer are as needed in the home? Judging from the turbulence and turmoil of our day, the restlessness, hopelessness and frustration of one segment of white youth, more parental guidance and tender loving care, not less, are needed.

Apparently, man is able to perform miraculous technological feats. He has gone to the moon and come back successfully. But he has not solved the problems of the heart. He has not solved the human problems. What does Women's Lib offer to replace the mother? Twenty-four hour day care centers are a poor substitute.

The more radical elements in Women's Lib depict husband and wife as rivals, not as members of the same team who are working toward a common goal. Women have been the culture bearers. Women have been the ones who are thought to possess the virtuous traits. We are described as loving, kind, gentle, moral, beautiful. I am reminded of the little jingle that children say: What are little boys made of? What are little boys made of? Frogs and snails and puppy dog tails. That's what little boys are made of. What are little girls made of? What are little girls made of? Sugar and spice and everything nice. That what little girls are made of. If women are no longer thought to be the symbols of the good, the true and the beautiful, the world is in for a devastating fate. To what standards will it aspire? There may be enough people on earth, but there is not enough goodness. There is not enough love. If women forsake this cultural function which is so necessary for the survival of the planet, who will set moral standards?

Of course, it is necessary sometimes to have babysitters and to send children to nursery schools and day care centers. What concerns me is that the more radical wing of Women's Lib emphasizes the right of women at the expense of the children.

Being a parent is a gigantic responsibility. It's importance cannot be overrated. It involves personal sacrifice. It starts at the point of conception. Pain and inconvenience begin for the woman. Greater physical and emotional responsibility also begin for the man. If the white men have forsaken their responsibility, that is no excuse for black women to forsake theirs. Children can be given the creature comforts, the physical needs of life by day care centers and babysitters. But the Hippie Movement, which seems to be a white, middleclass movement, warns us that material things are not enough. "What the world needs now is love, sweet love." What children need now, is love, attention, guidance, direction, discipline and more love.

Annual Report

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY THE WOMAN'S CONVENTION AUXILIARY

NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION, U.S.A., INC.

President Ross, Official Family, Messengers—My Local, District and State Presidents of New York Women and Ministers Wives and Fraternal Guests, I come at this moment to submit my record of stewardship in the task with which you honored me again last September. This report presents a view of what the new decade holds for National Baptist Women through this office and a perspective of the work and operation of the office, in light of the challenges of time and change. We have moved out from simply letter-writing into total involvement in the church, community and a universal culture.

Last September, one of the delegates said to me after this report: "Oh yes, I liked what you said, but did not know it was that much hard, real work." Well, we hasten to tell you that the tasks of just sending creative or canned sympathy telegrams, up-to-date or obsolete, congratulatory messages, answering the phone all night and listening to complaints are minor responsibilities. Today, the Corresponding Secretary is called for Workshops, Women's Day observances, Symposiums on college campuses, for travel information, speech outlines, funerals and all too many meetings of church related and/or community based "do-good" organizations.

Wherever the action is, there must be a National Baptist Officer. Each has a heavy load of responsibility and we seek divine assistance to perform our duties as thoroughly as possible.

Please permit me to say to my dear Presidents, Chairladies, Secretaries yea leaders, the high standard of performance required of a leader in this decade demands a wider knowledge of general terminologies. Correspondence, memoranda and reports should be typed, grammatically correct and brief. We encounter diverse subjects daily. It is not expected that we know the meaning of all the words we hear, that we remember our third grade grammar, that we are literary experts, nor that we can reproduce all that we have learned through reading, however, archaic expressions must be eliminated in this Moon-landing Age. It is, it must, it will be expected that we use the dictionary and thesaurus before spelling, speaking or writing.

Too many of the letters we received this summer from Pastors, Presidents, Committee Chairladies and Secretaries were written on tablets like the ones my grandmother used back in the olden days in Kosciusko, Mississippi to list the grocery and send us to the store.

The Corresponding Secretary would like again to remind messengers to read the letters you receive from this office, follow the instructions, send all money to the treasurer's office and stop losing your letters. A few people stated they had not received letters. Maybe you did not. The fault could be in my office, it could be in the Post Office or it could be you forgot to register last year. After our last session, about fifty (50) letters were sent back from dead letter sections all over the country.

It may sound like egotism, but I doubt if you could do a more thorough job. We strive to answer each letter or refer it to the right department. The responsibility of this office has been discussed with the President and studied in the libraries.

When we do not know what we are doing, you may be sure that we shall ask someone who knows.

Department Heads must learn to operate within their area of responsibility. Elected officers of this convention form the official family and we are praying for a real togetherness. Teamwork by a dedicated trained team will improve the morale in the delegation and silence many status seekers.

During our convention session, this office is equipped to type your reports, supply registration blanks, issue appreciation envelopes and handle all convention correspondence. Returned letters are available also.

We would like to reiterate one general point we have emphasized in the past, and that is that we have come to the office to work and not for prestige or power. All constructive criticisms are desired, providing they come from qualified sources, spiritually and intellectually.

LIASON RESPONSIBILITY

National Council of Negro Women requested the Corresponding Secretary to serve as liason for National Baptist Women. President Ross's approval made possible the participation in the programs and projects of N.C.N.W. Literature is available through that organization. Last year two thousand copies of pamphlets, brochures and visual aids were distributed. WE DID NOT READ IT. Church Women United established a Commission on "Woman in Today's World." Again, since this office is in the city of their Headquarters and it would be economically advantageous for our budget, we have been serving on the Commission. It's proposals are as follows:

"It is proposed that:

1. Church Women United explore the possibility of
 - a. setting up regional workshops on women's identity.
 - b. giving leadership for the initiating of small experimental groups of women across the country to help them discover their identity and role. (See this in relation to "a" above.)
 - c. Serving as the catalyst or channel for bringing together women in church and church-related vocations.
 - d. staffing these endeavors through an additional part-time or full-time staff person.
2. That a member of the Commission who is in Washington be asked to explore the possibility of setting up an information center in Washington, D.C.
3. The Commission be authorized to undertake a selective survey of employment practices with respect to women of either the National Council of Churches or some major denominations and church-related organizations. The purpose of this study is to compare the standards within church organizations with national standards as reflected in Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and its interpretations by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and to make specific recommendations to church organizations to achieve full equal employment opportunity.

The areas covered by the survey would include, for example,

- a. comparisons of educational and experience levels of women with their job levels.
- b. maternity leaves and maternity benefits.
- c. housing allowances and other employment benefits.
- d. equal pay for equal work.

- e. provisions for sabbatical leave.
 - f. insurance coverage and other health benefits.
 - g. retirement age and benefits.
 - h. opportunity for job advancement.
 - i. representation of women on personnel committees and other policy-making bodies.
4. A booklet be provided in "lay" language from a variety of perspectives on the theology and philosophy of women's liberation and related concerns; that possibilities of an article in **The Christian Century** be explored; that what is currently available or is being produced for or about women be identified and catalogued; and that a survey of Christian education and family materials be made to determine the images of women they project.
 5. The Sunday morning TV programs sponsored by the National Council of Churches (Look Up and Live, etc.) and the Council of Churches of the City of New York be asked to include one or more programs dealing with women in today's world and that women be given basic responsibility for preparing and participating in the programs."

Dr. Ross also presented the committee a tentative offer for purchasing of camp cabins at a cost of \$4,000.00 per cabin, that perhaps it would house 25 persons. She also stated that there is a possibility should we purchase 2 or more cabins that the contractor would deduct \$100.00 on the cabin. After much discussion, questions and favorable answers, a motion was in order to accept or reject. It was moved by Mrs. W. O. Mays and seconded by Mrs. Wood, that our chairman check with the contractors and purchase 2 cabins if the price seems in keeping. This motion was carried.

Mrs. Marsetta Wells asked about the restoring of our beach. In answer to this question it was stated that our chairman is working with Michigan State officials on re-daming the lake. Answer accepted.

Mrs. Zee Anderson Barron suggested that some men be named on this committee. This met the approval of the members. A motion was carried, and our chairman was asked to appoint 5 men of her choice to the Board. Reverend Wilford McKinley was named, Others to be named at a later date.

Mrs. Pauline Campbell suggested that each state would help build and support our National Camp and that a space be given on their annual program for a person to talk about the National Camp. Mrs. Campbell also suggested that this plan be presented to the Woman's Convention in this September annual session for its approval.

Reverend Mrs. Trudie Trimm offered words of praise to our chairman for her

untiring service as chairman of this Board, president of the Woman's Convention and Editor-in-chief of our Baptist magazine. A standing vote of thanks was then expressed by all present.

The purpose of the Camp was well stated by our chairman. It is to be a Camp-site beautiful, where all types of religious retreats may be held, to compare with Ridgecrest, Glorietta, Green Lakes and other such places.

The Board was adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.





President Ross, Officers and Members of the Woman's Convention Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention, U. S. A., Inc., State and Local Directors, Officers, Delegates, and Friends:

I thank God for the opportunity of greeting you in the Forty-fifth Annual Session of the National Young People's Department.

A SALUTE TO NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA

We begin the Decade of The Seventies in the Crescent City, New Orleans, the largest city in Louisiana and a major sea and river port, on the Mississippi River, near the Gulf of Mexico.

New Orleans is often called America's "Most Interesting City". Four flags—those of France, Spain, the Confederate States, and the United States have flown over it. You will find many reminders of Old Europe and the Old South here. In the narrow streets of the historic French Quarter; behind the heavy wooden doors, iron grille work and weather-faded shutters of century-old mansions; and in the lavish festivities of Mardi Gras the city's vivacious Creole heritage perseveres.

The Creoles (descendants of the early Spanish and French settlers) probably contributed the most toward making New Orleans unusual among American cities and for its having the nickname, "The City Care Forgot". The people of New Orleans have always been ready to lay aside their business and have a good time. Many of the city's restaurants are world-famous for their cooking. As you know, New Orleans is also famous as the birthplace of Jazz. Although the night clubs where Dixieland and Jazz were born have been tamed, the history lingers in such classics as "Basin Street Blues" and "Way Down Yonder in New Orleans".

You will find here a Jazz Museum featuring the first cornet of Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, a native of New Orleans.

To Baptists New Orleans is famous as the home of Mahalia Jackson, the renowned Gospel Singer.

Of course, New Orleans has a wide variety of museums and other cultural facilities. You may visit the Institute of Middle American Research at Tulane University. Memorial Hall houses Civil War relics, and the Pharmaceutical Museum specializes in the history of medicine. The Delgado Art Museum contains its collection of Italian Renaissance Paintings from the Kress Foundation.

Musical activities include fifteen annual concerts by the New Orleans Philharmonic Society, Performances sponsored by the New Orleans Opera Association, a summer "Pops" concert series, and, of course, Jazz in the cabarets of Vieux Carre' (Old Square).

In the field of education you will find such institutions of high-

er learning as Tulane University, Louisiana State University at New Orleans, Dillard, Loyola, and Xavier Universities, Southern University, Our Lady of Holy Cross and St. Mary's Dominican Colleges, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and Notre Dame Seminary. You will perhaps recall that amidst violent protests by some white residents of the city, token integration of the Public and Parochial school systems took place here in 1961.

New Orleans is one of the leading commercial and industrial centers of the southeastern United States.

I could go on and on telling you about Annual Events such as the Spring Fiesta and Sugar Bowl Football game and other events and things to do and see in New Orleans. I am sure our hostesses here led by Mrs. Yokum will see that you forget your cares while you are in the "City Care Forgot".

1. Spiritual awakening
2. Intellectual approach in Search of Truth.
3. An Involvement In and Dedication To Everyday Christian Living and Services.

You need a B. S. U. on your campus.

The advent of these programs last year added much to the area of worship and we anticipate more effective ones this year.

The morning study classes, conducted by the Christian Education Department under the direction of Director Beatrice Bates, Dean Romeo Woods and the Instructors continues to provide opportunity for study of the Bible and methods of Teaching Young People. We believe it is very important that we "Study to show ourselves approved unto God". We are grateful to these administrators and teachers for this worthwhile service.

COMMITTEES

All of the committee chairmen and members are to be commended for loyal, dedicated service. We couldn't have a successful convention if any of you failed to function.

The Directors are lending valuable guidance through their organization. We hope to perfect this very important council by organizing the District Directors in this meeting.

The Special Features that provide social and cultural programs as well as finance, such as: Directors' Luncheon and Chain Rally, The All States Tea, Queen's Revue and Wedding of the Roses, and The Honors Luncheons are especially vital and the Bulletin Editor and Press Committee are also due commendation.

The States have sent to us consecrated, interested, loyal Youth Officers, Counselors and Directors and "together" with God guiding us we have not failed.

I think the success we have attained thus far is due to "Togetherness". We have all worked together to carry on a program for the Glory of God and the development of Young People. If we become divided, we shall fail.

12TH BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE AND ORIENT TOUR

Through the providence of God I was able to attend the 12th Baptist World Alliance Congress which met in the Budokan Hall, Tokyo, Japan, July 12-18, 1970. The 1970 theme was "Reconciliation Through Christ."

Baptists live, work and witness in 125 countries of the world. Their fellowship encompasses 31,023,937 baptized believers.

"The Baptist World Alliance, extending over every part of the world, exists in order more fully to show the essential oneness of Baptist people in the Lord Jesus Christ, to impart inspiration to the brotherhood, and to promote the spirit of fellowship, service, and cooperation among its members." So declares the preamble to the Alliance Constitution.

A Baptist World Congress is an event that one can never forget. The Roll Call of Nations, when all Nations dressed in native costume and speaking their native languages, come forward and tell of the work in their countries is an unforgettable experience. Offerings of praise and thanksgiving to God are given in every tongue. One has the opportunity to strengthen fellowship and get to know Baptists of the World. The Alliance provides an orientation concerning the conditions in various parts of the world in regards to religious liberty and human rights.

There were many impressive features of the 1970 program. Some of them were: The Panoramas highlighting Baptist work in different countries; The Dramatic Bible Episodes; The Congress Choir; The Smpphony Orchestra; The Symposium; The Congress Sermon by Dr. John Williams, U.S.A., Negro Alliance Vice President; The Closing Sermon by Billy Graham; The Addresses of Alliance President Dr. William Tolbert of Liberia and Honorable Angie Brooks of the United Nations.

On Monday and Thursday the Conference for Women was presided over by President Edgar Bates of Canada. Two impressive features were: Dramatic presentations of a Look at the Women's Work in Europe, North America, Southwest Pacific, Asia and Africa. These women wore their native costumes and told of the work in their native languages, and Japanese interpreters gave the interpretations. In the second place, our hearts were made glad by the fervent benediction given on Thursday by our beloved President, Mrs. Mary O. Ross.

The Conference For Youth was also held on Monday and Thursday afternoons. Business sessions were held. We were especially concerned with the nomination of members of the Youth Committee. Director Dorothy Robinson of Michigan B. M. and E. Convention was nominated as a member of the Youth Committee. We anxiously await the results. It is a great honor to even be nominated; one well deserved by Dorothy Robinson.

I was especially happy to greet so many of the Youth Leaders

who have worked, or are still working, with our Department. Regional Directors Funches and Fallin, Ruth Wells, Pinkie Reeves, Earline Anderson, Eddie Sue Williams, Claudia Richardson, Ruby Gates Robinson, Gloria Wadlington, Jimmy Frazier, Ollie Anderson Walden, Gertrude Bennett and Violet Williams were some that that I saw. I understand there were many others in attendance.

I am sure we left the Alliance determined to promote the spirit of fellowship, service and cooperation, and to strive together for fulfillment of the Great Commission of Jesus Christ.

ORIENT TOUR

Although I have visited Europe and the Holy Land three times, I had never been to the Orient. The trip to the Alliance gave me the opportunity to visit Hong Kong, China, the Tax-Free Shopper's Paradise with its old Chinese fishing village of "Aberdeen", renowned for its Floating Population, Floating Restaurants, and hundreds of Junks and Sampans; Tiger Balm Garden, Victoria Peak, the John Wesley Village Mission School, and many other points of interest.

We went next to Taiwan, called Formosa (Beautiful Island) by the Portugese; now called Taiwan (Terraced Bay) by the Chinese, one of the loveliest islands on earth. We toured Taipei, the capital of Taiwan, and had many glimpses of China's ancient culture. We visited mission work in Taipei.

We visited next, Osaka, Japan's second largest city, known as the "Venice of Japan" on account of the numerous canals and rivers that cut across and under its streets. Because of the business acumen of its citizens, it is also called the "city of merchants". While in Osaka we visited Expo '70, the Japan World Exposition depicting the theme: "Progress and Harmony for Mankind".

From Osaka we went to Kyoto, Japan's cultural capital which abounds in historic buildings such as: Higashi Honganji Temple, headquarters of the Buddhist sect, Jodo Shinsu! Heian Shrine, Gold Pavilion; Zen Gardens; Moss Temple; Nijo Castle, the old Imperial Palace and Imperial Villa. We visited Kyoto Handicraft Center, famous for silks and textiles. We saw a number of shops selling traditional handicrafts, and saw some of the craftsmen at work.

Our next stop was Tokyo, the "City of a Million Faces" and Japan's political, cultural and economic capital. It is the world's largest city, with a population of almost 11½ million.

Tokyo is composed of 23 "Ku" or wards plus an additional 14 areas called "Satellite cities" and may be the only capital in the world that has its own islands, in the southern entrance of Tokyo Bay.

We visited the Imperial Palace and the Imperial Gardens. The Parks, the National Diet Building (home of the Japanese Parliament), the Meiji Shrine; Ginza, the world-famous shopping and entertainment area; the Great Buddha Shrine and Zen temples;

toured the exquisite Japanese Gardens, considered to be sculptured art; Tokyo Tower, the University of Tokyo, and the Baptist Mission there. We were fascinated by the Pearl Farms, where cultured pearls are made.

We had the thrill of riding a Japan Air Line's Jumbo 747 Jet from Tokyo to beautiful Honolulu where we spent a day of sightseeing. We took a cruise to Pearl Harbor and saw the ruins of some ships attacked by the Japanese on December 7, 1941. We learned that Pearl Harbor still has a species of pearl-bearing oyster in the harbor, but the pearls are of no commercial value because the water is polluted.

After a delightful visit in America's 50th state we boarded our jet for the Mainland.

The tour was educational, thrilling and interesting; the Alliance was inspiring and challenging, but it was good to be home where raw fish, rattle snake and eel are not delicacies, as they are in Japan, but in the good old U. S. A., where we can have "soul food" in Mississippi and Creole dishes in Louisiana, and where we can read all of the writing and understand all of the talking.

Thank you for the Bon Voyage wishes and gifts and for your prayers for my safe return.

We have assembled here to preach, teach, discuss, fellowship and sing. The message of our 1970 convention Theme is relevant, and we invite you to explore it with us through the programmed activities.

1970 CONVENTION THEME:

"THE SUFFICIENCY OF CHRIST FOR THE PROBLEMS OF YOUTH"

"But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus."—Philippians 4:19.

The problems of youth are many and very complex, but the Gospel of Jesus Christ can meet the needs of young people today.

In times like these even youth should read the Bible where all the problems of life are treated and find therein the answers.

There is something deep in the nature of youth that keeps them searching, groping, dissatisfied with the present conditions—"the establishment". They seek one thing after another—drugs, alcohol, sex, free love, riots, demonstrations, in the vain hope that these will satisfy. What they don't realize is that they can't be satisfied with *things*. They must find rest and satisfaction in the spiritual. There will be no end to their restless searching until they have found Jesus. He is the answer to our every need. Jesus Christ is our Saviour. He is our hope for a better world that will emerge out of the chaos, confusion, frustration, restlessness, violence, injustice, wars, immorality, and social evils of today.

He alone can bring the pearl out of the oyster. Have you ever thought how amazing it is that from so humble an origin as the

oyster comes the pearl? People, when irritated, fuss, fume and blow their tops! the oyster acts quite differently. When an irritation is set up inside the oyster by foreign particles, he quietly exudes a substance which allays the friction, covers the sore spot, and miracle of miracles, the substance hardens, forming a pearl.

Oysters that have never been irritated, never had a problem. No problem, no pearl. Yes, young people, no cross, no crown. you must be purged with hyssop to be purified, cleansed by His precious blood. The power you need is the power of the blood of Jesus Christ, God's pearl of great price. Yes, Christ is all you need. Are you heavy-hearted, are you sore distressed? Christ is all you need. Go to Him in prayer and He will roll all burdens away. He will "fix" you. "Get hooked" on Jesus Christ and you will be "fixed" for life.

Geraldine Clinton Little in her poem "Quest" based upon Psalm 15, expresses the prayer I believe youth and adults should make:

"Sanctuary Lord, a mountain of sanctuary,
And how may I dwell there with Thee?
There is right to be done.
Lord, how do I recognize the right?
There is truth to be spoken.
How wise would I be if I knew what is true.

"A flock of doubts, hover, shrieking, wheeling,
diving, buzzards of questioning.
My tongue is not silver with goodness, Lord.
Enmity and bitterness enslave and irritate
me as sand in an oyster.
Through your immense and endless understanding
Will I, in time, create even one small pearl
to lay before you? "

10. Printed Worship Programs.
11. Instituted "Bunk In" Party for Youth.
12. Expanded Honors Luncheon.
13. Instituted Divisional Lecture—Discussion Groups.

I have already mentioned the Annual features and financial activities we have carried on, and I have expressed my deepest appreciation to the leaders.

**NATIONAL COUNCIL OF NEGRO WOMEN

HOTEL INTERNATIONAL, WASHINGTON, D.C.**

To this meeting I was privilege to go as an official representative of a National Affiliate in the Council, the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention. I brought greetings to the N.C.N.W. on behalf of Dr. Mary O. Ross our president. The following excerpt is taken from the remarks offered at that time:

"Mrs. Ross is especially impressed with the theme of the National Council: 'Changing the Elusion of Unity into the Reality of Power,' because by chance it seems to point up a program of 'Renewal' launched in the Annual Session of the Baptist Convention held in Kansas City, Mo., September 1969. THE HOT SPRINGS MEETING

The business meeting of the Board of Directors of the Woman's Convention was held in January 1970 in the Bowman Little Theatre in the Baptist Bath House.

Director Barron submitted to the Parliamentarian a recommendation that Constitutional Revision be made to the effect that a Far Western Regional Director be added to the Regional Staff to serve with boundaries set to include all Far Western States. June 11-13, 1970 marked the historic 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Women's Bureau with the notable Mrs. Elizabeth Duncan Koontz as Director.

Being one of three persons representing our National Baptist Auxiliary—the others were Dr. Ross our president and Mrs. Myra Taylor, National Literature Chairman—I found myself in another unique situation noting the interest of more than 1500 women, covering a broad spectrum of our society assembling to make it known to the Administration that "Justice" must become a dominant part of its policy was very challenging.

Mrs. Koontz's keynote address was exactly as it was expected to be—DYNAMIC. She used as her subject, "American Women at the Crossroads." From this theme the conferees developed thirteen workshops to further explore "Directions For The Future." Other speakers of interest were Arthur Fletcher, Assistant Secretary of Labor and James D. Hodgson, Under Secretary of Labor.

An interesting afternoon was experienced at a White House reception on the famous South Lawn as guest of the First Lady, Mrs. Pat Nixon.

Director Beatrice Bates was our gracious hostess while we visited the Progressive Baptist District Association in Cleveland, Ohio. President Ross, Officers of the Women's Convention, Directors Barron, Leak, Fallin, and Watts, Field Workers, Directors of States, Officers of the Young People's Department.

The decade of the 70's has begun and the situation in the world, especially here in America makes one who has given most of his life to teaching and living the work of God reflect on what the future holds for mankind. In foreseeing the potentials of new communications, and scientific experiments, one must realize that with each new capability there comes a corresponding responsibility upon those who exercise it. There can never be an electronic substitute for a man's private conscience, his sense of justice, compassion and dignity.

I have tried through the years to persuade young people to prepare themselves properly, become involved in community work and to have faith in their God. The scriptures says: "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." That biblical admonition tells us that we cannot think in terms of weakness and be strong. We cannot think in terms of fear and then be courageous. We cannot think in terms of doubt and then have faith.

Once again, I was honored when Dr. Mary O. Ross appointed me to take a Group Tour Around-the-World, stopping in Tokyo, Japan for the 12th Baptist World Congress and the first World Congress to be held in the Orient.

On July 6th, 1970 at 9:30 A.M., I boarded United Airlines Flight 720 from O'Hare Field to San Francisco. We arrived in San Francisco at 11:30 A.M. and transferred to Pan American 707 Flight to Honolulu, Hawaii. Upon arrival in Honolulu we were transported to the Hilton Hawaiian Village Hotel. Monday evening we had dinner at the hotel and rested.

Tuesday we toured Honolulu. The sights are astonishing and breathtaking. We saw the State Capitol, Honolulu Civic Center, Iolani Palace, Queen's Hospital and

the National Memorial Cemetary located in what they call Punch Bowl Crater. We toured the world's largest fruit cannery and shopping center, Dole Pineapple Shopping Center. It has 155 stores. Two of the stores were very familiar to us, Colonel Sanders Kentucky Fried Chicken and Sears Roebucks.

Wednesday was a day of leisure.

Thursday, July 9th at 1:30 P.M. we boarded Pan American 747 for Tokyo. The 747 is an extra large jet. It seats 364 passengers. Before reaching Tokyo we crossed the International Date Line losing one day. Flight time was seven hours ten minutes so we landed in Tokyo on Friday evening at 4:20 P.M. Tokyo time. We transferred to another airport by bus to take our plane to Osaka.

The trip to Osaka took 45 minutes. On board the hostess served sandwiches and hot tea. The Tour Guide met us at the Airport and escorted us to the Hotel Osaka. Dinner was early and we retired for the night. Saturday we went to Expo 70 but were unable to see much because of the rain. Along the way to and from Expo we were shown rice fields where the Japanese work for very low wages. One thing that stands out among the Japanese people is their politeness to travelers.

Sunday we left Osaka and returned to Tokyo for the 12th World Baptist Congress. We arrived at 4:30 P.M.

"Reconciliation Through Christ"

This was the theme of the "12th World Baptist Congress." 10,000 Baptists from 85 different countries representing many racial strains coming together to seek the cause of freedom and peace under God's Guidance.

The opening session on Sunday Evening used the Scripture Lesson—2nd Corinthians 5:15-20. The message of those words was a beautiful way to bring workers of God together to unite to break down barriers of prejudice, racial differences and social customs.

The keynote speaker was Dr. Theodore F. Adams, retired minister from Richmond Virginia, and past president, Baptist World Alliance. Speaking on the theme of the Congress, Dr. Adams told the international audience that Christianity brings together people of different views and races and breaks down barriers that separate them. The opening session closed with the singing of the hymn "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Beginning on Monday the Congress consisted of Morning and Evening Sessions and the afternoons were devoted to Workshops. Workshops were held for the World Relief Offering, the Radio and Television Committee, Continental Language Groups, Women's Groups, Youth Committee and Pastors Committee.

Monday evening at the session the president of the Congress, Dr. William R. Tolbert, Jr. of Liberia gave the main address. His topic was "Panorama, Asia." The Congress had some world renowned speakers such as, Honorable Angie Brooks, Liberia, Mrs. David S. Russell, General secretary, Baptist Union of Great Britain and Ireland, Daniel Y. K. Cheung, pastor Kowloon Baptist Church, Hong Kong, and American Evangelist Billy Graham.

The Workshops were interesting and very informative. The meetings for the Youth Department were very helpful in suggesting ideas on getting new members and creating an interesting yearly program. As one student delegate put it "Our task is to educate our people about their responsibility for the problems of the world and to attack the spirit of our own people who put their own interests first."

On Thursday evening at the regular session a pageant was given depicting the history of the Baptist Church in America. Dr. Mary O. Ross and Mrs. Margery Gaillard took part in the pageant. There are 27,250,138 Baptists in 30 different denominations in North America.

The speaker at the closing session was the Evangelist Billy Graham. The Congress was a thrilling and gratifying experience.

Saturday morning at 9:30 a.m. we left Tokyo on a 747 bound for Hong Kong. We arrived at 1:30 p.m. and our guide took us to the beautiful Hyatt Hotel where we lunched on—GUESS WHAT!—Hamburgers, French fries, coffee and ice cream.

We took a five hour tour—where we saw Kowloon and Territories—visiting the Resettlement Estates, Tsun Wan (industrial satellite city) Castle Peak, Yuen Long (a farming center) Kam-Tin—a century old walled village surrounded with moat and turrets. We rode the cable car which is elevated 50,000 feet over the city, ascended Victoria Peak by funicular for a magnificent panoramic view of the city, harbor, and Kowloon. We visited the Tiger Balm Gardens, a fishing village of gaily painted junks, sampans and floating sea-food restaurants. We also visited the Ghetto where the poor live. The last plant we visited was the Dairy Farm where all the milk for Hong Kong is produced. It is owned by the English.

Monday we left Hong Kong for Manila in the Philippines. We spent only one day in Manila so our tour was short, but we did see many old historical and scenic attractions, such as, the old Walled City, 360 years old San Augustin Church, Chinatown and the Manila Bay.

Tuesday morning we left by air for Bangkok arriving there at 10:15 a.m. We rested and had dinner at the Hotel Susi Thani.

Wednesday we saw Bangkok—the floating markets and the Temple of Dawn, Wat Arun. Our early morning trip took us up the Chao Phya River and the Klongs (canals) passing the colorful boat houses, picturesque scenes of native life.

The afternoon part of the tour we visited the Royal Palace Gardens to see the dazzling Wat Phra Keo with its Emerald Buddha and Golden Chedi. During this excursion gentlemen are obliged to wear coat and necktie, ladies are not permitted to wear shorts, slacks or open heeled shoes. Movie cameras are not allowed on the Palace grounds.

Thursday we continued on to Delhi, India. It was very hot. The temperatures were in the upper 90's. The city tour guide showed us the Jantar-Mantar Observatory, the magnificent Laxminarayan's Temple, Rajghat (where Gandhi was cremated). Outside the gates to this temple where Gandhi was cremated snake charmers sit with the great big cobra snakes some have them wrapped around their body. Also, you see monkeys dancing in the streets for people. The Moonlight Square in Delhi is where the people use the same water to cook, bathe themselves, and drink. The same water is used for all purposes.

Friday the tour leader took our group to see the world famous Taj Mahal, one of the wonders of the world. Emperor Shab Jehan in 1648 built it as a Mausoleum to his beloved wife Queen Mumtaz Mahal. It took 22 years and 20,000 people working around the clock. It is built in pure white marble with gold inlays in the floor. We also saw the historic Fort of Agra built by Akbar the Great and the famous Tomb of Tmad-Ud-Saula.

Saturday morning at 6:00 a.m. we took off for Bombay arriving at 8:15 a.m. Bombay has a large population. It is called the Gateway to India. It is also a seaport. Poverty is seen everywhere. Health conditions are very poor. Some people sleep on the sidewalks. The poor people have no funerals for their dead. Instead they wrap them in sheets and take them to an area that is surrounded by brick walls. The family is not allowed to go inside. They lower the bodies inside where vultures who sit and wait devour the bodies in three to four hours. Lime is sprinkled on the bones and when they disintegrate they have an under ground tunnel which carries these out to sea.

The afternoon tour took us to see the Tata Institute, Rajabai Clock Tower, High Court, Marine Drive, Aquarium, Nehru Park, Hanging Gardens, Haji Ali Tomb,

Dhobi Ghat, Victoria Garden, the Jhaveri Bazar, Crawford market and the Prince of Wales Museum.

By air on Indian Airways Flight 182 on Sunday morning at 6:10 a.m. to Nairobi, the capital of Kenya in East Africa. We were transferred to the Ambassadeur Hotel upon arrival in Nairobi. The tour included sections of the city and the city and the National Park which covers an area of 44 square miles. Also, a two day tour (if one wanted to go) to the Amboseli Masai Reserve with overnight stay at the lodge.

Thursday July 30th we had breakfast in the air on our way to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia arriving there at 10:30 a.m. The guide met us and transferred us to the Ethiopia Hotel where we stayed.

Addis Ababa is the capitol of Ethiopia. Interesting places on the city tour included the Coptic Cathedral of St. George, the Palace, the Handicraft School, Church-hill Street, Menelik II Square and the statue, the newly built city hall, the new market, where we had the opportunity to buy souvenirs. This is the area where the farm people come to sell their wares. School is not compulsory there.

Friday at 1:55 P.M. we arrived in Cairo and were transported to the Hilton Hotel. Our sightseeing excursions took to the Pyramids and Sphinx, a drive through the Al Tahir Bridge, a short visit to the Obelisk of Tanis. We stopped and some took a ride on a camel. Then back to the hotel.

Later we took a drive to the Egyptian Museum, visited the Mummies' Room, then on the Citadel and last to the bazaars known as Khan al Khalil.

Sunday by air on Cyprus Airways 305 at 8:35 a.m. we left Cairo for Nicosia. We toured the city in the afternoon seeing the Cyprus Museum, The Venetian Walls and St. Sophia Mosque. We had dinner at our hotel, Ledra Palace.

Monday found us on our way to Tel Aviv, Israel, where we transferred for our flight to Jerusalem. In Jerusalem we stayed at Hotel National Palace.

The tour of Jerusalem took us to the Jaffa Gate, David's Tower and Citadel, we walked inside the old city, the Jewish Quarter, visited the Wailing Wall and went through the picturesque bazaar. We visited the first and second Temples, through the Via Dolorosa and saw the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Each member of the group received a Certificate from the City Government of Jerusalem.

Tuesday we went to the Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane, visited Mary's Tomb and then drove back to town.

We left Jerusalem on Wednesday for Beirut, Lebanon arriving at 12:00 noon. After lunch at the Hotel King's we took a short city drive to the campus of the American University continued over the mountain fertile Bekaa Valley to Baalbeck. The temple of the ruins in Baalbeck will give you a deep feeling of admiration when you stand and view the great achievements of the past. We also saw the Roman temples of Jupiter, Bacchus and Venus and then back to the hotel for dinner and rest.

On Thursday a personal friend of Dr. Funches took the group for a lovely outing.

Thursday evening we left Beirut for Rome arriving there at 1:45 a.m. and were taken immediately to our hotel—Hotel Metropole.

Friday morning sightseeing tour took us to the Vatican Museums, the Court of Belvedere, Sistine Chapel, Stanze of Raphael, the Library and the American Catholic Church in Fusan.

Afternoon sightseeing tour showed us the Trevi Fountain, Janiculum Hill, Church of St. Paul outside the Walls, Church of St. Peter in Chains with the statue of Moses by Michelangelo, The Capitol, Roman Forum, Colosseum, Aventine Hill, Via Dei Fori and the Protestant Cemetery.

Friday evening was leisure time for the people to shop and dine at their own

desire.

Saturday morning at 11:40 a.m. we left Rome for New York. We were aboard flight 111, a Pan-American jet 747 which landed at JFK Airport in New York 8 hours and 15 minutes from take off.

We transferred at JFK Airport to Flight 17 for O'Hare Field. We arrived in Chicago at 9:30 P.M. and everyone was happy to be home safe.

Rev. Green is to be complimented on her arrangements for the complete tour. Our Accommodations were excellent on the whole tour. Everyone was extremely pleased and well satisfied.

The immediate members of my group were my niece, Mrs. Gloria Bryant, a former Sunshine Girl, Mrs. Jewel Byrd, Mrs. LeVater Broadnax, Rev. Charles W. Alexander, Jr. and Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Lackey. Mrs. Ethelstine Lackey is a graduate of the Mission School in Nashville, Tennessee. She was a student there when I was teaching.

Arriving home on August 9th has caused me to rush to get this report ready. There are so many things that I observed on my trip this time that I would like to mention but there is neither time nor space. One thing I am certain is that the people of this world must begin to search for new solutions, must begin to accept new ideas and must have the courage to continue to teach—Using the words of Dr. A. E. Freeman "God exists as the Pillar and Ground of our whole existence and he uses reason and faith to his own glory." The reason of man is the candle of the Lord," and "He who would come to God, must first believe that he is and is a rewarder of those who diligently seek him."

For 34 years, I have been the recipient of wonderful things from the Women's Convention. I am deeply grateful. I have been inspired by wonderful leaders, helped by faithful workers and I have always stayed constant in my desire to serve God. I have lived to see many wonderful things happen in this world, for instance: the automobile, the radio, the television, the jet plane, and the greatest feat of the century—man landing on the moon. So I look to the future not the past and know that "All things are possible to him that believe."

Let me this morning do something that shall take
 A little sadness from the world's vast store,
 And may I be so favored as to make
 Of Joy's too scanty sum a little more.
 Let me not hurt, by any selfish deed
 Or thoughtless work, the heart of foe or friend;
 Nor would I pass, unseeing, worthy need,
 Or sin by silence when I should defend.
 However meager be my worldly wealth,
 Let me give something that shall aid my kind—
 A word of courage, or a thought of health,
 Dropped as I pass for troubled hearts to find.
 Let me tonight look back across the span

I have a dream that one day she will be victorious in every effort without a minus.

As I viewed or observed the Baptist World Congress, I could see many and varied functions carried out on a world-wide scale. To me it was an agency of communication between Baptists through publications, dissemination of news, film, radio, personal visits and correspondence. I saw it as a forum for study and fraternal discussion of doctrines, practice and ways of witness to the world, a channel of cooperation in extending help to each other and those in need, a vigilant force for safeguarding religious liberty and other God given rights.

The relief program of the Alliance is a unique channel through which Baptists of all conventions and all nations can work together to "bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Gal. 6:2). The impact of the BWA has rested heavy on my heart.

CONQUEST OF SPACE

The supreme technological achievement of this century is the conquest of outer space. We have reached for the moon and have realized our dreams by successfully landing two crews of Astronauts on the surface of the moon. This has been one of the most staggering accomplishments in history. Dr. Thomas O. Paine informs us that within a few months we will have space platforms for a more in-depth study of our universe. A space-planing task group has recommended placing a man on Mars by 1983, and yet the cutting edge of these attainments is dulled by the realization that even as we are basking in the glory of these great accomplishments, our earth is still filled with defeat and failure. The war in the Middle East grows in intensity. The Vietnam war threatens to engulf all of Indochina.

We seem to be succeeding as scientists but failing as men. We are conquering outer space, but are losing the battle for "inner space."

The words of Jesus echo down the corridors of time: "What shall it profit a people, if they gain the whole world and lose their own souls?"

I have often thought, "What if we as a people would exert the same effort, the same energy, the same dedication and sacrifice, in setting our individual spiritual houses in order that the NASA people have done in planning the moon flights. What if each of us would sincerely examine his heart and say with David, "Search me, O God, and know my heart, try me, and know my thoughts; and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

Seriously, we need God in our educational system today even more than we did 125 years ago. The Bible says, "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God"—(Psalm 14:1). The American educational system needs transforming from top to bottom. We need to recognize that man is a trinity. He has a mind that needs educating and a body that needs developing, but he also has a spirit that needs fulfilment. That fulfilment can be found only in a personal relationship with God.

Nearly all the early educational institutions of America were founded by church leaders who recognized the need for a faith in God as a basis of true knowledge and true wisdom. The Supreme Court, departing from the spirit of the writers of the Constitution and departing from the precedent of every Supreme Court throughout American history declared in effect that God is no longer relevant.

The Supreme Court is wrong! God is not only relevant, He is essential if we are to rear a generation of law-abiding citizens.

A WORD TO OUR YOUTH

Don't downgrade the future, nor the present. You can play any part you want in an unbelievably better world.

I know it is difficult for you and me to see the future in the same perspective. You have more of it ahead

of you than I, but I have seen more of the past than you.

Your vision today may be sharply boned by the imperfections of our time, but mine is enriched by the knowledge that the world does indeed get better with time.

Your generation, rich in the security of freedom won, has committed itself to the next goal, the perfection of individual liberty.

You demand universal justice, yes. You continue to plead for equality. You curse the darkness of intolerance and dishonesty. Remember men have sought these goals throughout history—but never with the advantage you have today. You are strong materially but don't think you can build a better world without God.

FAITH IN GOD

Yes, I believe that all things are possible if we only believe.

When we examine the problems that confront us today, we find that every one of them resolves into a problem of the dark side of the human spirit. We are infected by the disease of sin. The Bible says, "There is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10).

Today if we will turn the searchlight of truth on the dark side of our human spirits and let Jesus Christ become the master control of our lives a new day will dawn for us.
