

vation of such papers may be of great importance to public and private interests, and necessary and interesting to the history of the State,—Therefore:

Resolved, That the Governor and Council be, and they are hereby authorised to appoint some suitable and competent person or persons, whose duty it shall be to examine every part of the public buildings where there may be reason to believe any papers or documents, properly belonging to the Executive or any other department, may be found in an unarranged condition and out of place, and to collect and arrange all such papers and documents, and to deposite them in the office or offices to which they may appear properly to belong, and report to the Governor and Council a list of all such papers and documents, noting where each has been deposited.

Resolved, That the Governor and Council be, and they are hereby authorised to allow to the person or persons they may appoint to collect and arrange said papers and documents, such compensation therefor as they may deem reasonable and just, and to pay the same by a draft or drafts on the Treasurer of the western shore.

Resolved, That the Librarian be, and he is hereby authorised and directed to procure and have bound in a suitable manner, a complete set of the Judicial Reports of the State of Maryland, to be presented in compliance with the proposition of the Library Committee, to the British Government; and that the Library Committee on part of the Senate and House of Delegates be charged with the said presentation, and be requested in the name of the State to express its high sense of the liberality of the donation of the British Government, and to transmit with their communication a copy of this Resolution.
