To his Excellency,
The Governor of Maryland:

As I have been detailed for the survey of the Annapolis Canal, on an application from the Executive of Maryland, and as there is no organized company for the construction of the canal or superintendance of the surveys, nor any other official persons with whom I can communicate, I have thought I could not make a better disposition of the accompanying communication, from the Maryland Canal Company, in relation to their selection of a route, than to lay the same before the Governor and Council.

Sir:

As I have been informed, and no doubt correctly, that you have been detailed, and charged by the Government of the United States, to survey a route for a canal, which the Annapolis and Potomac Canal Company, when incorporated, might wish to construct; I now communicate to you, in compliance with a resolution adopted on yesterday by the President and Directors of the Maryland Canal Company the annexed official copies of certain proceedings of the commissioners of said company, and of the President and Directors thereof, relative to the route and location of the canal and works of the Maryland
