

has since died. It will be seen by the report of Colonel Cloud, that the public arms in his possession are in bad order, and that he desires an exchange—this I strongly recommend, as we are liable to be called upon daily to meet such occurrences. Since the occurrence of the 22d, a volunteer company has been raised at Charlestown, and officers elected, as will appear by the enclosed letter of Major Black Commissions for whom I recommend. Whenever this company shall be properly organized, and the requisitions of the law complied with, the arms asked for, I would respectfully request should be given to them, as necessary to the defence of that place and neighborhood.
