on as expeditiously as its nature would allow; and 3dly, that it has

been conducted with proper economy.

So far as the duties of the Topographical Engineer are concerned, your committee, having understood that this officer intends to address a communication to this House, setting forth the amount and nature of the services which he has rendered to the State, under this set together with a detailed statement of the expenditures for the several vorks in which he has been engaged, abstain from making a youn ments. They presume, that the House will feel desirous of taking some action upon this communication when it will have made its appearance.

In reference to the duties of the Geologist, so far as regards the benefits which the people have derived from his services, y uncommittee believe, they have much exceeded in value the cost of his portion of the survey. In the course of his scientific investigations, vast agricultural resources, of which the citizens of Maryland were heretofore in ignorance, have been developed, and a fresh impension given to other modes of improvement previously known and not pro-

perly appreciated.

Throughout the tide-water districts, over which the geological survey, thus far, has principally extended, your committee have reason to believe, the value of land has been much enhanced, and mainly too, they think by the operation of this judicious scheme, at which a death-blow is simed by the order of enquiry now submitted to them.

On the Eastern Shore, where great accumulations of oyster shells occur near the site of former Indian villages, they find a merchantable commodity in the lime into which these sheds are readily conveni-Requiring scarce any outlay, this single article must become, in the hands of the more thrilly farmer, a permanent source of income. The discovery of marl in localities which have always been supposed destitute of any such resuscitating agent, has infused new strength and vigor into the hearts of some who were ready, in the fullness of despair, to cherish livelier hopes in sections of country remote from their native State. The mania for emigration had been poisoning the public mind, and it found a powerful disinfectant in this undertaking, which has proved an incentive to homebred industry and homebred enterprize. Nor is it confined in its results to the agricultural interests of the State. The manufacturing portion of our citizens is deeply interested in its being successfully carried out. Several substances of extensive application in the arts have already been detected within our geographical limits by the very indefatigable offcer at the head of this survey, who is now devoting all his energies to its completion.

Your committee have enumerated some of the prominent advantages that have accrued to the tide-water districts, and it such has been the amount of di coveries made in those portions of the State, already surveyed, where scarcely any mineral wealth or resource had been proviously supposed to occur, they cannot out remain satisfies,
