pointed out particularly to Dr. Baxley some of his objections to the law as reported by Col. Dulaney, and expressed his opinion that it would be impossible to substitute an actuary as proposed, for the Executive Committee. He declined recommending the passage of the law, as he was urged to do, but may have said, and probably did say, that he would express to Col. Dulaney, his own views of the law.

This much and no more was Dr. Baxley, or any other person, au-

thorised to communicate to Col. Dulaney, as coming from him.
