TRUE ELOQUENCE.

The following touching passages are contained in the speech of the Hon. Mr. Brewster, delivered in the House of Representatives of the United States. The incidents narrated cannot fail to minister every eye by which they are perused.

COLORED EMIGRATION TO HAITI.

A few days ago a vessel sailed from New Orleans, with eighty-one free colored persons, belonging to Louisiana, who go to try their chances in Hayti. The captain says:

THE DEATH OF WASHINGTON.

"Sir, I have often heard from the last survivor of that band of patriots and their march; how they made some six hundred miles in twenty days—thirty miles a day—and how, at the very point of their destination, Washington, who happened to be making a reconnaissance in the neighborhood, saw them approaching, and recognizing the lily-white warriors, rode up to meet and greet them in the camp; how he saw their captain—his old comrade in arms, Stephen, who stood by his side at the Great Meadows, on Braddock's fatal field, and in many an Indian campaign, and who reported himself to his commander as 'Join the right bank of the Potomac'—he sprang from his horse and clasped his old friend and companion in arms with both hands. He spoke no word of welcome, but the eloquence of silence told what his tongue could not articulate. He moved along the ranks, shaking the hand of each, from man to man, and all the while—my informant told me—the big tears were seen courting down his manly cheek.

THE DEATH OF WASHINGTON.

"Ay, sir, Washington wept! And why did the glorious soul of Washington weep with emotion? Why did he weep? Because he saw that the cause of Massachusetts was practically the cause of Virginia; because he saw that her citizens recognized the great principles involved in the contest. These Virginia volunteers had come spontaneously. They had come in response to the words of his Henry, that were leaping like lightning through the land, telling the people of Virginia that they must fight for Massachusetts. They had come to rally by Washington's side, to defend your fathers' freedom, to protect their homes from harm. Well, the crisis has been returned! John Brown rejected that very county as the spot for his invasion, and, as was mentioned in the Senate, the rock where Boston fell was the very rock over which Morgan and his men marched a few hours after. Hugh Johnson's command had crossed the river yesterday further up.

THE DEATH OF WASHINGTON.

"May this historical reminiscence recall to the mind of our nation the noble hearts of those who have sacrificed their lives in the cause of freedom. It is not to be forgotten here. When the dark day comes, as some may think, when the day comes that now divides and agitates the hearts of the people can only be decided by the bloody arbitrament of the sword, it will be the saddest day for us and all mankind that the sun of Heaven has ever shone upon.
