ANAPOLIS, Feb. 10, 1880. SENATE.—After my report closed today, the following business was transacted:—Bill Passed.—Altering John T. Baker, late a collector in Montgomery county, further time to complete his collection. Geo. McKing received a unanimous vote of the able and dignified manner in which he discharged the duties of president pro tem. of the Senate. House of Delegates.—After my report closed the following letter was received from the Governor, and referred to a select committee: EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, ANAPOLIS, Feb. 15, 1880. To the House of Delegates:—Gentlemen: I have been informed to-day by a committee of your House that you have adopted an order reciting that "Whereas it appears from the public press of the country that the Governor of Maryland has placed his congratulations upon Mr. DeWitt of New Jersey, a black republican, upon his election to the distinguished position of speaker of the House of Representatives, and directing a committee, appointed by the speaker, to inquire of the Governor whether his congratulations were presented at all, and if so, whether privately or officially; I cannot admit the right of the House of Delegates to make such inquiry; and the respect which, in my opinion, ought to be observed by each department of the Government towards every other, precludes me from returning any answer to such a message, other than to acknowledge its receipt. Mr. Freaner presented a petition, praying for a reduction of license on inn keepers. SENATE Session.—Bill Passed.—Authorizing the opening of a road in Howard and Montgomery counties. ANAPOLIS, Feb. 17. SENATE.—The Senate was engaged in the discussion of the bill relating to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, presented by Mr. McKing. Mr. McKing spoke at length on the merits of the bill, which was followed by Mr. Kimmel, who was speaking with a local character. The other business up of a local character, prior to taking up the above bill. HOUSE OF DELEGATES.—Petition Presented.—By Mr. Turner, of Howard, to compel free negroes to hire out by the year. By Mr. Freaner, for the reduction of license on drinking houses. Leave to Report a Bill.—By Mr. Briscoe, to require judges of courts of equity to file their decisions more promptly. Bills Reported.—By Mr. Briscoe, relating to the right of riparian proprietors. The bill to amend the law relative to the shooting of wild fowls was taken up on the motion of Mr. Compton. Considerable sharp discussion ensued as to the provisions of the bill. Objections were made to the bill, and motions were made to except several counties from its operation; but without success being had thereon, the bill was postponed and made the order of the day for Saturday next. Bill Passed.—To reduce the amount paid to the Maryland Hospital for the annual support of insane free negroes from \$150 to \$100. THE KENTON SHORE RAILROAD BILL. On motion of Mr. Landing, the bill making an appropriation of the balance of the \$1,000,000 due the Eastern Shore counties of Maryland for interest on the bonds of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, was taken up, and after considerable discussion was made the special order of the day for 12 o'clock on Monday next. THE COLORED POPULATION. The bill reported by Mr. Jacobs, chairman of the committee on colored population, regulating the manumission of slaves, was taken up. Mr. Burgess moved to substitute the bill on the same subject presented by Mr. Dennis, of Somerset, known as the bill of the slaveholders' committee. Mr. Jacobs was speaking at length in favor of his own bill when this report closed.

DANIEL E. SICKLES.—The New York correspondent of the Charleston, S. C., Courier, has the following: A rumor obtains very generally here, that the Hon. D. E. Sickles has experienced a change of heart, and that he contemplates connecting himself with some church. His former friends say that they have noticed a marked difference in his conduct recently. At Washington he leads a very different life from what he once did in this city. Before he leaves the Capitol it is thought he will make a public profession of Christianity. After that, I doubt if he will longer follow the vagaries of public political life. In view of these circumstances, some of Sickles' most ardent friends almost desire to see him ousted from Congress by A. J. Williamson, who contests the seat of the Third Congressional district.

WHOLESALE POISONING.—At Fonda, N. Y., one hundred and fifty persons were lately attacked with the bowen and stomach complaint, and poison was detected. It turned out that a miller had been in the practice, when his mill stones were too deep, of putting in a preparation of white lead, and this getting into the flour, poisoned the whole neighborhood.
