MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.

ANNAPOLIS, Feb. 18, 1860.—The following business was transacted after my last closed to day:

Bills Passed.—A bill to increase the compensation of the Judges of the Orphans' Court of Montgomery County. An act for the benefit of James G. Heeding and Willis W. Watkins. An act providing where no executor shall renounce his commissions, he shall not be taxed thereon. An act to open a public road in Howard and Montgomery counties.

The Eastern Shore Railroad bill (the million) was taken up and rejected, yes 11, nays 10.

On motion of Mr. McKaig, the vote on this bill was reconsidered.

Mr. McKaig, from a Committee, reported an act to regulate the Obesque and Ohio Canal Company, which was read a second time, and made the order of the day, at 1 o'clock.

The Hagerstown railroad bill was engrossed and passed, by yeas 13, nays 6.

Adjourned to Saturday morning.

House or Delegates.—A message was received from the Senate proposing that the President of the House should inform the Speaker of the House of his re-election as United Senator. Adjourned.

ANNAPOLIS, March 3, 1860.

Senate.—The bill appropriating \$5,000 to the Deaf and Dumb Asylum was passed.

The bill appropriating \$5,000 to the House of Friends was taken up and passed by yeas 15, nays 4.

Mr. Elliott, from the committee on the constitution, reported an act providing for the taking of the sense of the people on the propriety of calling a convention to form a new constitution and a new government for the State, and to delegates to said convention.

Mr. Dr. Davis—Mr. Long, chairman of the committee on revenue and expenditure bills making appropriations for the support of government for the years ending January 1st, 1861 and 1862.

Telegraph Population.—Mr. Jacobs, chairman of the committee on colored population (who appeared in his seat to-day after illness of a week), moved to take up of the bills relating to the colored population.

The House committee of the whole (Mr. Ford the chair) took up the bill prohibiting emigration, the immigration of free negroes, establishing policy commissioners, each county, and authorizing them to hold and hire out free negroes, and providing that free negroes may renounce their freedom and become slaves, which wretched discussion when the House adjourned to Monday.

ANNAPOLIS, March 5, 1860.

Senate.—The bill containing the corporate existence of the Maryland State Colonization Society, and appropriating \$5,000 for the relief of free negroes to Africa, was rejected, yeas 10, nays 5. The bill was then withdrawn.

House.—*Delegates.*—The *Congress of Delegates* to the Governor, repaid by the Special Committee of the House for the removal of Judge Stamp, came at 12 o'clock, as the order of the day.

Mr. Maxwells moved that the Judge be permitted to appear at the bar, and 10 person, or through counsel, address the House in his defense.

After some discussion, the motion was adopted, and the Judge was allowed two hours to make his defense, which he was doing when this report closed.

An Agency to Assist fugitive Slaves to Return to the Masters.

Mr. C. J. Brown, an enterprising southerner, who has been sojourning for some weeks in Canada on a specie mission, has opened an office in Decatur's block with the charitable view of rendering material assistance to the colored race in assisting those who are disposed to return to their masters at the South. He says he has made such investigations in Canada, especially at Halifax and other places where African most congregate, to satisfy himself that large numbers of them are anxious and ready to return to their masters at the South if they only had the means and he proposes to furnish them with transportation tickets and send them a company with an agent, looking to the owners for remuneration for his trouble. He is a man of nerve and determination, and is possessed of the means to carry it out.

The following is his circular addressed to the colored population:

"The undersigned have made arrangements at the South to furnish means to those of the colored race who are desirous of returning, to take an office at No. 2 Decatur's block, entrance on Jefferson avenue and Decatur, where he can be found from 1 a. m. to 8 p. m. Arrangements entered into with parties will be guaranteed beyond question as to the strict fulfillment of all obligations. Parties desirous of securing can communicate with the undersigned, either personally or by letter.

C. J. Brown, Agent."

There are numbers of the poor creatures who are starving to death in consequence of their inability to support themselves, and we have no doubt that the new enterprise will have a successful run of business. We have already made the welfare of the race an object of our special solicitude, and now advise every one of them to go directly to Mr. Brown and get their return tickets. It is very difficult that they will have to give up their wives and such little luxuries yet the fact remains that, while they live not a second, their backs here, they will not need any when they get home to the warm climate. We predict that the return route will suffice the underground railroad.
