

MARYLAND DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

This body assembled in Baltimore on Thursday last of last week, and it is agreed to order by Bradly T. Johnson, Esq., President of the State Democratic Central Committee:

Be it resolved, That Parkin Scott of Baltimore, John Tarr of Chestnut county, was called temporarily to the chair, and George A. Hanson, Frederick, temporary secretary; and

Ex-Gov. Pratt, chairman of the committee, presented the following nominations for presidential electors:

President—Hon. John C. Breckinridge of Worcester county; Vice-President—Col. T. J. McCalig of Allegany; Thos. C. Carroll of Frederick; James C. Gilmer of Baltimore county; John S. Street of Hagerstown; Benjamin Shiner of Montgomery; P. M. Abur of Prince George's; John Parsons of Calvert; D. L. Tarr of Caroline; J. W. E. Sibley of Queen Anne's; David Witten of Washington; Dan'l. Stoll of Carroll; Jas. A. Heron, of Baltimore; Washington Gaither of Howard; Dr. Scott of Anne Arundel; Dr. Keay of Charles; Dr. Edelin of St. Mary's; Jacob Wilson of Dorchester; Jas. O. Colton of Talbot; R. M. Golding of Kent; and J. R. Golding of Cecil.

Secretary—George T. Carman, Wm. D. Head, Edward O'Brien, Thomas A. Heron, Wm. L. Roberts, and Geo. A. Hanson.

The report of the committee was unanimously adopted;

Col. T. Johnson voted to the convention in pursuance of a resolution made by the State central committee, which corresponded with all the candidates nominated by the convention of the 2d March, and all except Hon. H. H. of the 3d district, and Dr. Milton Taylor of the 3d district, had expressed their preference for Breckinridge or Lane. From these gentlemen he received no reply.

The Convention took a recess until 4 o'clock, P. M.

Before the arrival of the committee the convention was addressed by Messrs. Kingdon, of Kent, Wimer, of Washington county, Ritchie, of Frederick, and Preston, of Baltimore city.

At half past five o'clock the committee appeared, and the president called the convention to order, when prayer was offered by Rev. James P. Fugit.

Wilson M. Carey, Esq., of Baltimore, chairman of the committee on resolutions, reported the following:

"Resolved, That we endorse the platform of principles adopted by the Democratic Convention in the Maryland Institute on Saturday, the 23d day of June.

"Resolved, That we approve of the course pursued by those delegates who withdrew from the Front Street Convention.

"Resolved, That we recognize the authority of the Democratic State Central Committee to assemble this convention.

"Resolved, That we, the recently elected representatives of the Democratic party of Maryland, knowing that we represent their wishes, endorse the nominations of Breckinridge and Lane, and recommend them to the support of the voters of Maryland!

"Resolved, That this convention, having been satisfactorily informed that the electors of the third and fourth congressional districts have expressed their determination, if elected, not to vote for the persons indicated by this convention as the choice of the Democratic party of Maryland; therefore, be it resolved, that it is the duty of this convention to nominate electors for said districts."

Edward Bell, Esq. of Prince George's, offered the following as an amendment to the report of the committee:

"Resolved, That we profess our unalterable devotion to the union of these States in the present confederation, and we recognize an undividing adherence to the Constitution and all its guarantees, as the best plan for the preservation of the Union."

The amendment was adopted.

The resolutions thus amended were then adopted without a dissenting voice.

Mr. G. F. Maddox, of St. Mary's, offered a resolution that a portion of the ticket be balloon'd at the approaching election to headed Douglass and Johnson, and the others Breckinridge and Lane, and that the electors be required to vote pro rata for Douglass and Breckinridge.

A good deal of confusion followed the reading of the resolution, when it was withdrawn.

On motion, the delegates representing the 3d and 4th districts were requested to present nominations for candidates for electors in those districts.

The third district named Hon. Joseph Vann, and the fourth the name of T. Parkin Scott Esq., both of which were unanimously adopted by the convention.

Mr. Hanson, of Allegany, offered the following resolution:

"Be it Resolved, That the State Democratic Central Committee do, and they hereby continue in power, and that the chairman hereby instructed to ascertain the sentiments of each member of said committee, and that, if within a reasonable time the gentlemen in now in congress that committee shall not indicate to the said chairman their determination to import Messrs. Breckinridge and Lane for President and Vice President of the United States, in place of either of them, or shall fail to do so, he shall be filled by the chairman of the State Central Democratic Committee."

Mr. Hanson, of Frederick, offered a resolution for the resolution, when both were laid on the table.

Mr. G. F. Maddox offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That this convention most heartily endorses the administration of Mr. A. H. Hannegan, President of the United States, and the right of the United States, to interfere in the affairs of any of these States, in the enforcement of all constitutional rights."
