Valuable Recipes. RANCID BUTTER—HOW OBTAINED.—A young wife, in the Prairie Farmer, having asked for information on this subject, the editor received the following replies to her query: I saw in the last number of the Prairie Farmer, the question how to reclaim rancid butter? As I have had considerable experience in handling and packing butter I will give a recipe that I have used with good success: For 100 lbs. rancid butter take 2 lbs. fine white powdered sugar, 2 oz. salt per fine white pulverized, and as much fine dairy salt as you wish to add to the butter to make it your taste. The butter has to be thoroughly washed in cold water, before working in the above ingredients. The amount used should be in proportion to the strongest of the butter.

CURE FOR NEURALGIA.—Some time since we published, at the request of a friend, a recipe to cure neuralgia. Half a drachm of sal ammonia in an ounce of camphor water, to be taken (teaspoonful) a dose, and the dose repeated several times, at intervals of five minutes, if the pain be not relieved at once. Half a dozen different persons have since tried the recipe, and in every case an immediate cure was effected. In one, the sufferer, a lady, had been subjected to acute pains for more than a week, and her physician was unable to alleviate her sufferings, when a solution of sal ammonia in camphor water relieved her in a few minutes.—Alla Californian.
