WAR NEWS

It was late this morning that the statement of the army correspondents of the Associated Press, Gen. McClellan is now pushing forward his columns vigorously in the direction of Richmond. On Monday the Confederate pickets were driven across Potomac or Bottom's Bridge by the troops marching in that direction, whilst Stoneman's cavalry advanced to New Bridge, within eight miles of Richmond. As it was not the purpose, we are told, of Gen. Stoneman to bring on an engagement, he subsequently retired one mile from the bridge and encamped on Tuesday the whole army started early, expecting to make a long march during the day, and Wednesday night it is reported that the headquarters of Gen. McClellan were within a short distance of Richmond. If such were the fact, a battle must be imminent. It must not be supposed, however, that the progress of the Federal troops has been easy and unimpeded. On Saturday, according to the correspondent of the Philadelphia Press, during a reconnaissance in force, they were met by the Confederates and repulsed with some loss. That the casualties must have been quite serious is evident from the fact that the writer expresses a earnest hope that the statement in regard to the affair may turn out to be somewhat exaggerated.

The gunboat Hattera which ascended James river, on Sunday week last, was repulsed at Fort Darling, seven miles below Richmond. From the report of Col. Campbell to the Secretary of War, we learn that the engagement took place on Friday last, and that the fleet, which was composed of the gunboats King Royal, Monitor, Naugatuck, Aristocrat and Fort Royal, were driven back with great loss from before Fort Darling, and a portion of them fell down the river to Jamestown Island, where Lieutenant Morris made a repulse upon Col. Campbell for assistance to be furnished. Seventeen boats had been interred at the date of the report, on the banks of the river, and there were a number of wounded on board, including Lieut. Morris. The gunboat Naugatuck, which was the only one that escaped, is now at the mouth of the river. What appears to be singular is that Lieut. Morris was destitute of intelligence concerning the condition of the forts below Jamestown Island.

Official correspondence between the officers of the Virginia Legislature and President Davis is published, in which he says that it is not the intention of the Confederate government to withdraw its forces from Virginia or abandoning the State; but if the report should have to be surrendered—a necessity which he did not see or anticipate—that would be necessary for withdrawing the army, as the war could be successfully maintained for years on the soil of the State.

In addition to the order recently issued by the Superintendent of the Military Telegraph directing that no account of the pending battle near Corinth shall be permitted to pass over the wires without the permission of the War Department, we have now what is called a special field-order from General Halleck, by which commanders of army corps and divisions are to see that their campfires are extinguished at all unauthorized hours, and any one attempting to evade this order will be compelled to work intramuros, or better, in the construction of roads. This follows, by itself, the significant paragraph: "This order is understood to apply to all persons—correspondents included."

General Wool has prohibited the publication of all newspapers at Norfolk and throughout the surrounding country. The transportation there of supplies or medicines is also forbidden, and neither soldiers nor civilians will be permitted to visit that city except on business connected with the Department of Virginia.

The citizens of Parkersburg, Va., appear to have been recently thrown into a considerable state of excitement in consequence of the movements of parties of guerrillas on the Kanawha. The town of Burning Springs, in West county, is said to have been destroyed on the 9th instant, by the Mordecai Rangers, and the same fate is alleged to have befallen the little village of Palestine. Parkersburg is reported to be full of fugitives, and as but one company of Federal troops is stationed there, some of the citizens considered the place to be in imminent danger of attack.

From Kentucky we learn that bands of Confederates are still organized here in the central portion of the State, four hundred being encamped at McCormick's, about twenty miles east of Mount Sterling. A party of thirty men also passed through Mount Sterling recently. It is supposed that they had constituted McCormick's a place of rendezvous, with the ultimate intention of moving Southward.

Col. Geary reports that an infantry company of his command was attacked on Thursday week last by a body of Confederate cavalry, and was overpowered. He gives what purports to be the list of casualties, viz: one man killed and fourteen taken prisoner. Satisfied with this exploit, the Confederates are said to have retired with some loss. "I have been informed," adds Col. Geary, "that a portion of Gen. Shields' command had a skirmish with them." What the result of that skirmish was, he leaves Gen. Shields to state.

Gen. McDowell is still on the north side of the Rappahannock. Gen. Banks' whereabouts is uncertain—some say, he is at Strasburg, and others that he is at Harper's Ferry. One thing is certain, he is not as near Richmond as he was some days ago.

The abolitionists have found out a "new dodge," by which they hope to evade the effect of the law of 1850, in regard to fugitive slaves. They contend that the law, in saying nothing of the Constitution, only relates to slaves escaping from one State into another, and does not include the District of Columbia. As a corollary to this objection, we understand, several of the fugitives, now in the District, intend to contest the point before the Circuit Court for the District.

CONFEDERATE REPORTS OF RECENT BATTLES

The Victory Near Corinth. RICHMOND, May 10.—The War Office has received the following official dispatch: Corinth, May 10, via Mobile, May 10. To Gen. S. Cooper, Adjutant General.

We attacked the enemy to-day, and drove him from his position. G. T. BRADSHAW. Corinth, May 8.—Bragg and Van Horn advanced on the enemy at 11 o'clock this morning. After a sharp skirmish, which lasted three hours, we drove the enemy two miles beyond Corinth, and beyond the bridge. Five thousand troops were engaged on each side. The Federal cavalry charged Holloman's battery, but were repulsed in great confusion, their horses falling over the bridge. Our loss was small. Major Ingraham and Capt. Lettowich of Gen. Van Horn's staff, were dangerously wounded. We captured a large amount of clothing and knapsacks. The enemy's loss in killed and wounded was heavy. May 9.—I have just returned from the front. The Federal army is retreating. The Confederates are returning to Corinth. It is reported that the Federal army is retreating to the Tennessee river, having captured large numbers of prisoners and a large amount of property at Paris and Paducah.

Jackson's Victory in the Valley of Virginia. RICHMOND, May 10.—The following official dispatch was received at the War Office this morning: VALLEY DISTRICT, May 9, via Staunton, May 9. To Gen. S. Cooper, Adjutant General. God blessed our arms with victory at McDowell. (Signed) T. J. JACKSON, Major-General.

A despatch to Gov. Letcher, this morning, says that Gen. Jackson telegraphs that he has driven the Federal army from the Valley, and that the enemy is in full flight, both pursued. Our loss is 40 killed, and 200 wounded. The enemy's loss was heavy, and all the Federal troops were driven back to the 12th Georgia regiment, Capt. Fulton, McMillan and Patterson, Lieut. Turpin, Goulet and Woodward, were killed. Captain Woodard was taken prisoner. May 11.—A later despatch to Gov. Letcher, dated Staunton, Saturday evening, says that the enemy's loss at McDowell was 500 killed and 1,000 wounded. The Federal troops burned all their baggage and wagons. Our forces are pursuing them closely. Some of our wounded have arrived here.

Particulars of the Fight at McDowell. The Whelan Intelligence (Federal) has been furnished, by Lieut. Fichte, a Federal officer, with an account of the fight, on the 8th instant, at McDowell, Va. We copy from that paper as follows: It appears that Milroy's force had advanced from the vicinity of the junction of Station far as McDowell, two regiments ten miles beyond and one sixteen. Just before noon on the 8th the pickets of this advanced regiment were driven in, and the main body of the other two. They fell back in good order, about a mile and a quarter of McDowell, where they were ordered to stand firm. They were driven in a quarter to six in the evening, when the main battle began. Our force was ordered out by Col. Turner, to make a reconnaissance, and after proceeding some distance along the Shenandoah river, came unexpectedly into a pass, on either side of which the enemy were posted in force.
