fighting near Hichmond; but, in attempting to wade through the mass of confused and often contradictory accounts in the various dispatches, letters of correspondents, &c., which are all from Federal sources, we have given it up in disgust, resigning ourselves to the necessity of waiting until more reliable details can be obtained, when we shall endeavor to furnish all the light, in regard to that great conter, that is accessible to us. All that we are assured of is, that General McClellan bas met with serious reverses, and seems to be further removed from accomplishing his purpose to take Richmond, than when he collected his grand army on the Peninsula. His lorses, in killed, wounded and missing, are variously sand, and some placing them at much higher figures, together with his slege guns, an inmense quantity of artillery and small arms, and military stores generally; whilst the loss of the Confederates is equally open to conjecture. In the meantime the Government maintains a sullen silence on the subject.

Of the latest news, properly so called, there is very little to record, and that little is of the cloudiest and most indefinite kind. General MrClellan is reported to be safe under the protection of the gunboats, about sixty miles be-low Richmond, on the James river. A portion of General Burnside's command is reported to have reached Fortres Montoe, on their way to reinforce McClellan. In the meantime, however, some movements are making on the wes bank of the James river, which seem to indi cate an intention on the part of the Confeder ates either to blockade the river or to seri ously interfere with the movement of trans-ports laden with supplies for the use of tharmy. According to the correspondent of th New York Times, several batteries have alrea dy been planted below Harrlson's Landing, or the opposite side of the river, one of which fired into the mail-boat Juniata, killed two men on board and wounded six, and so de ranged the ressel that she was obliged to b run ashore to avoid being sunk.

A telegram from Cairo furnishes some par ticulars in regard to the condition of affairs in the Southwest. The Grenada (Mississippi Appeal is quoted as stating that a large num ter of Confederate troops have left Tujelo for Water Valley, some forty miles from Holly Springs. The division commanded by Gen J. C. Breckinridge is said to have gone to Vicksburg and a considerable force of Missis sippi troops to Richmond.

Vickaburg is not yet taken. Porter's mortar fleet is still engaged in bombarding th

city, which is said to have sustained consider able damage; but the Confederates appear de

termined to resist the landing of troops, ever if the batteries should be silenced-some ter thousand Confederates, under Gen. Van Doro being encamped on the high bluffs four mile Gen. Curtis is said to have abandoned a idea of attempting any further offensive opers tions in Arkanses. One account has it that h is hard pressed; that no relief has reached him and that the whole country bordering of White river is up in arms. Another statemen
