Confederates in Maryland. There is now no longer any room for doubt, that the Confederates have actually crossed the Potomac, and are now in force on the soil of Maryland.

Their entrance into Frederick City. The military force in Frederick, consisted of but one company of Federal troops, under command of Captain Faithful, the Provost Marshal, who, of course, on hearing of the near approach of the Confederates, on Friday morning, immediately vacated the city, applying the torch to all military stores.

Under pretence of supporting the Constitution, but in violation of its most valuable provisions, your citizens have been arrested and imprisoned upon no charge, and contrary to all forms of law, the faithful and manly protest against this outrage made by the venerable and illustrious Marylander, who in a letter to your issue, expressed his indignation.

From a gentleman, a resident of this city, who was on a visit to Frederick, and who stated about four miles from up that stream, in all probability, Maryland is shortly to become the scene of the most sanguinary encounters, and death will continue to claim victims by tens of thousands.

Arrival of Federal Troops. Since Friday of last week, immense numbers of troops, estimated at between 10,000 to 250,000, composed of Infantry, Cavalry and Artillery, equipped with large trains of transportation wagons, have continued to arrive in our town and vicinity, and on Wednesday last commenced moving towards Frederick.

A Sign of Peace. The "Washington Republican," is supposed to have stated in the "Toloso Blade," (an Ohio paper,) that the Hon. James M. Ashley, a Republican member of Congress from Ohio, is in favor of such a division of the Union as that contended for by the South.

More Arrests. Messrs. Thomas Gott and Raphael Jarboe, citizens of Medley district, were arrested on Tuesday last, and brought to this place, from whence they were taken to Washington.

Gov. Brown's Proclamation. In view of the presence of the Confederate army within the borders of the State of Maryland, Governor Bradford has issued a proclamation calling upon his citizens to organize without delay such a military force as will effectually assist in repelling the invading forces.

The Coxy Horses. Our Court House has been converted into a temporary hospital, for sick and broken down soldiers, of which there seems to be quite a number.

A Picket Skirmish. We have been informed by a Union man, living near the spot, that on Monday last, a skirmish took place near Medley's Hill, about three miles North-east of Poolesville, between the Confederate and Federal pickets, resulting in a Confederate loss of two killed and four wounded, one of whom has since died.
