SUMMARY OF WAR NEWS.

The following summary of War News, for the past week, was extracted from the Baltimore Courier.

Friday, April 3.—Notwithstanding the constant predictions of our correspondents that the Yaxoo Pass expedition would eventually succeed in reducing the hastily improvised fortifications at the mouth of the Tallapoosa river, and thus clear the way for the triumphant movement down the Yaxoo of the boats and of the transports carrying the land forces, it is now openly admitted that the whole operation has signally failed.

Monday, April 6.—A pity but ominous despatch from Cincinnati, sums up in a few terse sentences the present condition of affairs at Yaxoo. "The news from Yaxoo," it says, "is not encouraging. The Steele's Bayon (Southern) expedition has been abandoned. The work on the cut-off has been abandoned. Rebel cannon command two-thirds of the heights."
