THE object of this Bill is to place in force and to vacate the deed therein made, and to convey the same to the complainant. The bill alleges, that on or about the 15th day of October, 1884, the complainant conveyed certain real estate in said county, and particularly described in a deed, an official copy of which is filed with this bill as a part thereof, to the defendant, who has since intermarried with the co-defendant, Catherine A. Leahon, and that said deed was made upon the express trust, to secure satisfaction of a debt due to the complainant by the defendant, and to be paid to him or his vendee, whoever requested so to do; that at the time of the execution of said deed, the complainant was greatly indebted to the defendant, and was unable to pay the same; that the defendant, who was induced, by the defendant's advice, persuasion and promises of fidelity to the trust, and confidence reposed in him to execute said deed, at the time, and in the absolute form it bears; that the consideration mentioned in said deed was not paid to the complainant, nor any part thereof, nor was it intended to be paid; that the true consideration and intention of the parties being the trust and purposes aforesaid; that the consideration mentioned in the deed was not paid, and the real value of the property, that the complainant derived his support from the property, on which he and the defendant resided, and cultivated it until recently, from the date of the deed, that some time last winter, the defendants moved away, leaving the complainant the sole occupant of the property; that the complainant has been, to his surprise, that the defendant, Alvin G. Leahon, for the first time, claims said property as his own absolute estate, free from any interest or right of the complainant therein, and in the trust and purpose aforesaid, and is now endeavoring to sell the same for his own use and benefit, and positively refuses to reconvey and property to the complainant, or to recognize his obligation in respect thereof, or to satisfy the same; that the complainant so to do, all of which is contrary to the intent of the deed, and to the injury and loss of the complainant, and a violation of the trust reposed in the defendant, as aforesaid.
