LAWS OF MARYLAND.

PUBLIC GENERAL—[ORIGINAL.]

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That there shall be appointed by the Governor a Commissioner of the State of Maryland, who in conjunction with the duties assigned him by this act as hereinafter mentioned, shall also act as secretary of the Board of Public Works, keep a regular journal of the proceedings of said Board, and to be the custodian of all papers, documents and other records appertaining to said office, and will be under the immediate control of said Board of Public Works.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That said Commissioner shall open an office in Baltimore, that shall be accessible at all times to the agricultural and business men of the State, and shall keep a record of the operations of the agricultural and mining products of the State of Maryland, and the price of current of the Baltimore market for the convenience of agriculturists and others visiting said office, and shall furnish, whenever desired in connection with the operations of said board, reliable information in regard to the internal improvements and general financial condition of the State, together with authentic maps and charts showing the geographical position of the State of Maryland, and the railway system now completed or proposed to be built.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That said Commissioner shall be specially charged with the duty of insuring capital and labor into the State of Maryland by means of immigration; he shall prepare and distribute, or cause to be prepared and distributed, both at home and abroad, such facts and information as may conduce to a complete, full and satisfactory understanding of the agricultural, mineral, manufacturing and general commercial resources of the State of Maryland, and shall keep always open to inspection in said office, reliable statistics of all property in the market for sale with the terms annexed, as far as such information can be obtained, together with accurate maps and charts showing the location of such property and the relation in which it stands to railways now built or intended to be built, and such other facilities by means of navigable waters or otherwise, as may be deemed advantageous.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That said Commissioner shall, immediately after his appointment, open communication at such points as he may deem expedient, as will advance the object of immigration to the State of Maryland, and shall distribute, or cause to be distributed, from time to time, as opportunity occurs, such facts and information in regard to the agricultural, mineral, manufacturing and general commercial resources of the State of Maryland, and cause the same to be vigorously distributed in such manner, and at such points as may best conduce to the speedy increase of our population and the occupation of our lands by capital and labor.

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of said Commissioner to collect and publish the statistics of commerce, in each and every year, authentic statistics of the operations and results of every department of trade and business within the limits of the State of Maryland.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That said Commissioner shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars, payable quarterly, and shall employ a clerk, to be appointed by the Governor, at an annual salary of one thousand dollars, payable in the same manner, with such allowance for office rent, advertising and contingent expenses as may be agreed upon by the Board of Public Works, not exceeding two thousand dollars.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That he shall be authorized, for any other agent, without his consent, to visit vessels arriving with immigrants on board, for any purpose whatsoever, until such immigrants have been seen and properly instructed by the Commissioner, or his clerk, provided for in this act.

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That any person or persons, relating to the last preceding section, shall be liable, on conviction in any court of law of this State, having competent jurisdiction, to a fine of not less than fifty dollars, nor more than five hundred dollars, or imprisonment for not less than thirty days, or more than sixty days, at the discretion of the court, and shall go to the State Jail.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That no one shall be appointed as Commissioner of Immigration, or clerk to said Commissioner, who is directly or indirectly interested in, or who has any company, firm or individual bearing for their object the transportation of passengers, by land or water, or the sale of public or private lands outside of the State of Maryland.

CHAPTER 29.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That for the expenses of the support of the Government, for the year ending on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby appropriated, in addition to the appropriations made under chapter one hundred and eighty-three of eighteen hundred and sixty-five, that is to say, to pay the members of the General Assembly, their officers and attendants, including the cost of printing and miscellaneous expenses, and the ten dollars per diem to the Speaker of the House of Delegates, and President of the Senate, each, one hundred thousand dollars, for the postage of members of the General Assembly, including Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Delegates five thousand dollars, for the indexing of the laws and journals of the Senate and House of Delegates eight hundred dollars, for stationery for the present session of the General Assembly, (or so much thereof as may be necessary) including the extra articles ordered, the sum of one thousand dollars; for three hundred copies of the Supplemental Code, 3d volume, ordered by this House, nine hundred dollars; to pay for the Constitu-

tion of Maryland, ordered by this House—125 copies—one hundred and eighty-seven dollars and fifty cents; for printing the laws, journals and documents of the present session, two thousand dollars; for the expenses of distributing the bound copies of laws, documents and journals for the present session to the clerks and registers of this State and the States and Territories, one hundred and fifty dollars; for the expenses of distributing Maryland Reports to the clerks and registers of this State and the States and Territories, fifty dollars; for the expenses of distributing English Statutes and joint resolutions to the Executive and Legislative Departments, one hundred and fifty dollars; for the expenses of distributing No. 8, of January session, 1866, fifty dollars; to pay States printer for cost of paper used in printing reports of the Court of Appeals, eleven hundred and eighty-eight dollars and eighty-eight cents; for extra compensation to Samuel W. Brooks, messenger to the Executive two hundred dollars for the year 1866; for contingent fund for Board of Public Works eight hundred dollars; for additional clerk for Comptroller, twelve hundred dollars; to pay States subscription to volumes 20 and 21 of the Reports of Court of Appeals in addition to appropriation already made, four hundred dollars; to William Camden, clerk of the Treasurer, three hundred dollars; to Alexander Miller and Thomas M. Wolfe, each three hundred and fifty dollars; for services as clerks to the Adjutant General of the State in the enrollment of the Militia, under the act of last chapter 294; to Jacob E. Bell, administrator of James M. Maxwell, deceased, enrolling officer of Militia in Washington county, fifty dollars; for hiring and recording the laws and resolutions of the present session, three hundred and fifty dollars; for four copies of the first and second supplement code for new members, at four dollars each, thirty-two dollars; for retorting the Adjutant General's report, three hundred dollars; for private secretary to Governor, two hundred dollars; for Daniel M. Moore, for services as additional clerk for Comptroller, twelve hundred dollars; for services as clerks to the Attorney for Dorchester county, Francis J. Hoff, five hundred and eighty-four cents; for fees due him as State Attorney for Dorchester county, Alexander Woolford, nine dollars; for fees due him as Sheriff of Dorchester county, Alexander Woolford, one hundred and thirty-two dollars; for the compensation for fees due for suits brought by order of the Comptroller, under joint resolutions No. 29, of 1862, for collection of claims due the State, by the Court of Appeals, Clerk of the Circuit Court for Calvert county, thirty-nine dollars and eighty-five cents, for fees due him by the State, to James Walker, one hundred and twenty-eight cents; to John C. Grier, for fees due him as Clerk of the Circuit Court for Dorchester county, Alexander Woolford, one hundred and thirteen cents for work done about the State House by order of the Lieutenant Governor and the State Librarian, and to Alexander B. Hagner one hundred and thirty-four cents for costs for Thomas H. Phillips, George Williams and Robert Ford, for costs in the case of State vs. Hagner, against the State, and H. S. Shroyck & Son, fifty-nine dollars and twenty-five cents; John H. Franklin for salary as Circuit Judge of the Sixth Judicial Circuit from November 22nd, 1865, to January 1st, 1866, three hundred and thirty-four dollars and seventy-five cents; for J. E. G.
