3. The Awarling Committees are particularly requested to be in attendance and prepared to enter upon their duties by 10 o'clock, A. M. on Wednesday, the first day of the Pair, and the call at the Secretary's Tent for their respective lists. Each list will contain the name of the member of the Committee of Arrangements, who will show the respective Committees the location of the Animals or Articles for their inspection.

4. The Chairmen of Committees will, as early
