Vacasta Lands in Maryland

The Annapolis Genetic says that some attention is being attracted to the varant lands in this State. Dr. Hayward, Land Commissioner, recreatly issued a sumber of warrants to parties for marsh lands on the Eastern Shore, which heretofors were considered valuless, but; owing to the market found for the course grass they produce; in demand. This grass is shipped North, where it is used for bedding on the floors of street cars and otherwise. It brings \$12 per tos.

One of the medes of taking up land is by cerbeat warrant. A person, bulleving in a tract to be recheat to the State for want of heira, applies to the Land. Commissioners for an esheat warrent to effect it. The warrent, is issued on the responsibility of the applicant: that is he takes all the risks, whether he may at some future time be ejected by the heirs, when, as the State Martinda no money fail for the same, he losed what he may have given the State. The survey being made, and a certificate returned, the certificate remains in the Land office six wouths, and if no cavest is estered against the issue of the partnt, that is issued upon the applicant, the State coveying early the title.
