I pur-lished in your paper of the 27th ult., actual documents showing that the said Beard upon going out of office, paid a balance of \$902 94 to Mr. James Anderson, Tresaurer of the succeeding and the present Board. Mr. Peter finding himself exposed in making a reckleding that he undertook to mistead the people, or was wholly Ignorant upon the subject he was endeavoring to discuss, seeks, in your last paper, to find justification in the fact that the old Board of School Commissioners left teachers salaries for the Spring during which they went out of, office, simounting to \$3,74 5s (not \$3,930 75, as stated by him) to be paid by their successors, having out entirely the further information that their successors also received all the accruing movies (for the same year) of the old Board, and the very money in fact out of which the old Board had intended to pay the said salaries. money from the State I resury alone, without running themselves or the county in debt, in the midst of their duties, they were remoted from office by the operation of the new school law, on the 18th of April, 1863. The records of the 'office now show that the incoming Board received July 22, 1864, from the State Treasury the sum of \$5,628 12 which would of course have come into the hands of the old Board had they continued in office. With this and other accruing instalments, they in-tended to pay three spring salaries, and to struggle on as they had done before, to the end of the year. Now one of the first acts of their successors was to negotiate a loan, as end of the year. Now one of the first acts of their successors was to negotiate a loan, as they alleged, to pay these salaries. But the records show that most of these salaries were not paid in fact until after the receipt of the above mentioned sum of \$5,028 12 in July 1868. In proof of the fact that the approaching receipts from the State Treasury would, had the old Board continued in office, have paid these spring salaries (\$3,174 58) and still have carried the Board through the year, the books show, that there was a considerably larger amount of money received in the year 1888, from the State Treasury than was received in 1867, the Squren being as follows: a Received in 1868, mostly by the incoming Board, \$14, 138 14. If therefore, the old Board got along with \$12,091 92, 1867, who can doubt that they would have got through the year 1868 with nearly \$2,000 00 more?
