Useful Hints.

GREASING WAGONS .- The following extract from the Scientific Press is worthy the attention of farmers :

"Greating buggies and wagons is of mor importance than some people imagine. Many wheel is ruined by oiling too plentifully. A well made wheel will endure constant wear for ten to twenty years, if care is taken to use the right kind and proper amount of oil : but it this matter is not attended to, the wheel will be used up in five or six years, or may be Lard should never be used on a wagon, for it will penetrate the hub and work its way out around the tenons of the spokes and il the wheel. Caster oil is a good materifor use on an iron axle; just oil enough should be applied to a spindle to give it a light coating; this is better than more, for the surplus put on will work out at the ends and by the shoulders and nut into the hub around outside the boxes. To oil an axletree, first wipe the spindles clean with a cloth wet with turpentine, if it won't wipe without it. On a buggy or carriage wipe and clean off the back and front ends of the hubs, and then apply a very small quantity of castor oil, or som especially prepared lubricator near the should-ers and point."

Kicking Houses .- The Country Gentlema has the following on the subject of kicking horses :

Much of the kicking of horses, owing to th villainous practice by attendants, men and boys, tessing and tickling the animals, and all owners should look catefully to the conduc of hired men and others. It is very difficult to cure a kicking horse. 
