Explosion of Five Powder-Mills in Ohio.

Explosion of Five Powder-Mills in Ualo.

Sentstersen, Ohio, February 5 — Five powder-mills belonging to the Minni Powder Ompan, and located between Nenia and Yethow Springs, on the Little Minni railroad, exploded at 160 clock this morning. Several men were killed, and another is milesing. The ground is strewn with timbers and debris for half a raile. At Yellow Springs hundreds of windows were demolished. This city was considerably thaken, and the inhabitunts ran into the streets in great slarm. The names of the persons killed by the explosion are: Nero Ballard, Robisson White and a colored mun named Conley. The latter was blown into fragments. Nothing could be found of him but a portion of his head and trunk. The shock was distinctly felt at Dayton, Urlana and Xenia. The amount of loss has not been argeitained. Jundreds of citizens are furrying to the scee of the disaster and rendering all possible swistance. Duncany, a colored map, is so terribly lacerated that his death is momentarily expected. Search is being made among the rulus for more workmen, some of whom are missing. The bodies of the dead are shocking-in mutilated and burned. A brick house, standing more than a mile distant, had the windows completely blown lout, and otherwised damaged. Great excitement valled.




