Useful Hints.

To Externinate WILD Oxions. - What meth ed of cultivation will extirpate this pest and nuisance? Strip the sod completely from a lawr in which the "garlic" has once gained a footing, and despite your utmost care, a sufficien supply of almost infinitesimal "sets" to recrop the whole at an early day will sift thei way into the remaining soil.
