FRION ON THE FINGER. - Many persons suffer extremely from felous on the finger. These afflictions are not only painful, but frequently occasion permanent crippling of the members affected. The following simple prescription is recommended as a cure for this distressing ailment : Take common rock salt, such as is used for saiting down perk or beef, and mix with spirits of turpentine in equal parts; put is on a rag and wrap around the affected part, and as it gets dry, put on more, and in twenty-four hours you are cured.

REMEDY FOR NERVOUS BEADACHE. - Take dessert spoonful of common soda, such as is oughly in a quart of cold water. With this thoroughly shampoo the head for about five minutes, scratching the skin of the head and the back of the neck well with the finger-nails. Then ringe the head with clean water. This remedy is for herrous headache, and not for those afflictions of the head arising from de ranged stomaths.

REMEDY FOR PAINFUL WOUNDS .- Take a pan or shorel with burning coals and sprinkle upon them common brown sugar, and hold the wounded part in the smoke. 
