Useful Hints.

THE CARE OF LAMPS .- The easiest way to clean petroleum lamps is to wash with thin milk of lime, which forms an emulsion with the petroleum and removes every trace of it, and by washing a second time with milk of lime and a small quantity of choride of lime even the smell my be so completely removed us to render the vessels thus cleansed fit for keeping beverages in.
