Inde accounts discover to us that many families of the Mennonites are patronised by the government, and are to settle in New Russia. The history of the Christian Church, particularly about the times of the Reformation, exhibits the singular events which furnished the interior of Europe with settlers of a character resembling that which was marked in the first settlers of America. The violence of persecution drove into the unsettled parts of Europe the men who preferred peace of conscience to every other pleasure. The best policy, & the immediate interest of the Princes made them indulgent to the new settlers, and from them have returned to Europe the best principles of religious liberty, and the greatest spirit of free enquiry. Had he Europeans left the American world profit from the civilization of its own habitants, it would have been long ithout hope. A progress not more rawould not have been made in Eupe, had the uncivilized man been lest emerge from his barbarity. By trinsplanting sects, much has be a done

ier the interior parts of Europe, and so long has Russia struggled in vain to raise its own subjects from their barbarism, that no course can be more wise than to encourage the persecuted or the friends of religious independence to plant themselves in countries which invite and will reward industry. To encourage Artizans in Couth Poussia, in the act of the Prussian Court in 1798, it is promi-'sed, that they shall possess their privileges, without any enquiry into the causes of their emigra ion, while they remain peacesul subjects. The Mennonists have suffered all the contempt which religious prejudice could fix, but by their morals they become the most wseful part of the new population. Their leader has been dead 240 years. For a Century they endured the worst persecuon, and divided into seels in Poland and he adjacent countries. The success of the English Colonies in America, and the tapidity of their growth, will justify the experiments made upon the same character in Europe.

In 1800, a plan was proposed for a colony on the borders of China, in Siberia. It was to consist of 11,000 persons, who were to be cantoned so that no more than 100 samilies should be together. They were to attend to agriculture, and manuf ctures of cloth and furs, for the commerce of China. They were to be soldiers in part, and of persons under sentence of basishment, and the latter afterten years were to gain the privileges of Colonists. The government were to provide 2000 houses, and provide for then; 13 months. No duties were to be paid for the first ten years, and nothing required but an annual consideration to the Impector, and assistance to the new Celonists who should join them-This has some resemblance to the English Colony for transported persons.
