Here it will be discovered, that I allude to his only and main charge-which was, that I had not published an account of certain improper transactions of the French, which, as he says, took place on the Point.

But, Mr. Viator, had the other papers of the city published this outrageous affair when you first made your attack on the American? You must answer no-and you must do this to your shame, as it exhibits your meanness and want of candour-and pre-eminently she ws you destitute of the mild influence of impartiality and common justice. If it was a criminal neglect on the part of this paperthen, was it not equally so on the part of the other papers of the city? Plain honesty and common charity would say ves-and had the views of Vistor been honest, instead of fighting me singly he would have fought the whole field.

But, even admit, for a moment, that enormities like those pictured by the vivid fancy of Viator, had in reality been committed-could it from thence be argued that the editor's of the Americ must of necessity be acquainted therewith? I have before deciared that I had heard nothing of the matter previous to Viator's publication; yet notwithstanding all this, the malignant reptile, still intemperately makes this the corner stone on which with various base materials he villanously aftempts to found monument of infamy. After being blasted in his efforts to sully my claim to the dignified name of an American, which I inherit by the laws of nature, he then sends forth the arrows of vile scurrility, dipped in Gaul, and like an as sassin, under cover, lies in the dark, and seems willing to stab to the vitals: In a word, some of his vile epithets and low names, are far below the productions of a gentleman, and in their profusion, would be estremed honourable to some of the proficients of Billinsgate, and none others.
