A FRIEND TO SIMPLES.

An ingenious Method of propagating Cucumbers for several crops in succession without sowing them.

As soon as there appear several flower buds on a plant, bend the 2d or 3d joint of a branch below the blossom, fasten it firmly in the ground, and cut off the capillary point of the plant. The vegetable speedily takes root, when you separate it from the Parent Stock. Proceed thus with the most vigorous plants; and, as each root has to support only a few fruits with nourishment, you save both labor, to procure a constant succession of Cucumbers, for a number of months, from one sort, which is not so liable to degenerate, as if they were raised from a variety of seeds.

The ship Rebecca, Deal, from Batavia, for Baltimore, was spoken going into the Isle of France, the 10th April.
 Arrived sch'r. Virginia, Edwards, 11 days from St. Thomas—rum—P. A. Guestier. Left there 6th inst. at 12 o'clock, on the 18th June sailed from Kingston, (Jam.) and left there ship Neptune, Greenville; schooner Nimrod, Farland; schooner Leone, all of Baltimore, carried in for trial on 26th June. Left at St. Jago a New York ship discharging; sailed from Barracoa 6th inst. Left schooner Henry, Murphy, of Baltimore, to sail next day (arrived) on the 8th July, in Crooked Island passage. was boarded by a privateer commanded by the famous Jack, Matthew, and treated politely; he had with him a prize brig called the Tartar, but could not learn where from or any thing else relating to her; the privateer reported that she had run ashore the brig Lyance, or Alliance, of Baltimore, mounting 10 guns. Also, schooner Henry, Murphy, 11 days from North East of Cuba—coffee—Alexander Maclean, sailed 6th inst, left there a schooner from Charleston, name unknown; schooner Commerce sailed 5th inst, supposed for Charleston. Spoke on the passage, brig Cabinet, of Norfolk, from Freecamp to Charleston; there are

on board the Henry, 8 sailors belonging to the brig Tartar, of New-York, mounting 10 guns, taken by a French privateer under Henega on the 5th July, and the people put on board the Henry, the 7th On board also is Thomas Barber, of the schooner Eagle, of New York, bound to Jamaica, who was taken on 26th June by a French privateer and sent into Barracoa, after arriving they confined him three days on board and then sent him on shore and set sail with the vessel, where he could not learn.
