

#### LATEST FROM FRANCE.

Imperial Decree,

Bearing regulations on the mode of presentation to the acceptation of the peaple of the proposition announced in article 142 of the organic Smatus Consulte, of the 28th Floreal, 12th

NAPOLEON. by the grace of God, and by the constitutions of the republic, emperor of the French, upon the report of the ministers and council of state, of the 28th Flores!, year 12 -- Ordains the regulation, the tenor of which follows---

Article 1. There shall be open to the records of all the administrations and of all the municipalities, to the offices of all the tribunals, to all the justices of peace, and to all the notaries - registers, upon which all the French are called upon to subscribe their votes on the following prop sition:

"Do the people desire that the imper al dignity shall be hereditary in the direct, mitural, legitimate and adoptive descendants of Napoleon Bonaparte, and in the direct, natural and legitimate descendants of Joseph and Lewis Bonaparte, as regulated by the organic Sinatus Consulte, on the 28th floreal, year

Art. II. The registers shall be open

Art. 3. Immediately after the expiration of the time given for voting, each depositary of register shall be closed, and said register shall be certified, and then directed and forwarded in the course of 2 following days to the Mayor of each municipality; and within the space of 24 hours, the latter shall forward the same to the under prefect of his district. with a note certified by him, and which shall be conformable to model, in pre-

sent regulation, under No. 1. Art. 4. Twenty one days after the publication of the present regulation, the Under Prefest shall transmit to the Prefect all the legisters of his district, with a note by him certified, and

which shall be conformable to model No. 2. Art. 5. I wenty five days after the publications of the present regulation, each Present shall forward to the Minister of the Interior, all the registers of his department, with a general note by him certified, and which shall be conformable to model No. 3

Art. 6. The Presects are authorised to put in extraordinary requisition; the Gens d'Armes, for the quick transmission of the Registers of the several municipalities and the orders relative to the execution of the present regulation.

Art. 7. The ministers are charged with the execution of the present regulation, which shall be printed in the bulletin of the laws. NAPOLEON. (Signed.)
