Among the brilliant company we observed the mayor of our city, and several clergymen, of different denominations—and we add with pleasure, that we learn, the mayor has manifested towards our Indian friends an attention to please, as prompt as that experienced by them at the seat of the general government.

## COMMERCIAL.

The Agent of the Asiatic Council of the Batavian Republic, has the honour of informing the merchants of the United States, that the Supreme Government of the East India Company at Batavia has decreed:

That to such American vessels as show a disposition to be in any wise or manner useful to the Honourable the Company, either by carrying passengers at a reasonable rate, or by the faithful delivery of the papers entrusted to them—the Director-General is authorized to promise, and, in the name of the Government, to assure, that in proportion to the services rendered by them, they shall, in preference to all others, be obliged and favoured.

It is further decreed, that all documents and prices current are to be legalized by me, should they be respected.

It is requested, that the papers may be left at the office, a day previous to their being forwarded.

**INVISIBLE WOMAN.** In the preceding page is a description of a philosophical apparatus, of which a similar one is now exhibiting in this city. It is worthy the attention of the curious.

The following letter from a gentleman of respectability in the city of Washington has been handed the editor of the *Telegraph* for insertion:

Washington City, July 19, 1854.

DEAR SIR,  
Permit me to introduce to your notice Mr. Peter Chouteau, an inhabitant of St. Louis, in upper Louisiana. He brought letters from captain Lewis, which testify, that he is deservedly considered among the most respectable and influential citizens in that country. Since the cession of Louisiana to the United States, Mr. Chouteau's zeal to promote the public welfare, induced him, at the instance of our government, to visit the Osage nation of Indians, with a view to prevail on some of their chiefs to accompany him to the seat of government, for the purpose of effecting a treaty of amity and friendship. On this mission he has been successful, and has accompanied their king, with eleven chiefs and two boys to this city. The promptitude and fidelity with which Mr. Chouteau has fulfilled the wishes of government, as well as the personal danger to which he has been exposed, entitle him, in an eminent degree, to the respect and particular attention of his fellow citizens. It is his intention to travel with the chiefs as far as New-York, that they may take a view of some of the most populous parts of the country. I am, sir, with respect and esteem,

New York, July 23. Arrived since our last. The schooner Betsey, Whelden, in 7 days from Savannah. Spoke last Monday, off Cape Hatteras, a brig 18 days from St. Kitts for Philadelphia.

The ship Octavia, captain Stout, from London, and 49 days from Madeira. Left the brig Luna, of New York, from Lisbon, to sail for this port in 2 weeks; brig (Kearny, supercargo) from New York; and a brig just arrived from Norfolk. The ship Benjamin, of N. York, sailed from Madeira, May 16, for Bombay. The ship Rebecca sailed for Portsmouth the 27th; & the brig Jefferson, of Norfolk, sailed for Bristol the 1st of June. Spoke, June 29, in lat. 39 11, longitude 59 32, the ship Gosport, out 10 days from Norfolk. July 3, in lat. 39, 56, long. 59, 30, the ship Maria, 9 days from Philadelphia for Liverpool. July 10, in lat. 30 40, long. 66, the ship Ritson, of New-York, 60 days from London for Norfolk—Mr. Brown, partner in the house of Gilbert Robinson and Co. of this city got on board the Octavia, and arrived at this port. Captain Stout informs, that Thomas Ustick, Esq. and lady, had arrived safe at Madeira from N. York.

Also, brig Bulia Lee, in 21 days from Falmouth, Jamaica. Left, ship Anna, Riley; brig Triton, Rust, and Integrity, Funk, all of New York, the latter to sail in 2 days. The ship Experiment, Smith, of New York, was at Montego Bay, to sail the 15th inst. Sailed in co. ship Ann, Murdock, for Luca & New York. On the 3d July, near Cape Antonio, captain Lee was captured by a French privateer of 2 carriage guns and 2 swivels, belonging to Havana, & carried into Waering Bay (Isle of Pines) and detained 2 days, during which time they plundered the brig of most of her provisions, liquors &c. and robbed Mr. Thomas Lee, passenger of all his clothes—they then dismissed her, saying that "it was a d—d shame that they could not make prize of such a fine vessel."

At Quarantine. Also, schooner Liberty, Dorgan, in 17 days from Trinidad. Left, brig Commerce, Callahan, for New York in four weeks; sloop —, just arrived from New York; and schooner Wealthy, of Haddam—Markets dull. Passengers, Mr. Allen and lady, Mr. Black, and Mr. Pownall—Flour had been 18 but had got down to 10 dollars, in consequence of the arrival of the sch'r Jolly Bacchus from Philadelphia, and several other vessels.

Ship Guardian, Hunter, in 64 days from Londonderry—and the brig Jane, in 24 days from Surinam. The brig Betsey, Paddock, in 23 days from the City of St. Domingo. Left the schooner Louisa, Clark, to sail in 3 days for Philadelphia; schooner Antelope, Hayes, for do; and sch'r. Lively, of New York.

Came up from quarantine, brig Sally, from Guadalupe. The ship Henry, Smith, from Batavia, has arrived at Salem. She left Java head the 1st March.

The ship Frances—Ann, has arrived at Sumatra in 230 days from New Haven. The ship William Littlejohn, Forrest, arrived at Londonderry, in 25 days from this port.

The Abbe Thule fell in with the Windward Island homeward bound fleet, on the 23d of June, in lat. 17. 17, long. 62, 28, the day after leaving Bassaterre, Guadalupe, and was examined by one of the convoy and directed to proceed; and on the same day was boarded by a small British privateer off Nevis; to which place she was carried and detained two days.

July 4, spoke a Spanish schooner in distress, and supplied her with provisions, lat. 20, 11, long. 66.

July 6, lat. 24, long. 60, 30, spoke a schooner from Edenton for Jamaica.
