JEROME BONAPARTE.—It appears by the legislative acts of France relative to the establishment of the empire, and the elevation of the Bonaparte family, to the imperial dignity, that the brothers, Lucien and Jerome are not admitted in that part of the arrangement which establishes the hereditary succession. In default of male issue from the families of Napoleon, Joseph and Louis; the senate is to appoint a successor. Moreau, together with his letter to his Imperial Highness Bonaparte; which, with other articles, shall be given in this Gazette to-morrow or the next day. Moreau had not been liberated as reported.

Last evening arrived here from Nantz, which place she left the 15th of June, the ship Logan, Capt. Macey. We have received by her French papers to the 11th ult. They are principally filled with official documents, and the proceedings on the trial of the conspirators.

Moreau's fate is at last determined.—He is to be imprisoned for two years.

We have advices from Havannah, says the New-York Mercantile Advertiser of July 27, that by a late ordinance of the Government, American vessels are permitted to enter that port with Horses, Lumber, and every description of Plantation Utensils.

The memorable Mr. RUTLEDGE, of South Carolina, and the celebrated M. BAYARD, of Delaware are now on a visit to Boston. [Boston Gaz.]

Extract of a letter from a Mercantile house in Cork dated June 9, to their correspondent in Philadelphia.

"The quantity of Haxseed left on hand in this market, we compute at 4 a 500 hhd. in the whole kingdom we suppose not less than 10 000 hhd. the demand was scarcely ever known to stop so sudden and unexpectedly.—Upland Georgia cotton dull, 17 a 18d per lb. On the first arrivals from your side the price must decline.

Naval Stores plenty, particularly rosin.

Whale Oil £45 per ton of 252 gallons. A new duty of £24 per ton being lately laid on it, is a prohibition."

Consumption of sugar in England.

By return made to the house of commons, it appears that the quantity of raw sugar, imported in the year 1863, was 3,164,250 cwt. of which 1,689,269 cwt. was exported in a raw and refined state, making the consumption amount to 1,482,960 cwt. the whole paying a duty of 3,133,282 3s. 4d. or about 17,000,000 dollars.

The annual revenue of the city of Petersburg amounts to 982,605 roubles its expenses to 827,255.

Arrived schr. Elenor, Smith, 18 days from Basseterre, (Guad.)—sugars—Ambrose Clerk. The schooner Victory for Baltimore sailed—the day before to touch at St. Thomas. Left brig Sophia, of Philadelphia in 15 days; Commerce, Smith, of ditto in three weeks, and many others belonging to the Northward. 8 days before they sailed the schr. Iris, of Fredericksburg, was seized for smuggling, ran away in the night and carried off the French Guard. 8 days ago spoke the Danish sloop John, from Baltimore to St. Thomas, lat. 35, long. 70. The Swedish brig Marias, from Guadaloupe came into the Capes with the Elenor. Passed in the Bay ship Elizabeth, from Amsterdam and Fame from New Orleans bound up.

Also, English ship Mary, Cox, (Acton late master) 31 days from Barbadoes. July 14, of Cape Romano on their passage to Savannah, was taken by La Dame Ambert, French privateer, the people taken out, a Prizemaster put on board and ordered for Guadaloupe. Next day fell in with the English sloop of war Lily, an engagement ensued and the ship of war was finally taken with the loss of the Captain and 1st. Lieutenant, and several other officers.—Next day, (16) the Mary's crew was returned on board of their own vessels, together with the whole of the Lily's people except two of the officers, and after taking the slaves, Ivory & every other valuable they could get from the Mary, they desired them to go any where

they pleased, as they did not wish to be encumbered with so dull a sailing vessel. The captain of the Mary, landed several of the sloop of war people on Cape Hatteras, the wounded men they sent to Norfolk.—The privateer, 3 days before, had taken an English Galliot from Honduras to London, the crew of which is now on board. The privateer was waiting to intercept two English vessels that they understood were ready to sail from Charleston to Liverpool. The remaining part of the Mary's cargo is Redwood, small Ivory and Manchester Cottons.
