
COURT OF KING'S BENCH. May 4.

[U. S. Gaz.

POTTER U. BROWN. The plaintiff is a merchant in London, the defendant a merchant in Baltimore, in America. A Bill was drawn by her for 1200% on a Mr. Mangin, residing here. It was refused acceptance, and some time after the bill became due, the defendant availed herself, on account of her insolvency, of the bankrupt laws in America; and Messrs. Page and Co. with whom the bill was negotiated at Baltimore, had proved the debt for the consideration given on her estate. The case came before the Court on a demurzer, and the question was, if a foreign certificate of hankruptcy, under the cucumstances, could be a debar to a demand on the drawer of the bill, or, in other words, if the contract has been discharged by the certifica'e of bankrupt.

Mr. CARR contended, that the certificate was no bar, on these grounds : - 1st, That the immediate cause of action happened in England by the non acceptance: 2d, Taking this as a simple contract, and the Plaintiff as a resident here, the law which shall operate upon the debt, follows the person of the debtor, and not of the creditor! 3d, This being upon a bill of exchange, is such a chose in action as refers the debt to this country. The Learned Counsel having ar gued these points from the cases of Bright and Purrier, Milford and Mayer, and others, Mr. JERVIS was proceeding

to reply, when he was interrupted by Lord ELLENBOROUGH, who said, that the cirtificate was a sufficient bar. The courtesy established between nations made them regard their respective laws, and it was the rule in England to pay that respect when foreign laws did not contradict any imperiant maxim of our own These points had been perfectly settled in the cases of Hunter and Gaiding, Hunter and Potts, and Valentine and Golding.
