

We observe by an extract of a letter from a French house in Bordeaux that it is rumored the Pope himself will pay a visit to France for the purpose of making the ceremony of the Sacristian, at Bonaparte's coronation, which is to take place on the 14th July, either at Rheims or Lyons.

From the great importation of dollars into England from the North, and from Lisbon, as well from the United States, we are told they have fallen to four shillings and eight pence sterling each, or to about three and a half per cent. of their real value. Coffee and sugar supported high prices.

A private letter from Paris, dated May 17, has the following particulars:—

Bonaparte will on the 14th July, be invested in the *Champ de Mars*, by the grand constable, with the imperial mantle, and receive from him the imperial sword, both of which will be previously consecrated in the cathedral church of Notre Dame by the cardinal, arch bishop of Paris. It is said there will be no anointing or coronation.

Bonaparte after receiving the mantle, will take the oath attached to his high dignity in presence of the members of the senate, those of the tribunate, the legislative body, tribunals, and the other constituted authorities.

Another letter, dated May 22, says:— "Besides the known disagreements in our imperial family, between his majesty Napoleon and his brother citizen Lucien Bonaparte, his imperial highness, prince Louis Bonaparte, has narrowly escaped an affair of honor with citizen Beauharnois, brother to her imperial highness, the princess Fanny de Beauharnois, consort to prince Louis. This quarrel originated in the discontent of citizen Beauharnois, who, though his mother was saluted an empress, his father decried an emperor, his sister made a princess, and his brother-in-law an imperial prince, and a constable of the empire, in the same day; he received neither rank nor promotion, but simply an annuity of 100,000 livres (40000) in the month, until he can be better provided for. In the challenge to prince Louis, citizen Beauharnois said, that he was a viscount, when his imperial highness was only a *sans culotte*; and that he possessed property to the amount of 60,000 livres in the year, when the whole imperial Bonaparte family together did not possess an acre of land, or a cottage.

Cit. Flahault, son to the guillotined count de Flahault, aid-de-camp to his imperial highness prince Louis, carried this letter to his majesty, the emperor Napoleon, who ordered the field-marshal, citizen Murat, to put citizen Beauharnois under arrest; who notwithstanding the interference of her imperial majesty Josephine, his mother, he has been exiled, as some say, to the army on the coast; or as others pretend, to join the remainder of the disgraced Bonapartes, at Rome.

We have just received the news by the Telegraph that the consuls of the Italian republic had elected the illustrious first consul, and their ex-devant president at present our emperor, his majesty Napoleon their hereditary king of Lombardy.

Died, on Saturday, the 28th ult. near Dover in the state of Delaware, a black man named POMER, in the hundred and twentieth year of his age.

On Tuesday last at Philadelphia, JOSEPH FRANK, Esq. in the 76th year of his age, formerly of Strasburg, Lancaster county.

Thomas Perkins, Esq. commissioner of loans in the commonwealth of Massachusetts, has been removed from office, and general Thompson J. Skinner, one of the representatives of that state in congress appointed to succeed him. Gen. Skinner has arrived in Boston, to undertake the duties of his office.
