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NORFOLK, August 2.
FRENCH IMPERIAL FRATERNITY.
By a gentleman who arrived yesterday from Charleston, we are informed, that the French privateers have completely blockaded that port, as the following fact will shew.—Captain Micks, in a sloop laden with coffee from Cape Francois, having taken a pilot off the Bar of Charleston, wished to go in; but the pilot informed him that two French privateers were lying close to the Bar, that it would be impossible for him to get in; and advised him to attempt another port. Captain Micks did so, and arrived safe at Wilmington, North Carolina!

CHARLESTON, July 26.
In consequence of information given to the officers of revenue, stating, that a schooner called the Eliza, alias the Divina Pastora, commanded by a man named Bernard Johnson, had been fitted in this port, and was intended to be converted into a French privateer: she was sent after early in this month by the collector, to where she lay at anchor near Sullivan's Island, and brought back to town. A libel was filed against her in the Federal District Court, holding Admiralty Jurisdiction. On Tuesday last her trial came on, when, after a hearing of eight hours, the jury brought in a verdict against the vessel and cargo, which are in consequence condemned as forfeited to the United States, for the said offence against the laws of the United States. Captain Johnson is now in confinement, and will be tried at a Special Circuit Court.

From what we could interpret of the affected smartness and bombastic attempt at wit, as exhibited in the notice of exaltation, which the editors of the Gazette gave the other day, when promising the publication of Viator (which appeared yesterday, after the usual length of time to prepare) we discovered that the writer was declared a most "potent surgeon," wielding the most "keen instrument," & which, it might have been supposed, would have cut, at least, "half an inch within the skin"—but behold, it has proved too dull and blunt to probe even the "ulcers of democracy;" much less can it cut away "excessencies" [the Gazette, we suppose, meant, excessencies] to reach the "vital part"! In short, all that we can see worthy of notice, in Viator's production, is, (notwithstanding his assertion to the contrary) that in our last shot at him, we exactly hit our mark; and in knowing this, we know him to be beneath our notice; and we likewise know him to be, as publicly posted, a disgrace to society—a stigma on every thing that constitutes the dignity of a gentleman—and a low-bred malicious slanderer.

Were we to enter into a detailed observance of Viator's vapid string of strange inconsistency, stupidity and malice, we are conscious we should commit ourselves, in the opinion of many of our readers; for the fallacy, fashood and impotence of every sentence is sufficiently conspicuous. To gibbet the wretch, we should be under the necessity of dragging him from his lurking hole—and after doing this, we well know, that the necessary exposure which should follow, would require more time and paper, than we are willing to squander on so unworthy an object. We have therefore only to add, that when we say Viator is beneath our notice, we wish it viewed in a point of view; only as it respects that system of personal abuse which he, under cover, has been unfairly permitted to adopt—and not on the score of politics—for when principles are attacked, which we respect, they shall be defended, although the infamous Viator may be the immediate opponent.—But at present, in this line, there is no specific cause of dispute between W. Pechin and Viator, as all can readily perceive, further than merely the rant of wild, incoherent and untenable declamation, embracing charges, materials for forming which are only to be found floating in the inflamed shallow brain-pans of the crazed Viator—who (for the present) we compassionately "Leave to heaven,

And to those thorns that in his bo-
corn lodge, to prick and sting him."

Each field-marshal of the French REPUBLICAN Empire has received from his imperial majesty, a present, in ready money, of 300,000 livres (£12,500) to equip himself. Their regimentals are to be the same as those of the late marshals de France under the king.

The Court of Bavaria, whatever may have been insinuated respecting past transactions in that circle, have expressed public approbation of the increasing happiness of the people. As a proof of it they consider the increasing number of peasantry, who, by the generosity of the rich, are released from abject slavery. The council of military justice has been suppressed. An Adutory General has

been substituted with the same privileges as in the civil courts. In the exchange with Austria, Bavaria receives part of the Bishoprick of Kempton for the Burgau. In 1803 in Vienna and the Lower Austria, were 9,904 marriages, 44,455 births, and 40,812 deaths. The births exceeded the deaths by 3,633. Among the deaths, under 7 years of age were 20,252; from 7 to 17 years, 1,223; from 17 to 40, 4993; from 40 to 50, 2,459, and above 50 years, 11,505, of whom several were above 100 years of age. Only 202 perished by the small pox, so very greatly has this class of sufferers been diminished by the most important discovery of the vaccine. A new system of Forest Laws has been obtained in Bavaria. The advantages to the population, & the agriculture of the country may be known from the history of these laws in England. On the last Leipsic fair, were 2635 German and Latin works. Of which 273 were Novels, and 72 pieces for the Theatre. The works in other languages were 295, and 273 were articles of Music. The Duke of Saxe-Gotha, well known for his Literature, and for his generous patronage of learned men, has directed in his will that he should be interred in his garden, in a common grave without a monument, or an epitaph, and his will has been executed. His merit entitles him to higher notice, and he will live in the memory of posterity. Posterity will not be bound by the will which can only exclude them from the use of the wealth of the worthy dead, in any tribute to their memory. Even zealous Luther is not forgotten. A literary society at Mansfield have obtained the King of Prussia's consent to erect a monument to this benefactor of mankind. The king has contributed 500 dollars to this expression of public gratitude. The Protestant worship is established at Wurtzburg, by an electoral rescript of 11th of November, 1803.
